School Days

In 1923 I came from a one room school house in the community of "Hillside" at Rowden (it sat across from the entrance to Tommie Harris' house), to a three story school house in Cross Plains.

Hattie Bryson and Mrs. Bill Hatchett were my teachers at Hillside. The Cross Plains teachers that I remember were Mr. DeVaney, Patience Austin, Joan Yarbrough, Esther Sides, Inez Gibson and Beatrice Reasoner.

One incident I well recall was when the merry-go-round fell. It was loaded with children and one girl was hit on the head by a piece of falling metal. One girl sustained a broken leg and several of us were bruised, but no fatalities.

The old school was cracked from top to bottom. If a bad cloud came up we were dismissed so we could seek cover. We did not mind extra holidays!

The 1927/28 grade school graduation was held in the Baptist Church. The next school term we had new school buildings at the present location.

Mr. T. R. Haggard was the Superintendent. I graduated at Cross Plains High School in 1931. The only local graduates of this class are Lena Bland and myself, Flora (McMillan) Koenig.

— Solving the world's most pressing problems, while sitting on the rock wall during lunch break.

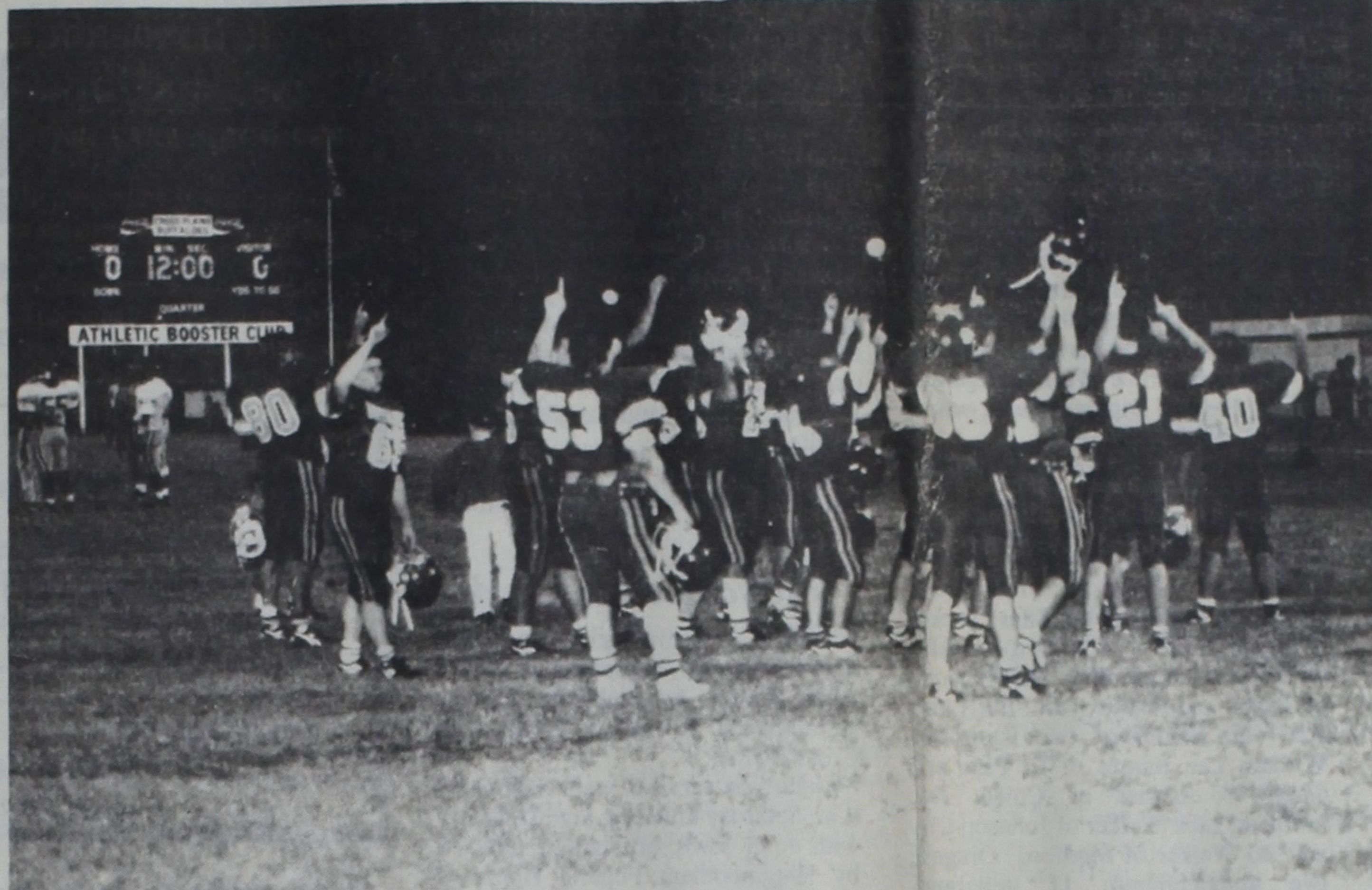

BUFFALO HERD PLANTS PLOWBOYS

Friday night in Buffalo Stadium the Buffaloes took on the Roscoe Plowboys. When the ending buzzer sounded, the score was Cross Plains 41 and Roscoe 7. The Buffalo offense executed well and played a good game.

Jason Fleming accumulated 2 touchdowns and completed a 2 point conversion to Colby Walker.

Jody Brown had a total of 4 touchdowns, and Brad Morgan at-

tempted 5 extra points, completing 3.

