Primary Elections Tuesday, March 10

Voter turnout in Callahan County is expected to be heavy on Tuesday, March 10, in the Democratic and Republican Primary Elections.

The Democratic Primary will be held at the Cross Plains Community Center on Beech. The center will be open for the Democratic Convention at 7:15 p.m. Voters are encouraged to attend, as delegates will be selected to go to the County Convention at this time.

The Republican Primary will be held at Odom Motel on Highway 36. Polls for both elections will remain open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m.

The race for Callahan County Sheriff has four Democratic candidates seeking the office, including incumbent County Sheriff Bill Skinner of Baird. Skinner's opponents in the race for sheriff on the Democratic ballot include Eddie Glen Curtis of Baird, Don Griffith of Clyde and Don Childers of Cross Plains. Unless the winning candidate receives 51 percent of the total county votes, an election runoff between the top two voter getters will be held. The winner of the Democratic Primary Election for sheriff will face Republican Jerry Roden of Baird in the General Election slated for November.

The race for Callahan County Tax Assessor-Collector is also being contested. Incumbent Wauwata Estes of Clyde will face challengers Bun Barry of Baird and Nancy Turnbow of Baird for the Democratic nomination. Again, unless the winner obtains 51 percent of the total county votes, an election runoff will take place between the top two finishers. The winner will not face a Republican challenger.

Incumbent Callahan County Attorney Brad Harris of Clyde is being challenged by Allen Wright of Eula in the Democratic Party Primary Election. The winner of the primary election will win election to that post because there is no Republican challenger.

Clyde residents located in Commissioner Precinct #1 will decide the fate of three men for the office of County Commissioner. Incumbent Clyde Commissioner Roy Henry LaFoy, Jr. is facing challengers Eugene Kitchens and Harold Hicks. Precinct #1 includes the northern portion of Clyde and the northwest portion of Callahan County. Voting in Precinct #1 will take place at the Clyde Lions Club Building. Unless the winner takes 51 percent of the vote, there will be an election runoff between the top two candidates. There is no Republican challenger for Precinct #1 Commissioner.

Voters in voting Precinct #4 and #7 will find the County Constable, Precinct #4 also being contested between incumbent Ernest A. Cortez, who will face Paul Yarbrough. There is no Republican Party challenger.

Several interesting state and national races are also scheduled for the Democratic ballot.

The most talked about race is between incumbent state senators Bill Sims and Temple Dickson for the State Senator, District 25 seat. The newly redrawn district boundary for District 25 brings incumbents Dickson of Sweetwater and Sims of San Angelo into the same district. The winner will face a Republican challenger in the November General Election.

Eleven men are seeking the Democratic nomination for U.S. President. Those seek the party's nominee are: Tod Howard Hawks, Lyndon H. LaRouche, Jr., Edmund G. Brown, Jr., Rufus Higginbotham, Tom Harkin, Bill Clinton, Charles Woods, George W. Bennis, J. Louis McAlpine, Bob Kerrey and Paul E. Tsongas.

On the Democratic Primary Election ballot there are other contested races for: Railroad Commissioner, Supreme Court Justice, Place 3; Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1; and Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2.

The Republican Party Primary Election ballot includes contested races for: U.S. President; Railroad Commissioner; Justice, Supreme Court, Place 1; Justice, Supreme Court, Place 3; Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1; Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 3; and State Senator, District 25.

The Republican Party Primary Election candidates for U.S. President are: George A. Zimmermann, Patrick J. Buchanan, Tennie Rogers, George Bush, David Duke and Uncommitted.

A proposition that an amendment to the Texas Constitution be submitted to the voters of Texas for approval to limit the number of terms state and federal public office holders can serve will also appear on the Republican ballot with voter being asked to vote for or against the proposition.

There are several Democratic nominees for public office that do not have a Democratic Party challenger, but however do have a Republican Party opponent. Democrat Charles W. Stenholm will face Republican challenger Jeannie Sadowksi for the U.S. Representative in District 17 in the November General Election. Republican Kent Sutton and Democrat John Weeks will face each other in November for the 42nd Judicial District Judge seat. Incumbent Democrat John Cook will face challenger Pete Lynch in the November General Election for State Representative, District 60.

