"Down Memory Lane"

Memories!!! Cross Plains Junior High Language Arts, English, Reading (Literature), and Spelling. WE mastered all three textbooks with one period a day! Many memories: including Mighty Mites Football Cheering Squad with the many out-of-town trips to games. Mr. Pender Mitchell, the bus driver, and I often reminisced over those experiences! Our cheering squad marched and exhibited formations at half-time to the beat of a single bass drum (no such things as snares!). I can still hear (and see) Sylvia Graham manning the bass drum to give us a unified: "Left-right; left-right, etc."

One spring Clyde and I had just returned to Cross Plains to enter the grocery business here, when Superintendent A. J. McCuin came to our house one morning with a proposition: "Would I come up and finish Polly Lawson's year of fifth grade work?" Her husband had landed on the west coast and she was "going to him!"

I finished her last six weeks of teaching, did the end of the year records, etc. and stayed 26 years. A great deal of that time of the last six weeks in that fifth grade room on the southwest corner of the old elementary building was spent trying to get Gene Bush to cease his survey of the west part of Cross Plains from his desk where he sat with the seat folded up. (Remember those seats?)

My teaching years in Cross Plains Junior High were under the superintendents McCuin, Paul Whitton, and Wayne Ford, with principals Hubert Kelly and Jack Watkins. Language curriculum was spiced with some public school music taught in the classroom with no modern tapes or records. Just textbook and chalk board with a GREAT DEAL of "rote singing."

There are some good memories from these classes, too, recalled as I hear Coach Dallas now using that good bass voice of his. When I was called upon to do the music for the funeral of Mrs. J. C. Bowden in the Burkett School Gymnasium, I called a trio of then high school students, Carol Jean White, Carol Ann Needham, and Wanda Cowan, who with a short practice session in the old music room at the north end of the elementary building, came through for me!

MEMORIES!! Many changes took place including using classrooms upstairs in the high school building where the auditorium had been, using floors that slanted forward for the students' desks! I can still remember a couple of students, Mike McClure, Sr. at one end of my desk and Pat Moore at the other!

I suppose the students survived without harm to their anatomies in spite of their sitting on the slanting floors. Another memory is that of having 52 eighth grade students in the northwest corner room of the elementary building. Needless to say, desks "lined" the back and east walls, leaving one chalk board available (we used the chalk boards in those days) at the front.

MEMORIES!! Those language arts students, Mighty Mites Cheering Squad leaders, etc. went on to become public school teachers, too; some as high school superintendents, band directors, college professors, medical

Moving To The Future

Four members of the faculty and one school board member from Cross Plains School District spent Friday and Saturday, September 20 and 21, in Austin attending a training session related to "Site-Based Decision Making."

A state law passed last year by the Texas Legislature mandates each school district in the state to establish a site-based committee at the campus and district level made up of faculty and/or administrators and school board members. The basic purpose of this committee is to allow the faculty, administration, and school board to work more closely together towards the overall improvement of the local school district.

In one of its actions last year, the newly formed committee applied for acceptance into a state-wide pilot program sponsored by the Texas State Teacher's Association (TSTA). The purpose of the pilot program is to study the effects and use of the site-based committee within schools across the state of Texas.

Only 9 schools throughout the state were accepted into the program. Cross Plains, in collaboration with Eula I.S.D. and Abilene I.S.D., were accepted as a combined cluster in this elite group.

The training session in Austin provided the participants with valuable and practical information and strategies on making the committees successful and useful. In addition to the working sessions, the participants were able to listen to and ask questions of the new Commissioner of Education, Skip Meno, who briefly explained his belief that he is more interested in the results of education rather than the process. Also attending the conference as observers were people from various other agencies such as the State School Board and the Texas Education Agency.

Mr. Whitton must have had some confidence in me. When Mrs. Ross Newton had to leave with no one to teach her Spanish class, he had me come over to the high school one period a day to teach it. Well, perhaps that completion was not so miraculous, but we did converse in Spanish, didn't we, Paul, Jr.?

Often a former student introduces me to a son or daughter, saying "Did you know that Mrs. Bunnell used to be my English teacher?" Of course, the son or daughter is thinking -- "My! How ancient can she be!"