The backs and receivers did a great job, but there are some unsung heroes. Who are they? The "root hogs," lineman as they are commonly called and they did an excellent job blocking.

The defense was superior on the field all night long, in holding the Plowboy's offense, and only giving up 7 points.

The Buffalo "Herd" proved that there is really a winning team in Cross Plains, and that a team wins by teamwork. Throughout the game it took teamwork and without it, the Buffs would never have won.

On offense the Buffaloes had 20 first downs, rushed 316 yards out of 40 rushing plays, threw 26 passes with 11 completions for 123 yards and only 1 interception.

The Plowboys had 9 first downs, rushed for 113 yards out of 41 rushing plays, and attempted 11 passes with only one completed for 16 yards. The Buffs had 1 fumble and the Plowboys 3.

The Buffaloes averaged 28 yards out of 4 punts, and Roscoe 23.6 yards out of 9. We received 8 penalties for 60 yards while they had 4 penalties for 35 yards.

Colby Walker led the defense in tackles with 6. Billy Walker came in next with a total of 5½. Kenny Horan and Jody Brown both accumulated 4. Jason Fleming and Michael Cowan had 3 each. Earl Meroney, Jacob Barron, Bucky Williams, James Reed and Warren Parson each received credit for 2 each. Billy Brown had 1½ while Brandon Smith and Shawn McKeenan each had 1.

The crowd did a terrific job in supporting the Buffaloes by encouraging them and by making noise with their noise makers.

The cheerleaders and band did another excellent job in supporting the Buffaloes. Keep up the good work!

The power and strength of the Buffaloes is truly in the "Herd" and in BUFFALO PRIDE. Come out and support the athletes, coaches, cheerleaders, and band every Thursday and Friday. The more support, the better we perform.

