When the Vietnam War occurred I was a teenager and it seemed so distant with numerous misunderstandings and it didn't seem real. That was until my cousin, Douglas (Rusty) McCorkle, Jr. was killed in a rocket attack.

It was a relief for all the troops to finally be pulled out of Vietnam and returned home. The disrespectful fashion in which these veterans were treated has always haunted me. It has to be tops on the list of national blunders.

It is sad that the veterans from all the other wars are now reliving their personal nightmares, due to this new encounter. My dad watches the Desert Storm in Saudi Arabia intently, then regrets doing so. The events of World War II flash back, too vivid. Many vets are already seeking aid through counseling to cope with their feelings.

At least these G.I.'s have support from the country and hopefully do not feel neglected. It is our wish that it can be over quickly. I know our community will pray for that end.

A special friend recently wrote this neat statement that can be helpful with our sorrow, "Realize grief can be endured and when divided by sharing; lessens with time."

meone else how to care for a sick person; as an alternative to nursing home care; to care for an elderly loved one; recovering from accidents, heart attacks or strokes; or to assist a terminally ill person and their family.

If you are 65 or over Medicare pays the full cost of all home health visits. Payment for services can also be through Medicaid, Workmen's Compensation, Veterans Administration, and Champus. Most private insurers and major medical policies now provide home care benefits.

The main qualifying factor for the program is that the patient must be

home-bound, in that it is difficult for them to see a doctor or need assistance to physically travel there. A person using a walker or wheel chair would qualify.

January 31 Deadline For Callahan Water Supply Corp.

January 31, 1991 is the final date for applications of membership in the Callahan County Water Supply Corporation. The original cut-off date was extended by the Board of Directors.

Any Callahan County landowner currently not in a water district and wishing treated water must become a member of the corporation before the final date. For the corporation to serve an area, at least two meters per mile must be obtained.

The corporation hopes to serve everyone not within an existing water system. The Board of Directors are depending on persons to contact their neighbors to inform them of the sign-up and to assure there will be enough meters in their area to receive water.

The size of the water lines will be determined by those signing before the final date. If more meters are added on later, there will not be enough water. For this reason, it is necessary to sign an application now.

Application forms are available at the Callahan County Appraisal District Office, located in the old hospital building in Baird, or call (915) 893-4346 for more information.

Carrier Chaired Ethics And Ag Subcommittees

AUSTIN — Lt. Governor Bob Bullock announced committee assignments this week, naming state Senator Steve Carrier (D-Roby) to several key slots in the Texas Senate leadership.

With the early focus of the Legislature on ethics, Bullock assigned Carrier to chair the Senate Subcommittee on Elections and Ethics. The Lt. Governor has already referred the ethics reform bill, which is co-authored by Senator Carrier, directly to Carrier's subcommittee.

In addition, Carrier was named to the chairmanship of the Senate Subcommittee on Agriculture. As the only member of the Senate who makes his living from farming, Carrier will use his experience to help protect farmers and ranchers from burdensome regulations and meddlesome state agriculture inspectors, and to further the economic development potential for value-added processing of Texas' basic crops. Carrier will also serve on the full committee on Natural Resources handling water, energy, and environment.

Also, Carrier was named to the Committee on Economic Development and to its Subcommittee on Insurance. All legislation dealing with insurance must pass through this committee, and with Governor Ann Richards' commitment to representing consumer interests and additional accountability of the insurance industry and the State Board of Insurance, the Insurance Subcommittee will have a crowded agenda. Finally, Senator Carrier was named to the Special Subcommittee on Legislative Districts and will continue in his position on the Sunset Commission.

The 30th Senate District consists of 30 counties stretching from Sherman-Denison to the Texas Panhandle. Carrier, who has represented the district since 1988, maintains district offices in Gainesville, Wichita Falls, and his hometown of Roby.

John R. Cook Appointed To House Committees

John R. Cook, District 64 State Representative was appointed Thursday, January 17, by Speaker Gib Lewis to membership on the House Energy Committee and the House Committee on Criminal Jurisprudence.