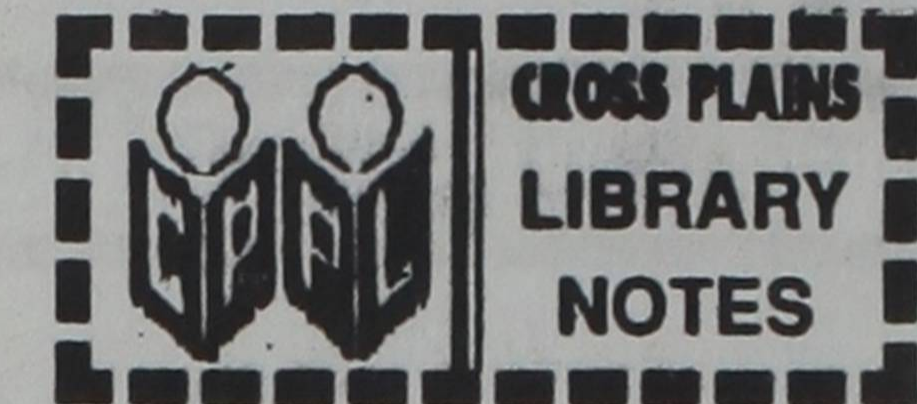

Private Pesticide License Training Seminar Slated September 30

A Private Pesticide License Training Seminar will be held Monday, September 30, beginning at 8:30 a.m. The meeting will be held in Abilene in the Old County Courthouse on the 3rd floor.

The training will be for those people wanting to obtain a private license. A private license is for those wanting to buy and apply restricted chemicals on their own property.

To obtain a license, a person must attend the training, take and pass a test and pay \$50 for a license that is good for 5 years.

The training will be given by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

CRP Enrollment

WASHINGTON, September 12, 1991 -- Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan today announced that 1.12 million acres have been tentatively accepted into the Conservation Reserve program from the 2.35 million acres bid during the 11th CRP sign-up July 8-19. Total CRP enrollment is now 35.6 million acres.

Of the 1.12 million acres tentatively accepted, 66,151 are to be planted to trees.

Secretary Madigan said CRP was modified by the 1990 Farm Bill to better address protection of environmentally sensitive croplands. "The approved acreage from the 11th sign-up will provide significant water quality benefits," he said.

He also announced that the 12th CRP sign-up will be June 15-26, 1992. Bids accepted from the 12th sign-up will be effective for the 1993 crop year.

The new CRP acreage would be enrolled at an average cost of \$59.14 per acre. Payments will be effective for the 1992 crop year and the first rental payment will be made after Oct. 1, 1992.

The CRP was authorized by the 1985 Farm Bill to take highly erodible cropland out of agricultural production and place it into a conserving use. Program participants receive annual rental payments with the amounts depending on the per acre rental rate and the number of acres under contract.

Based upon final approval, 152,202 acres of land accepted from the 11th CRP sign-up will be retired in conservation priority watersheds of the Chesapeake Bay, Long Island Sound, and the Great Lakes. Another 16,397 acres of land will be retired within watersheds targeted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and state water quality agencies.

NOTICES BEING MAILED TO DISABLED CHILDREN

The Social Security Administration (SSA) is sending notices to more than 450,000 children who are entitled to reviews of their Supplemental Security Income (SSI) claims. About 600 are being sent to children in the Big Country area.

The notices are being sent as a result of the Sullivan v. Zebley court agreement. The agreement requires Social Security to notify children who, from January 1980 through February 1990, were found not disabled or no longer disabled, and therefore ineligible for SSI.

The notice informs children of their right to a review and asks them to return an enclosed reply form within 120 days if they want a review. Once SSA receives the reply form, it will contact the child to set up an interview. The child (or someone for the child) should bring to this interview pertinent medical records or the names and addresses of his or her doctors.

According to Glyn Hammons of the Abilene Social Security office, it will take months for Social Security to reevaluate the cases of all the children who respond. "I hope those responding recognize it may take awhile, but I promise we'll eventually get to everybody," Hammons said.