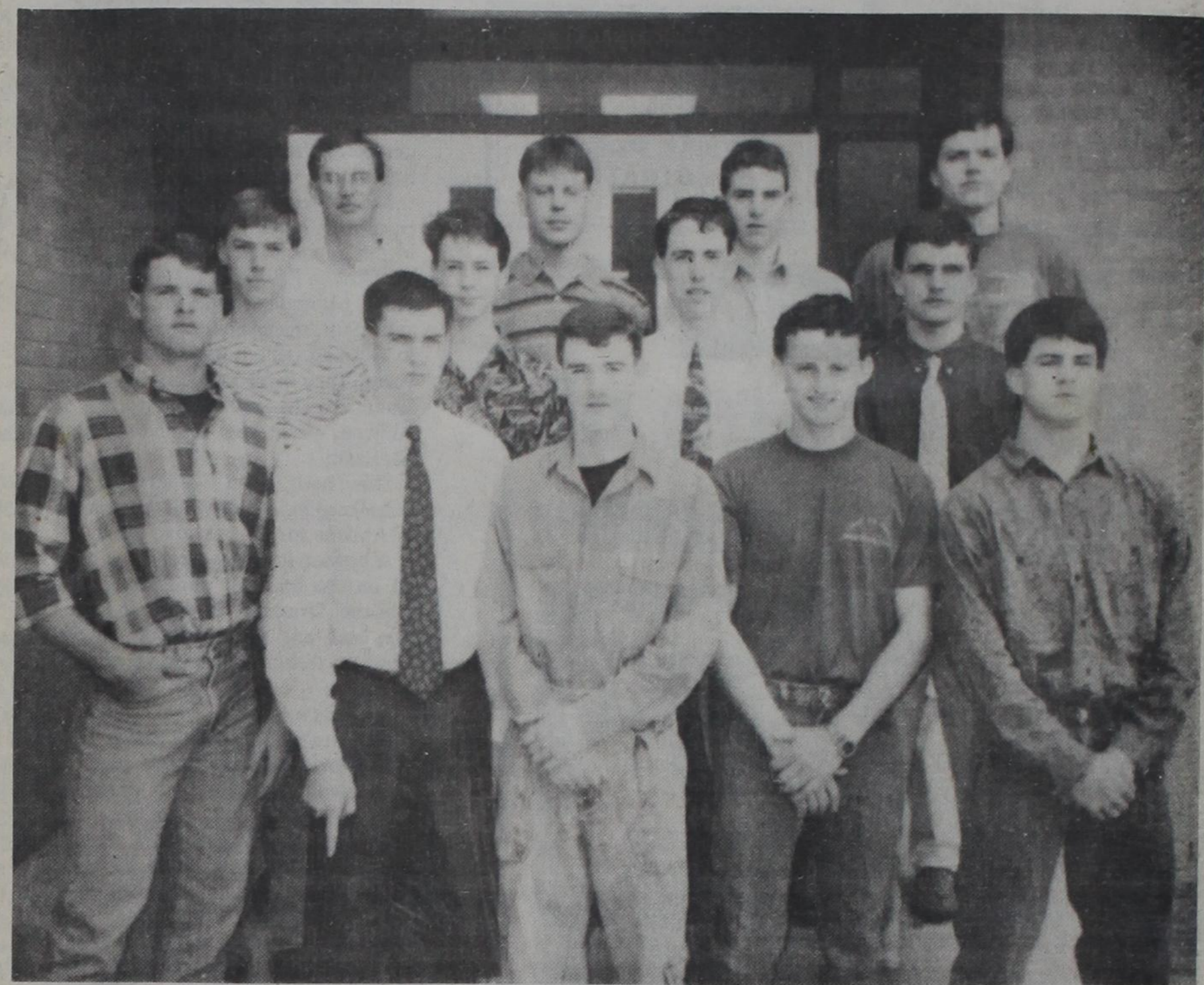
To vote in the primary elections, a county resident must have their voter registration card. Their voter registration card, which is blue and white in color, has the voter precinct number located on it. That voter precinct number determines which precinct you will vote in. Voters cannot cast ballots in both the Democratic and Republican Primary Elections, you must vote in one or the other.

