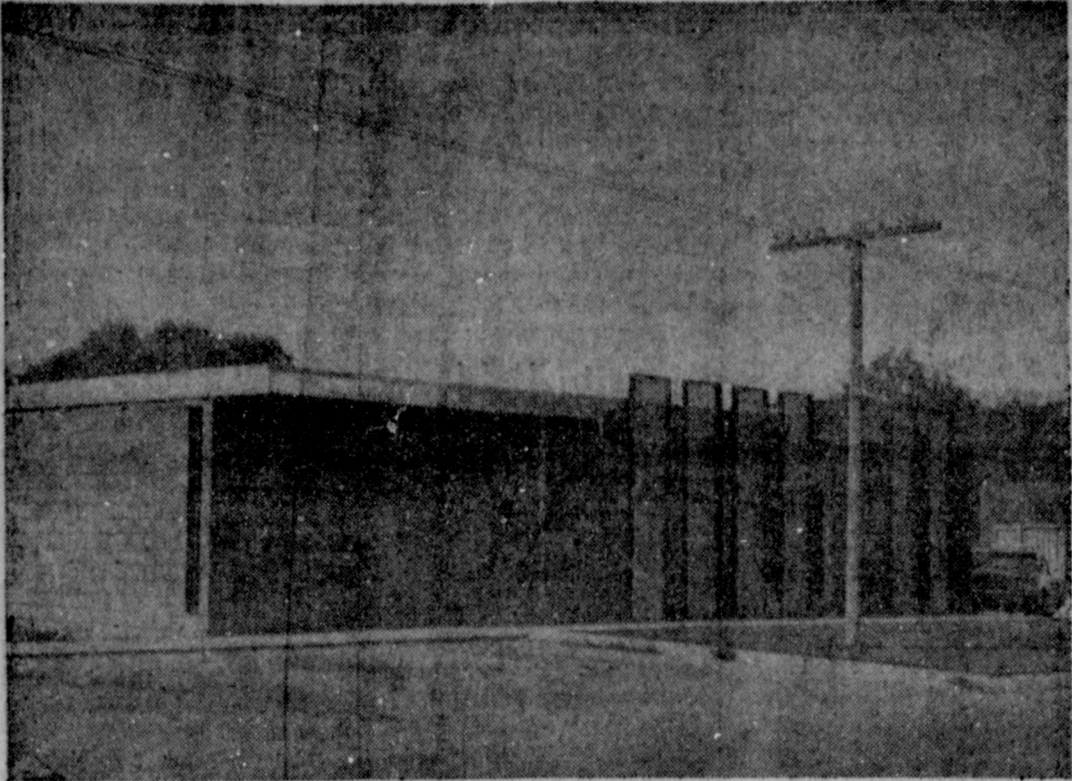

**DOCTORS CLINIC EXPANDS** — Dr. Ray Santos and Dr. Pummil are now expanding their office and clinic. Completion of this unit is expected within the next two weeks. Two examination rooms, two dressing rooms and one bath room, along with a new emergency and small surgery room are being added at a cost of approximately \$10,000. Equipment is expected to cost \$5,000.

## Test Tomatoes Yield Very High

Some 400 acres of tomatoes are now being harvested in the Muleshoe area. Most are going as ripe tomatoes to canneries in Arkansas at \$2.50 per ton to our growers with grower bearing the harvest cost up through loading on trucks. Many tons of tomatoes are going to fresh market outlets from the same fields. The fresh market tomatoes are not bearing the cost of grading and packing here at Muleshoe but bring 5 cents per pound of \$1.00 per ton to the grower. The cost of harvesting fresh market tomatoes is considerably higher than the cost of harvesting cannery tomatoes as it is a more delicate and exacting chore.

The California tomato, VF-14-5-A, produced slightly over 14 tons per acre from a single harvest on September 2nd. The other California tomato V. F. 14-5-22, was inferior and produced only 19,257 pounds per acre. The above varieties are for mechanical harvest and was gathered only once and results are final.

## Horace Houston On Campaign Tour

Horace Houston, a republican candidate for Lt. Governor, announced this week that he will begin the second of four extensive state campaign tours on September 30. This one will begin at Tyler and will include stops at 23 cities and towns in East, South and Central Texas.

