Cattlemen's Round-Up For Cripple Children Sale Dates Announced

ABILENE - As they have for the Auction past three decades. Texas ranchers again are practicing their "neighborhelping-neighbor" philosophy as they prepare for the 32nd annual Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children. This annual fall fundraiser. benefiting West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene and San Angelo. will include ten regional livestock sales beginning in late September, according to General Chairman James (Jim) Alexander of Abilene. Donated livestock is collected at designated points in various communities and transported to scheduled auction events where proceeds are converted into "treatment dollars" for WTRC. "As a donor-supported institution, the Rehab Center is dependent on such events to help provide funding for facilities and personnel to serve handicapped children and adults," said WTRC President Bill Snowden. "Also, the Round-Up is a symbolic, independent effort initiated by livestock producers who consistently have shown their support despite problems of their own." Area chairmen assist by promoting the event and by asking their neighbors to join them in donating to this year's drive which has a goal of \$304,000.

All those little faces looking out at me from the photo published in the Review a few week's ago brought a host of memories back. A flood of memories rushed over me that I thought were forever in the past, lost in the tide of time. Oh yes, I remember the joy that radiated throughout the class with the learning of each new sound, new word, and new sentence, the unbounded joy when they were given a book to take home and show Mother and Daddy that they could really read. When I passed out the first books each one began reading out loud. They were so proud of themselves. You know something, teacher was proud, too. Yes, I have memories, memories that are so close to being sacred that I almost feel guilty, guilty of breaking a trust, speaking publicly of them. I'll let you in on a little secret if you promise you won't tell. It was September and school had started. In those days we didn't have kindergarten and their first day of school was in the first grade room. Most of the little ones had been home with Mother practically all their lives. Of course, they felt a little uncomfortable for the first few days, with a teacher they had never seen before and a room full of children, the most of whom they did not know. This particular fall I had one little boy that had always been home with his mother, "Bless his little heart," and he felt so insecure and lonely that he cried softly most of the morning.

Callahan County Commissioners are seeking to locate \$200,000 to budget cuts to finance several projects currently underway in the county.





Sam L. Henderson, 67, passed away at his home near Cross Plains August 26, 1991.

Sam was born in Lamesa, Texas, and graduated from high school at Baird, Texas. He served four years in Naval Air in the South Pacific during World War II. Also, he attended Eastern New Mexico University, Amarillo College, and West Texas State University at Canyon.

He married Lois Baldridge in 1947 in Curry County, New Mexico. They had two children, a daughter, Cindy, and a son, Thomas L., who preceeded him in death.

Mr. Henderson farmed and ranched in New Mexico, served on Cattle Growers Association, Farm Bureau, and Roosevelt County Rural Telephone Boards. He moved to Amarillo in 1956, went to work for Amarillo Oil Company (which later became Pioneer Corp), and was decorated by Gen. Walter Bedell transferred to Spearman, Texas in charge of drilling exploration and completions. Later he transferred to

She became the "flying reporter" in 1937, flying more than 100,000 miles a year for broadcasts and articles. In World War II, she became a war correspondent assigned to serve with Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, supreme commander of the Allied forces in Europe. She covered Europe, Asia and the Middle East for her radio assignments.

She was the first woman to broadcast from Berlin following the Allied victory.

In 1945, she was arrested by the Russians at Potsdam for beating the "Big Three" - Truman, Stalin and Churchill - to the site of a conference. She was escorted at gunpoint



Co. Did Not Have To Bid On 911

Callahan County did not have to advertise for bids for hiring a firm to address county residences for the 911 emergency telephone system, according to a state attorney general's opinion.

Questions concerning Callahan County not advertising for bids to perform the 911 rural addressing recently arose. County Commissioners voted August 12 to contract with Sheppard

Surveying of Abilene to perform the 911 addressing in Callahan County at a cost of \$25,000.

County Judge Bill Johnson said that he checked twice with the state attorney general's office on if the county had to take bids on the 911 addressing and both times the AG said no.

According to Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, Article 664-4 - Professional

Services Procurement Act, the act states that contracts for the procurement of defined professional services may not be awarded on the basis of bids. Instead, they must be awarded on the basis of demonstrated competence and qualifications, so long as the professional fees are consistent with, and not higher than the published recommended practices and fees of the various professional associations and do not exceed any maxi-

mums provided by state law.

Professional services are defined as those performed by a certified public accountant, licensed architect, physician, optometrist, surgeon, registered surveyor, engineer or any group or association thereof.