The Energy Committee in the House of Representatives is composed of 9 members of the house with jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to the conservation of energy resources of Texas, the production, regulation, transportation and development of oil, gas and other energy resources, mining and development of mineral deposits, pipelines, pipeline companies and all others operating as common carriers in the state. The Energy Committee also has jurisdiction over matters relating to the Texas Railroad Commission.

The House Committee on Criminal Jurisprudence is also composed of 9 members of the house with jurisdiction over all matters pertaining to criminal law, probation, parole, criminal procedure in the courts of Texas, revisions and amendments of the Penal Code and fines and penalties arising under civil laws. The Criminal Jurisprudence Committee also has jurisdiction in matters relating to the Office of State Prosecuting Attorney and the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council.

The appointments received by Representative Cook were appointments by the speaker rather than seniority appointments since this is the first term served by Representative Cook. Each member of the house was provided the opportunity to give the speaker an indication of his or her first two preferences on committee assignments. Representative Cook has requested the Energy Committee as his first choice since the economy of the district and state are so tied to energy related business. He did not receive his second choice which was the House Committee on Agriculture and Livestock.

Representative Cook believes that the opportunity to serve on the energy committee will be beneficial to the 64th District and service on the criminal jurisprudence committee will give us some input in working to provide stronger laws relating to sentencing of drug dealers.

Base Fertilizer Decisions On A Soil Test

It's not too late to test soil samples to determine fertilizer needs for spring crops.

When farmers look for ways to reduce production costs, they often consider reducing fertilizer usage. But such a practice may result in yields too low to cover production costs.

A soil test may indicate that fertilizer is needed to attain a desired yield goal. Fertilizing at recommended rates will increase the probability of boosting yields enough to more than pay for the fertilizer and provide some margin of profit.

On the other hand, savings can also result when a soil test shows adequate levels of nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium or other necessary nutrients.

In either case, following soil test recommendations would effectively reduce the per-unit production costs and increase the chances of making a profit.

The Texas A&M Soil Testing Laboratories at College Station and Lubbock routinely analyze soils to determine the amount of available nitrogen present in the soil. This analysis is especially important to determine carryover nitrogen following a dry, or low-yield year. A reduced nitrogen recommendation results in savings without sacrificing yield.

There is no substitute for knowing a soil's nutrient balance when planning for spring crops. Testing can provide an economical means of determining a soil's nutrient status and can help a farmer make those major economic decisions with greater confidence.

Individuals Not Paying State Sales Tax Statements

Callahan County coffers have collected on only one-third of all individuals owing the county for sales tax on tires purchased at an Abilene business.

County commissioners, in a called meeting Friday, January 4, heard a report from County Treasurer Dora Hounshell, informing the commissioners that only nine of the 28 individuals owing for sales tax on the tire purchases have paid the county.

After a ruling by the State Comptroller's office in 1990, Callahan County was informed the county must pay the state sales tax on individuals that had purchased tires for their own personal use but claimed the purchases were tax exempt.

Mrs. Hounshell told commissioners that after those individuals were billed for the sales tax the first time, that only five of 28 had paid the state sales tax. She said that after a second notice was mailed, four more have paid the statement, leaving 19 individuals unpaid.

Commissioners said that if the bills remain unpaid on the 19 people in question, that their names will be turned over to the county attorney for collection.

In other items addressed by commissioners:

—Commissioners voted to pay \$7,080 yearly to the county's new courthouse janitor. Commissioners hired James Jones to replace retiring janitor Jim Haile during the court's December meeting. Commissioners set the annual salary for Jones at \$7,080 and also voted to pay an assistant at \$5 per hour for a limited number of hours.

—Commissioners voted to advertise for bids for the purchase of gas and diesel for the county's equipment for the 1991 fiscal year.

