**"Golden Memories"**

Yes, I have memories, golden memories, peeping out from behind that shining curtain that is draped between our yesteryears and the stark reality of the living, working, present day.

All those little faces looking out at me from the photo published in the *Review* a few weeks ago brought a host of memories back. A flood of memories rushed over me that I thought were forever in the past, lost in the tide of time.

Oh yes, I remember the joy that radiated throughout the class with the learning of each new sound, new word, and new sentence, the unbounded joy when they were given a book to take home and show Mother and Daddy that they could really read.

When I passed out the first books each one began reading out loud. They were so proud of themselves. You know something, teacher was proud, too.

Yes, I have memories, memories that are so close to being sacred that I almost feel guilty, guilty of breaking a trust, speaking publicly of them.

I'll let you in on a little secret if you promise you won't tell. It was September and school had started. In those days we didn't have kindergarten and their first day of school was in the first grade room.

Most of the little ones had been home with Mother practically all their lives. Of course, they felt a little uncomfortable for the first few days, with a teacher they had never seen before and a room full of children, the most of whom they did not know.

This particular fall I had one little boy that had always been home with his mother, "Bless his little heart," and he felt so insecure and lonely that he cried softly most of the morning.

I would start each morning with a story, maybe I read it from a book with pretty pictures, maybe I just told one to fit the day.

There was another little boy that reminded me of a little jack rabbit. His red hair that liked to stick up, his little freckled face and wide blue eyes, and his unwavering interest in all that went on around him gave me the impression, "There is a steady one, there is a sure one, that will always sit steady in the boat."

Well, one morning I was reading a story and putting in all the expressions and feelings I could. Really I was quite pleased with how things were going. The little boy on the second row of seats was crying softly. The little boy with the red hair and freckles sat on the front row. This funny little guy looked back and saw the little crying boy and all of a sudden his mouth flew open and he let out a yell that echoed through the halls and into Mr. Kelly's office.

Heads came out from each classroom, trying to determine what was going on in Mrs. Paige's first grade room. I was doing all I could to get the little redhead to quit crying but all to no avail. The loud crying kept

**VAC Started In Special Education**

The Comanche Special Services Co-Op has realized and recognized that all students have individual needs and that special provisions must be made within the frame-work of the regular school program for these needs. The Co-Op (which is composed of Comanche, Cross Plains, DeLeon, Gustine, Rising Star and Sidney) has put into place a program to help meet these individual needs. It is called Vocational Adjustment Cooperative Program (VAC). It is a work/study program designed to Transition handicapped students into the world of work. Vocational training and job experience are combined with academic courses in a special curriculum that leads to maximum development of employment potential.

Bill Odom, Comanche Special Services Director, has announced that Lloyd Jones has been employed to coordinate this program. Mr. Jones will be calling businesses in the near future to check on job availability for some students. These students will be in school part of the day and will work part of the day. By this employment and academic work it is hoped it will provide an opportunity for students to

become productive members of society.

Students can earn credit toward graduation through the VAC work/study program. In VAC classes, emphasis is placed on teaching students the necessary attitudes, habits, behaviors, and skills required to obtain and keep a job in the community.

It is an advantage for businesses to employ a VAC student. There are some tax advantages for a business and the business does receive recognition for employing one of these students.

A Pecan Field Day has been scheduled for 9:00 a.m., Tuesday, September 10, 1991 at the Dan Childress Orchard near Cottonwood. The orchard is located west of Cottonwood off F.M. 880. **Cattlemen's Round-Up For Cripple Children Sale Dates Announced**

**ABILENE** — As they have for the past three decades, Texas ranchers again are practicing their "neighbor-helping-neighbor" philosophy as they prepare for the 32nd annual Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children.

This annual fall fundraiser, benefiting West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene and San Angelo, will include ten regional livestock sales beginning in late September, according to General Chairman James (Jim) Alexander of Abilene.

Donated livestock is collected at designated points in various communities and transported to scheduled auction events where proceeds are converted into "treatment dollars" for WTRC.