Overnight stops will be made at Tyler, Angleton, Corpus Christi and Austin. Houston said that his chance for victory in November "has moved into the realm of possibility". The four term Representatives and presently veteran of the Texas House of the Republican Minority Leader in the House will, among other things on this campaign swing, stress the need for changing Texas "riot" laws. He says, "There is pressing need to strengthen our state laws as they relate to riots, looting, violence and civil disobedience for the reason that under present Texas law, the state would be severely handicapped in coping with rioters. Specifically, present laws should be amended to authorize the arrest and prosecution, for participation in a riot, of any person on the riot scene who refuses to leave the scene after being required to do so by an officer of the law."

### TIPS... FROM THE OFFICE OF HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT

Have you been using the abundance of Muleshoe tomatoes to their fullest advantage? A splash of color can cheer up the cook as well as brighten the meal, and one of the best brighteners - uppers around is the lively red of fresh tomatoes. Use them lavishly this time of year and use them with beef. The two foods are old friends. Their flavors compliment each other in many a favorite recipe. For a starter try these:

1. Pour 2 1/2 cups of tomatoes over a pot roast the last hour of cooking. It makes first class gravy, especially if a clove of garlic and a little thyme are cooked with the meat.
2. Add 1 cup of tomatoes and your favorite seasoning to 1 1/2 pounds of ground beef for meat loaf. Use about a cup of soft bread crumbs for a binder.
3. Put extra flavor and moistness in ground beef patties by adding 3-4 cup of tomatoes to 1 pound of ground beef. Use 1-2 cup of uncooked quick-cooking oats as a binder and season to taste. This combination has a delusion but "different" flavor, and helps you stretch a pound of meat to serve 6.
4. Pour 2 1/2 cups of tomatoes over browned round for Spangeebs steak. Add chopped onion and green pepper, salt and pepper. Cook until tender.

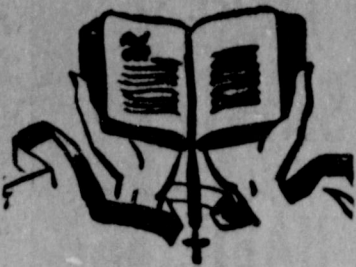

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Today's Meditation

**CHRISTIAN UNITY**  
A favorite dismissal of the ecumenical movements is to quote the Prophet Amos: 3:3 - "Can two walk together, except they be agreed?" Simply because we have denominations with different concepts of Baptism, Communion, Worship and Ministry, it is taken for granted we can never agree, and never unite.

The true translation of this verse in the more accurate Revised Standard Version is this: "Do two walk together, unless they have made an appointment?"

Christ made it clear we were to make an appointment when He prayed that they may all be one (His followers).

We disagree on a number of things, but thirty - one years ago, before the altars of Christ, we made a sacred appointment to walk together in marriage for the rest of our lives.

Two can walk together even when they differ, if there is a basic agreement, a basic love.

Christian Unity was best stated at the Evanston Assembly of the World Council of Churches: "Here where we stand, Jesus Christ stood with us. He came to us, true God and true Man, to seek and to save. Though we were the enemies of God, Christ died for us. We crucified Him, but God raised Him from the dead. He has overcome the powers of sin and death. A new life has begun. And in His risen and ascended power, He has sent forth into the world a new community, bound together by His Spirit, sharing His divine life, and commissioned to make Him known throughout the world."

We do have an appointment to meet with Christ, to follow Christ, and to do this together rather than competitively and apart.

"Ladies for Lyndon" Dress On Sale  
Designed With Purpose In Mind

An official "Ladies for Lyndon" dress went on sale today at Johnson - Humphrey Headquarters in Austin. Made of fabric woven from dacron, polyester and Texas-grown cotton, the dress and kerchief (both for \$30) are blue-bonnet blue. An optional poncho (\$7.50) makes the dress adaptable to Texas weather.

Johnson - Humphrey Headquarters indicated that over 150 orders for the entire outfit have already been received.

Mrs. R. Max Brooks, who designed the dress, describes it as a "skimmer of bluebonnet blue dacron polyester and combed Texas cotton fabric with a bateau neckline, bracelet length sleeves, long shape-darts in the bodice, and A-line skirt."