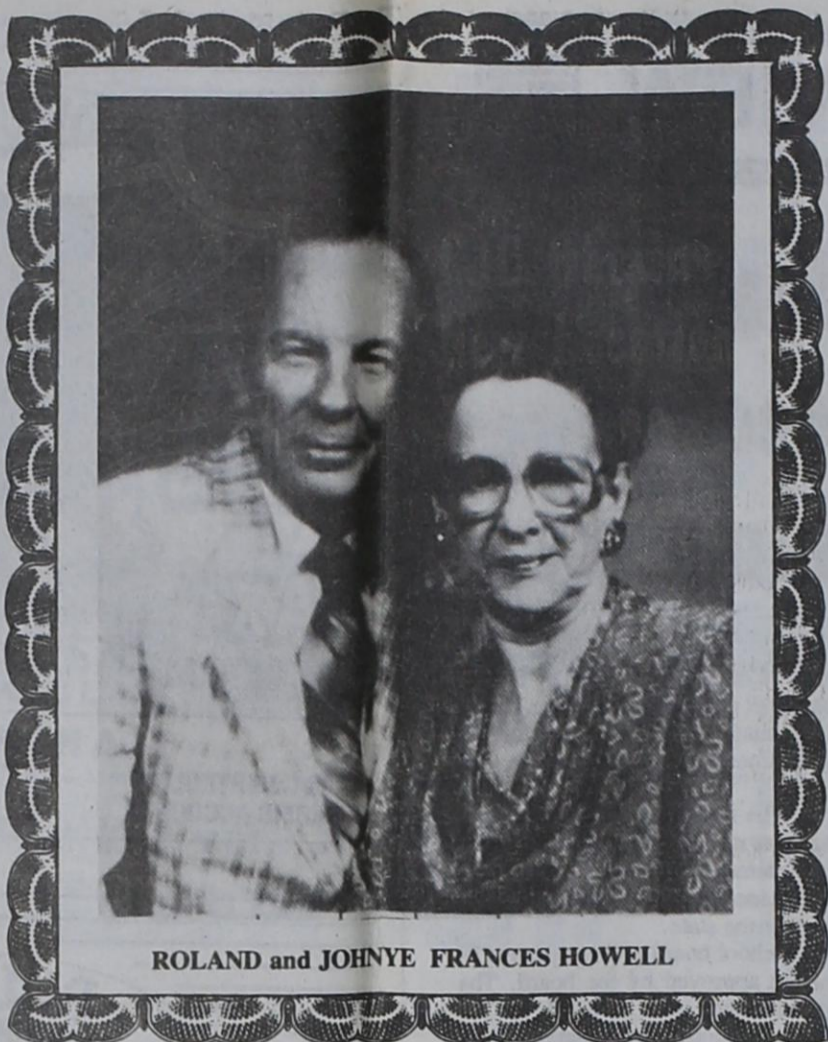

Low-income households may be eligible for energy assistance

AUSTIN—Some low-income Texans may be eligible for help in paying heating bills this winter through the Home Energy Assistance Program, according to Texas Department of Human Services Commissioner Ron Lindsey.

Lindsey said the one-time payment is available to many low-income households. Applications for energy assistance were mailed to households that received food stamps, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, or Supplemental Security Income in December. Other low-income individuals may request an application by calling the toll-free number 1-800-252-8060 during the enrollment period of Jan. 28 through Feb. 28.

Eligibility is limited by gross income and resources. Aid is available for a one-person household having less than \$628.49 gross income per month. The gross income limits are \$842.49 for households of two persons, \$1,056.49 for

three, \$1,270.49 for four, \$1,484.49 for five, and \$1,698.49 for six.

Households are eligible if the cost for heating is included in the rent payment or if the household pays a portion of its home energy costs.

Energy assistance checks are sent directly to the people who are eligible for assistance. However, the checks are made payable to the energy provider.

People receiving one of these energy assistance checks should mail it or take it in person to the energy provider business office with their regular energy bill. The check can be cashed only by the energy provider. If the HEAP check is more than the energy bill, the additional amount will be credited to the person's account for the next month's bill. If the energy bill is higher than the check, the person is responsible for paying the difference.