Last Saturday night in Coleman the Cross Plains Buffaloes defeated the Panther Creek Panthers 66-56 to claim the Bi-District crown. This was the first time since 1986 the boys were in the play-offs, but they played like veterans.

The Buffs took a 20-13 lead at the end of the first stanza. During this quarter all five starting Buffaloes were in the scoring column. Colby Walker established his inside dominance with seven points, Jody Brown helped stretch the defense out by hitting two threes, Jason Rutledge had one three, and Matt Sowell and Justin Whitsitt each had a bucket.

The second quarter saw three starters on the bench in foul trouble. Sowell, Walker, and Brown all sat down the majority of the second quarter. The good news is that Jason Fleming, Michael Cowan, and Brandon Smith stepped up and did a super job. Coming off of the bench is a tough job, but these guys have done a super job all year!

Perhaps the biggest story of the first half was Panther Creek Senior Curtis Garrett who scored all of the team's

points in the first quarter and eight more in the second. Thanks to his great offensive first half, the Buffs held only a 37-32 lead.

The third quarter saw the boys lengthen their lead by three points. Excellent team play and unselfish basketball helped the Buffaloes take high percentage shots. Meanwhile, Garrett had seven of his team's eleven points in the third. Buffs lead 51-43.

The fourth quarter was perhaps senior Justin Whitsitt's finest hour as a Buffalo. With the Panthers sagging back on Sowell and Walker, Whitsitt hit three jumpers to lift him to a career high seventeen points. Garrett was held to only two points in the fourth quarter. Colby Walker was assigned to him and did an excellent job. When the final buzzer sounded, the Buffs had a hard fought 66-56 victory.

OPPORTUNITY KNOCKS AGAIN FOR MEDICARE ENROLLMENT

Anyone who didn't sign up for Part B Medicare medical insurance during the initial enrollment period — or anyone who dropped Part B coverage — now has the opportunity to enroll during the annual general enrollment period that runs from January 1 through March 31, according to Glyn Hammons, District Manager in Abilene. Part B medical insurance helps pay for doctor bills, outpatient hospital services, durable medical equipment, and certain other medical items and services not covered by Medicare's Part A hospital insurance.

"Medical insurance protection will begin on July 1 for new enrollees," Hammons said, "regardless of whether they sign up in January, February or March. The basic monthly premium this year is \$31.80. And there is a 10-percent increase in the premium for every year a person could

have been enrolled in Part B, but wasn't."

Anyone who waits past March 31 to make a decision will also have to wait until next year to sign up.

If you have questions about the open enrollment period for Part B medical insurance, you can call Social Security's toll-free number 1-800-888-1770. If you want to sign up for the coverage, contact the Social Security office. The phone number is 698-1360.

It's important to know that there is also a Qualified Medicare Beneficiary program that helps low-income Medicare beneficiaries by paying their Medicare premiums, deductibles and coinsurance. If you think you might be eligible for this program, contact the people at Texas Department of Human Services for more information.

