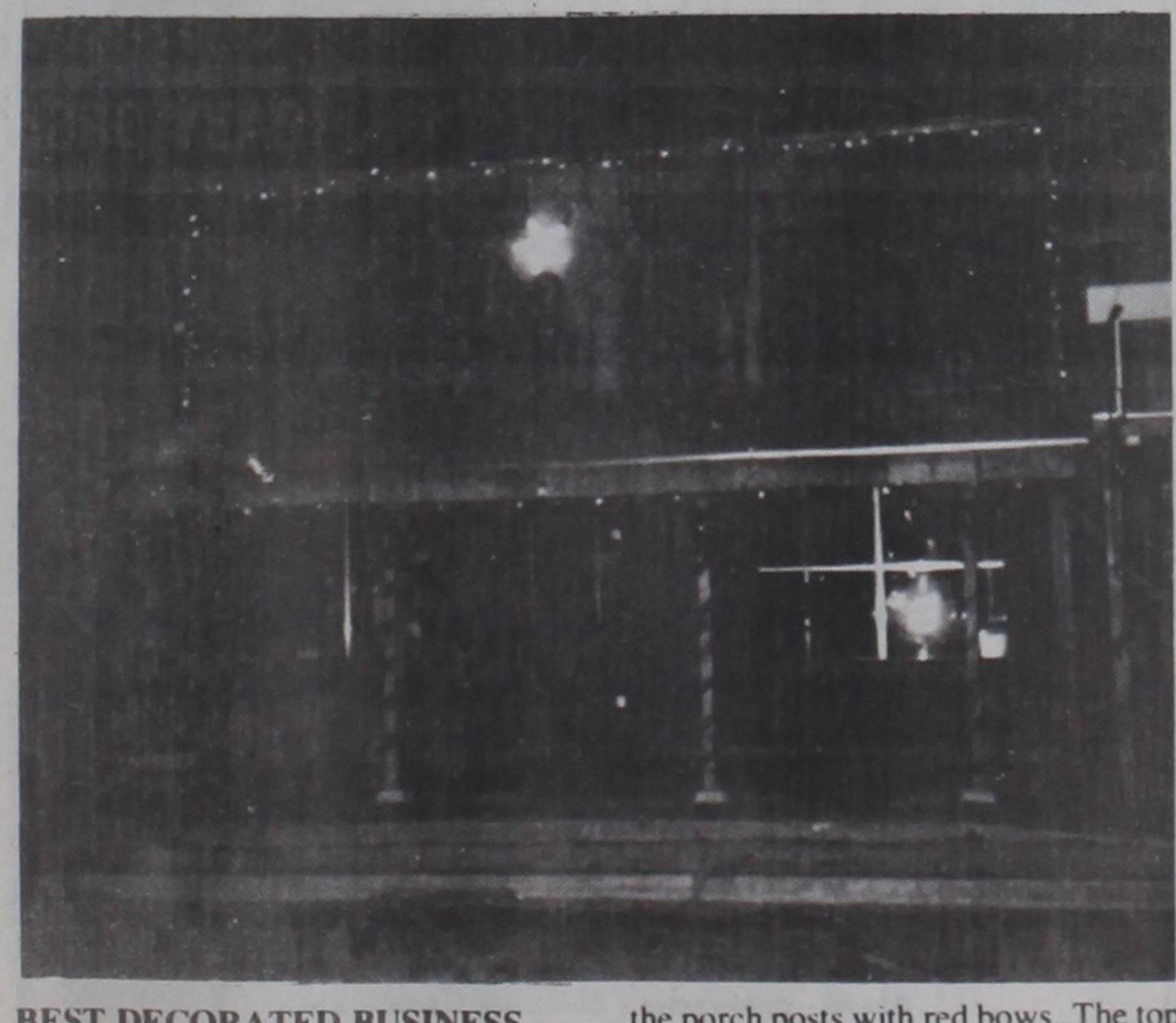

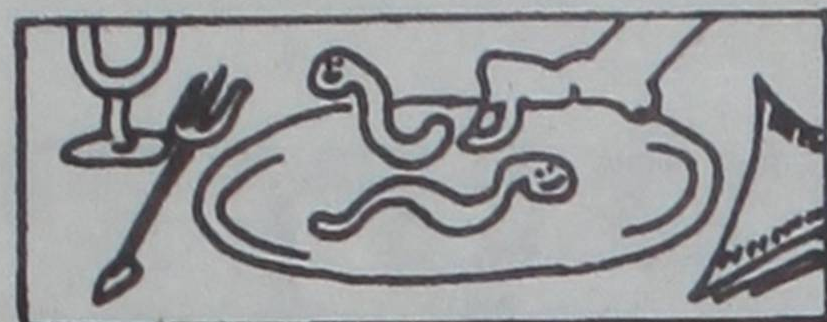

Cowan And Laverne Hutton To Celebrate 50th Wedding Anniversary

The family of Cowan and Laverne Hutton invite all friends and relatives to a 50th wedding reception in their honor at the Church of Christ Activity Center next Sunday, December 15, from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m.