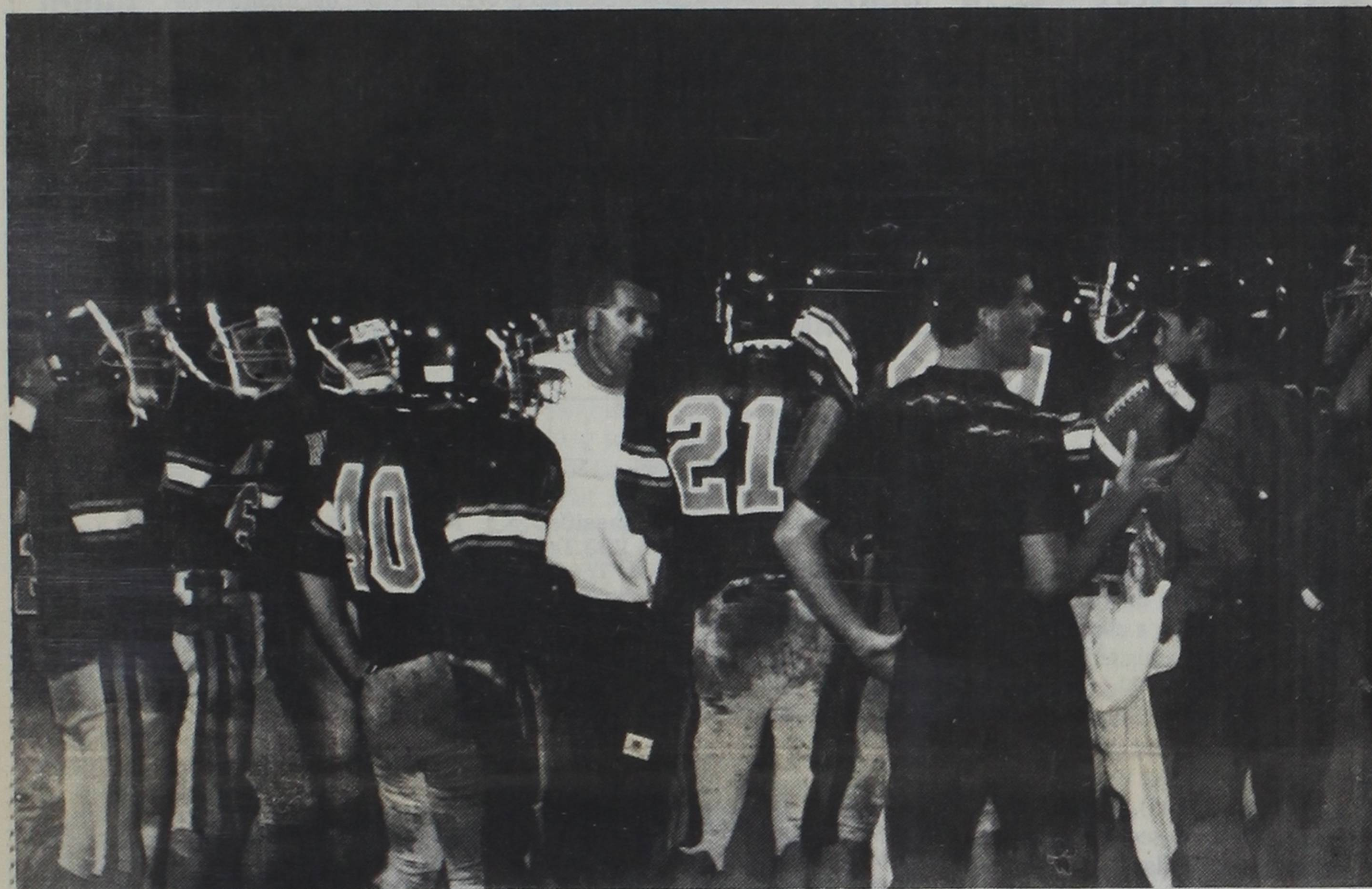

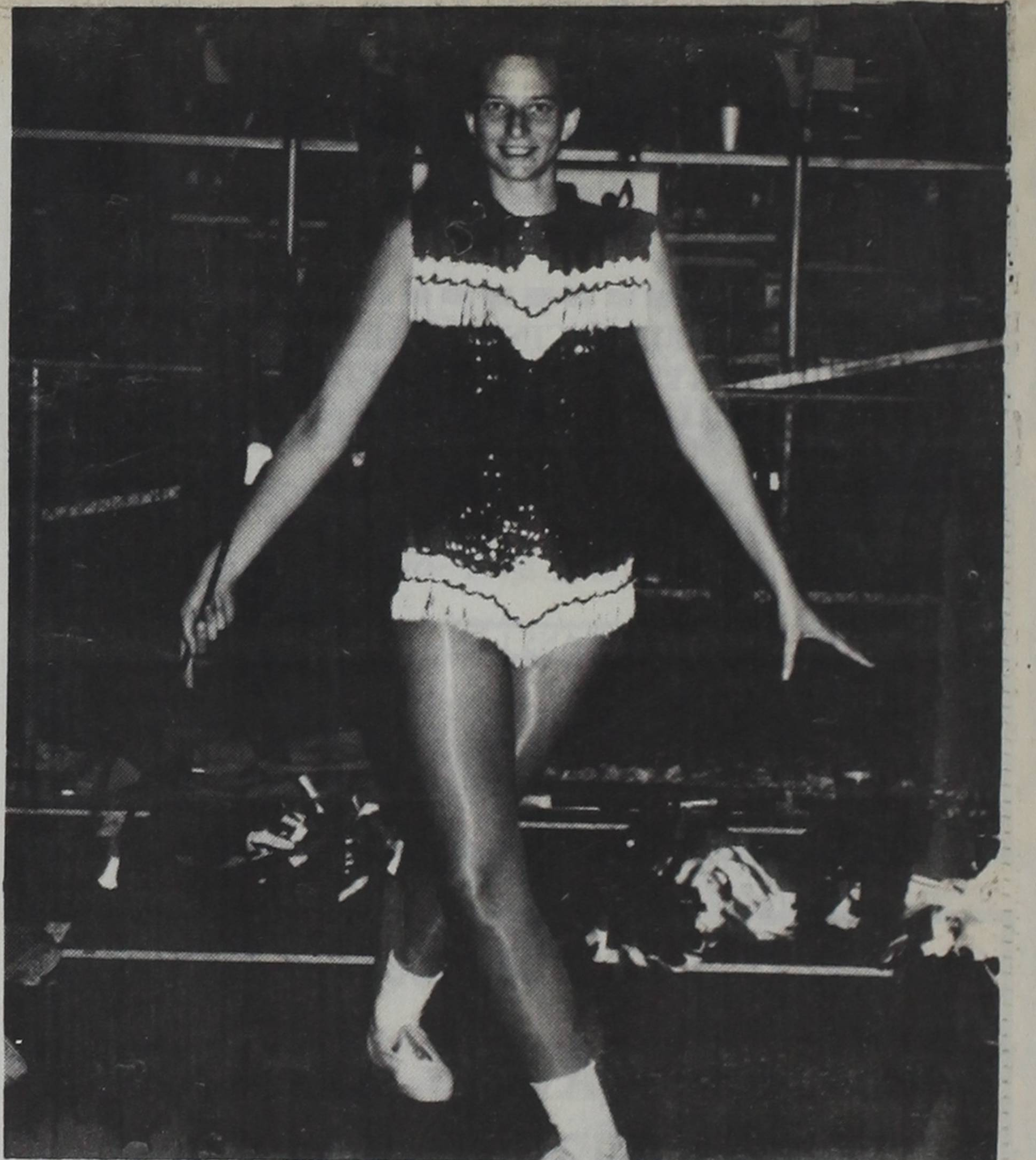
The defensive team for the Buffaloes did an excellent job in gang tackling and breaking up passes.

The cheerleaders and band were excellent in supporting the team.

