Individual Responsibility The Deciding Factor In Reduction Of Street And Hi-way Accidents

It is too much to expect that we shall ever completely eliminate accidents from our busy streets and highways. But the record of last year—approximately 33,500 killed, 1,150,000 injured, and an economic loss of some \$2,000,000,000—leaves no room for argument against the fact that we must accomplish a very substantial reduction.

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Speeding through the night, the driver of this car was momentarily blinded by approaching headlights. Because he was going too fast to control his car instantly, he swerved off the highway and crashed into a telegraph pole with such force that the car was almost broken in two. He was dead when help arrived. National Conservation Bureau advises night-drivers to keep their eyes focused on the side of the road, never to look directly into headlights and—most important of all—to drive at moderate speed.

20 Years Ago *
August 5, 1927

The little city of Pioneer was again visited by fire Sunday night when a disastrous fire, which destroyed three frame buildings, caused an unestimated \$8,000 loss. The Owl Drug Store and two adjoining buildings were totally destroyed before flames could be brought under control.

The Cross Plains Fire Department was called and they responded quickly but were unable to be of any great help.

The Cross Plains Tigers and the

Bald Coyotes, two of the strongest ball clubs in this section, are to play at the local park Sunday.

Cross Plains suffered its most disastrous fire in several years Monday morning at three o'clock the Cross Plains Bakery and Hotel Grace were consumed by fire. Both were 2 story frame buildings.

The West Texas Utilities Office, South of the two destroyed buildings, sustained considerable damage from both water and fire. The fire was well advanced before discovered and firemen were unable to save the buildings.

The Hotel Grace was a 24 room building valued at \$7,000. It is understood there was no insurance. The building, owned by an Abilene man, was under lease to Ira Lov-

ing. The bakery building, owned by J. L. Moore, was valued at \$10,000 and carried some insurance. Patrons of the hotel barely escaped with their lives, many running into the street with bare feet and only night clothes on. Both buildings were burned to the ground in less than 20 minutes. The blaze originated from an unknown source.

The best way to play safe with electricity, says Mr. Allen, is to have a responsible electrician inspect your electrical set-up and install any extra wiring you need.

HOME CANNING TOMATOES
Tomatoes ripening on garden vines are a bright signal to home canners to get directions and supplies ready for the country's favorite among the home canned vegetables. Rich in flavor and vitamin C, tomatoes are the easiest of vegetables to can, and the only common garden vegetable that does not require steam pressure canner.

Some experimental canning gives evidence that raw-packed tomatoes hold color and shape better than hot-packed. Not much difference was noted in flavor.

Tomatoes not heated sufficiently will not keep in storage.

Here are the directions for canning tomatoes: Use only perfect, ripe tomatoes. To loosen skins, dip into boiling water for about a half minute, then slip quickly into cold water. Cut out stem ends and peel tomatoes.

Leave tomatoes whole, or cut in halves or quarters. Pack tomatoes to one half inch of top pressing gently to fill spaces. Fill with tomato juice or hot water. Add a half teaspoon salt to pints and one teaspoon to quarts. Have water in canner hot but not boiling to prevent breakage of glass. Steam pints 10 minutes, and quarts 12 minutes. Remove from canner and refill if necessary. Process pint and quart jars 25 minutes. As soon as jars are removed from canner, complete seals if closures are not of self-sealing type.

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PLAY SAFE WITH ELECTRICITY

If you're making or planning to make any electrical changes around the farm soon, you may want to bear this warning from William S. Allen, of the Texas A & M College Extension Service. Mr. Allen is agricultural engineer in charge of farm buildings, and he tells us that amateur wiring or overloading of electrical equipment may cause a bad fire on your farm. He's urging us to get competent electricians to make any electrical changes.

Mr. Allen warns especially against overloading circuits with temporary wiring. Homemade extensions to the barn or other buildings have been a big cause of barn fires in the past.

And if an electrical fire does break out, don't use water to put it out. That may sound peculiar, but Mr. Allen explains that a stream of water can conduct electricity into your body with very unpleasant or even fatal results. He advises getting an approved

carbon dioxide extinguisher, or a vaporizing liquid fire extinguisher can get the job done, too.

Choice Of Camp Is Offered To Enlistees

The War Department has recently authorized direct enlistment for Camp Hood, Texas, it was announced today by Sgt. James Hendrick of the Eastland Recruiting Station. Approximately 200 different jobs are open to qualified men re-enlisting for a period of three years or more. These jobs range from cooks and clerks to diesel mechanics and medium tank crewmen.

In addition to Camp Hood, the following Air Force bases are open for direct enlistment: Ft. Worth Army Air Field; Roswell Army Air Field, N. M.; Alamogordo Army Air Field, N. M.; Tucson Army Air Field, Ariz.; and Barksdale Field, Louisiana.