A red, white and blue campaign ribbon 3 inches wide extends from the left shoulder to the right hip and is accented on the left shoulder by a large flash LBJ button. The kerchief of matching material is piped in red and accented on the back portion with small white felt LBJ letters.

Lined in flag red, with large white felt LBJ letters on the front, the matching poncho is a gay wrap for cool Texas days and evenings.

Another optional item available from Johnson - Humphrey Headquarters is the official ladies tote bag (\$6) designed by the Neuces County Democratic Women in Corpus Christi. Many Texas Democratic Convention delegates, including Mrs. Lyndon Johnson and Mrs. John B. Connally sported these attractive straw bags in Atlantic City.

AUSTIN - Anyone who is under the impression that glue sniffing gives a fellow a low harmless kick is sadly mistaken.

Serious damage may be caused by the solvent in glue. Exactly how serious or extensive the damage can be is not yet known.

But it is a fact that nine recent deaths are attributed to a practice. Six of these involved glue sniffing while the victim's head was covered with a plastic bag.

Some of the "sniffing" symptoms reported to poison centers ranged from headache, dizziness and breathlessness to intoxication, unconsciousness, blurred vision and blindness.

Apart from the physical injury produced by the inhalation of the solvents from glues, incalculable harm can be done while youngsters are under its influence.

One youngster described his sensations: "I saw two of everything, and everything far away looked real near. I had noise in my ears like a firecracker going off, and then I blacked out."

One boy in his early teens was so exhilarated by glue sniffing that he assumed a fighting stance before an oncoming freight train, narrowly escaping death.

A 12-year-old who has never been known to steal, robbed a florist shop while under the influence of glue. Another young glue sniffer jumped off a low building, convinced he could fly.

Inevitably the question must be asked: What can be done? Some local jurisdictions have passed legislation aimed at combating the problem. Researchers are searching for a method of eliminating toxic vapors and thereby eliminating the glue-sniffing practice.

Unfortunately, there seems to be no single, simple answer.

**Tokyo Welcome Olympic Girls**

HARRIETTE SHERMAN TOKYO (AP) — The 1964 Olympics, which even before it opens has distinguished itself with superlatives — largest roster of athletes and officials, widest coverage, highest number of entrant countries — also represents the most impressive participation by women.  
 The fair sex is making contributions in just about every facet of the event, not just the athletics themselves.  
 The two pretty daughters of Japan's prime minister, Sachiko and Noriko Ikeda, 24 and 22 will serve as volunteer hostesses to wives and families of visiting international Olympic Committee

members along with some 30 other wives and daughters of prominent Japanese.  
 Women by far outnumber men on the games' interpreting staff estimated currently at about 250.  
 An elite guard of police women, all college educated, expert in judo and fluent in English and other languages, will ensure the peace of the Women's Village, a tight little island of femininity within the Olympic Village.  
 JOSHI MURA  
 Haru Sadaka, daughter of Admiral Toyoda and a former star-athlete herself, is the lady whose charge it is to feed house and minister to the 852 women athletes and officials — 103 more than originally expected — who will stay at Joshi Mura, the euphonious Japanese name for Women's Village.  
 Participants from 52 countries will be housed in the 276 rooms of four fern-concrete buildings which like all the buildings of Joshi Mura are painted green, as distinct from the yellow of the men's section. Existing buildings, relics of Washington Heights, a former U. S. military housing area vacated permanently for the Olympic Village project, have been utilized and remodeled.  
 The former officers' club will serve as the women's quarters center. A spacious two story building, it will contain a dining hall, beauty parlor, shops for toiletries and other necessities, dry cleaning and laundry service, police women's contact office and recreation room with bar for refreshments — as elsewhere in the village, non-alcoholic.  
 SERVES 250  
 The dining hall, which will be able to serve 250 meals at a time, will be staffed by 58 cooks and 50 persons for serving and other chores. The cuisine will be international.  
 Sure to delight the psyche and soothe the muscles of the women athletes is the Japanese-style bath adjacent to the living quarters. Especially constructed for the women's quarters, it features two separate tiled bathing pools, steam room and massage facilities.  
 Additional facilities, which will be shared with the men in the Village proper, include a fully-equipped clinic, post office, fire station, bank and shopping center, where first class merchandise will be sold at lowered prices to the participants.  
 Cost for accommodations is \$6 a day, including meals, planned to provide a total of 6,000 calories daily.  
 The American team, of whom 85 are women, will have perhaps the best deal of all, as the American Committee has planned for it an elaborate activities program, exclusive of the offerings of the Tokyo Committee.  
**TOURS PLANNED**  
 Doing the leg work in Japan is assistant activities director, Dee Beckmann, a tireless organizer who is herself a sportsman and recreational specialist. First woman to coach an American Olympic team, track and field in the Berlin Olympics, she has planned individual and group tours of Tokyo sights and shopping, trips to such beauty spots as Mt. Fuji, lesson in tea ceremony and flower arranging.  
 The woman tourist who visits Japan during the Olympics can, of course, do all these things on her own. Most reliable shops and eating places will display the IGS — International Goodwill Shop — sign which promises courteous service and fair prices, and most are making a reasonable effort to supply information and prices in English.  
 A truly monumental job of road building has eased the hideous Tokyo traffic, cabbies will carry reference texts of conversational phrases, special corps of police will discourage con artist and pickpockets. An emergency phone number, 110, has been designated for foreigners in straits to call and the welcome mat is out everywhere.