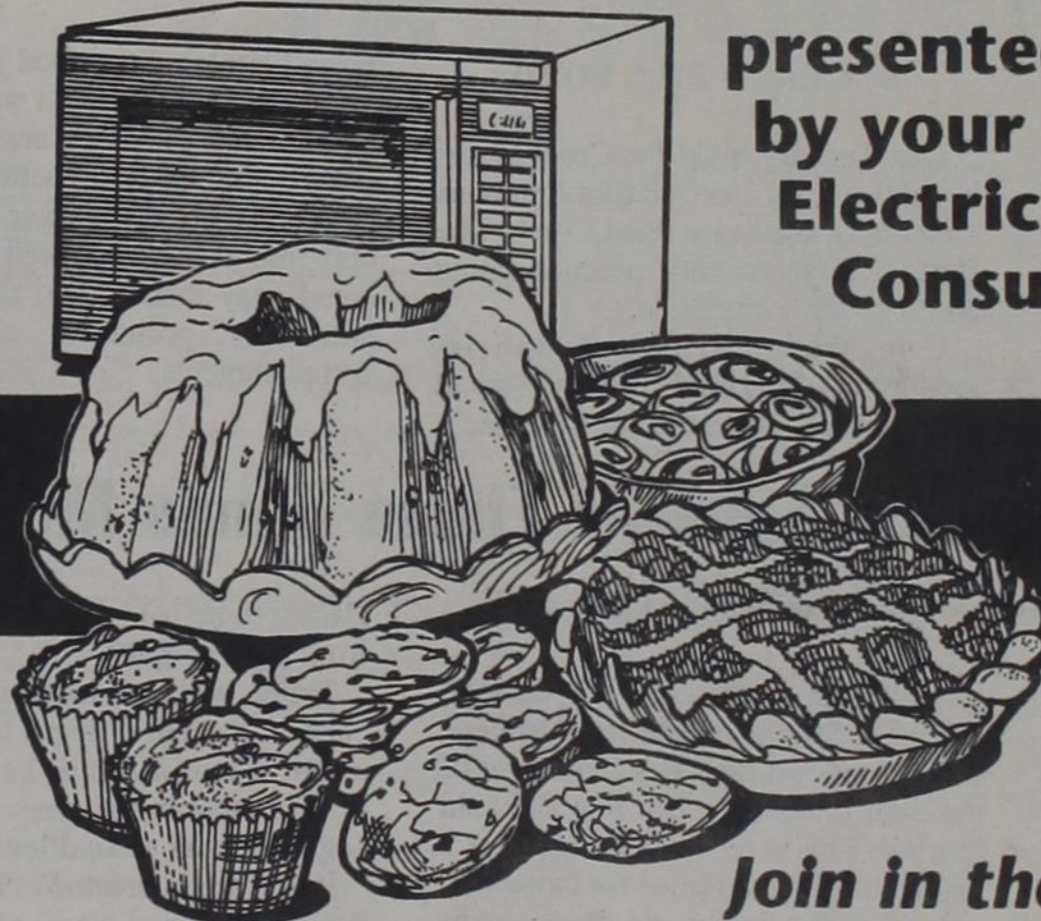

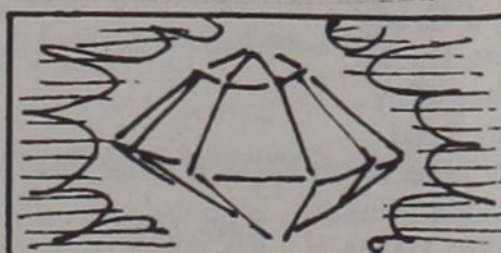

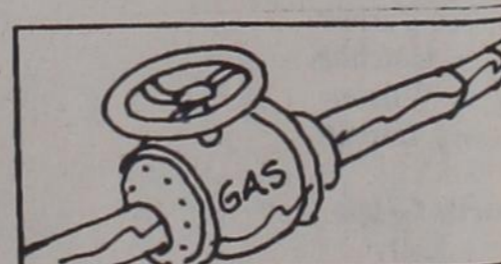

or over-the-counter medicines as a quick fix for pain or stress. Your example can counter or reinforce the media message that any problem can be cured by chemicals.

- Be aware of how personal use of alcohol can influence your teen. Avoid using excuses for drinking, like having a rough day.
- Talk honestly about personal stress or conflict. Children need to know that such struggles are a normal part of life. They have a good model when they see parents coping with problems without relying on alcohol or other drugs.
- Celebrate National PTA Alcohol and Other Drug Awareness Week by talking to your child about alcohol and drug use and its impact on his environments.

Texas PTA is the largest youth advocacy organization in the state with more than 850,000 members. Affiliated with the National PTA of more than 7 million members, Texas PTA works to better the environments of home, school, community, and place of worship for all children and youth.

Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, reported that only one-third of the Texas secondary students remained drug-free during the 1990 school year; the remaining two-thirds used either alcohol, tobacco, inhalants, and/or an illicit drug.