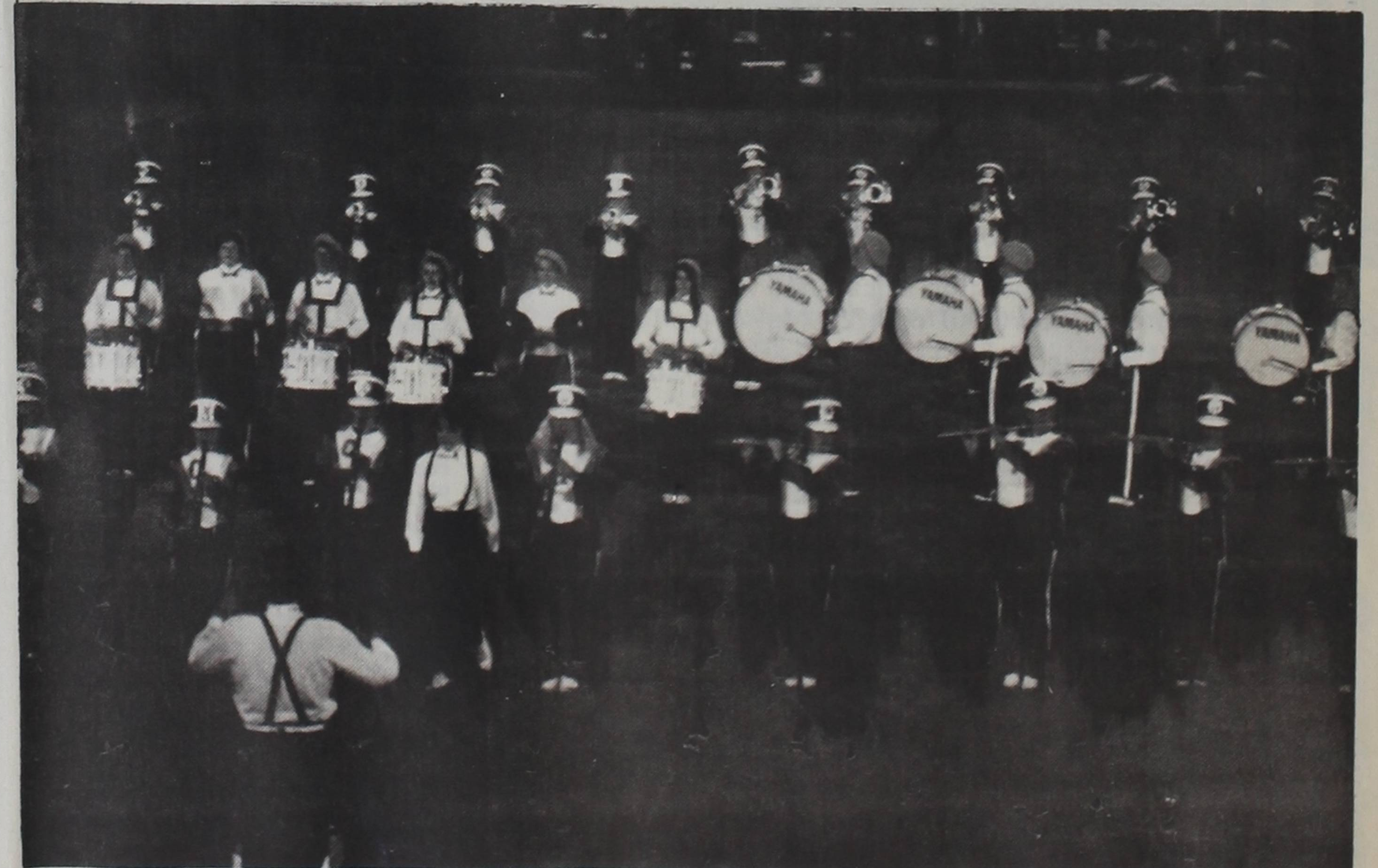

Peer Assistance And Leadership

By DENESE WHITELEY

There is a new program at Cross Plains School this year, a new student help program, called, appropriately enough, the "PAL PROGRAM."

This program began back in the 1980's in Austin. It has proven to be a very successful way to reach out to F "at-risk" students or to any student that needs or wants to talk to someone.

High school computer teacher, Dena Fielder, first introduced the idea for the program at Cross Plains last year and it is in operation this year.

She heard about it through some state information and our Region 14 Service Center. The program uses Juniors and Seniors, and for a student to be selected, they must go through a specific selection process.

This process consists of taking input from peers, teachers, and administrators. Each applicant's material is then reviewed by the sponsor, counselor, and principal and matched with their schedules to see if it is compatible.

There are 8 students involved this first year, 6 Seniors and 2 Juniors. When asked how much time they would spend with PAL, Mrs. Fielder replied, "As much as it takes to get their goal accomplished."

There is one class period set aside for the students in the project. During this time, the students go through a 6 weeks training period. Then each student, "PAL," is linked with 2 or 3 PALEES, which they meet with during the week. Also during this week, at least 2 days are set aside for feedback and more learning activities.

Last Wednesday, September 18, the "PAL" students went to Abilene for a training orientation that all students in

the program must attend before receiving their younger "PALEES."

Company Matches Students With Funds

Over a \$100 million in scholarship funds went unclaimed last year because students and parents did not know how to tap into these resources.

A National Company, using computer matching is now making this possible.

Scholarship Research Group has more than 200,000 sources of aid representing \$14 billion in financial aid. Begun in 1981, Scholarship Research Group helped over 35,000 students last year by supplying them with financial aid information. With college costs ranging from \$35,000 to \$60,000 and cutbacks on educational funds, more students and their parents are finding college is out of sight.

Virtually all families, regardless of income, can qualify for scholarships and other forms of financial aid. Although grades count in some areas, many grants and awards do not consider a student's GPA when awarding funding.

Using the information supplied by a student, SRG will send a printout listing the awards that match the students qualifications and needs. The printout will list the name of the award, it's value, whether it is renewable, address of the provider, and why the student was matched to this source.

