Locally Known Ballerina, Lisa Dickson, Chosen 'Dancer For Peace'

Lisa Dickson was selected among a group of sixteen young ladies, out of some 100 who auditioned to travel to Moscow, U.S.S.R. June 13 through July 3. They will be studying ballet at the Free Ballet Company, the school for training dancers for the famous Bolshoi Ballet.

The YMTN Television Network in Shreveport, Louisiana, another sponsor of the trip, is going to film a documentary of this experience, which will be shown nationwide on The Learning Channel (TLC) on cable to over 20 million homes. Also on Louisiana Public Broadcasting and the Vision Interfaith Satellite Network, as well as on television networks in the Soviet Union. The delegation is called "DANCERS FOR PEACE" and will be a part of an exchange program in which dancers from the U.S.S.R. will come to the United States to study jazz and modern dance. There will be a joint performance' of Russian and American dancers at the Strand Theater in Shreveport on August 3. 1991.

In October of 1990, Lisa auditioned for the Louisiana Dance Foundation of

Shreveport, Louisiana before a panel of nine judges. Cameron Hernholm, age 14, was also selected from Pat George Mitchell's school and will be traveling with Lisa this summer.

Both girls started dancing at age 3 and they have learned discipline, responsibility, and dedication. With Lisa as the youngest of the elite group, she is an excellent example of the training.

Mitchell noted that she was a very adult 11-year-old and all the other students were between 13-18, the age specified. Lisa wanted to try out just to see what would happen, and was really surprised that she made it.

When Lisa was questioned if she was fearful of visiting the foreign country, she stated that she wasn't, but that the six hours of dance each day would take any fear away. She remarked that dance was a way of letting everything go.

This will provide an opportunity of a lifetime for American and Soviet students to work, train, live, and perform together in a pursuit of world peace.

Victor Khartchenko, chief choreographer of the Free Ballet Company, along with two Soviet companions, have already toured the Longview Ballet Theater which Lisa attends. Mitchell has had several students go on to prestigious ballet schools in New York as a reward for her strict dance requirements. Lisa currently practices at least two hours each day under the supervision of her instructor. She is in the sixth grade at Judson Middle School. She started dance with the Jamie D. Dancers in Ranger and the Bonnie Lasses of Cross Plains. In 1984 she attended Cross Plains Elementary, while her mother, Karen, taught in the high school. Karen is the daughter of Doris Ann McBride and the granddaughter of Lucile Callaway of Cross Plains. C.V. Dickson, Lisa's dad, is formerly from Cross Plains and the son of Esthloy Dickson.

County Jail Option Might Cost \$60,000

Callahan County Commissioners. during a regular commissioner's court meeting Monday, April 22, discussed

one possible solution to solving the problem of the county jail failing its inspection.

Commissioners met Monday with Bill Franz, a representative from a Fort Worth company that designs plans for county jails. Franz told the commissioners that the county might only need to spend \$60,000 to construct enough jail space for the county jail to receive a favorable inspection. The Callahan County Jail, located northeast of the county courthouse in Baird, is the oldest occupied jail in the state at over 100 years old. The jail failed inspection by the Texas Jail Standards Commission February 12.

According to the Jail Standards report, the county jail must provide adequate separation of the different classifications of inmates in the jail. For example, separate areas must be provided for male, female, juveniles, and inmates with contagious diseases. The county must provide for one more classification of prisoners to be in compliance, it is believed. Franz told commissioners that by spending \$60,000 on two modular jail units, pre-fabricated jail buildings, the county would be in compliance with the Jail Standards. One of the two units would provide two separate private cells for certain classification of prisoners. The second jail unit would provide an additional four cells. Franz said the project cost includes bathroom facilities, a recreation area, and construction of the two units. The cost would also include bricking the facility to match the current jail building. The additional units would be added to the north side of the current jail. The new facility would be built onto the current jail for entrance into either facility.