To help Texas youths abstain from the use of alcohol and other drugs, parents need to be positive role models. Teens often will tune out lectures, but they watch their parents' every action. Following are suggestions when for parents to help combat their children's use of alcohol and other drugs:

- Show the value of freedom to think and act independently, that one doesn't have to do something because "everyone is doing it." This helps teens see that negative peer pressure can be rejected.

- Demonstrate a sense of self-respect and self-esteem. For example: taking care of your health through exercise and diet offers a strong model for your child.

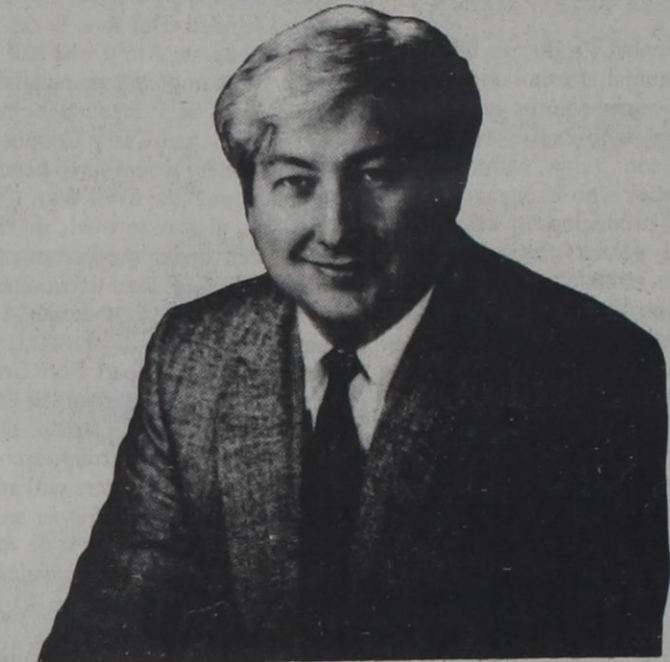

Referendum And Election Of T.P.P.B. Approaching

Texas Peanut Producers Board

The Texas Peanut Producers Board will hold its biennial election on April 30, 1992. The current terms of three board members will expire at that time. Any person living within the following counties who is engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced, peanuts for commercial purposes, is eligible to vote in his district, including owners of farms and their tenants and share croppers, if such person is subject to paying the assessment that is collected on peanuts within the following counties:

DISTRICT II: Includes the northern counties of the State. The westernmost boundary of this district includes the following counties: Loving, Wheeler, Ector, Midland, Glasscock, Sterling, Coke, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan, Eastland, Palo Pinto, Parker, Wise, Denton, Grayson, Fannin and Lamar. Peanut producers north of this line are in District 2.

DISTRICT III: The westernmost boundary of this district includes the following counties: Red River, Delta, Hunt, Collin, Dallas, Tarrant, Hood, Erath, Bosque, McLennan, Bell, Milam, Lee, Bastrop, Fayette, Colorado, Wharton and Matagorda. Producers east of this line are in District No. 3.

DISTRICT IV: The northernmost counties of this district include the following counties: Maverick, Zavala, Medina, Bexar, Guadalupe, Gonzales, Lavaca and Jackson. Producers south of this line are in District No. 4.

Any person qualifying to vote in the election may place his name in nomination for membership on the Texas Peanut Producers Board for a six year term from that district by application to the above organization, signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the election. Such application must be received by the Texas Peanut Producers Board at least 30 days prior to the election date, in order to have his name placed on the ballot.

The election will be held by mail ballot. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at P.O. Box 398, Gorman, Texas 76454 by or before midnight on date of the election. (April 30, 1992)

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot 15 days prior to the election, may obtain one at County Agent offices in peanut producing counties within the state.

1870's Historic Re-Ride Cross-Country Trail Ride At Fort Griffin

On September 25, 1871, Captain Wirt Davis, commander of Company F, 4th U.S. Cavalry, departed Fort Griffin with over 120 mounted troopers to bivouac at Old Camp Cooper, a historic pre-civil war military post. It was there he was to meet Col. Randal S. MacKenzie, commander of the 4th Cavalry Regiment who with another 480 troopers and 100 pack mules from Fort Richardson near Jacksboro, were to begin the first campaign of the famous Red River Indian Wars of 1871-75.