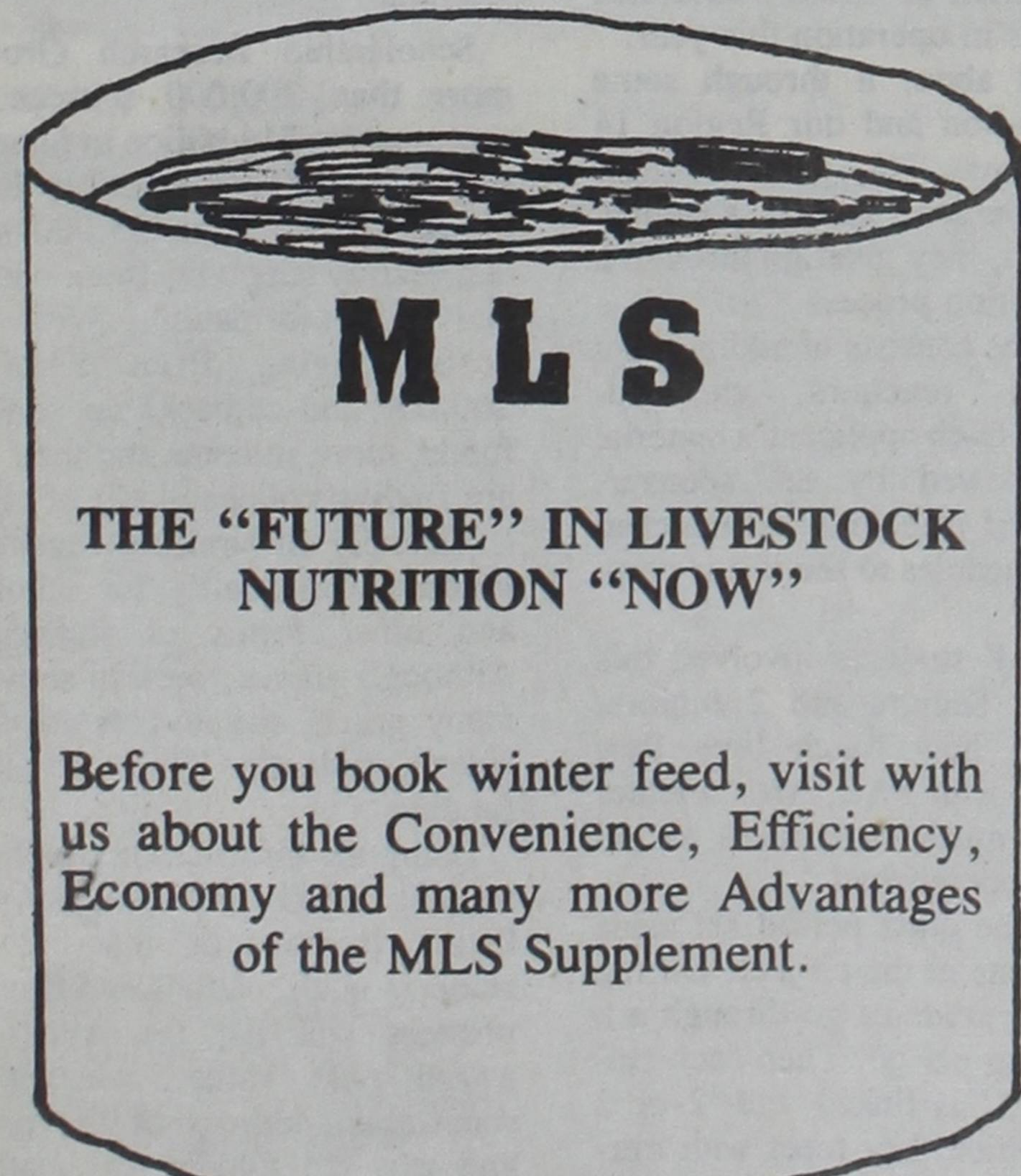