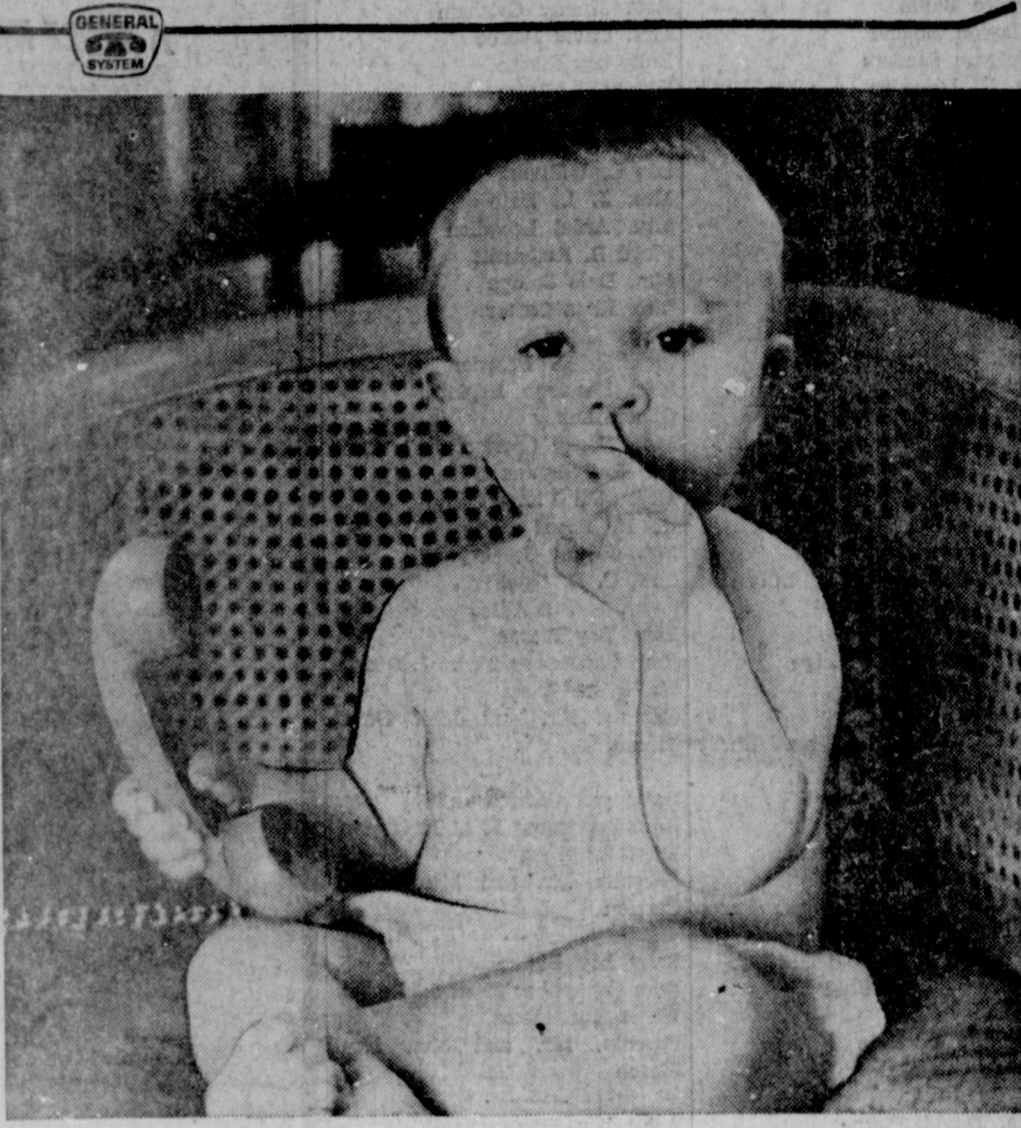

AUSTIN, Tex. — Speaking before more than 300 district and county attorneys, sheriffs and judges at a Law Enforcement Conference here, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr proposed the following 8-point program:

- (1) Expand training and education of law enforcement officials;
- (2) Provide more officers and pay them better;
- (3) Teach personal knowledge of confinement to juvenile offenders;
- (4) Teach and gain increased parental responsibility;
- (5) Make parents financially responsible for damage done by juveniles;
- (6) Place responsibility upon juveniles themselves through such programs as the Texas Youth Conference;
- (7) Continue and improve the annual Attorney General's Law Enforcement Conference; and

#### SHELL GAME

State Sen. William Putman of Ganado and Rep. Paul Haring of Goliad have entered strong protests with the State Parks and Wildlife Commission, on behalf of their constituency, opposing an application by Heldenfels Brothers of Corpus Christi to dredge for oyster shell in Opano Bay.

According to Haring, Heldenfels Brothers wants to use the shell to build a road by Opano Bay. But the State Highway Department would readily accept the use of lime instead. Protestors insist that dredging in the bay would kill off live oyster reefs and destroy fishing, sporting and tourist attractions in the area.

#### A. G. OPINIONS

Attorney General Carr has ruled that Rep. H. G. Wells of Tulla, who represents Briscoe, Hale, Swisher and Floyd Counties, should get legislative pay

through this term even though he now is attorney for the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1. Wells is not running for re-election.

Carr also held that professional roller derby contests are not taxable under the Admissions Tax Law of Texas; and that "concrete containers" to be used as burial vaults, in garden-type cemeteries to keep graves from settling, are funeral merchandise under state law and are not exempt as crypts or mausoleums.