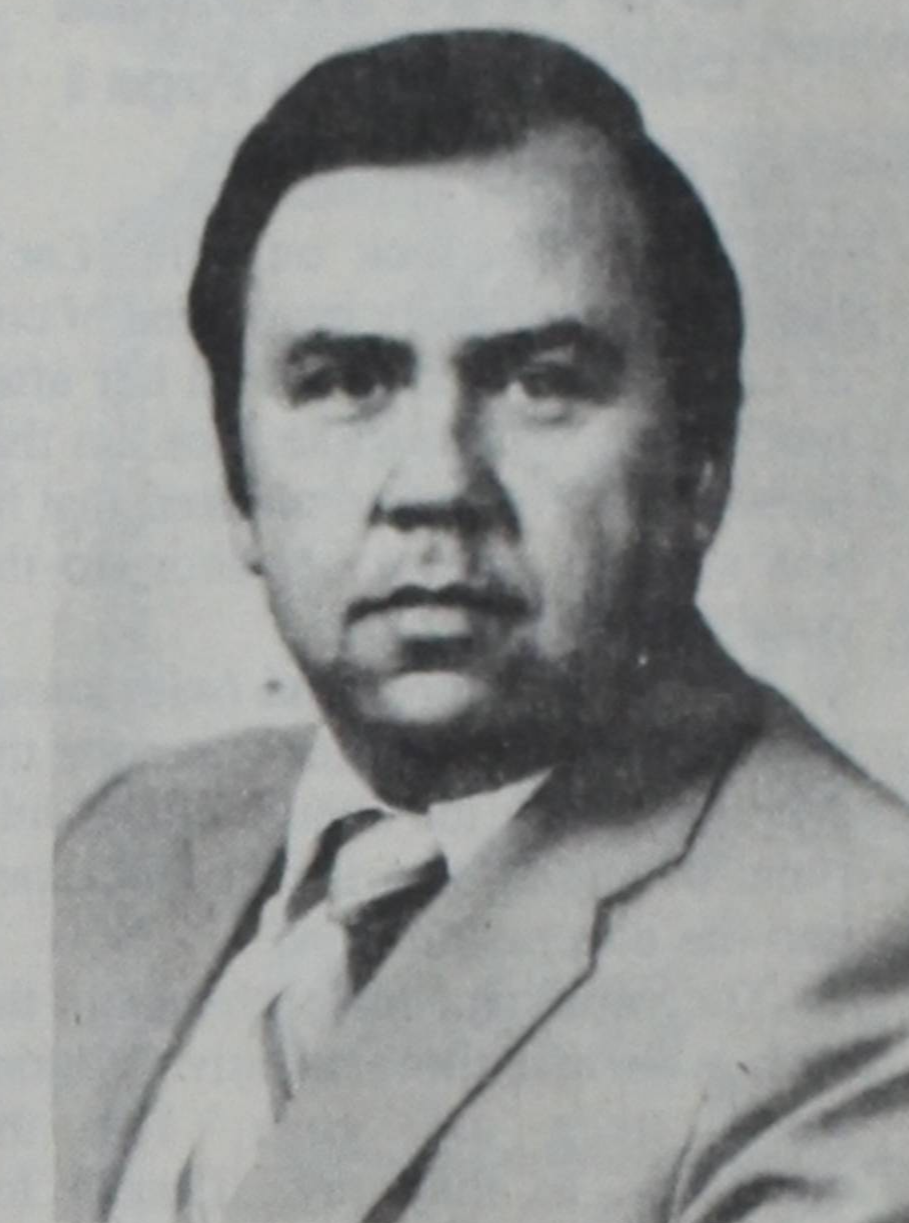

WTU Offers Lower Utility Rates For Customers

Customers of West Texas Utilities Co. have some good news in the form of lower costs for electricity beginning with October bills. The lower costs are produced by a one-time credit and a reduction in the fuel cost portion of the bill.

"Our continuing efforts to lower boiler fuel costs and related transportation costs were successful and prompted the reduction," said, Larry Cheshire WTU's area manager. Those efforts include renegotiation of supply and transportation agreements, construction of a gas pipeline to the Fort Phantom power station near Abilene to provide better access to suppliers, and improvements in the efficiency of some plants so they burn less fuel to make electricity.

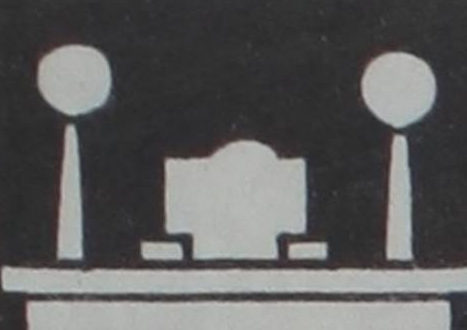
The credit will be issued on customer's electric bills during the billing month of October. An average residential customer using 660 kilowatt hours of electricity will see a reduction of \$13.17 on the bill that month. The actual reduction for each customer is based on their previous month's use of electricity.