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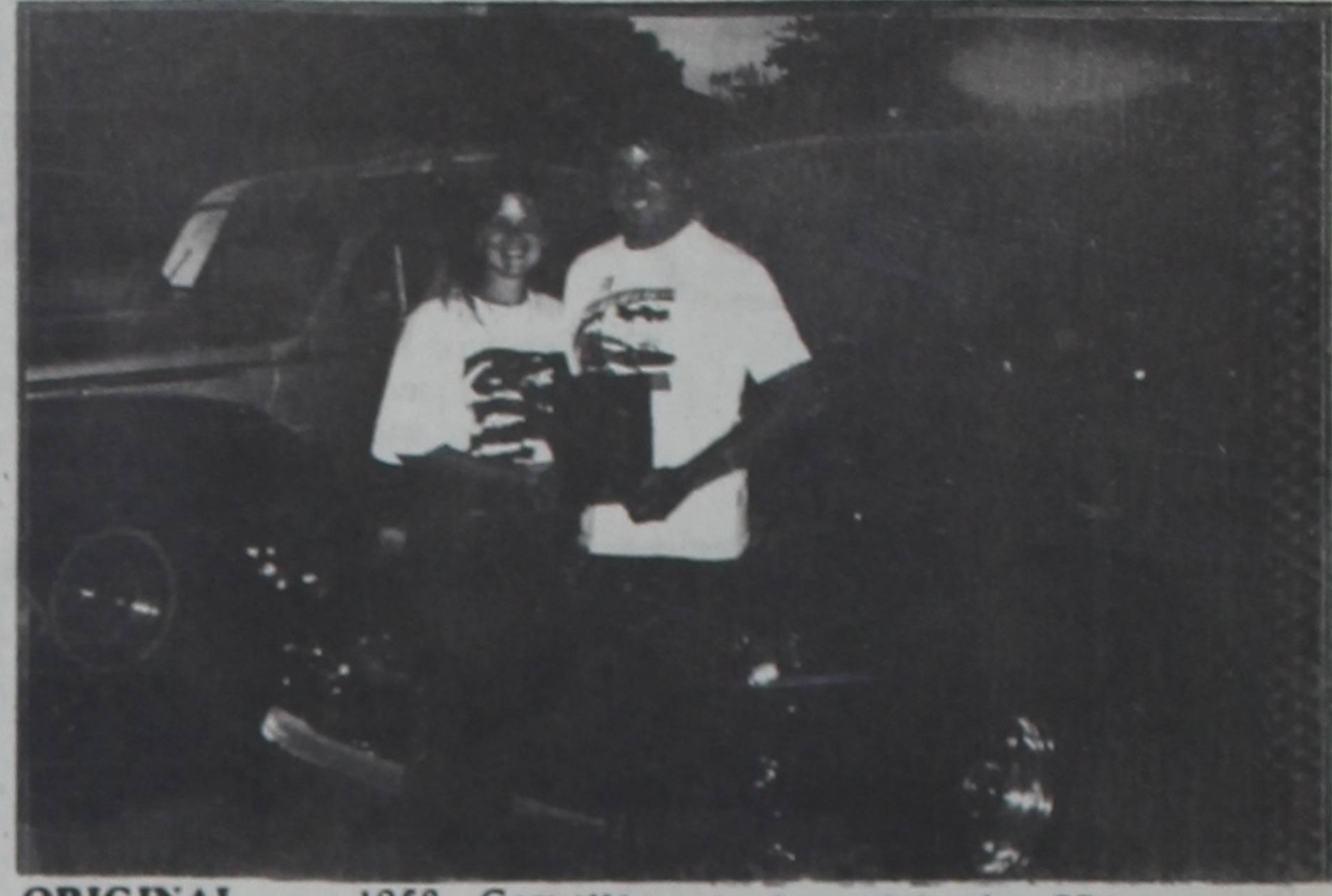