"As a donor-supported institution, the Rehab Center is dependent on such events to help provide funding for facilities and personnel to serve handicapped children and adults," said WTRC President Bill Snowden. "Also, the Round-Up is a symbolic, independent effort initiated by livestock producers who consistently have shown their support despite problems of their own."

Area chairmen assist by promoting the event and by asking their neighbors to join them in donating to this year's drive which has a goal of \$304,000.

**Commissioners Looking At \$200,000 In Budget Cuts**

Callahan County Commissioners are seeking to locate \$200,000 to budget cuts to finance several projects currently underway in the county.

Commissioners, in a regular Commissioner's Court meeting Monday, August 26, met with Callahan County Sheriff Bill Skinner to discuss cutting some expenses in his department.

Commissioners said that some cuts need to be made in the mileage reimbursement for the sheriff's department employees. Commissioners said that beginning next month, some restrictions will be placed on the mileage reimbursements for the department's employees.

Commissioners also discussed the possibility of entering into a contract to house Callahan County prisoners in the Coleman jail facility currently under construction. County Judge Bill Johnson said that the discussion with Coleman jail officials will have no bearing on plans for the renovation and addition of the Callahan County Jail in Baird. "Plans for the jail addition are still going on," Johnson stated.

Commissioners also discussed with Sheriff Skinner the possibility of moving the sheriff's office and some of the deputies offices into vacant office space in the Callahan County Courthouse

building next door. Commissioners said the moving of offices into the courthouse building could reduce the need for additional office space in the Callahan County Jail.

Commissioners will be holding a budget workshop September 9, 10 and 11 for the 1991-92 fiscal year and asked that the sheriff think about ways to cut the sheriff's department budget.

Commissioners will also be meeting with other county department heads to discuss cutting their budgets during the budget workshop next month.

Johnson said that some unusual expenses have forced the county to make some budget cuts elsewhere for the 1991-92 fiscal year. He said that expenses for the jail renovation and addition, the 911 emergency telephone addressing, the county commissioner precinct redistricting, county voting box redistricting and county justice of the peace precinct redistricting. Johnson said the added expenses amounted to \$200,000.

Commissioners also discussed progress on the 911 emergency telephone system addressing. The system is to be in place by January 1, 1992. A workshop will be held next month to train the county's dispatchers on operating the computer and answering sys-

tems. The 911 computer and answering system for the county is expected to be

## AARP's All-Volunteer Tax-Aide 'Army' Seeks Additional Recruits

In anticipation of the many older persons who will be needing assistance with their 1991 income tax forms, the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) is seeking additional volunteers to man their Tax-Aide assistance sites.

In cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service, the AARP will provide free training to volunteers who will provide tax assistance four hours per week during the tax season.

It is estimated that of the 28,000 AARP Tax-Aide volunteers nationwide, 2,000 will be in Texas assisting 95,000 older persons.

Neither those seeking assistance nor those volunteering to assist are required to be AARP members. Volunteers are needed to fill three positions: Counselors who provide direct tax assistance, Instructors who train the Counselors, and Coordinators who administer the program.

## Sam L. Henderson

Sam L. Henderson, 67, passed away at his home near Cross Plains August 26, 1991.

Services were held Wednesday, August 28, at Higginbotham Funeral Home Chapel. Burial was at the Cross Plains Cemetery.

Sam was born in Lamesa, Texas, and graduated from high school at Baird, Texas. He served four years in Naval Air in the South Pacific during World War II. Also, he attended Eastern New Mexico University, Amarillo College, and West Texas State University at Canyon.

He married Lois Baldrige in 1947 in Curry County, New Mexico. They had two children, a daughter, Cindy, and a son, Thomas L., who predeceased him in death.

Mr. Henderson farmed and ranched in New Mexico, served on Cattle Growers Association, Farm Bureau, and Roosevelt County Rural Telephone Boards. He moved to Amarillo in 1956, went to work for Amarillo Oil Company (which later became Pioneer Corp), and was transferred to Spearman, Texas in charge of drilling exploration and completions. Later he transferred to Darrouzett, Texas.

