School Memories

The funniest thing I can remember happening during my school years was when the Student Council decided to auction off its members and faculty sponsors as slaves to make money. The "slaves" were informed that they had to do whatever their owner requested the next day (within reason, of course!).

When the big day came, our principal, Mr. Freeman, was auctioned off to John Schaefer for an understandably high price. When lunch period arrived, John and his friends ceremoniously fetched Mr. Freeman from his office, and John told him to climb one of the trees on the front lawn that was clearly visible from Main Street and all passing motorists, and most of the high school campus.

Mind you, this was no easy feat considering the size of some of those trees and Mr. Freeman was in his customary suit and tie, also. Well, once he was in the tree John instructed him to bark like a squirrel. In a half-hearted attempt to get out of it, he told John that he didn't know what kind of noise a squirrel made.

A crowd was forming on the lawn by then. John went into conference with his cohorts and it was found that none of them had ever actually heard a squirrel bark either. After much loud discussion, it was agreed that howling at the top of your lungs like a banshee was the correct sound.

Then John proceeded to give an ear-splitting example or two. Our principal was left in the tree, making a feeble attempt to "bark like a squirrel" without drawing too much attention to himself, which was impossible because nearly the whole student body and some of the faculty had arrived by then.

I remember he was pretty good-natured about the whole thing, but I'll bet Mr. Freeman wished he was really a "free man" that day instead of a slave!

This same group of boys was big on pranks. During the first few warm months of school they took to initiating the Freshmen by playing "rodeo" with them. It was commonplace during lunch to see five or six Seniors garbed in hats, boots, and belts, with rope in hand chasing some poor unsuspecting Freshman down, roping him, setting him firmly on the ground, and finally tying him up as you would in calf roping. I'm just glad they didn't take to initiating the girls, because I was a Freshman that year.

Speaking of ropes, I recall a story from my sister's high school days of a young man being carted off from school and tied up and left in a bar ditch of a seldom used country road before class one day. When Scot Edington called his name during roll call, he was told by the culprits that the fellow was all tied up and just couldn't make it to class. I wonder if Scot ever knew the boy was indeed literally all tied up?

My husband remembers a year when Mrs. Browning's little volkswagon mysteriously disappeared during a football game one night. Seems when it was found it wasn't much use because she couldn't open the doors or even get in. It had been lifted up the steps of the high school and set completely inside one of the little alcoves to the front doors. I wonder how he remembers the details to that story so well?

I was in third grade when the elementary building burned. We lived just east of the school, and I can remember peering out my window at the bright light of the flames after my father left to go help fight the fire. Seems like every man in town pitched in to help that night. For the rest of

New Conditioning Facility Planned

Local volunteers have pledged support of a new conditioning facility for the community and the Cross Plains School's physical education athletic programs.

For several years the coaches and athletic directors have recognized the need for strength and agility in order for young people to compete in athletics with minimum injuries. Minimum facilities for necessary training and a positive fitness have been provided, but these facilities have not been expanded due to other priorities needing tax dollars first.

Because of continued uncertainty with state financing of public schools and reluctance to spend local tax dollars for such a facility, Coach Doug Dallas, the current Athletic Director, has requested a conditioning facility be constructed that could be used by the

public, utilized by the school, and financed by voluntary donations; not placing an additional tax burden on the community.

The Cross Plains I.S.D. School Trustees has approved the plans and location for the new facility. The structure, 30' X 75', will be built on the east end of the high school gymnasium, and will be utilized by boys and girls of all ages year round. Adults in the community will also be encouraged to use the facility after school and on weekends.

Coach Dallas and his assistants believe the value a conditioning facility, properly supervised and open year round, will not only promote beneficial physical fitness for the students, but also help build positive attitudes toward themselves and fellow classmates. The positive attitudes combined with better self-discipline will carry over into the school and community.

The cost of the facility will be financed by the voluntary donations and every contribution will go toward funding its construction beginning in mid-September.

Each business and individual donating funds will be recognized on the inside walls with their names professionally engraved as a permanent reminder to the youngsters that they live and are growing up in a community that cares for them.

Over 1,000 businesses, individuals in the community, and Cross Plains Public School alumni are expected to give toward this project.

New Law Changes Motor Vehicle Registration

In September, the simple matter of registering a motor vehicle in Texas will become a little more complicated.

The change is a result of insurance reform enacted by the 72nd Legislature.

Beginning September 1, the owner of a motor vehicle must submit current proof of financial responsibility with an application for initial registration, renewal of registration or transfer of registration. Also for the first time, Texans will have to show proof of insurance to receive or renew their driver's licenses and vehicle inspection stickers.

"Many states have found that tying these responsibilities to proof of insurance increases compliance with mandatory liability law," said Arnold Oliver, engineer-director of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. "But the Legislature was really responding to public pressure. Insured drivers — that's about 75 percent of us — wanted to tighten enforcement on the other 25 percent."

financial responsibility is a liability insurance card issued to the policyholder by the insurance company. Examples of other types of acceptable proof include insurance policies and binders, pool coverage documents, certificates of self-insurance, and certificates of bond.