#### APPOINTMENTS

Gov. John Connally has appointed George Dowlen of Canyon as Criminal District Attorney of Randall County. He succeeds the late Truett G. Hull Jr.

Connally also picked Paul N. Howell of San Antonio to succeed E. E. Voigt on the San Antonio River Authority Board. Howell, an oilman, also is a director of the San Antonio HemisFair.

#### PALMEITO DAM PROJECT

Edna and Ganado area people packed a Water Commission hearing room when Bureau of Reclamation representative and the Jackson County Flood Control District took up consideration of the proposed Palmetto Bend Dam Project.

Most of those attending the hearing favored construction of the 15-mile dam which would cost 48,150,000 to build. However, Commission Chairman Joe Carter said no written protests had been received.

#### HARRY BURLEIGH

area planning engineer of the Bureau of Reclamation, outlined the two-part project. It will begin with construction of a dam across Navidad River to form a reservoir with a capacity of 192,000 acre feet and a conservation level of 44 feet.

Part two of the plan would

extend the dam across nearby Post Oak Branch and Lavaca River.

Burleigh said that the first phase, if authorized by the Commission, plus the Federal House and Senate and the people of Jackson County, would satisfy Jackson County's water needs for about 19 years.

Approval of both phases at one time would result in savings, Burleigh stated. But Commissioner Otho Dent was reluctant to consider part two immediately.

"If phase one is an entity unto itself and you don't intend to do anything with phase two for 15-20 years, I'm not in favor of the state surrendering its rights to control of water in the second watershed at this time," Dent said.

Commission, which will write the state's comments on the advisement after six hours of discussion.