On April 4, 1992, F Company, 4th U.S. Cavalry Regiment (Memorial) re-enactment unit will host a public trail ride from Fort Griffin State Park (15 miles north of Albany in Shackelford County) to Old Camp Cooper, 10 miles by trail to the northwest.

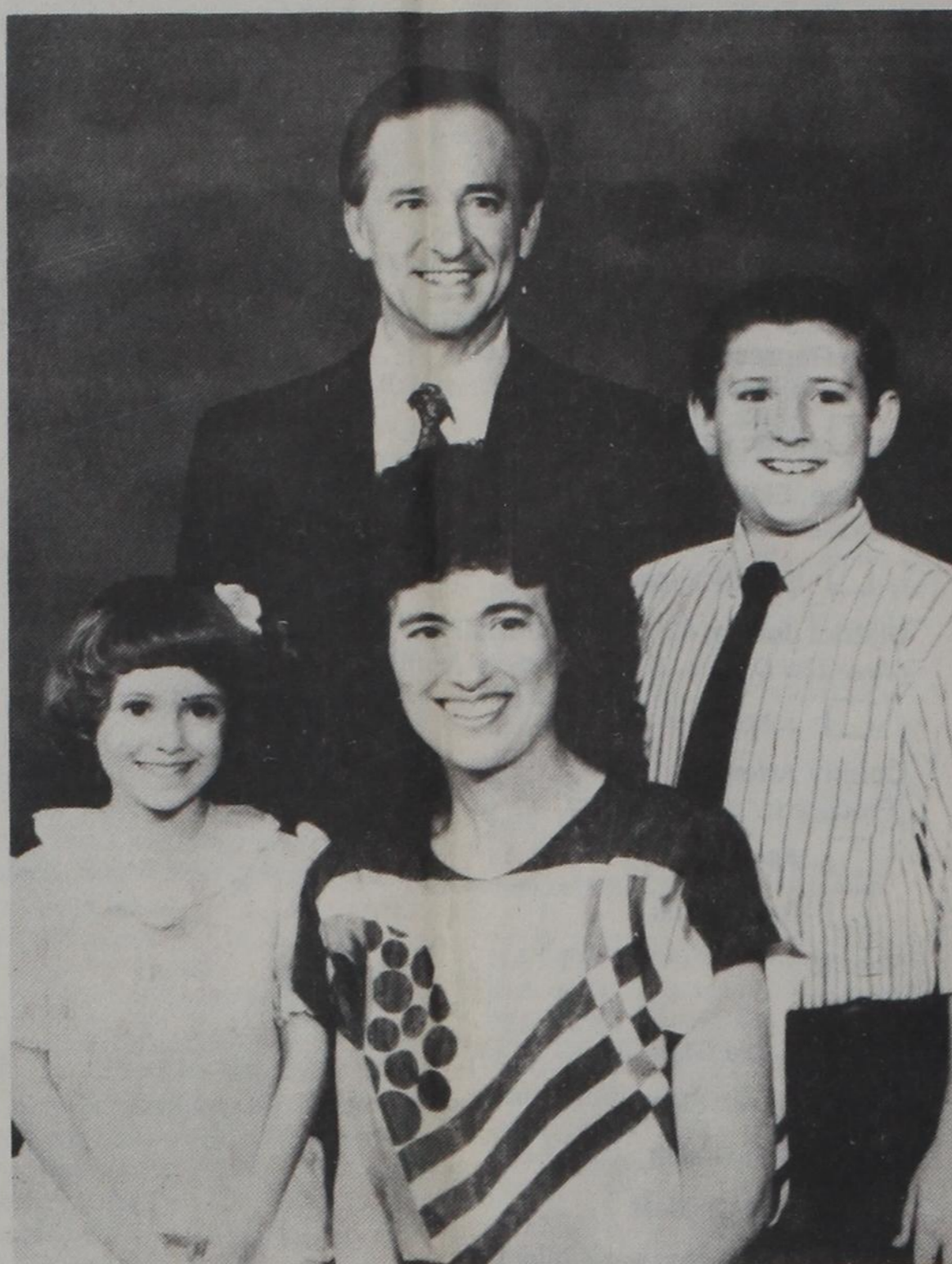
Historical Note: Camp Cooper was wisely evacuated by the U.S. Army in 1861 and handed over to a Texas unit of the Confederate Army who had surrounded the camp and demanded its surrender. Had the commander chosen to combat the issue, Camp Cooper and not Fort Sumter, would have been the battle that started the Civil War. Camp Cooper was also renowned, in 1857, to have been under the command of Co. Robert E. Lee, later to become the commander of the Confederate Army of the Potomac.