Judge Johnson said, "We don't have to bid on it (911 rural addressing). We made sure we were legal in every aspect before we contracted it."


Unemployment Rate Falls To 4.6% In July



Callahan County's jobless rate in July 1991, declined three-tenths of one percent over the previous month, according to figures released by Commissioner Mary Scou Nabers of the Texas Employment Commission. Of the 5,617 civilian labor force in Callahan County, 5,361 had jobs during July 1991, and 256 didn't, giving the county a jobless rate of 4.6 percent.

According to Ms. Nabers, Callahan County's unemployment rate was 4.9 percent in June 1991. Of the 5,636 civilian labor force in the county last month, 5,362 had jobs while 274 or 4.9 percent did not.

Previous monthly jobless rates in Callahan County include: 5.1 percent in May, 5.3 percent in April, 4.6 percent in

March, 3.7 percent in February, 4.7 percent in January 1991, 4.0 percent in December 1990, 4.0 percent in November 1990, 3.4 percent in October 1990, 4.7 percent in September 1990, 5.0 percent in August 1990 and 5.4 percent in July 1990, according to Ms. Nabers figures.

The statewide unemployment rate was placed at 6.8 percent in July 1991. The June 1991 state unemployment was set at 6.1 percent.

"The state's economic outlook took another jolt today," Commissioner Nabers said as the Texas Employment Commission released the unemployment statistics. "We are recording a statewide rate of 6.8 percent and that is within one then of a percent of the highest rate thus far for 1991," Nabers concluded.

The ranks of the unemployed swelled by 72,000 in the 30-day period, and that pushed the rate far above the 6.1 percent recorded last month. "Compared to the 6.3 percent of one year ago, the recent statistics are discouraging," Nabers said.

"Although some rising unemployment is to be expected during summer months, these statistics combined with a continued decline in the growth of nonfarm jobs in Texas is evidence of a weakened economy," Nabers said.

This latest report indicates that approximately 595,700 men and women

were out of work last month. That number is even more distressing according to Nabers who says it "only accounts for individuals we know about because they are interacting with this agency. There are obviously thousands of other unemployed individuals who arc uncounted."

The TEC estimates that 8,171,900 people were employed in the state this past month.

Following the statewide trend, all of the 27 Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSA) for which date are currently available had July unemployment rates which were higher than their June rates. In over half of the MSA's, the current rates were also above the rate one year ago.

The lowest unemployment rates among the MSA's in July were: Bryan-College Station's 3.9 percent, Austin's 5.1 percent, Amarillo's 5.3 percent, Victoria's 5.6 percent, and Midland's 5.7 percent.

Among the MSA's with the highest jobless rates in July 1991 were: McAllen-Edinburg-Mission, with a 16 percent rate; Brownsville-Harlingen, 13.2 percent; El Paso, with 10.8 percent; Laredo, with 9.0 percent; and Corpus Christi, with 8.2 percent.

Callahan County, and their unemployment rates for July 1991 include: Brown, 7.3 percent; Coleman, 6.9 percent; Eastland, 7.0 percent; Jones, 6.1 percent; Runnels, 3.8 percent; Shackelford, 3.3 percent; Stephens, 4.4 percent; and Taylor, 6.0 percent.



EMPLOYERS QUESTION DUTIES UNDER AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT


Dear Commissioner Nabers,

I am updating my employment application so that it complies with the new law on disabilities. In particular, I want to include a question about workers' compensation history. Can you recommend language which will keep me in compliance with this new law?

> N.G. Dallas

Dear N.G.,

The new Americans With **Disabilities Act makes it illegal for** an employer to ask before an offer of employment is made about a job applicant's workers' compensation history. Therefore, it would not be lawful for you to include a question about workers' compensation history on your application. On the other hand, after you reach an employment agreement with an applicant, you may gather information on workers' compensation history and submit it to the **Texas workers' compensation** offices without violating the privacy sections of the new law.

Employers are not required, however, to make accommodations which would cause undue hardship. Undue hardship would cover accommodations that are very costly, extensive or disruptive, or accommodations that would substantially or fundamentally alter the nature or operation of the business. Since employers must make a reasonable effort to accommodate disabled persons, it is a good idea to talk to the employee or applicant about his or her needs, just as you did. If the individual does not provide the information needed, contact the EEOC or other agencies assisting individuals with disabilities. Employers may also contact the Job Assistance Network at 1-800-526-7234. The Job Assistance Network is a free consultant service for employers seeking assistance in this area.