Cowan was born to J.P. and Iona Hutton June 24, 1921 near Blanket, Texas. He is the middle child of seven children.

Laverne was born to Delma and Ella Dean July 25, 1924 near Ballinger, Texas. She is the eldest of three children.

The first time Laverne saw Cowan was at a Sunday afternoon singing. He

was singing in a family quartet.

They didn't really meet until later at school at Maverick, Texas in 1938 when Laverne transferred from Ballinger school to Maverick.

Cowan told schoolmates he was going to date Laverne and he was going to marry her, too.

Cowan was the first boy Laverne ever dated (but not the only one). He stood her up on their first date. His daddy had him unloading cotton seed until it was too late. Most rural people didn't have telephones then, so it was the following morning before Laverne knew what had happened.

Cowan and his family moved to Lubbock County in 1939, and Laverne and her family moved to Eastland County. They saw each other very seldom, but they did a lot of letter writing. They set the date for their wedding in July 1941, but didn't tell any one until a few days before.

Neither were old enough, so Cowan's dad had to sign for both of them to get the marriage license in Lubbock County.

When Cowan arrived at Pioneer, they couldn't find a preacher, so they

were married by the Justice of the Peace in the Brownwood Courthouse December 23, 1941. Cowan said next time he went to get married he would bring the preacher with him.

They lived and farmed cotton in Lubbock County for twenty years, except about two years Cowan spent in the Medical Corp in the Army.

They moved to the Cross Plains area in 1961, where they have been farming and ranching.

The Huttons have four living children, Wanetta Parson, J.D., Danny, and Lynn Hutton. Noah, their eldest son, was killed in an airplane crash in 1991.

