



Rom. 16:16

PREACHING CHRIST . . . Please read: Phil. 2:12-20. "Then Philip went down to the city of Samaria, and preached Christ unto them." Ac. 8:5. And in that same chapter we learn how God directed Philip to a man of Ethiopia to whom he preached Jesus Christ, Vs. 26-39.