The reduction in the fuel portion of the electric bill will be in effect for all upcoming months. According to Cheshire, it will mean an average 3.5 percent reduction from costs last year.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) recently granted the company's request to reconcile fuel costs for April 1987 through December 1990 and adjust the fuel portion of the bill to recover projected fuel costs. WTU filed the request last February.

West Texas Utilities Co. serves 177,000 customers in a 52 county area that stretches from the Red River to the Rio Grande.

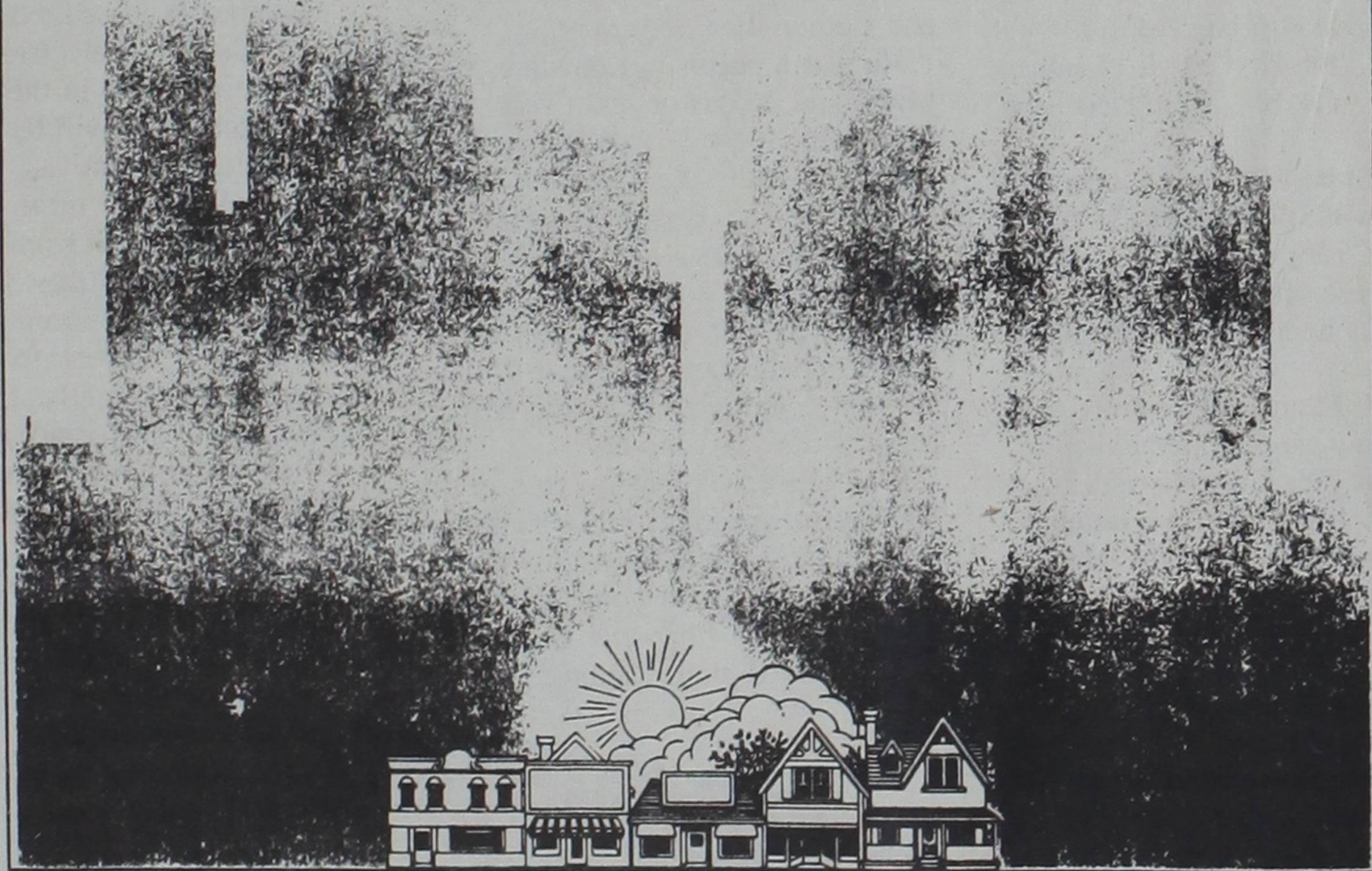

Fire Prevention Week Proclaimed By County Judge Bill Johnson, October 6-12

County Judge Bill Johnson has proclaimed the week of October 6-12, 1991 as FIRE PREVENTION WEEK in Callahan County.

The Callahan County Farm Bureau, in conjunction with all fire departments in the county are working together to emphasize fire prevention and protection throughout the county.

Fire Prevention Week is always the Sunday-through-Saturday period in which falls October 9, date of the Great Chicago Fire of 1871. The Chicago disaster killed 250 people and destroyed 17,430 buildings.

In his proclamation, Judge Bill Johnson has called upon the citizens of Callahan County to participate in Fire Prevention Week activities such as locating and eliminating fire hazards; checking smoke detectors and developing a home escape plan; as the 1991 theme suggests "FIRE WON'T WAIT PLAN YOUR ESCAPE!"

Tom Humber, President of the Callahan-Shackelford Farm Bureau said, "Fire is both friend and foe. We can't live without it, but its destructive power is a threat we must control."

Protect yourself by keeping fire a friend:

- ★ Regularly inspect your house and out-buildings for fire hazards. Check the electrical system, electrical appliances and equipment, fuel storage, heaters and heating systems. Make needed repairs or replacements without delay. Don't overload circuits or bypass fusing.

- ★ Remove trash, stacks of papers and other unneeded combustibles that could feed a fire.

- ★ Read and follow instructions with portable heaters. Place them where they won't ignite combustibles or be tipped over. Never use gasoline in a kerosene heater, and make certain gasoline and kerosene containers are clearly marked to avoid a mix-up. Never use kerosene or gas-fired heater in a closed area — have ample ventilation.

- ★ Check your heating system prior to the heating season. Install and use wood-burning stoves as directed in the manuals or other literature. Screen fireplaces. Keep chimneys and flues free of obstructions and creosote buildup.

- ★ Keep matches and lighters out of children's reach.

- ★ Don't smoke in bed nor when drowsy. Don't smoke when using flammable materials nor in places that have readily combustible materials such as hay, straw, dry weeds, grain dust, etc. Store flammable liquids in well-marked, closed containers. Make sure your cigarettes or match is "out" before discarding.

- ★ Install approved lighting protection systems on main buildings. Inspect them annually to make sure they are properly grounded.

- ★ Be prepared for fire should it strike. Have operating smoke detectors and fire extinguishers. Develop and practice a home fire escape plan. Teach children how to call for help. Have a water supply available to fight fire.

- ★ Choose and regularly inspect fire extinguishers that are the right size and type for the fires that might occur.

- ★ Consider installing a sprinkler system in all new construction.