# **Peanut Communities Alerted To GATT Threat**

The GATT threat to peanut farmers and communities with peanut production is for real. That word of caution comes from Benny Hagan of Cisco. Texas, local director for the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association. When the U.S. made its original proposal to GATT in 1987 calling for elimination of all farm programs by the year 2000, most observers did not appear to take the proposal seriously. But the total commitment of the Bush Administration to secure an international trade agreement is now universally convincing and currently poses a direct threat to farm programs that depend on import protection under Section 22 of the Agricultural Adjustment Act. Peanuts is one such commodity. One of the principal goals of the U.S. proposal to GATT is the elimination of all trade barriers. The protection that Section 22 provides to the peanut, cotton, sugar, and dairy industries is considered by the Administration to be an import barrier.

If Section 22 is eliminated or substantially altered, both Mainland China and Argentina stand ready to supply this country's peanut needs. China demonstrated in 1980 that it can supply peanuts to the U.S. at prices representing roughly half of the U.S. quota support price. We could not expect to see the retail price of peanut products drop below present levels as a result of lower prices of farmers stock peanuts. At least that has not been true in similar experiences in the past. Therefore, there would be no price advantages to American consumers of peanut products - only a reduction in quality by substituting foreign produced peanuts in American made products.

Another phase of the U.S. proposal. to GATT calls for the elimination of

House and Senate to disallow fast track, but to be successful such a resolution must receive a majority vote in either the House or Senate by June 1, 1991. Otherwise the President will have continuing fast track authority.

Individuals in peanut producing communities have been URGED TO CONTACT their Congressman and Senators to communicate their feelings both on the upcoming vote on fast track as well as the danger of losing Section 22 protection for peanuts in any eventual GATT Agreement. Numerous meetings have been held throughout the Southwest to alert growers to the potential dangers inherent in the U.S. proposals to GATT. Although these meetings were well attended, there are many growers and local business people who did not attend a meeting. Growers and business people who were not present at one of the meetings and who have not contacted their Congressional delegation are urged to do so. For Congressional addresses or to receive help with your letters, you may contact the SWPGA director in your area or you may call the offices of the SWPGA, in Gorman, Texas, telephone (817) 734-2222, the Oklahoma Peanut Commission in Madill, Oklahoma, telephone (405) 795-3622, or the Texas Peanut Producers Board, telephone (817) 734-2853.

It should not be necessary at this point to emphasize the importance and urgency of following through with contacting U.S. Congressmen and Senators. The future of our peanut communities depend upon how Section 22 and the peanut program fare in international GATT negotiations and the degree to which key U.S. elected officials are successful in representing the peanut industry with members of the U.S. Trade Team and in decisions





In other words the quickest way to kill the peanut program and with it the rural communities which it supports would be to remove Section 22 for peanuts, or to reduce the quota support level. The U.S. proposal to GATT would do both!

To compound the problem peanut communities face, any international trade agreement that may occur could be approved by Congress by fast track legislation if free trade advocates have their way. President Bush has asked that Congress extend fast track authority which would otherwise have ended last March 1. Fast track means that the trade agreement, which may include the loss of Section 22 import protection for peanuts, could only be voted yes or no by Congress without any changes being made by the Congressional Committees and without floor amendments.



# Sharp Says Texas Tops In New Jobs County Oil And Gas

AUSTIN - "Nearly one out of every five new jobs created last year in the United States went to a Texan," State Comptroller John Sharp said today, releasing figures that showed Texas added more new jobs than any other state in 1990.

"While many states saw their workforces dwindle in the wake of the national recession, the Texas economy continued its moderate growth, gaining 168,700 new jobs between January 1990 and January 1991.

"Most of Texas' 2.5 percent increase in employment came in the service industry, followed by new hires in government to keep pace with growing school enrollment and reforms of Texas prisons and mental health and retardation facilities," Sharp said.

Data contained in the April edition of Fiscal Notes shows California came in second with 147,500 additional jobs and Ohio third with 77,100 jobs. Two of the nation's largest states, New York and New Jersey, lost employment in 1990. New York suffered the



steepest drop with a decrease of 121,500 jobs.

The Texas Employment Commission reports a total of 7.1 million nonfarm jobs in Texas as of March 1991.

"These latest statistics provide more evidence that the state's economic expansion remains on track, providing new jobs and more state revenues,' Sharp said.

# **Totals Published**

Oil and gas production figures for January 1991 in Callahan County have recently been released by the Railroad Commission of Texas, and natural gas and oil production are both up slightly.