The new law applies to registration handled in person or by mail. The original or a photocopy of the evidence will satisfy the requirement of proof of financial responsibility. All original documentation will be returned.

Questions about proper evidence of financial responsibility for vehicle registration may be directed to your automobile insurance company, your county tax assessor-collector, or to the local Division of Motor Vehicles regional office. For information about driver's licenses and vehicle inspection stickers, contact the Department of Public Safety.

Low Income Beneficiaries Get Help With Medicare

If you're on Medicare and don't have much income or resources, the Social Security Administration wants to make sure that you know about a program that can save you money. It's called the "Qualified Medicare Beneficiary" program, and it can help pay for your Medicare premiums, deductibles, and coinsurance.

Although a notice was sent to Medicare beneficiaries who are likely to be eligible for this program, recent studies show that a significant number of them have not yet applied and are not receiving the benefit.

If you have not applied for the benefit because you don't have enough information about it, let me explain how you qualify and how the program can benefit you.

First of all, you must be age 65 or older, or disabled, and your income and resources must be low enough for you to meet the State requirements for medical assistance or "Medicaid." It is your State Medicaid agency that is required to pay your out-of-pocket Medicare costs. That agency also must determine if you qualify for the benefit.

The rules may vary from State to State, but in general your total income for calendar year 1991 cannot be higher than the Federal poverty income level of \$6,620 for one person and \$8,880 for a married couple. In addition, you cannot have resources such as bank accounts or stocks and bonds worth more than \$4,000 for an individual or \$6,000 for a couple.

The \$29.90 monthly premium for Medicare medical insurance coverage is taken out of your Social Security check every month. If you qualify, this program will pay that premium for you, as well as some of the other Medicare charges you've been paying up till now.

World War II 'Flying Tigers' Eligible For VA Benefits

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has announced that the famed World War II Flying Tigers have been granted veteran status.

A recent Defense Department decision determined that honorably discharged members of the American Volunteer Group (AVG) (Flying Tigers) who served from December 7, 1941, to July 18, 1942, are potentially eligible for veterans benefits. Individuals must have an AVG discharge certificate or letter, or identification as an honorably discharged AVG member in other credible publications or documents.

In general, these newly designated veterans (or their survivors) can apply for the same benefits currently available to other veterans, including service-related disability compensation, pension, medical care, certain survivors' benefits, VA-guaranteed home loans, and burial benefits.

Eligibility for specific benefits will be determined on a case-by-case basis, depending on the specifics of service and eligibility criteria for each benefit.

Before applying for veterans benefits, individuals must first apply for an Armed Forces discharge certificate by filling out DD Form 2168,

which is available from the Waco Regional Office, telephone (800) 827-2012 or (817) 772-3060. The form is also available from the Department of the Air Force.

The completed form, together with any supporting documents, should be sent to: HQ AFMPC/DPMARS2, Randolph AFB, TX 78150-6001. Attn: TSGT Williamson. Additional information is available from Lt. Col. Robert Dunlap, Secretary of the Air Force Personnel Council (AFPC), Washington, DC 20330-1000, telephone (703) 692-4747.

The discharge certificate must be presented to VA when applying for benefits.

New Erosion Control Pond At Tally Windham Farm

The Tally Windham farm in Callahan County now features a new erosion control pond built in a public/private partnership between the landowner and the general public.

The pond was financed by the landowner and cost-shared through the Ag-

ricultural Conservation Program (ACP) administered by the Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The area where the pond is located was a serious erosion problem that was destroying the land and polluting local streams with sediment. Through the cost-share program of the ACP, the pond now prevents erosion, provides water for livestock and wildlife, and has other recreational benefits.

In addition to the pond, Mr. Windham has also carried out brush control of mesquites by treegrubbing and the establishment of permanent vegetative cover on this farm. Other similar services offered under the ACP include terraces, diversions, waterways, shaping and filling of gullies and other needed conservation practices.

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



VA Reduces Maximum Interest Rates On Home Loans

In response to changes in current market conditions, the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) reduced its maximum loan interest rate for home loan guaranties from 9.5 percent to 9 percent, effective August 12, 1991.

This change, the third this year, marks a turnaround in the credit market conditions which caused VA to raise the rate from 9 to 9.5 percent as recently as June 17.

Reducing the rate means the monthly payment on the typical VA loan of \$80,000 would be \$28.99 smaller, from \$672.69 to \$643.70. This represents potential savings to the borrower of more than \$10,000 over the life of a 30-year loan.

Also effective August 12, VA will decrease by one-half percentage point the maximum rates for Graduated Payment Mortgages to 9.25 percent, home improvement loans to 10.5 percent, manufactured home loans to 11.5 percent, manufactured home lot-only loans to 11 percent, and manufactured home and lot loans to 11 percent.

In the fiscal year that ended September 30, 1990, VA guaranteed more than 196,500 home loans totaling \$15.8 billion.

VA home loans may be used by qualified veterans, service members, and surviving spouses to purchase, improve, or refinance a house or condominium, and to purchase or refinance a manufactured home.