Retention of qualified men in these assignments will depend solely on the individual and his ability to satisfactorily perform the duties of the military specialty.

Former Army personnel who are interested in enlistment and assignment to any of the above camps or bases are advised to contact the recruiting sergeant on his visit to Cross Plains each Thursday afternoon, or call at the recruiting station, located on the third floor of the courthouse in Eastland, Texas.

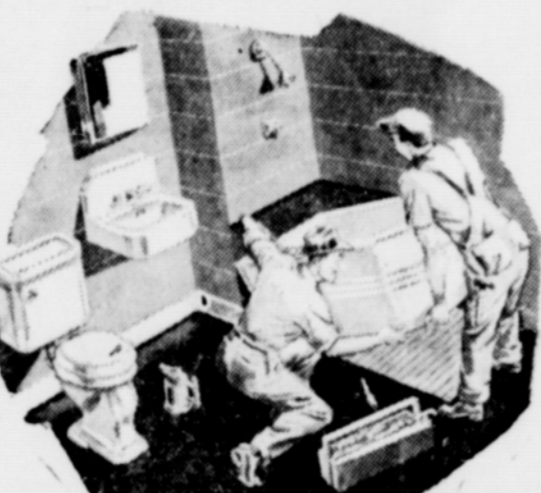

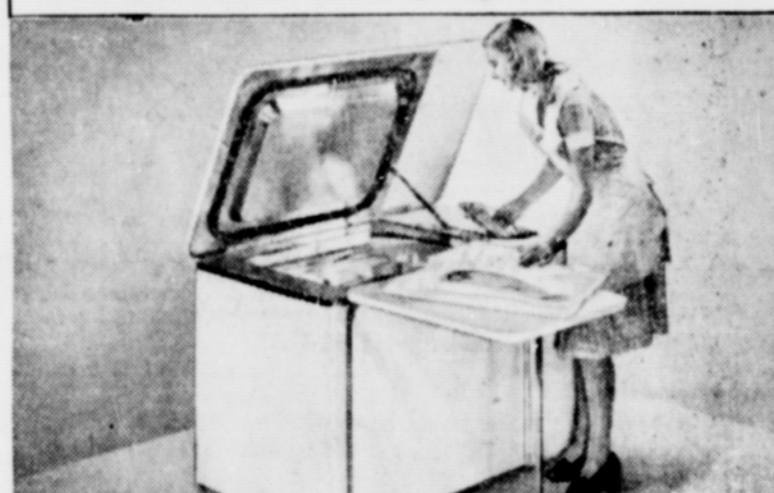

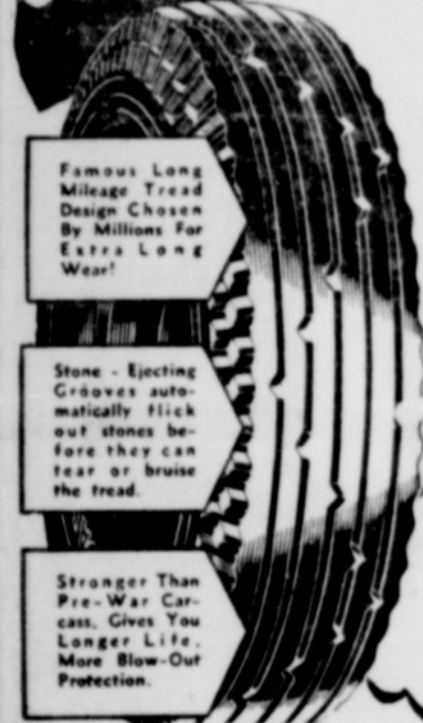

What Is SCIATICA?

This is an inflammation in which the sheath of the sciatic nerve becomes swollen and presses upon the nerve fibers so as to produce pain. The inflammation may be in the nerve itself in which case there is less pain but more or less paralysis. Sciatica has sudden onset with pain in the hip region and extending downwards. It may be dull or sharp, and is aggravated by flexing the leg at the hip. To minimize the pain, the patient, in walking, leans to the affected side. If the case is severe the muscles of the leg are weakened, the skin is cold, and there is considerable paralysis.

The inflammation of sciatica is produced by pressure upon nerves at the point where they emit from the spinal column. The sciatic nerve is a bundle of fibers which emit from the spinal cord at different places. The point of pressure is not always the same. The inflammation produces swelling, and this also causes pressure on the nerve fibers. If the sciatic condition becomes chronic the paralysis may become permanent. Prompt attention is necessary.