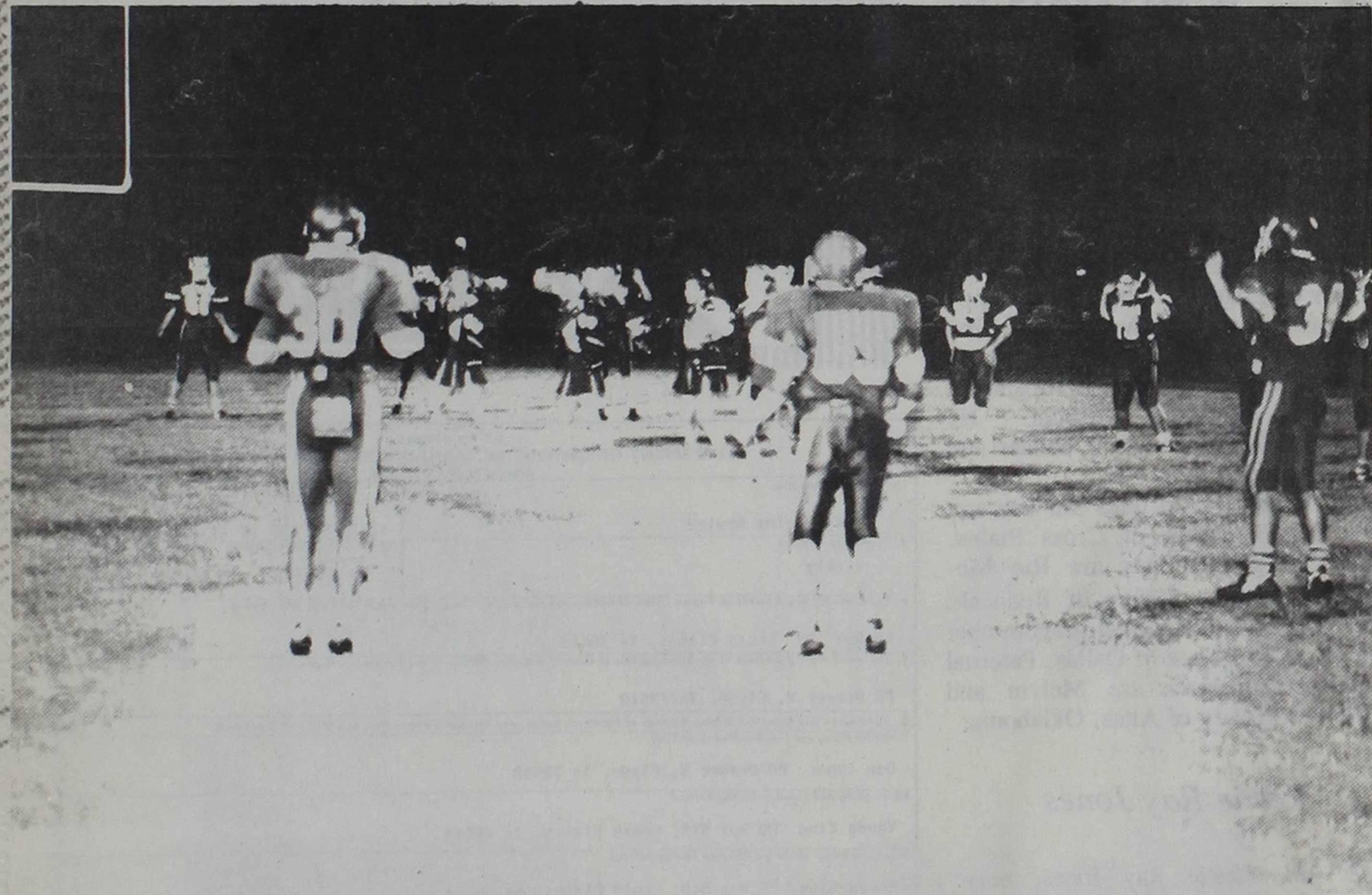

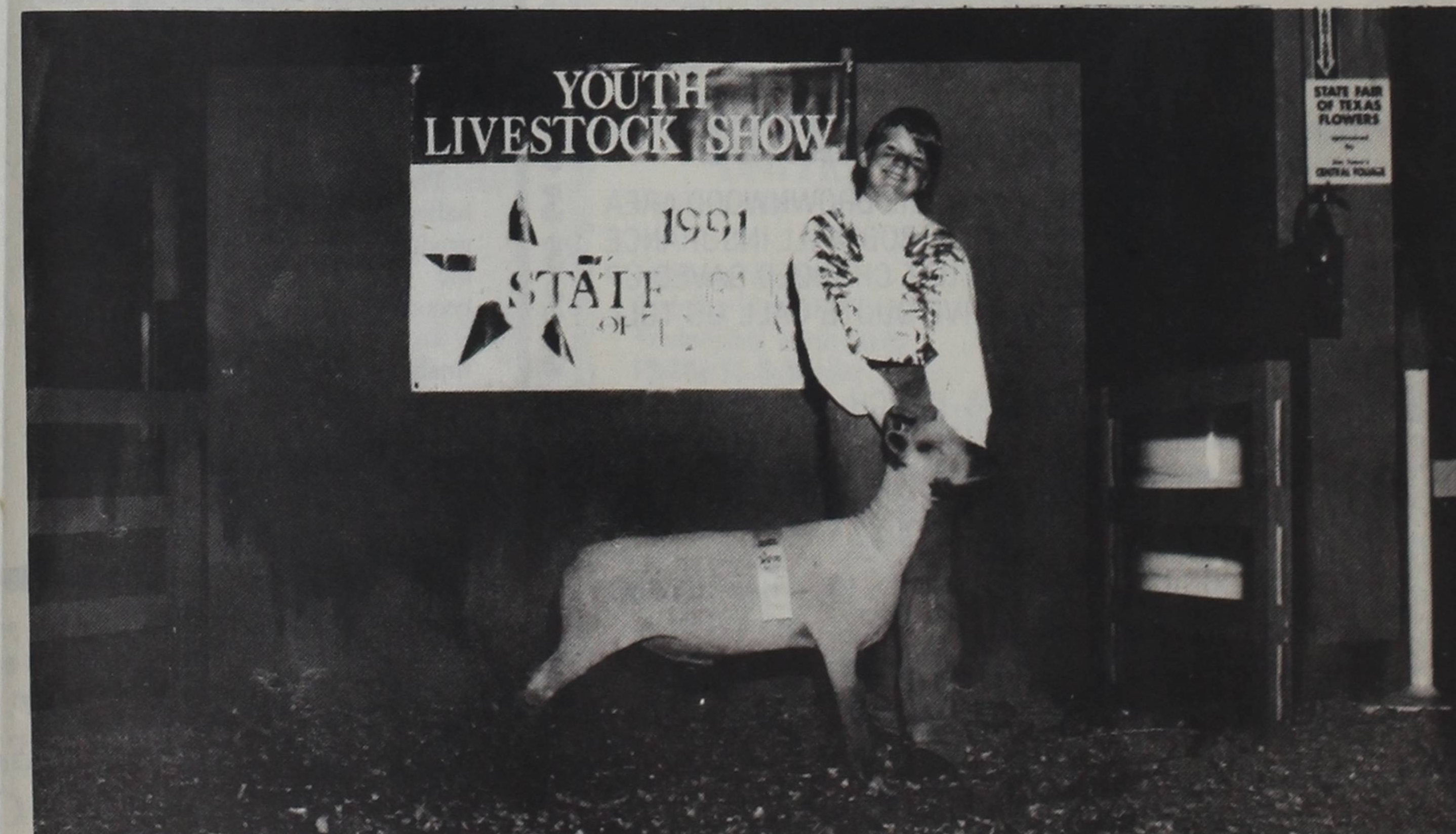