Sam retired from Pioneer Coop in 1983 and moved to Callahan County near Cross Plains.

Survivors include his wife, Lois of the home; a daughter, Cindy McGhee, a son-in-law, Jerry D. McGhee, and one granddaughter, Shadoe Lyn McGhee, all of Crowley, Texas; one brother, Foster Henderson of Birmingham, Alabama; two nieces of Baton Rouge, Louisiana; numerous cousins and host of friends.

## W. B. 'Bill' Dillard

W.B. "Bill" Dillard, 76, died Wednesday, August 28, 1991 in an Abilene hospital.

Services were held at 2:30 p.m. Friday at Higginbotham Funeral Home Chapel with the Rev. Knox Waggoner officiating. Burial was in the Cross Plains Cemetery.

Mr. Dillard was born in De Leon, was an oil field worker and a mechanic.

Survivors include his wife, Edith Dillard of Cross Plains; a son, Gene Dillard of Cross Plains; four daughters, Barbara Dillard, Patsy Curtis, Margaret Clark and Betty Edwards, all of Cross Plains; 10 grandchildren; and 16 great-grandchildren. Pallbearers were grandsons.

## Kathryn Cochran Cravens

**BURKETT** - Kathryn Cochran Cravens, 92, famed reporter, died Thursday, August 29, 1991, at her residence.

Graveside services were held at 10 a.m. Friday at Burkett Cemetery with the Rev. Jeff Robinett officiating, directed by Stevens Funeral Home of Coleman.

Kathryn Cravens started as an actress with Fox Films in Hollywood

and later starred in soap operas. In 1926, she went to New York City as the first female coast-to-coast commentator, speaking her "News Through a Woman's Eyes," over the CBS network.

She became the "flying reporter" in 1937, flying more than 100,000 miles a year for broadcasts and articles. In World War II, she became a war correspondent assigned to serve with Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, supreme commander of the Allied forces in Europe. She covered Europe, Asia and the Middle East for her radio assignments.

She was the first woman to broadcast from Berlin following the Allied victory.

In 1945, she was arrested by the Russians at Potsdam for beating the "Big Three" - Truman, Stalin and Churchill - to the site of a conference. She was escorted at gunpoint by the Russians.

The U.S. Army suspended her for 72 hours for entering forbidden Russian occupied territory. But on Aug. 10, 1950, the U.S. Army gave her a citation for bravery and she was decorated by Gen. Walter Bedell Smith at a special ceremony.

She was the first reporter to enter Finland after V.E. day. She covered Balkan elections, Palestine riots and war crime trials. She wrote a novel called, "Pursuit of Gentlemen," which was awarded first prize by the National League of American Penwomen in 1948.

Born in Burkett, she grew up there and in Pilot Point. She returned to Burkett in 1962 from New York City where she had been residing.

She was the last of seven children and is survived by numerous nieces and nephews.

**EASTLAND** - Audie Marie Lem, 87, died Sunday, September 1, 1991 at a local nursing home.

# Co. Did Not Have To Bid On 911

Callahan County did not have to advertise for bids for hiring a firm to address county residences for the 911 emergency telephone system, according to a state attorney general's opinion.

Questions concerning Callahan County not advertising for bids to perform the 911 rural addressing recently arose. County Commissioners voted August 12 to contract with Sheppard

Surveying of Abilene to perform the 911 addressing in Callahan County at a cost of \$25,000.

County Judge Bill Johnson said that he checked twice with the state attorney general's office on if the county had to take bids on the 911 addressing and both times the AG said no.

According to Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, Article 664-4 - Professional

Services Procurement Act, the act states that contracts for the procurement of defined professional services may not be awarded on the basis of bids. Instead, they must be awarded on the basis of demonstrated competence and qualifications, so long as the professional fees are consistent with, and not higher than the published recommended practices and fees of the various professional associations and do not exceed any maxi-

mums provided by state law.

Professional services are defined as those performed by a certified public accountant, licensed architect, physician, optometrist, surgeon, registered surveyor, engineer or any group or association thereof.