#### HEARINGS CONCLUDED

A legislative study committee completed its hearings on congressional redistricting and settled down to figuring how to draw 23 districts of equal population.

At the final meeting in Austin Rep. John Traeger of Seguin suggested a redistricting plan which would create a new 16-county district in the Guadalupe River Basin. His proposal also would combine the East Texas districts of Congressmen John Dowdy of Athens, Wright Patman of Tarkenton and Lindley Beckworth of Gladewater.

Unless the study committee of the Texas Legislative Council comes up with something better, Traeger served notice he intends to submit his plan to the next Legislature.

#### SEN. GEORGE MOFFETT

of Chillicothe, committee chairman, indicated repeatedly that the panel is aiming for a plan in which no district varies more than five per cent in population from the mathematical average of 416,598.

#### OIL PRODUCTION HELD

Texas Railroad Commission held Texas oil production to 27.9 per cent of potential.

New order will peg October production at 2,886,252 barrels a day, compared with an October 1963, figure of 2,878,206 under a 28 per cent order.

#### MENTAL RETARDATION

PLAN — Texas' biggest effort to initiate a plan reaching into many communities for combating mental retardation is under way.

Planning work was authorized by a special committee appointed by Governor Connally.

Goal of the committee is to measure the size of the problem, pinpoint available services and accurately forecast needs to treat and prevent retardation. A long-range study is planned under federal grants.

Mental retardation afflicts 300,000 Texans. Over 8,000 mentally retarded children are born each year, the committee was told.

LUBBOCK CHOSEN — After inspections covering 12,000 miles and 17 cities, the State Board for Hospitals and Special Schools picked Lubbock as the site for a new school for the mentally retarded. Estimated cost is \$2,500,000.

School will serve an 84-county West Texas area.

Plainview, Odessa, El Paso, Levelland, Midland, Fort Stockton and Amarillo also were seriously considered as sites. Thirty-nine cities originally expressed interest in having the facility.

#### DISASTER PLAN STUDIED

A new "hospital zone support concept" which would like all Texas hospitals in the event of a major disaster was unveiled here.