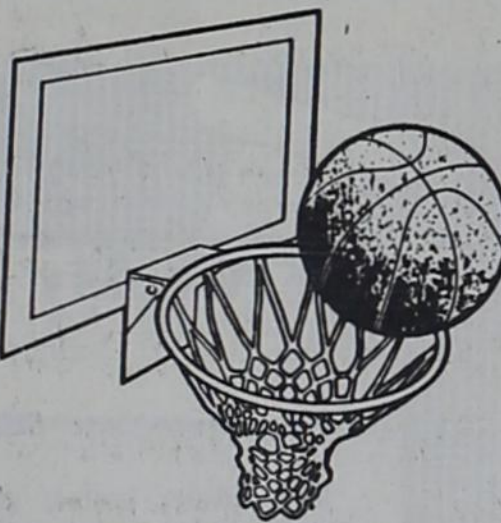

Board Meeting Summary

The Cross Plains I.S.D. School Board met in regular session on Thursday, January 17, at 7 p.m. The following business was transacted by the board.

1. The Records Management Program was approved by the board. This is a systematic method of storage and maintenance of school records as mandated by the state.

2. School board policy update #38 was not approved by the board. The superintendent was directed by the board to contact the State School Board Association Policy Service in regard to desired changes in update #38.

3. Ann Watson, school counselor, presented TAAS test scores to the board. Mrs. Watson explained that every high school student that did not master the TAAS test will be enrolled in a remediation class. In addition, tutoring will be available for these students.

4. The special education co-op policies were approved by the board. Cross Plains School District is a member of the Comanche Special Services Co-op, which also includes Comanche, De Leon, Sidney, Gustine, and Rising Star School Districts.

5. The superintendent discussed the new license regulations for school bus drivers. The new examinations and increase in fees will make it more difficult in the future to recruit bus drivers. Cross Plains School District currently has 7 bus routes.

7. The administration and board discussed the possibility of bringing in outside evaluators as a part of the teacher appraisal process. This would help in reducing the demands on the principal's time and also possibly give an objective approach to teacher evaluation. No decision was reached at this time regarding this matter.

8. Dates and personnel were approved for the upcoming school board election.

9. The superintendent informed the board that a tax warrant had been served on some gas/oil property. It will now be up to the owner of the gas/oil property to make arrangements on the delinquent taxes.

10. As a part of the superintendent's report, the board was advised that the accreditation visit is scheduled for February 11, 12, and 13.

11. During the financial report the superintendent notified the board that due to a shortfall in revenue the Cross Plains Schools would be shorted approximately \$20,000 in state revenue, local tax collections were slow in coming in, and the budget would have to be monitored very closely.

12. Two applicants were interviewed by the board in regard to the position of athletic director/head football coach.

13. The superintendent's contract was extended by the board.

14. After voting to pay the bills, the meeting was adjourned.

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Sharp Announces State Drug Tax Seizure

AUSTIN — "We've taken the wheels off an alleged West Texas drug dealer," State Comptroller John Sharp said today, announcing that agents from his office have, for the first time, seized automobiles and other motor vehicles for a violation of the state drug tax law.

"Agents in the Comptroller's office have in the past seized close to 70 bank accounts to satisfy unpaid taxes resulting from illegal drug deals, but this is our first seizure of motor vehicles," Sharp said.

The state law, which went into effect September 1, 1989, gives the Comptroller's office the authority to seize bank accounts and other personal property for failing to purchase the required tax stamps on felony amounts of marijuana and controlled substances. The tax rate is \$3.50 per gram of marijuana and \$200 per gram of a controlled substance.

"It's my unequivocal policy that, whenever possible, the state will return the proceeds from any property seized in a drug raid to local law enforcement officials for their continued drug enforcement efforts," Sharp said.

The vehicles seized in West Texas are to help satisfy approximately \$900,000 in unpaid state drug taxes, interest and penalties levied by the Comptroller's office against Steven Patrick Beniefel.

Earlier this month, Beniefel, a Ranger resident, and nine other West Texas co-defendants were arrested on charges of possessing a controlled substance with the intent to distribute; conspiracy; and engaging in a continuing criminal enterprise. The charges follow a three-month investigation involving the Texas Department of Public Safety, the FBI and local law enforcement authorities. Agents from the Comptroller's office were also part of the investigation and were able to identify Beniefel's financial assets and coordinate the seizure of 13 vehicles.