Judge Johnson said, "We don't have to bid on it (911 rural addressing). We made sure we were legal in every aspect before we contracted it."

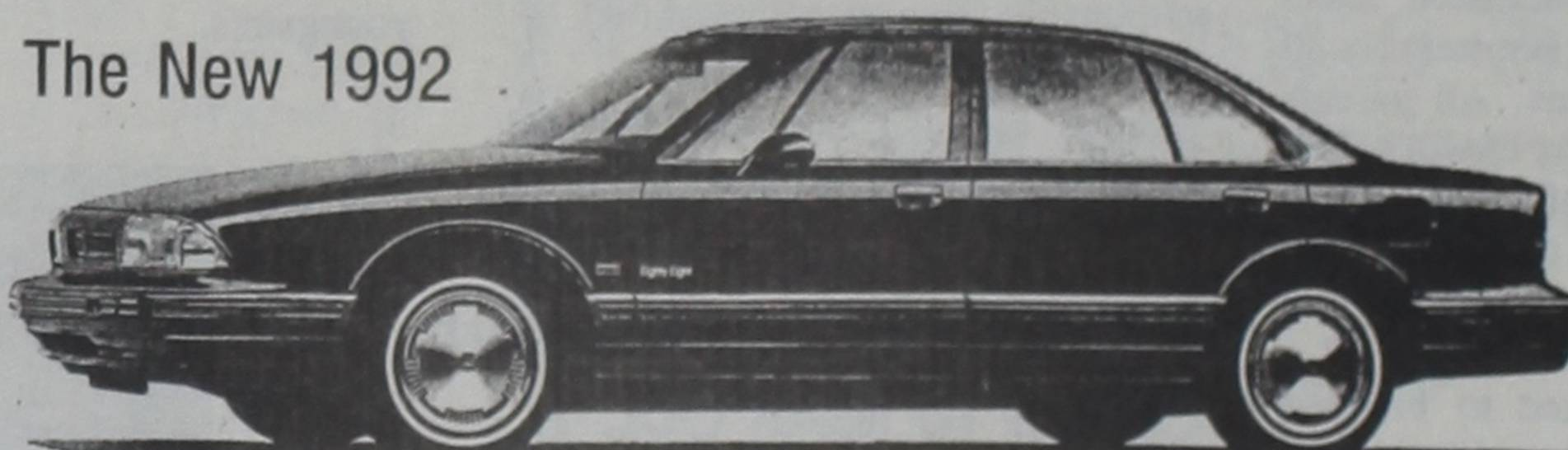

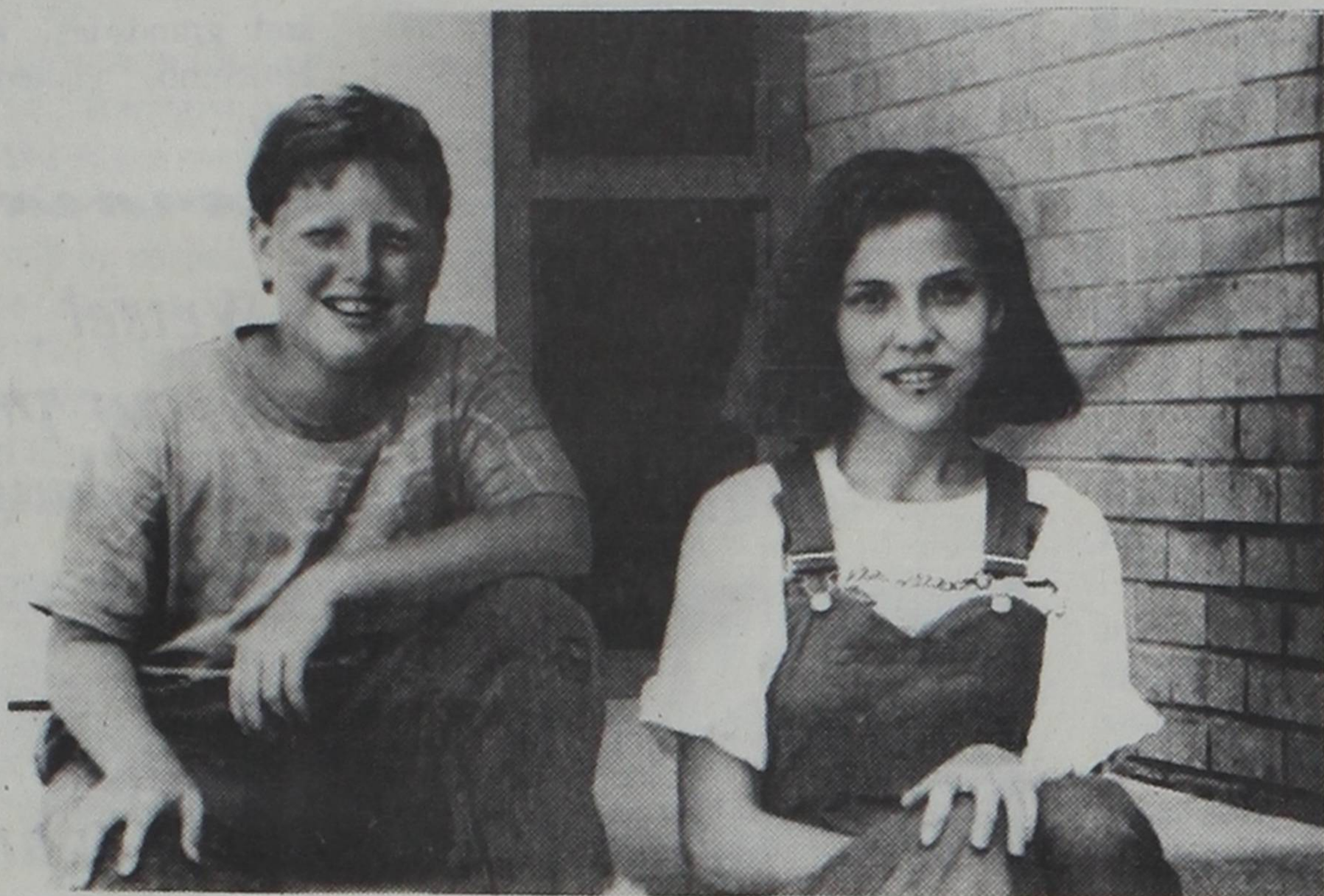

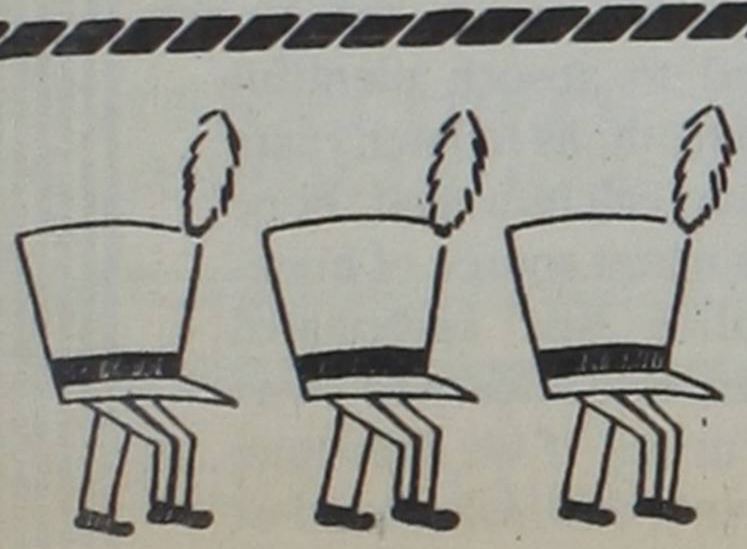

## Houston Livestock Show Sets Limit On Premium Sale Animals

Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo officials today announced major revisions in the Show's junior market auctions, putting a cap on the amount of money a junior exhibitor can receive for an animal.

