'I Give You Texas'

The paper shortage in this country is highly serious. One reason is that everybody wants to be a columnist and then gather the "cream" of his columning and put it in a book.

The latest of these Johnny-Come-latelys in the field of what might laughingly be called literature is Billy Rose, who has been very successful as a producer of shows, and of course that qualifies him as a writer, just as making a billion dollars by manufacturing automobiles makes a man an authority on any subject he wants to talk about.

And metropolitan papers, dazzled by a "name", are using Billy's output in a big way. His column, in case you have been so fortunate as not to have read one, consists of a marvelous display of egotism—even for a columnist—and of a parade of all the truly fictional situations that have been worn to shreds by students taking a short story writing course by correspondence.

Mr. Rose says he writes the column himself—but maybe he produces his column the same way he produces his shows. Back in 1936 and 1937, when the "Broadway Barium" put on the Fort Worth Casa Manana DuBois designed the costumes, Sussie composed the music, a Hollywood dance director put on the dances, Winkler provided the lighting effects and John Murray Anderson put it all together as director. With these slight exceptions, it was 100 percent Billy's work.

Billy got his start by writing songs. Everyone knows how lofty critics of Tin Pan Alley are. They borrow from Bach, they mooch from Mozart and the bum from Beethoven.

Rose admits he has some "researchers" and "legmen" for his columning. In other words, by his own admission, the column he calls his is not really his, in toto, except in the sense that something you buy and pay for is yours.

But watch some book club make the so-called Billy Rose club his selection for the month.



PICKLED PEACHES

Pickled peaches are one of America's favorite sweet spicy refreshes, says Evelyn Wieland, county home demonstration agent.

Miss Wieland recommends this recipe using 8 pounds of small or medium sized peaches; after peaches are washed and pitted, two cloves are stuck in each peach, or the 8 two inch sticks of cinnamon and 2 tablespoons of whole cloves may be tied loosely in a clean, thin, white cloth and placed to cook with 2 pounds of sugar, 1 quart of vinegar and 1 cup of water for 10 minutes. The peaches are added to the liquid and cooked slowly until tender but not broken. After standing overnight, syrup is drained from the peaches and spices removed. The syrup is boiled rapidly until thickened, and poured over peaches already packed in clean, hot sterile jars. The jars are sealed tightly.

To give time for flavor to be blended, the jars of peaches should be kept in a cool place for several weeks before serving.

FRIED CHICKEN FOR NEXT WINTER

Fried chicken can be a year round treat for the family table if some of them are saved for the freezer locker.

The young birds are best for fried chicken and getting them ready for freezing is the same as for eating. But, it is easy to pick the chicken if it's dipped into a semi-boiling water for half a minute. This means the water should be about 125 degrees.

Suggestions on freezing include cutting up the chicken into pieces exactly as you would cut them for frying. The next step is to seal the pieces and pack into moisture, vapor proof containers or wrapping paper. Put the amount needed for each meal into a package. Make the package as air tight as possible.

Freeze quickly, and store at zero degrees or lower. If the home freezer is used, the chicken may be killed in the afternoon and frozen that night. If a commercial frozen locker is used, the chicken may be killed in the morning and taken to the locker early in the afternoon.

At the same time they are troublesome items because they're hot and bulky, hard to clean, difficult to press over and clumsy on hangers.

Miss Evelyn Wieland, county home demonstration agent, has some tips for saving time and trouble with shoulder pads. She says, make them removable instead of sewing them into your clothes. You can attach them with small-sized snaps, which don't show if they're hidden under seams. Then you can take the pads out easily

when dresses or coats are cleaned and pressed . . . and snap them back in before wearing.

For travel, removable pads have several advantages. Dresses will pack more easily and fold smoothly . . . and you can save trouble and expense by using the same pads for all dresses of similar style.

Pads are troublesome in the wash because the filling is likely to come out. It is a little easier to keep them clean than to wash them, and here's a trick on that score: tuck a piece of washable material over the side of the pad that goes next to the skin. When this becomes soiled, it's easy to remove and wash.

FARM PRODUCTION OF GRADE YEARLING BEEF

There is no definite procedure for the farm production of good grade beef, for feed and pasture conditions vary; however, in starting feeders one should have a general plan and the feed or needed in sight. At the Spur station the plan is to purchase calves in the fall; winter with silage, stalk fields, or native grass; summer on native grass; then finish in lots. In wintering, all calves, those on wheat, are fed one pound of cottonseed cake daily.

Calves on wheat are given dry roughage or access to native grass. In the summer period, depending on the grass, yearlings may be fed 2 or 3 pounds of cottonseed cake daily for 30 to 60 days before dry lot. The object is to get as much weight and condition as possible on grass. Grass gains cost less than dry lot gains and the more weight at the start, the less to be made in dry lot for good finish.

It was possible to produce good grade carcasses with fleshy feeder yearlings in 112 days of feeding with rations comparatively low in concentrates. The yearlings were raised approximately one grade, or

from "Commercial" to Good with dry lot gains, basis market weight, of about 200 pounds.

In the comparison of roughage lots, two fed 6 pounds of ground alfalfa in addition to sunac silage and only 2 1/2 lb. of cottonseed meal instead of 4 lb. as the other lots, made above average gain. Previous tests have shown the same results.

Steers on light grazed pastures averaged 64 lb. more gain and higher condition than steers on heavy grazed pastures. The average gain was the same for the two rates of use, but the 1945 acre-gain was low for heavy grazing.

Summer grazing tests with yearling steers on native grassland show that 5 pastures cleared of mesquite produced 14% more gain per acre and 31lb more gain per steer than

5 pastures with moderate stands of mesquite. Successful control of hornflies on range cattle has been made possible with water dispersible forms of DDT. This organic chemical, unlike other fly killers, remains highly toxic to the hornfly for several days after treatment by spraying or dipping.

Wheat pasture supplemented by dry lot roughage produces just about as high a rate of gain as good feeding in dry lot. More than any other feed treatment at Spur it seems to afford the maximum of economic winter gain. Wheat calves not only put on flesh but made a great deal of growth. Usually, calves at Spur gain about three fourths pound daily from December to April when wintered on native grass with 1 pound of cake daily per head. Wintering on grass with cake is a good treatment. The calves grow well and make good use of summer grass.

Generally the more calves gain during the winter the less they gain on grass the following summer; however, the total winter and summer gain is greater in the case of high winter gain. Steers once behind in development, and they develop more rapidly as calves, never quite catch up in size although they may finish to very good advantage.

Wheat pasture in winter, light grazed and cleared pasture in summer as well balance dry lot rations for finishing are the steps in the farm production of good grade yearling beef at the Spur station.

Percent Cut In Peanut Acreage For '48 Recommended

In order to receive a support of 90% per acre as of July 15, 1948, peanut producers will vote at a referendum to be held before December 15, 1947, to place the nation's 1948 peanut acreage to about 75% of that planted in 1947, according to Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P.