Total gas production in Callahan County for the month of January was 323,489 MCF. One MCF is 1,000 cubic feet of natural gas.

Total crude oil production in Callahan County for the month of January 1991 was 87,670 barrels of oil.

Other oil production months include: January 1990 oil production at 84,735 barrels, February's oil total was 76,219, March oil production was 86,738, April 1990 oil total was 88,492 barrels, May 1990 was 85,972 barrels, June 1990 totaled 75,584, July 1990's total was 74,178, August 1990 was 81,779 barrels, September 1990 was 78,656 barrels and October 1990 production was 83,633 barrels, November oil production at 81,457 barrels, and December oil production at 75,730.

### **1991 Family Land** Heritage Program **Begins Registration** For Farms/Ranches

AUSTIN - Agricultural Commissioner Rick Perry announced today that registration for the 1991 Family Land Heritage Program will open May 6 and extend through August 16.

"TDA is looking for all the farms and ranches in Texas that have been active and productive for the same family for at least 100 years. We want to recognize the families who have provided us with farm and ranch products as a matter of long-term tradition," Perry said.

The Family Land Heritage Program was created by the Texas Department of Agriculture in 1974 to honor farms and ranches throughout Texas for maintaining continuous agricultural production for a century or more. Since the program's inception, more than 2,500 properties in Texas have been registered.

The program's basic requirements are: the land must have been agriculturally productive and owned by members of the family for 100 years or more; a minimum \$50 per year income for a farm or ranch of 10 acres or more or \$250 minimum income for those less than 10 acres; and immediate family members must actively manage and direct the everyday operation of the farm or ranch. If all of the land has ever been rented to someone outside the family it will not qualify. Applications must be certified by the Home for their loving care, and county judge of the county in which the land is located, and supporting documents must accompany the application when it is presented to the county judge for certification. The Texas Department of Agriculture is the final judge of eligibility. The honorees will receive a certificate in the name of the property at the annual ceremony held in Austin. Those who feel they meet the basic 5:30, Monday thru Friday, 725-6322. requirements and wish to apply may obtain an application from their county judge, county historical commission chairperson, the nearest TDA district office, or by writing to: Family Land Heritage Program, Texas Department of Agriculture, P.O. # **Rural Texans Know What's Best For Rural Texas**

At first glance, it sounds like a good idea.

The Journal received a news release a little while back from the U.S Dept. of Agriculture telling about the organizing of the Texas Federal Rural Development Council.

The release said the council's purpose "is to provide an institutional framework within which Federal government resources can be used, in combination with resources from state and local governments, private sector organizations, non-profit and charitable groups, to promote rural development in Texas.'

If you have the time to cut through all this bureaucratize, it sounds pretty good — a group to help develop rural Texas.

So, you then ask, who are the over 50 members of this council? Probably they picked leaders from rural areas 'all over Texas to fill the bill, right? Nope.

That would make too much sense, having people from rural areas brainstorming on how to better themselves.

The release included the names and positions of some 30 members of the council who attended a meeting last month in New Orleans. Most of them were from such "rural" areas as Dallas, Houston, Austin, and Fort Worth. Sounds like they picked real home folk, doesn't it?

Then you ought to see what these people do for a living. One woman town bankers, or doctors, or school officials, or farmers on the list.

I see the need for a few of these bureaucrats on the list, but the whole council doesn't need to be made up of them. How in the world are they going to know how rural Texas feels, or what it wants or anything else about it?

This whole thing smacks of the same problem that plagues most government programs. They feed on themselves, and cost the taxpayers a bundle in the process.

Here's what I mean. I spoke earlier of a council meeting in New Orleans, a great place to visit but a bit expensive. According to the news release, the meeting was paid for with a Federal grant.

# Webworms Plaguing Homeowners

Homeowners in Callahan County are being plagued with webworms or tent caterpillars in mulberry and pecan trees, according to Greg Gerngross, County Extension Agent.

The worms are defoliating the trees where they are present in large numbers. It's real important that the worms be controlled because continued defoliation can weaken the trees and could cause death of the trees.

Several chemicals including Malathion and Diazinon are recommended for control of these pests. Webs should be broken up as much as possible prior to spraying because the chemical must make contact with the insect before it can be effective.