The cap will not affect how much buyers may bid for the junior show champions, but any amount above the established ceilings will be put into the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Educational Fund. Each \$25,000 or major fraction thereof will be used for permanently endowed scholarships in the name or names designated by the buyer.

Dick Graves, president of the Houston Show, said, "The auction payoffs to some of our grand and reserve grand champion winners have become excessive in the past few years. However, we did not want to implement any type of system that would limit the enthusiasm of our bidders or the thrill of setting world records.

"This program gives us the best of both options. We pay the exhibitors a fantastic but reasonable price, bidders can compete to any level, future records can be established and deserving scholarship winners will benefit."

The established caps are:  
Steers: Grand Champion, \$50,000; Reserve Grand Champion, \$35,000; All

Other Sale Animals, \$15,000.

Barrows: Grand Champion, \$25,000; Reserve Grand Champion, \$17,500; All Other Sale Animals, \$7,500.

Lambs: Grand Champion, \$25,000; Reserve Grand Champion, \$17,500; All Other Sale Animals, \$7,500.

Broilers: Grand Champion, \$20,000; Reserve Grand Champion, \$10,000; All Other Sale Animals, \$5,000.

Turkeys: Grand Champion, \$20,000; Reserve Grand Champion, \$10,000; All Other Sale Animals, \$5,000.

The 1991 Grand Champion Steer sold for a world's record price of \$221,000. Under the new system, if this same price is bid in 1992, the junior exhibitor will receive \$50,000 and the additional \$171,000 will be put into the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Educational fund as seven endowed scholarships in the names of individuals or organizations chosen by the buyer.

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo annually contributes more than \$2 million in scholarships and other educational programs throughout Texas. Since the scholarship program began in 1957, in excess of \$24 million has been donated to deserving Texas youngsters.

