

Bank Deposits Here Reach All-Time High

Bank deposits in Cross Plains have again established a new high, according to a statement of conditions published this week by the Citizens State Bank on page 2 of today's Review.

Although in that report, required by the State Banking Commission, figures are rounded off to the nearest thousand, Jack W. Tunnell, bank president, provided the actual deposit figure at the end of 1977, which was \$10,491,611.92.

That figure compares with a year ago when deposits were listed at \$9,647,552.09, and increase of \$844,059.83. By way of comparison five years ago the Citizens State Bank totaled \$6,826,503.10. During the past five years deposits have increased over three and one-half million dollars (\$3,665,108.82). Tunnell noted that a bank

has surges in both directions, (increases and decreases in deposits) but locally those surges have generally tended to be increases.

The bank president stated that those at the bank were proud of the growth shown, and he extended appreciation to the many customers served for the confidence and trust shown. "We will continue to strive to merit approval of the customers," Mr. Tunnell stated.

Chimney Catches Man In Burglary Attempt

A charge of attempted burglary was filed against a Cross Plains man after he was freed from spending several hours in an old unused chimney in the Cross Plains Higginbotham store Monday morning.

Jim Greener, Cross Plains Chief of Police, filed the count in L. P. Mitchell's Justice Precinct 6 Court against William Keith Jones of this city.

Shortly before the filing, the 26-year-old Jones had been freed from a chimney where he was lodged several hours. He was pulled from where he was stuck several feet from the top of the chimney, by Greener, and Higginbotham employees, Baylis Pope and Steve Lipstraw.

Pope had located Jones in the old chimney after cries for help were heard by employees shortly after the store opened. Greener was summoned and after some bricks were removed, Jones was freed about 8:30 a.m. He reportedly became wedged in the chimney sometime between 1 a.m. and 8 a.m. Monday when he slipped when attempting to get out of the chimney when entry into the store could not be made through it.

Upon extraction, Jones was taken to a local physician for emergency treatment, required primarily for loss of circulation. He was later transferred to Callahan County Jail in Baird.

In this article, and two or three to follow, we want to give some of the basic doctrines of Premillennialism and study them in the light of God's word.

Premillennial, a compound word, means: Pre-, before and millennial, one thousand years. Thus the word means "before one thousand years."

But this passage does not mention: (1) The second coming of Christ; (2) a bodily resurrection; (3) a literal throne; (4) a reign on the earth; (5) Jerusalem or Palestine; (6) nor Christ on the earth. Please read and examine the passage and see for yourself. And friends, always remember — it is never proper to array highly figurative passages as Rev. 20 against plain, simple truths of God's word.

My friends, the Jewish people (generally speaking) sought a literal earthly ruler and missed the truth of God regarding Christ and his kingdom. And many wonderful people are being led into the same error today.

Rural four-party line now costs \$9.95 and will be \$10, but figures were not available for party lines within the township. The Docket 81 billings will be evident either on the January or February bills, it was opined.

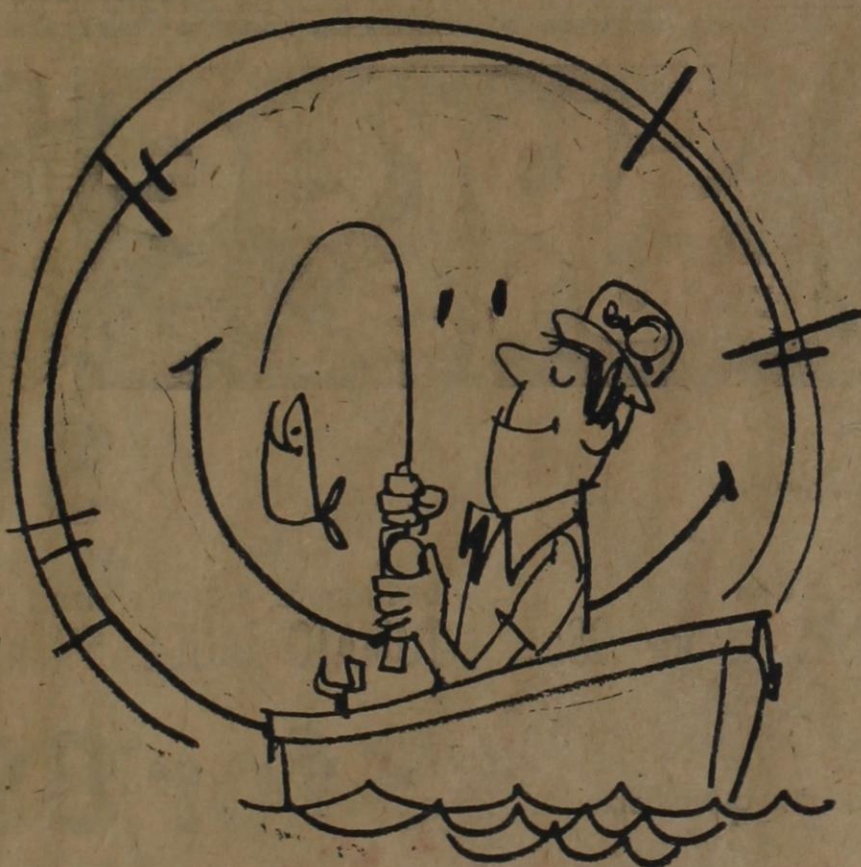
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Cottonwood Sector News . . .
