

In this article, and two or three to follow, we want to give some of the basic doctrines of Premillennialism and study them in the light of God's word.

Premillennial, a compound word, means: Pre-, before and millennial, one thousand years. Thus the word means 'before one thousand years.'

In the main, the premillennial theory has Christ returning to the earth (in Jerusalem of Palestine), set up his kingdom (an earthly kingdom), and reign as king on David's throne (a literal throne on earth), for a literal thousand years. The theory also has two resurrections a thousand years apart. The righteous being raised to reign with Christ during the thousand year reign (the first resurrection) and at the end of that thousand years the unrighteous will be raised. We purpose to show from the Scriptures that each of these expectations of the premillennial theory is the present possession of the children of God, and consequently the premillennial theory is false.
