## School Board Makes Changes At Session

Several changes were approved by Cross Plains School Board in regular session last Thursday and Friday.

Site of the new Agriculture Building, on which site preparation will begin soon, has been changed to immediately south of the old Homemaking Cottage, now being used as a field house.

Supt. Scot Edgington stated that hopefully the concrete slab will be poured in the next week or two.

Bids will be taken on the old homemaking structure to be opened, as advertised elsewhere in today's Review, on Friday, Jan. 20.

Trustees also changed their regular meeting day to the second Thursday of each month at 7 p.m.

Local school district will soon be using a data processing tax accounting system made available through Region 14 Education Service Center. Edgington noted it is a computer service which is expected to save time, labor and costs in processing school taxes. He emphasized that a tax office will still be maintained here. "It will be similar to the computer service used by the country," the superintendent stated.

Trustees extended Edgington's contract for a year. It is now for three years through the 1980-81 school year.

# 2-Day Junior Stock Show Slated Here For Week End

Annual Callahan County Junior Livestock Show will begin a two-day exhibition Friday, Jan. 13 at 9:30 a.m. at the show barn a mile north of Cross Plains on Highway 206. The show will be completed on Saturday.

An estimate of 250 entries are expected from Callahan County 4-H Clubs and school Future Farmers of America chapters, says Greg Gerngross, county extension agent who serves as secretary for the show organization. Included will be

50 swine entries, 25 beef entries, 75 sheep and goat entries, 10 dairy entries and about 100 poultry and rabbit entries.

The show is sponsored by the

Callahan County Junior Livestock Show Association through contributions from local and area businesses and individuals. Officers of the association are

Don Harris of Cross Plains, president; Doug Ford of Clyde, treasurer, and Greg Gerngross of Baird, secretary. Directors of the association are individuals in the county who have an interest in youth and the promotion of youth activities.

Judging will start at 9:30 a.m. on Friday with the poultry and rabbit competition. J. E. Moore of Wylie will judge both divisions with B. P. Stephenson of Baird acting as superintendent.

Also on Friday breeding sheep and goat judging will begin at 10 a.m. followed by fat lamb show at 11 a.m. Roger Blackmon of Coleman will judge sheep and goat classes, and he will also be the judge of the swine exhibit which is scheduled to begin at 1 p.m. Edwin Schaefer of Cross Plains will serve as superintendent of the breeding sheep. Scotty Mitchell will serve as fat lamb superintendent.

A later start is scheduled for the second days activities. On Saturday judging of dairy cattle will be held at 1:30 p.m. That will be followed by the beef heifer show slated to begin at 11 a.m.

The fat steer competition will get underway at 1 p.m. on January 14.

Superintendent of the beef show will be Billy Kniffen of Clyde. Lawrence Winkler of Albany will judge the beef and dairy cattle shows.

## New Farm Bill Designed For Corporate Take-Over

Editor's Note: Following is the second in a three-part series written by George Mack Taff, Sr. and J. D. Hutton of the Pioneer Community citing the dilemma facing the American farmer today. This article concerns dissatisfaction with the new farm bill and cost comparisons of prices received for three major farm products in 1955 and 1977 and costs of foodstuff and articles made from that produce. The article follows.

The new farm bill is designed to further oppress the farmer, increase corporate take-over, and possibly bankrupt the basic economy of this country. We urge you, the consumer, to protect your interest by supporting the American farmer. Ask yourself this question.

Could I support my family with the same income I had in 1955? Most major farm prices today are comparable with 1955 prices.

Cotton in 1955 brought \$3.55 cents per pound, and in 1977 it brought 40.00 cents per pound. Levi pants cost \$3.15 per pair in 1955, and in 1977 cost was \$17.95.

Wheat brought 2.04 per bushel in 1955, and it brought \$2.00 per bushel in 1977. A large loaf of bread cost 21 cents in 1955, and in 1977 a large loaf of bread cost 63 cents.

Back in 1955 peanuts brought 11.6 cents per pound figured on gross weight, and 1977 peanuts brought 18 cents per pound figured on gross weight. An 18 ounce jar of peanut butter cost 59 cents in 1955, but in 1977

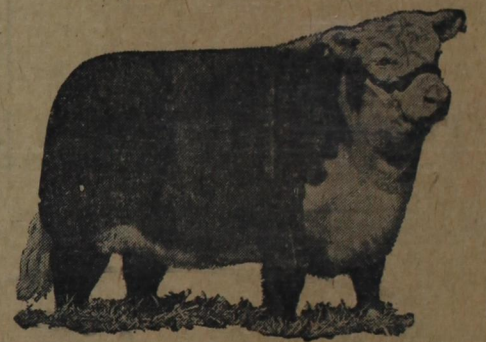

Wheat would bring \$6.12 per bushel for 63 cent large loaf of bread.

Peanuts would be 28 cents per pound figured on gross weight for the \$1.32 for an 18 ounce jar of peanut butter.

The farmer today is being asked to produce for yesterday's prices in order for the middle man to continue increasing his prices. You, the consumer, are paying enough already. The problem is that we, the ones who fight weather, drought and insects, aren't getting our fair share.