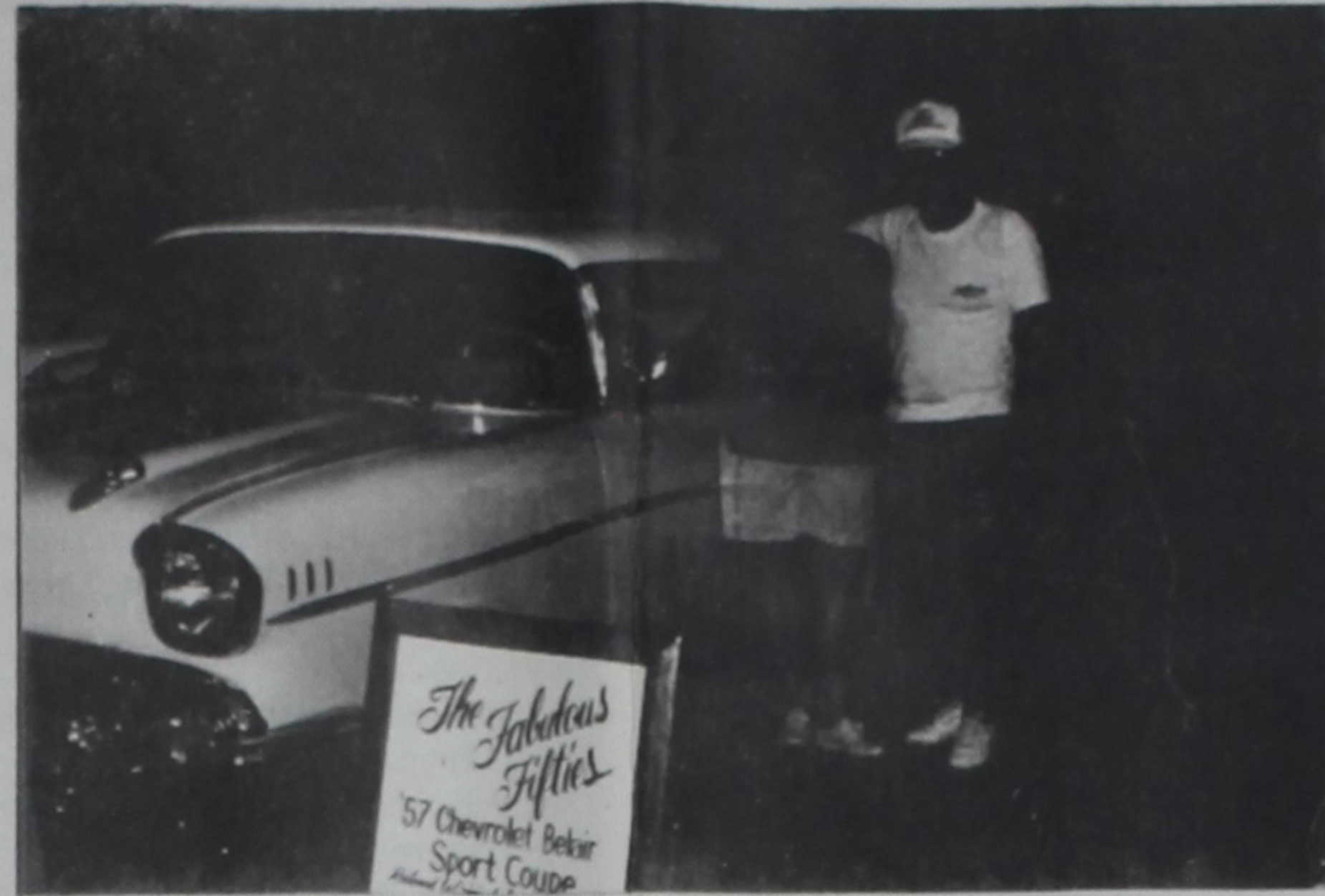

**HUBERT BELEWS' ATTEND 4TH
ARMORED DIVISION ANNIVERSARY**

Hubert and Celia Belew returned home September 8, after an enjoyable three week trip to Louisville, Kentucky.

The couple left Cross Plains on Tuesday, August 20, driving to Clarksville, Texas where they spent the night with their oldest son, Buddy, Debbie and girls.

On Wednesday, the 21st, they drove 622 miles arriving at Cave City, Kentucky staying overnight at the Kentucky Inn. With only 82 miles left to drive to Louisville they arrived the next morning. They had reservations at the Galt House Hotel, where the 4th Armored Division was having their 45th Annual Convention.

Hubert was in the Headquarters 22nd AFA of the 4th from 1941 to 1945. This year they celebrated the 50th Anniversary of activation of their great division. Most of them, including Hubert, started in the Calvary and were at Fort Knox about 3 or 4 weeks and they formed the 4th Armored Division which went to Pine Camp, New York.

On Friday 489 people went by bus to Fort Knox for the celebration. The personnel at Fort Knox gave everyone a wonderful welcome.

A portrait of General John S. Wood, the general of the 4th, was unveiled. A speech was delivered by his son, Retired General John S. Wood, Jr. A tank that the 4th had used in World War II was also unveiled and will be on display permanently. The portrait of Wood was placed in the Patton Museum along with Patton's car, a statue of him in uniform, etc. He served as general of the 3rd Army and the 4th Armored fought under him.

Lunch was served at the Officer's Club. After lunch they placed a wreath of flowers with the color and shape of the 4th Armored on it at a large monument with all units of the 4th, and in a

large circle each unit has a small monument. Everyone then returned to Louisville.

Saturday morning there was a memorial service with a 21 gun salute. Each unit had group photos taken before the banquet on Saturday night. The main speaker was Retired Colonel Robert Ellis of Houston. He was in the same unit Hubert was in.

Afterwards each group met in the hospitality room for more visiting, picture taking, and saying goodbye. The Belews reported a wonderful time and the next reunion is slated for 1992 in Las Vegas, Nevada. There were 902 men from the Division attending. Hubert saw three men he had not seen since 1945. One being his Company Commander of California.

On Sunday the Belews left and drove to Charlottesville, Virginia where he was born and lived until entering the service in May 1941. He still has a brother and sister-in-law there and several nieces and nephews.

On this weekend there were 19,000 students who had arrived for the fall semester at the University of Virginia. They visited in Hubert's hometown for a week before starting home.

They stopped back by Buddy's and attended the football game. The couple viewed a lot of beautiful country and had a great time, but it was nice to be home.