Beniefel, owner of a Ranger garage and wrecker service, is charged with operating an extensive methamphetamine drug ring in the Abilene area. All tax liens filed with the Eastland County Clerk's Office are for unpaid taxes, penalty and interest on narcotics allegedly sold to undercover law enforcement agents between September 26, 1990 and December 13, 1990.

Four wreckers, two utility trucks, one van, three motorcycles, one boat,

one loader, and one medium-sized house trailer were seized from Beniefel. The vehicles are currently impounded at a DPS facility in Abilene, awaiting auction.

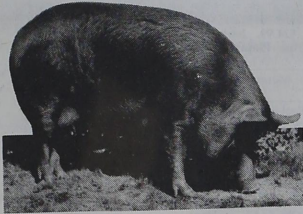

Ms. Jewel Foster didn't have any special news — we were in Sunday School class together on Sunday. Her health is just great, for which we all are grateful.

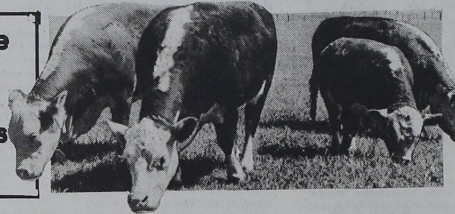

**Plan Ahead When Applying
For Social Security Benefits**

People nearing retirement age who will soon be applying for Social Security benefits can save time and energy with a little preplanning. Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

People should contact Social Security 2 or 3 months before the date they wish to begin receiving benefits. This will allow sufficient time for processing the claim so that the first benefit payment will arrive the month retirement begins. People can apply by telephone, or they can go to their local Social Security office.

Whichever way is chosen, they can save time by having certain documents ready. They will need their Social Security card or a record of the number. They must also have a birth certificate and the birth certificates of their spouse and children (if they, too, are filing for benefits), as well as evidence of recent earnings. This would be last year's Form W-2 or a self-employment tax return for last year.

People who want benefit payments deposited directly into a bank account should have a checkbook or bank passbook in order to give the correct bank account information.

Anyone with questions about applying for benefits should contact Social Security. The people there will be glad to help. The Abilene Social Security office is located at 142 S. Pioneer. The office is open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