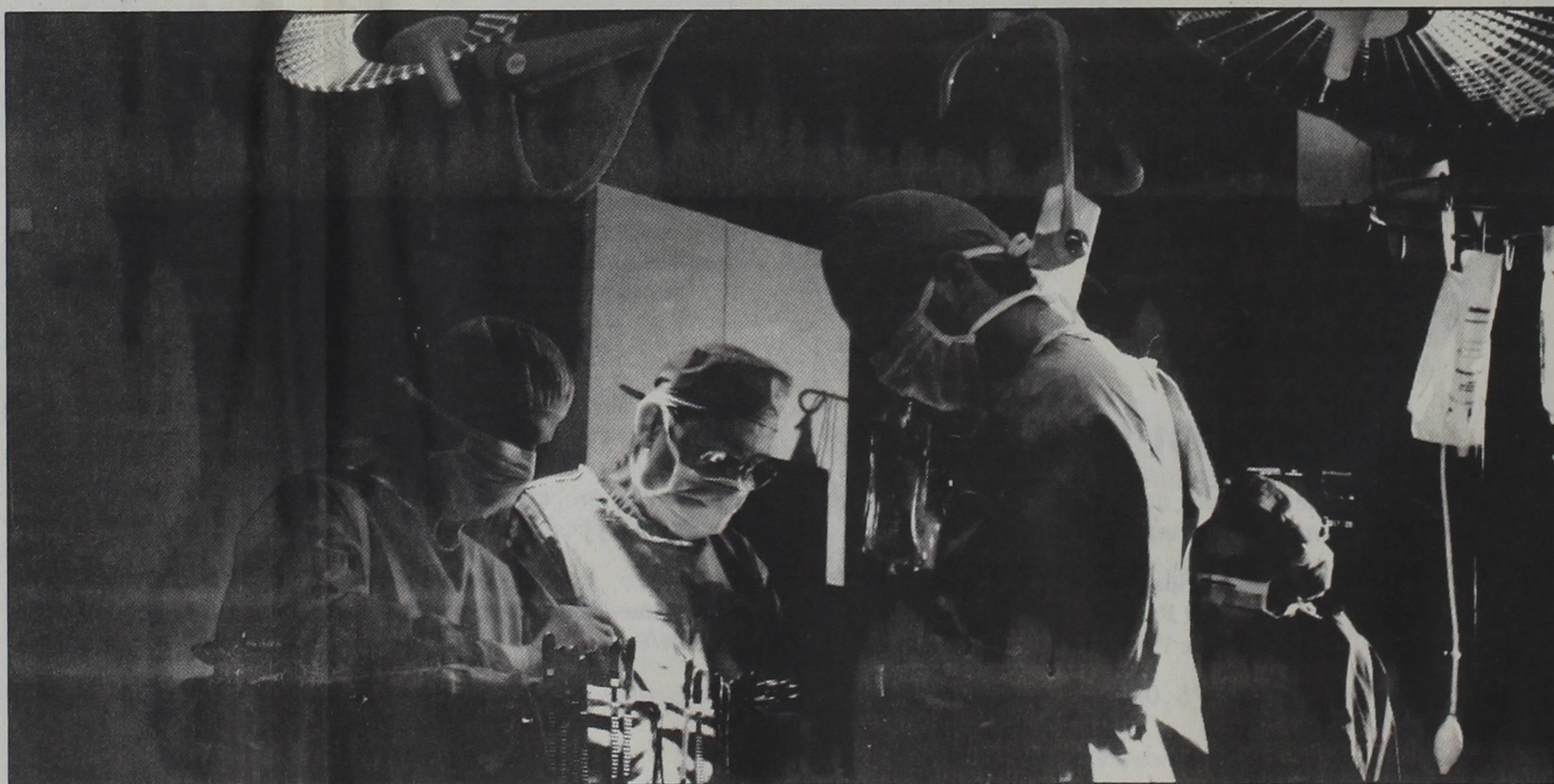

Dear Commissioner Nabers,

I am updating my employment application so that it complies with the new law on disabilities. In particular, I want to include a question about workers' compensation history. Can you recommend language which will keep me in compliance with this new law?

Dallas

Dear N.G.,

The new Americans With Disabilities Act makes it illegal for an employer to ask before an offer of employment is made about a job applicant's workers' compensation history. Therefore, it would not be lawful for you to include a question about workers' compensation history on your application.

On the other hand, after you reach an employment agreement with an applicant, you may gather information on workers' compensation history and submit it to the Texas workers' compensation offices without violating the privacy sections of the new law.

Dear Commissioner Nabers,

I recently hired a disabled individual and need to make some adjustments to our office. Before I spend a lot of money doing this, I want to know what I am required to do. I asked the new employee what she wants, but she did not have any suggestions. What should I do?

Dear L.A.,

Under the new law, employers will be required to reasonably accommodate disabled employees as well as disabled job applicants. This means making changes or adjustments to the work environment to allow an employee to perform essential functions of the