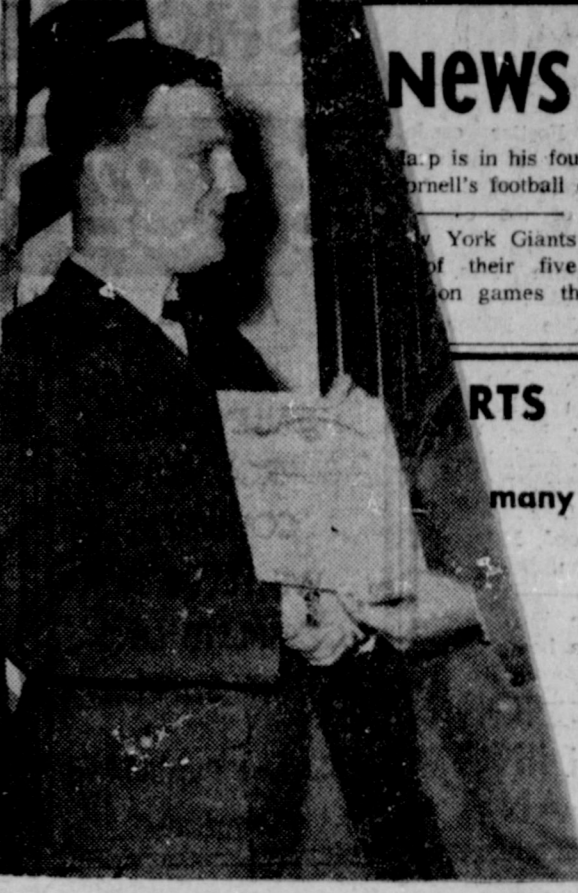

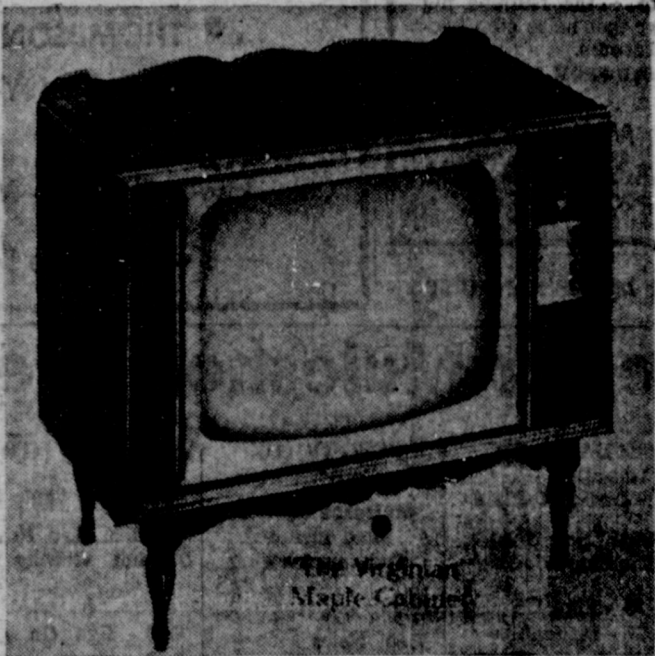

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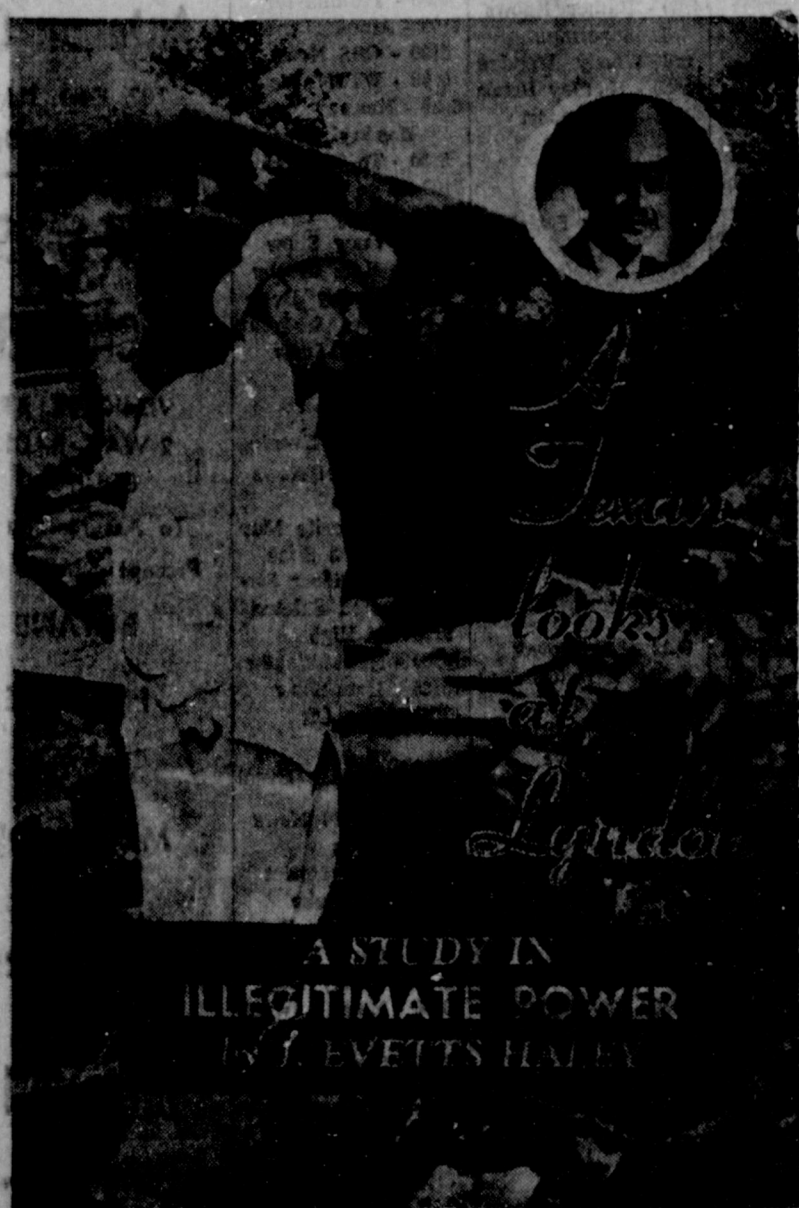
