On The Corner Subject Well A Little Dry

When the well starts to go dry, you dig a little deeper. That's what I'm doing to find something to write about this week.

BITS AND PIECES:

I got a news release the other day saying that while Texas is the second largest food-growing state in the nation, only 6 per cent of this production is processed inside the state.

That, according to the release, is because it's cheaper to move this production out-of-state via deregulated interstate carrier for processing then back into the state for consumption.

It went on to explain that carrier rates inside the state are regulated by the state and so are higher. Thus, the Texas farmer is forced to sell his products out of state.

How much money are they talking about? It gave as an example the shipping of finished livestock feed from Fort Worth to Marshall. The cost was \$16.50 a ton. It costs only \$10.22 a ton to ship that same feed from Fort Worth to Shreveport, La. Incidentally, the route from Fort Worth to Shreveport runs through Marshall.

The whole point of the release was that Texas' trucking regulations need to be reformed. Amen!

A recent release from the Dow chemical company said it has developed a new herbicide for killing mesquite trees that is twice as effective as what has been on the market up to now. It's called "Reclaim" but it ain't cheap. The release set the cost at about \$26 an acre when used by itself or \$23 when mixed half-and-half with Grazon PC which kills pricklypear.

Gosh, I can remember when you could have bought the whole place for \$26 an acre. But, then, I've been around a while.

I normally let "wiser" heads than I comment about national and international events but I noticed in the paper that President Reagan was again voicing "concern and anger" over the Iraqi missile strike in the Persian Gulf which left nearly two score of our sailors dead. He's getting pretty good at it. He ought to be, he's had enough practice.

WTU Files for Increase in Rates

West Texas Utilities Co. has filed for an increase in its retail electric rates, citing the costs of completing a new coal-fire power plant as making the move necessary.

"We have said over and over again that it would be necessary to increase rates when our Oklahoma Power Station was completed," said Larry Cheshier, WTU's local manager in Cross Plains, adding that WTU's last rate request came almost three years ago.

The rate changes being sought would add \$50,361,475 to the Company's annual retail revenue. This is a 23.9 percent increase over the test year ending March 31, on which the case is based. The request was filed May 19 with cities in the WTU service area and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas in Austin.

Mr. Cheshier said there is no such thing as a "typical customer," but that the new rates, if approved, would mean that a residential electric customer using 625 kilowatt-hours per month

Board Approves Athletic Budget, Transfers

The Board of Trustees for the Cross Plains Independent School District met in regular session on May 20. A summary of the items addressed include:

1. Transfer students from outside the Cross Plains I.S.D. were approved. For the 1987-88 school year there will be 24 students attending C.P.I.S.D. that reside outside the district.

2. The 1987-88 athletic budget was approved. Amount of the budget is \$35,390.

3. The 1987-88 school calendar was tabled due to conflicts between holidays and U.I.L. district contests. It will be reconsidered again in June.

4. Use of the auditorium for a dance recital in June was approved by the board.

5. An amend to the tax collection contract between C.P.I.S.D. and the Callahan County Tax Office was approved. The cost of collection of school taxes by the county office will now be based on the number of parcels in the school district instead of on a percentage of the taxes collected.

6. Permission was given to the administration to hire part-time temporary help as needed during the summer. This is due to the changes from the Texas Education Agency in data processing and to help complete the various projects currently under-

way.

7. Safety equipment for the lunch room was tabled in order to allow the superintendent time to verify certain parts of the safety equipment with the Workman's Compensation Insurance and the School Liability Insurance Company.

8. Student Insurance for the 1987-88 school year was tabled and the superintendent directed to contact other school insurance companies in regard to a better rate per student and/or better coverage.

9. The Drug Dog Program was approved for the 1987-88 school year.

10. The superintendent reported to the board that the school had experienced some vandalism, but that the city policeman, Jerry Martinez, had resolved the matter and restitution for the damage was being paid by the parties involved.

11. The school board approved the hiring of Ann Watson as part-time counselor for the 1987-88 school year. Mrs. Watson is currently from Coleman and will be replacing Mrs. Bobbie Trammell, who will be with the Baird I.S.D. next year. The board also approved Mrs. Olinda Hale as third grade teacher for the 1987-88 school year. Mrs. Hale will be replacing Mrs. Wanda Grable, who is retiring at the end of this year.

Callahan County's Population Increasing

Callahan County's population is increasing 14.6 percent per year according to figures recently released from the U.S. Department of Commerce Bureau of the Census.

Figures show that from April 1, 1980 to July 1, 1985, Callahan County's population has increased 14.6 percent. The county's population in 1980 was reported at 10,992 and its 1985 population is listed at 12,600, an increase of 1,600 persons.

No figures were released for individual towns in Callahan County.

Adjacent counties and their population totals and percentage increase or decrease include: Jones, 18,200, 5.4% increase; Taylor, 122,200, 10.2% increase; Runnels, 12,500, 5.5% increase; Coleman, 10,600, 1.7% increase; Brown, 35,100, 6.0% increase; Eastland, 20,700, 6.4% increase; Stephens, 10,400, 5.1% increase; and Shackelford, 4,000, 1.8% increase.