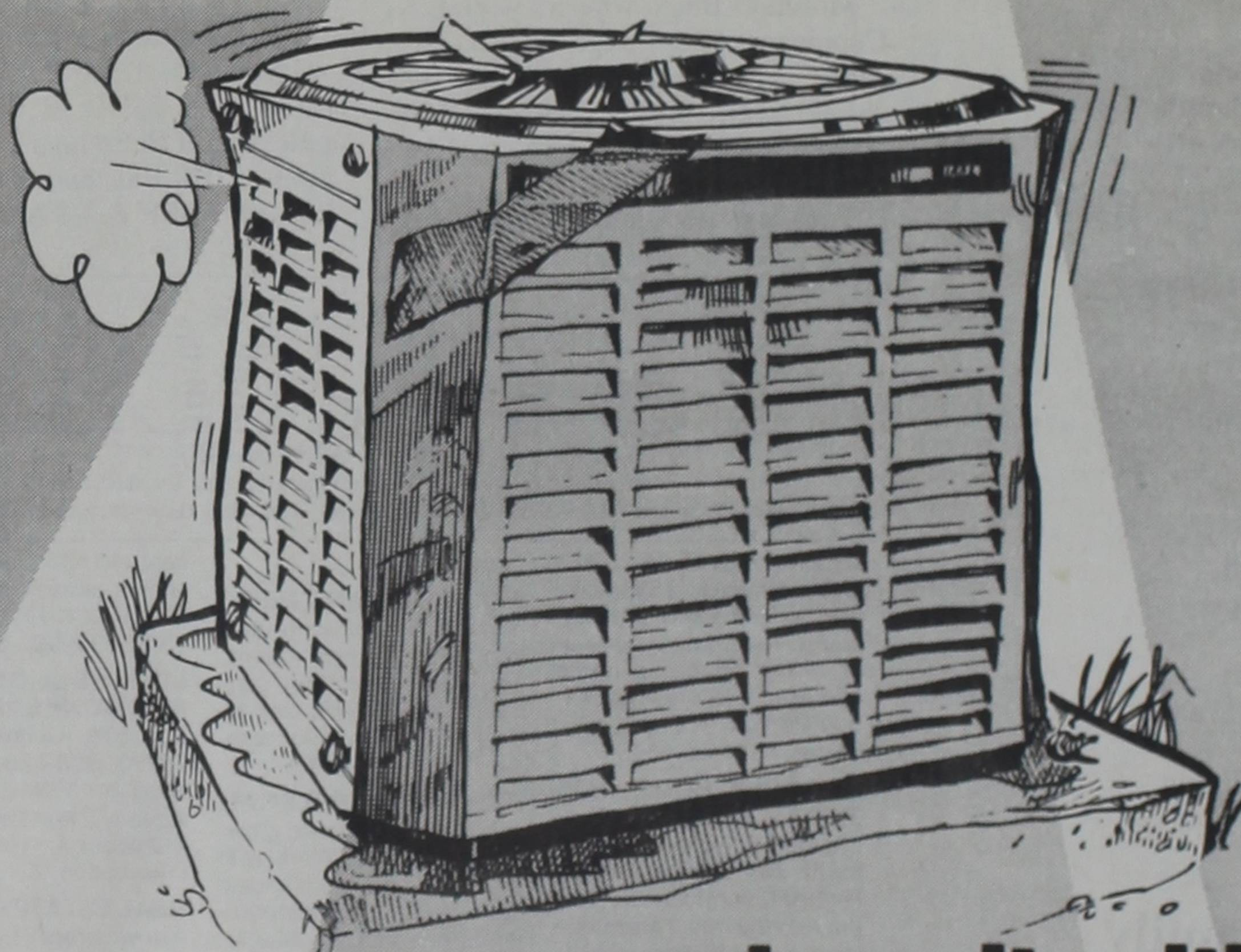

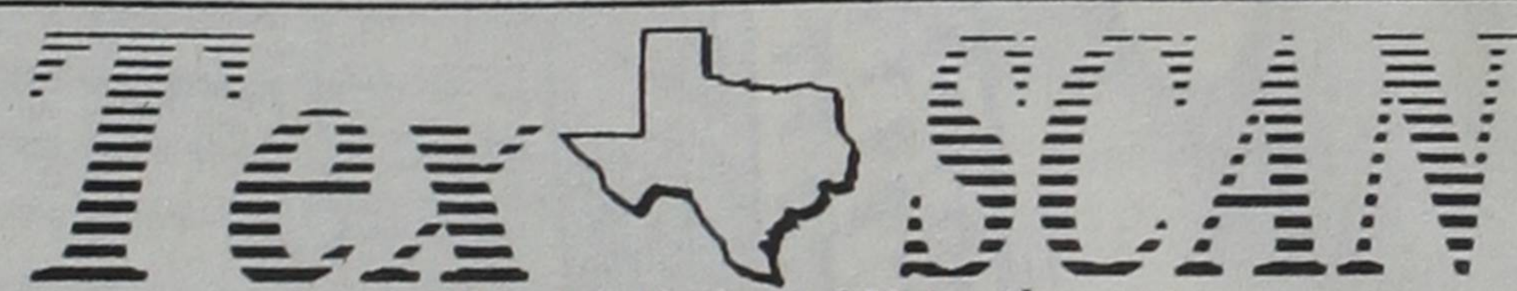