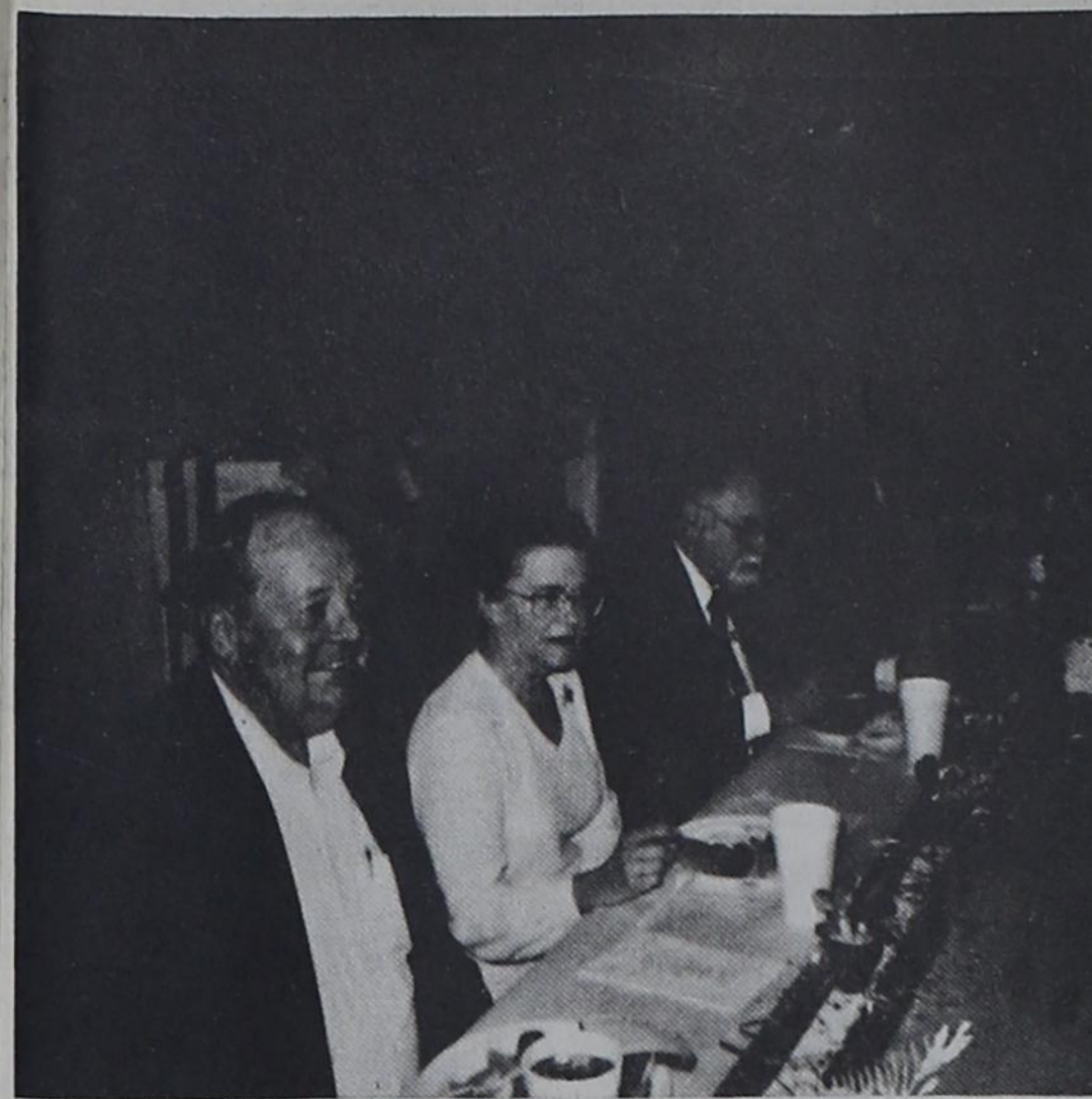

COLLEGE STATION — Wanted: a few heroic people.

Nominations are being sought for the state's annual rural heroism award, which honors an individual who saved the life of another during 1990 in Texas, preferably in circumstances related to farming and ranching.

February 8 is the deadline for submitting nominations, said Thomas D. Valco of College Station, an agricultural engineer with the Texas Agriculture Extension Service and member of the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council that presents the award.

"The nominations should include a written account of the heroism incident," Valco said. "Include the names, addresses and telephone numbers of all persons involved. When available, include newspaper clippings and photos."

All nominations, Valco added, should be sent to the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, Box 2689, Waco, Texas 76702-2689.

The 1990 award winner will be announced March 18 during the 53rd Annual Texas-Southwestern Safety Conference and Exposition at the Convention Center in Arlington.

The 1989 rural heroism winner was Bill Penix of Garland, who rescued his stepfather, C.W. Hines of Quitman, from a tractor-posthole digger accident. Penix received his award during the council's annual safety exposition last March in Houston.

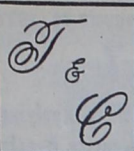

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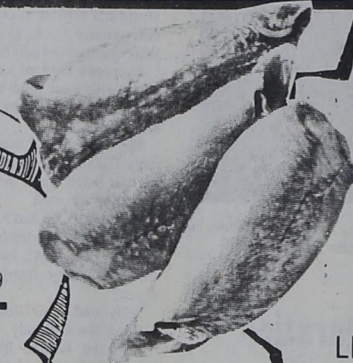
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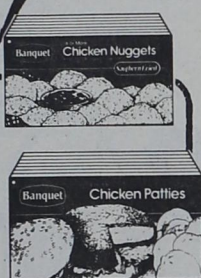
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