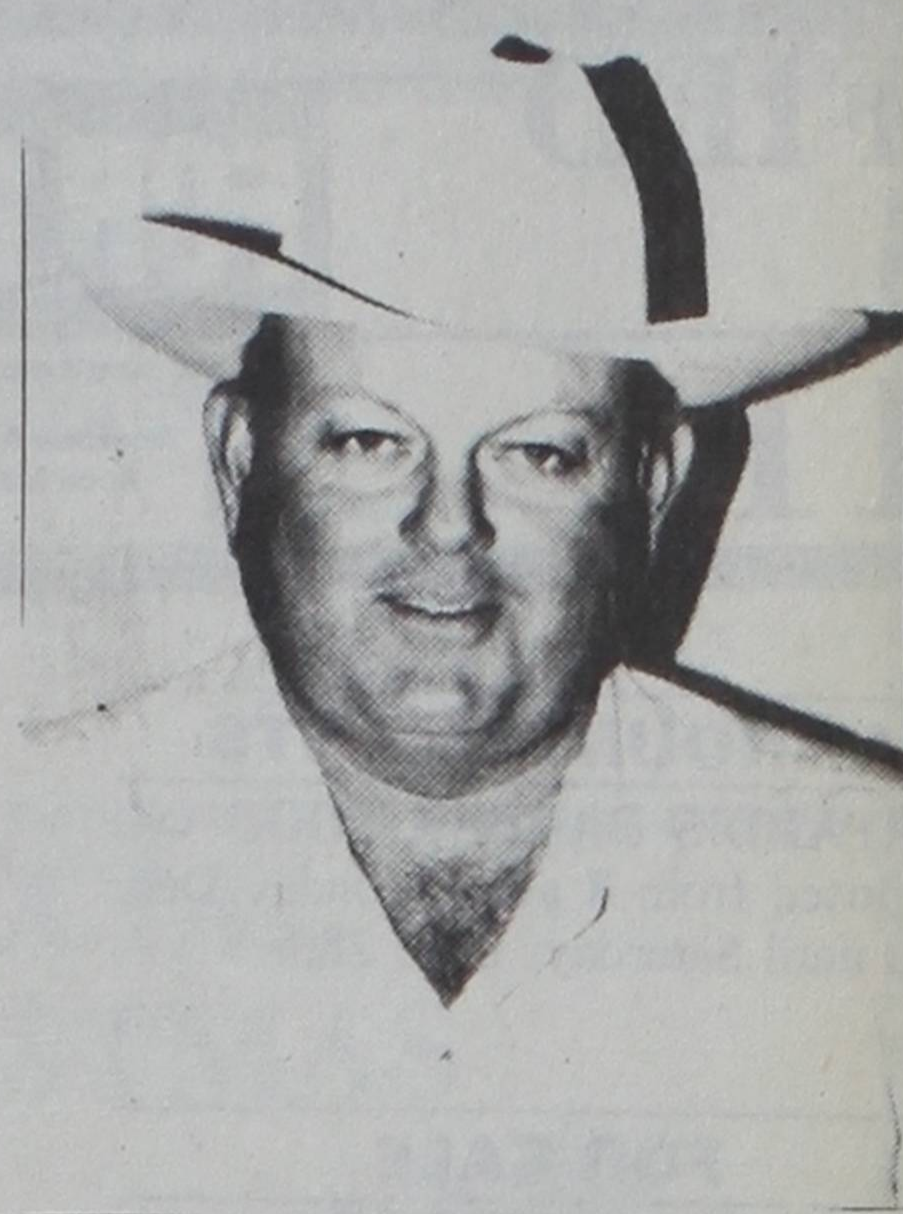