Many Chiropractors have had cases where the condition has been cleared up with a short course of adjustments. When pressure on the nerve is removed by correcting misaligned vertebrae, the inflammation subsides and in a short time the swelling in the nerve sheath goes down. Rats Are Known To Be Disease Carriers

Because of the economic losses they cause to industry and commerce and the annoyance they create in homes, rats have been considered a serious menace to mankind since long before their role as vectors of disease was understood. Today at least six diseases which are transmitted to man from the rat are known to medical science, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. These diseases include the dread plague, typhus, trichinosis, a form of jaundice, tapeworm and food poisoning. The whole history of the role rats play in the transmission of disease remains as yet unknown.

"It is necessary to public health," Dr. Cox said, "that a continuous rat control program be maintained in every urban and rural area throughout Texas. This is of special importance on farms where rats may flourish by feeding on grain and other farm products."

The doctor pointed out that rats, like other living things, require food and shelter if they are to propagate and increase in number. Destroying their shelter and breeding places requires the rat-proofing of buildings and providing for periodic inspection of buildings to insure permanent safety. The program will force the rat out into the open where its destruction may be accomplished.

Of equal importance as a control measure is the elimination of all food supplies. This consists of storing all foods in ratproof buildings or in ratproof containers, the proper storage and disposal of garbage, and careful feeding of stock to prevent waste food from being picked up by the rats.

By observing these control measures, the community will benefit not only in the eradication of a nuisance and economic menace, but in improved health conditions and the prevention of rat-borne diseases.

4-H NEWS
Seven boys from Callahan county 4-H Clubs are to attend District Camp at Lake Brownwood July 21, 22 and 23. Those who planned to attend were: Billy Hicks and Robert Collins from Clyde; Billy Millern and C. Lee Smith from Eula; and Thurman Achley and Robert Armour from Denton.

For the 3 days at camp the boys will enjoy games, swimming, educational films, talks by specialists, and a rifle contest. The boy making the highest score with a .22 caliber rifle will go to the State contest to be held in Sept. The boys received rifle practice at Eula July 3rd and will meet again July 10th to sharpen their aim. Approximately 200 will attend this camp from District 7.

The boys selected to attend camp were chosen on their club activity and club record. Any boys who had previously attended camp were ineligible.

The county camp is scheduled for August 6 and 7 at Lake Cisco, and all 4-H members are invited and asked to bring their fathers if they are able to attend.

GRASS ERADICATION DEMONSTRATION
These were some 25 to 30 farmers gathered at the Denton Store Thursday, July 19, to witness a demonstration on killing Bermuda grass and Johnson grass with an old s, rdard weed killer, sodium chlorate. The poison has been special treated which has eliminated the danger of fire and makes the poison more effective. The commercial trade name is "Alacide".

George Morgan, of Morgan's Food Store, in Baird furnished the chemical and sprayer equipment for the demonstration which was given on J. E. Ogles place just north of the store.

A check in two weeks will probably show the effectiveness of "Alacide" for killing Bermuda and Johnson grass.

CO-OPS
It was said 2500 years ago by the Greek, Xenophon, that "when agriculture flourishes, all other pursuits are in full vigor; but when the ground is forced to lie barren, other occupations are almost stopped, as well by land as by sea."

This is as true today as then and the farmers are realizing this fact as well as many business concerns as more cooperatives are being formed each year. The activities of two newly organized farmers organizations, the Cross Plains Vetch Growers Association, and the Callahan Farmers Cooperative, Inc., have been organized to help agriculture flourish in our country. And when agriculture flourishes the farmer has more money to buy from the merchants in Putnam, Cross Plains, Baird, Clyde, Opine, Eula etc. and it is to everybody's advantage.

The Callahan County Farmers Cooperative, Inc. is attempting to furnish all farmers that are planning on planting winter legumes with "hospitas" this year. Cards are being mailed asking farmers to list their needs and if the response is received that is expected, plans will be made to handle the fertilizer as soon as the sources of phosphate have been contacted.

The Cross Plains Vetch Growers Association met Friday night (July 11) and all growers in that vicinity

agreed to pool their seed and set the price at 22 1/2 cents per pound. The price is the same that Dublin and the Rising Star Association agreed upon as a fair price. All vetch growers are urged to cooperate and hold their seed for this price if they don't store it at the Association's place of business with A. D. Petty, Cross Plains.

A report on other county activities: After small scale tryouts, the farmers have gone all out and formed a county-wide legume growers association in Hamilton county. Last year when 18 farmers planted hairy vetch seed, they made \$3,500 extra by pooling and marketing their seed together. Seeing possibilities, the group formed itself into a small association and the number of farmers planting vetch seed jumped to 250. Since there is a big demand for legume seed, the growers then organized on a county-wide basis, drew up by-laws and received a charter from Austin.

Going into action, the association is constructing a 40x100 foot steel concrete floored building to house a vetch and clover cleaning machine. They estimate a 1,500,000lb legume seed crop this year.

Why shouldn't farmers look after their own business of marketing their products? Co-ops are a means toward that end.
