In determining the price support level for these additional peanuts, the Secretary will be ooking at current demand for peanut oil and meal, expected prices of other vegetable oils and protein meals, and the demand for peanuts in foreign markets.

In 1977, price support was available on the entire crop of peanuts produced on alloted acres. The support level was \$430.50 per ton, or \$410.50 per ton after a deduction of \$20 for storage, handling and inspection. This deduction will not be made under the 1978 program.

Statement of Nondiscrimination



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