The re-ride will depart Fort Griffin H.Q. at 10 a.m. on Saturday the 4th of April on the trail that Captain Davis followed in 1871. The group, escorted by the 4th Cavalry troopers will arrive at the site of Old Camp Cooper and be treated to an 1870s army style meal. Following lunch and some cavalry activity, the group will return to Fort Griffin by another route.

The ride will be totally on private ranchlands, predominantly that of Watt Mathews and the famous Lambhead ranch. Old Camp Cooper would not be accessible to the public other than on a ride such as this one.

Pre-registration is necessary. Admission to the ride will be \$15 per adult and \$8 for children up to age 13. Each rider will be given a specially made bandana commemorating their participation on this historic trail.

Veterans Land Board Lowers Interest Rate For Texas Vets Home Loans

AUSTIN — Land Commissioner Garry Mauro said today he expects the Veterans Land Board (VLB) to reduce the interest rate on a veterans home loan to "7.50 percent or lower" and he urged Texas veterans to go ahead and apply for loans based on that eventuality.

The exact rate will be determined at the next Veterans Land Board meeting on March 9. The rate has been 8.5 percent.

"The new rate could be as low as 7.25 percent," said Mauro, who serves as VLB chairman. "We'll begin processing applications immediately and then apply the new rate to those loans once the new rate has been set by the board."

Mauro urged any Texas veteran thinking about a home loan to call the VLB at 1-800-252-VETS and take advantage of the reduced rate.

"Lowering the interest rate to the 7.25-7.5 percent range allows our veterans loan program to compete with anyone on home mortgage money," Mauro said. "It places us below the VA, below FHA, and below conventional rates."

The board is also expected to lower the interest rate on a Texas Veterans

Home Improvement Program loan from the current 10.5 percent rate to between 9 and 9.25 percent.

Mauro anticipates the board will give final approval to the reduced rates after the board studies bond counsel recommendations regarding tax-exempt bonds which fund the loans.

"These changes mean substantial savings for Texas veterans," Mauro said. "Lowering our rates ensures that our program remains far and away the best deal in Texas for veterans searching for affordable housing or wanting to improve the value of a home."

Mauro said calls to the Veterans Land Board have increased 47 percent since the maximum amount of a home loan was raised to \$45,000 last September.

"Last year we answered more than 122,000 calls on our toll-free line — an average of 500 calls per work day," Mauro said. "Now that the word is out that we're making \$45,000 direct loans our calls have shown a 47 percent jump over the same quarter last year."

He said he expects even more inquiries after the VLB lowers the home loan and home improvement interest rates.

February 11, 1992

This was a special budget workshop for the preparation of the budget for the fiscal year 4/1/92-4/1/93. Members present were Mayor Ross Gerking, Ted McKeehan, Betty Lewis, Edwin Weiss, and Gary Childers. The meeting was called to order at 6:30 p.m. Joe Holland was absent.

The council looked over the proposed expenses prepared by City Manager Debbie Gosnell. The expenses were discussed at length and budget cuts were made where feasible. The council also discussed the need to increase the water and sewer rates to try to balance the budget. It was noted that it would not be feasible to increase the rates to pay for the extreme expense on the sewer farm for 1992. The council decided to adjust the rate so that the sewer rates could pay for the sewer farm over a 3 year period.

The City Manager is to work on the budget and the proposed rate increase. The council and mayor will look over the proposed budget and final preparation made on 2/18/92.