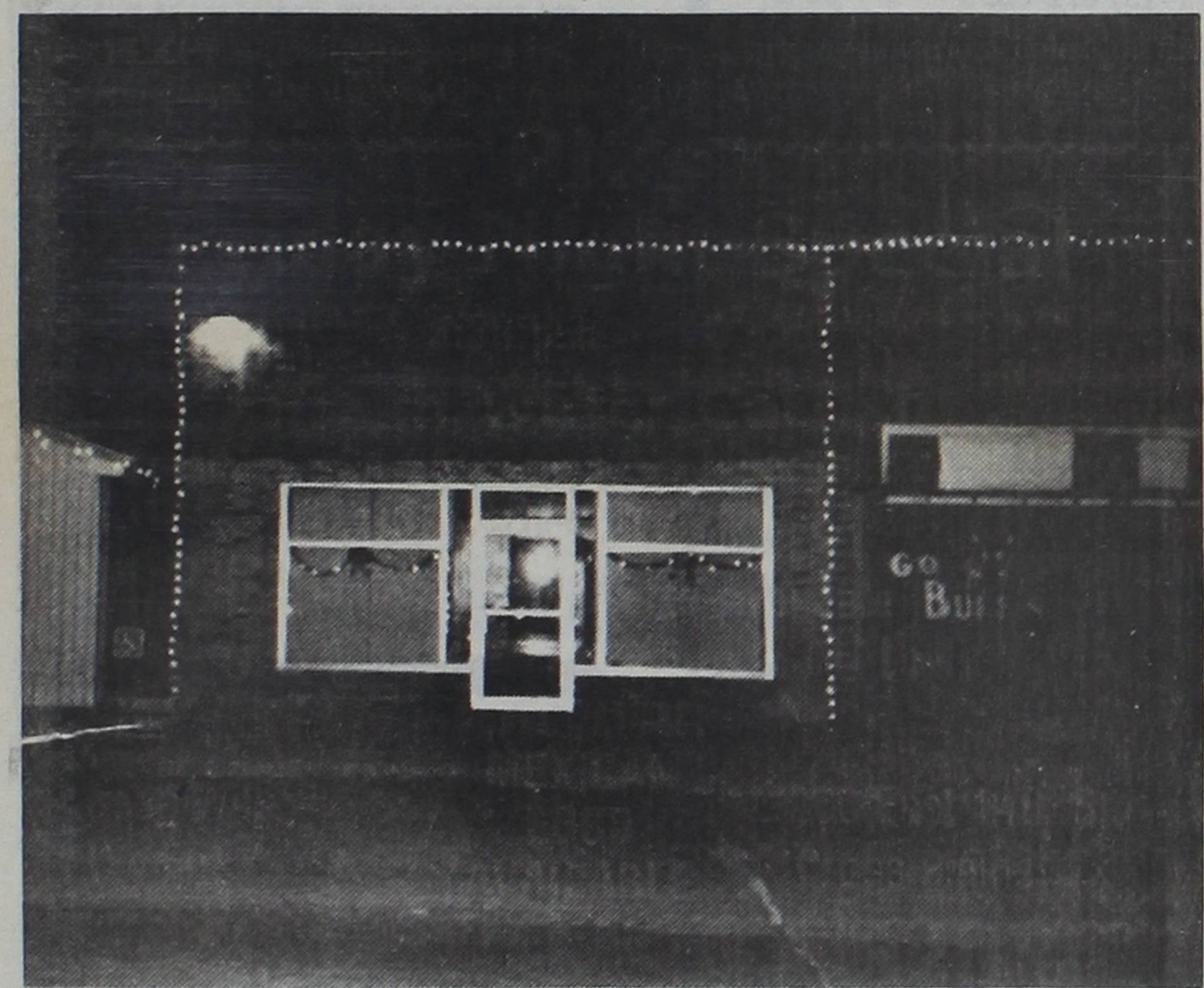

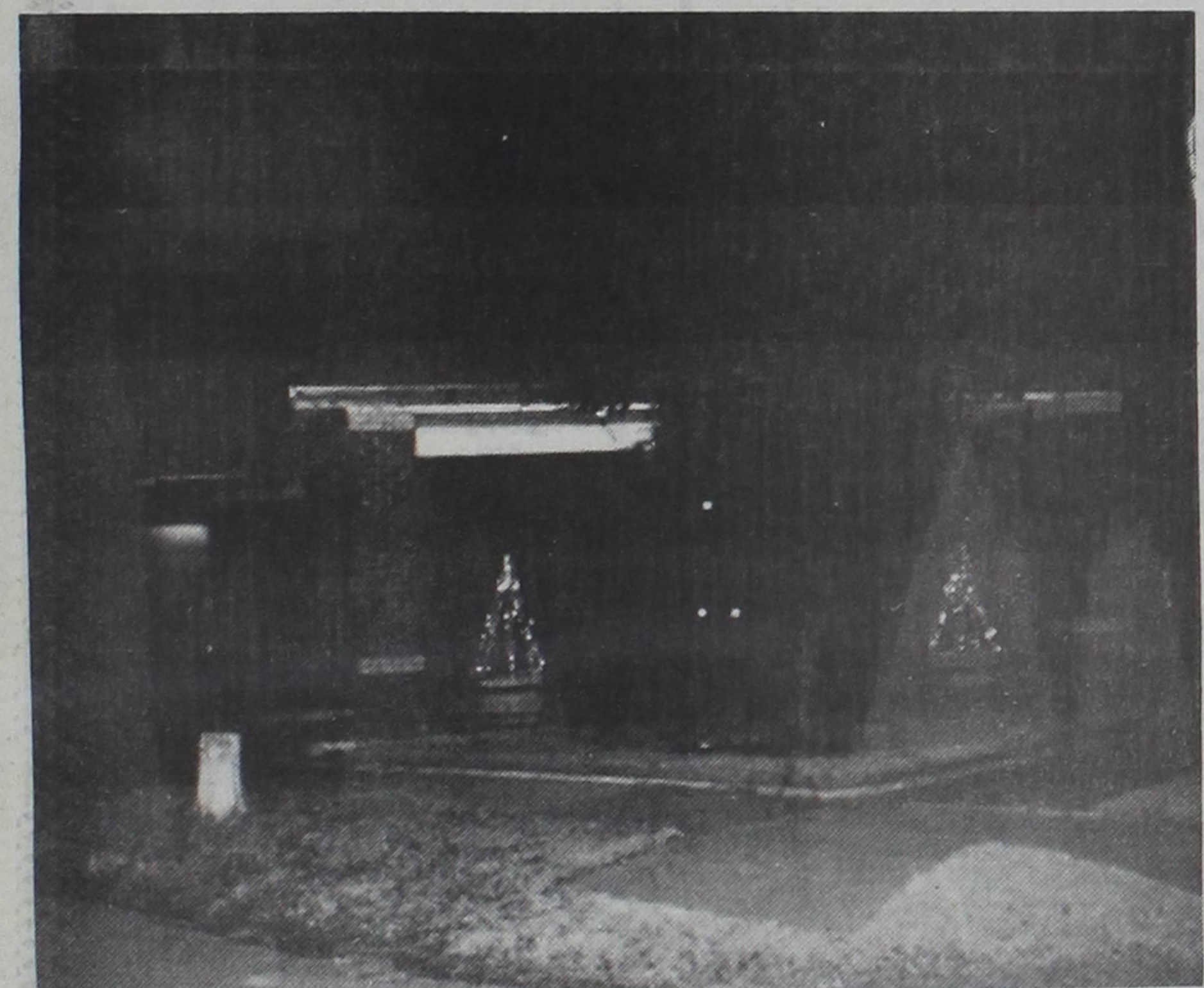