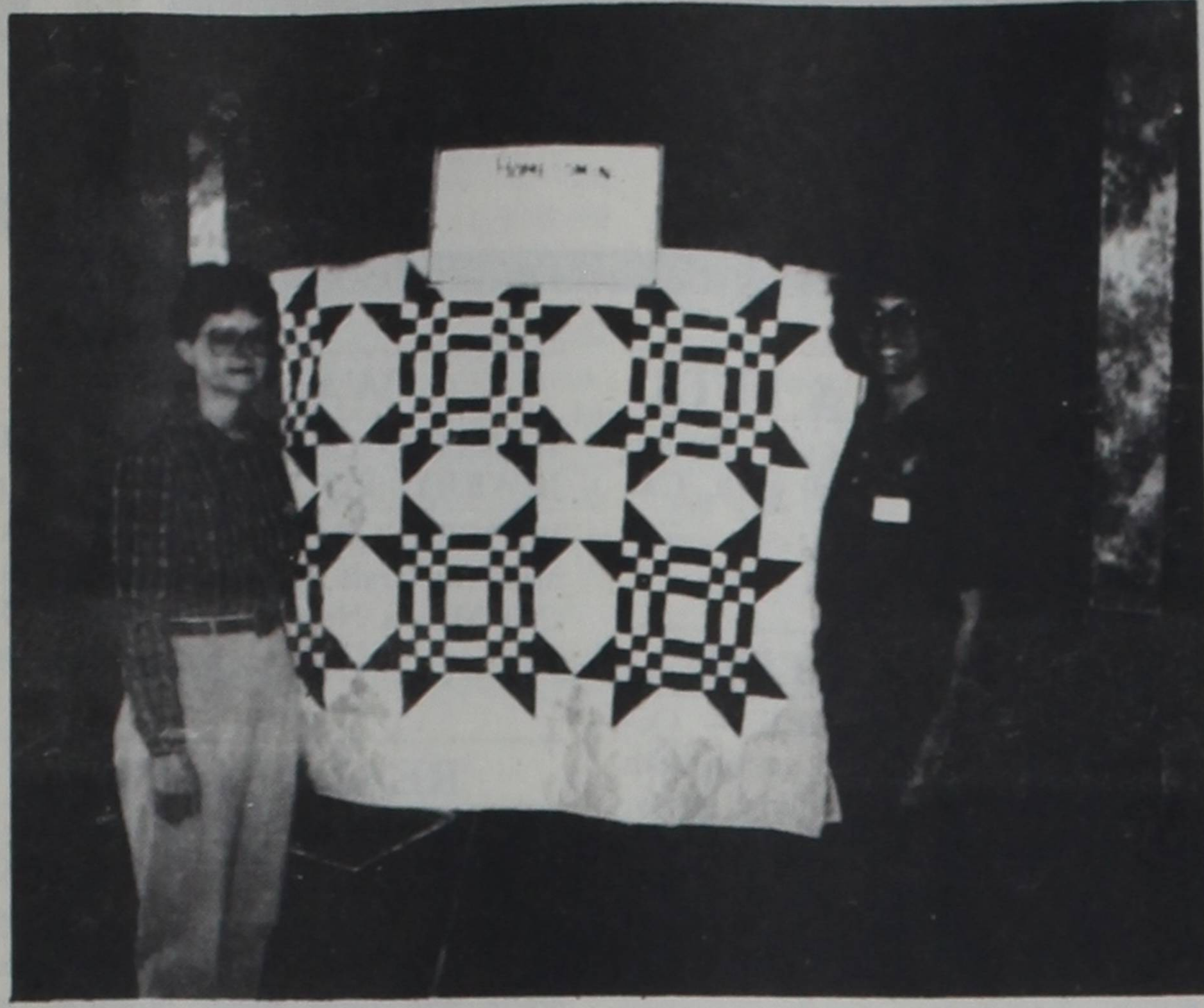

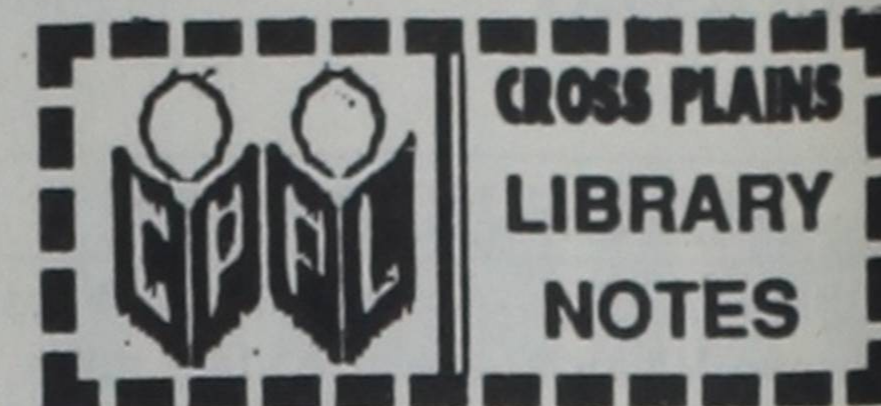
“Scholarship” Pennants For Homecoming
