Bravelet making was demonstrated by Miss Wieland and Louise Smith. Dorris McClain was in charge of recreation.

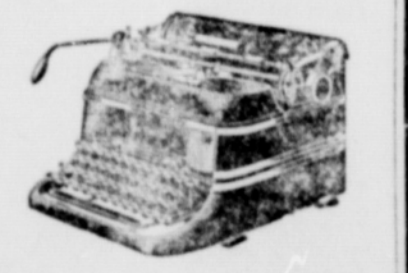

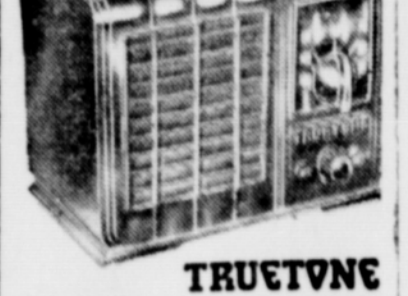

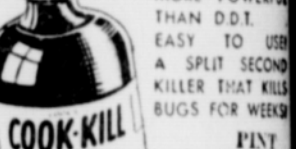

PEACHES COMING. A Texas crop that's expected to be of the best quality yet has started rolling into market from the West Cross Timbers area and the north-eastern part of the state. Most growers in both areas have carried out intensive spraying for free peaches. During the last half of July and well into August, the yellow freestone peaches, Hakehaven, Fairs Beauty, Tevberta and others, will be coming in. The Elbertas will start moving in early August. The big crop is coming from some 6 million trees, most of which are around Weatherford, Eastland and Comanche in the West Cross Timbers area. Approximately one million of the fruit trees, mostly Elbertas, are in the vicinity of Avery, Dekalb and Omaha, Texas. For the first time in several years, housewives will have a chance to combine this quality peach crop with unlimited supplies of sugar. The peaches will go by the way of truck to every town in Texas. SAME TIME, DIFFERENT CANNERS. The processing time tables for home canners recently released by the Texas A & M College Extension Service can be relied on for any make or model of canner. CANNERS on the market today differ in material, design and also size, but tests in nine canners showed that the rate of heating and cooling did not differ enough to make different processing times necessary. U. S. Department of Agriculture specialists made tests with green beans and mashed pumpkin with two canners of porcelain enamel one steel, one of pressed aluminum, and the others of cast aluminum. The canners varied in weight from 11 to 20 pounds and in volume from 17 to 31 quarts. Each canner had a capacity of at least one tier of seven quart jars. Housewives may feel safe in using the standard processing times in any type of canner. 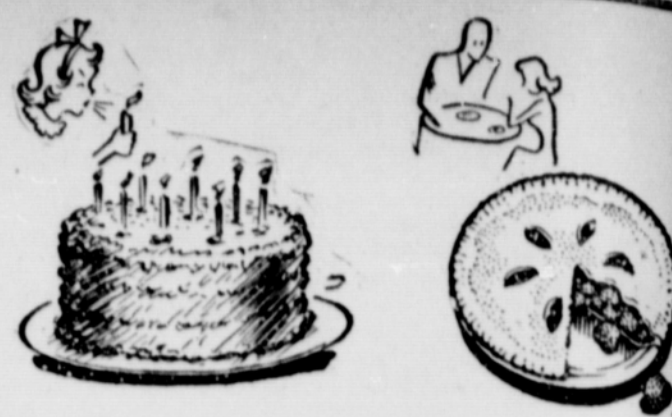
