Big Buck Winners

From November 2 to January 5, the FFA (Future Farmers of America) Chapter at Cross Plains High School sponsored their annual Adult and Student Big Buck Contest. The bucks had to have killed within 40 miles of Cross Plains and were judged on several other criteria to earn "points." The buck with the highest total points was then the winner.

In the adult division, the first four places were as follows:

First place was Jerry Dominy. He killed an 11 point buck with a 17 1/8" inside spread which scored 64 3/4 points. Mr. Dominy was awarded a 243 deer rifle.

Second place was taken by Andrew Young. Mr. Young killed a 9 point with a 20" inside spread, earning a score of 63 points. His second place

earned him a new scope.

Third place was won by Kenneth Sowell. He killed a 12 point buck with a 16 1/4" inside spread which scored 60 3/4 points. He was awarded a new knife.

Taking fourth place was Jeff Harris. Mr. Harris brought in an 8 point with a 15 1/4" inside spread, scoring 53 7/8 points. He was given a gun case.

The winners in the student division in the contest were as follows: First place was Tim Yates, who killed an 8 point with an 18" inside spread which scored 63 1/2 points. Tim received a new 30/30 rifle.

Second place was Kenny Horan. He killed a 9 point buck with an 18 5/8" inside spread, earning 60 3/4 points. He was given a new scope.

The FFA thanks and does appreciate all of those who participated in this year's contest, making it successful.

Callahan County Child Welfare Board Report

The Callahan County Child Welfare Board had their monthly meeting January 16. The report was given by Gloria Wilson. It had been an unusually busy December with seven cases investigated for Callahan County. This brought the year total to 52 new cases for 1991, and the group is praying for a decreased number for 1992.

Every 47 seconds, a child somewhere in the United States is abused or neglected. Even though April is the designated month for child abuse prevention, everyone needs to be aware every day, every week, every month. Commissioners Discuss Deputies Overtime Pay

Callahan County Commissioners met Monday, January 13 with an associate from the law firm of Bob McCool to discuss the upcoming meeting with the Federal Labor Board concerning overtime pay for the deputies in the Callahan County Sheriff's Department.

Melissa Romine, an associate from the law firm of Bob McCool, told County Commissioners that the Sheriff's Department has not hired the law firm. She told Commissioners that she has spent approximately five hours exploring the Fair Labor Standards Act and if the county does need to give overtime or compensation time to the department's deputies. She told Commissioners that the Labor Board is pro-employee and that litigation is time consuming and costly.

Ms. Romine told Commissioners that Taylor County had recently spent \$50,000 in litigation concerning an opinion if the probation officers of that county are entitled to overtime pay.

She told Commissioners that their case to the Labor Board could go either way. "I encourage you to keep an open mind when going to the Labor Board," Romine said to Commissioners.

The Commissioners and County Judge will meet with the Labor Board in Fort Worth on January 24 concerning overtime pay dating back several years for the county deputies.

Callahan County Sheriff Bill Skinner attended the Commissioner's Court meeting, but did not comment on the deputies overtime pay. Sheriff Skinner did inform Commissioners that the Callahan County Jail inspection is set for February 25 in Baird.

The sheriff, when presenting his monthly budget to Commissioners, told them that because he is furnish his own vehicle and mileage for the duties of sheriff, he didn't feel that \$400 monthly in county mileage is too much to ask the county to pay. County Judge Bill Johnson stated that he'd wish the sheriff use one of the new four vehicles purchased by the county for the sheriff's department.

Other items brought before Commissioner's Court included:

—Commissioners voted to have Greenwood Insurance Agency in Cross Plains provide auto, general liability and crime insurance coverage for the county for one year and accepted the bid from the Texas Association of Counties to provide fire insurance coverage and all-risk coverage on the commissioner's equipment. The bids accepted by the county provide coverage from January 26, 1992 to January 26, 1993. Judge Johnson stated that providing insurance coverage between the two companies instead of getting coverage from one company saved the county almost \$7,000.

—Commissioners voted unanimously to elect County Commissioner Lowell Johnson as the judge pro-tem for 1992.

—Commissioners discussed arrangements for the federal food commodity distribution for January.

—Commissioners set the 1992 county holiday schedule (see related story elsewhere).

County Survey For Support Of Fire District

Callahan County residents are being asked through the area media whether they will be willing to support a fire district in the county through additional tax dollars.

At a meeting of the Callahan County Firefighters Association Thursday night, January 16 at the Clyde fire station, association's secretary Don Haley explained that in the past, rural fire protection has been financed by contributions, city funding and county funding. According to Haley, some rural fire departments are solely dependent on contributions and fund-raisers. Haley added that cities are financing more than their share and that contributions are unreliable because it only comes from about 12 percent of the people.

Rural areas of Callahan County rely on neighboring towns for assistance in fighting fires, yet they do not provide any funding for the fire departments.

"Some people never contributed at all, yet they receive all the benefits of fire protection," Haley said.

"There is not enough money to make needed repairs and many times the equipment will break down enroute to a fire. Also, there is no extra funds to provide scheduled replacement, so equipment becomes old and worn out. This prevents the fire departments from doing a reasonable job of fire protection," Haley said.

Haley said the estimated cost of a county with rural fire protection is approximately \$78,000.00 annually. Contributions and county funding in no way provides these funds, he said. "Based on current property values in Callahan County and at the maximum rate allowed by law of three cents per hundred dollars valuation, a fire district would provide approximately \$75,000.00 to \$80,000.00 annually," Haley said.

The association secretary said that after the association met with the Callahan County Commissioners, the commissioners suggested that a fire district is the way to provide funds to pay for fire protection in Callahan County.

Some counties make contracts with nearby cities to provide fire protection,

Haley said. This can sometimes benefit both city and the county, he continued. "The fire district pays the city a certain amount for all calls outside the city limits. In some cases they pay a fixed amount annually. Issues of liability in cases of injury, insurance, specific boundaries, etc. also have to be considered," Haley said.

"If the rural area needing fire protection is too far from a municipal fire department then a district may be formed there. The Commissioner's Court is obliged by Article 2351A-1, Vernon's Ann. Civil Statutes to provide both equipment and fire protection to all areas outside of the city limits. A county rural fire prevention district may be a workable solution," Haley went on to say.

Haley said that to form a fire district, one must first obtain one hundred signatures on a petition, designate the name of the district, its boundaries, name of two petitioners and a fee not to exceed \$150. If the petition is found to be in order, the county judge will file the petition with the county clerk and serves notice of a hearing. At the hearing, all interested person may speak for themselves or by their attorney, on all issues relevant to the creation of the district. The court will have the power to grant or deny the petition. Haley said that territory within the city limits does not have to be included in the fire district boundaries.

If the district is formed by a majority vote of the voters within the fire district, the commissioners will appoint the Board of Fire Commissioners. "This board acts as the governing body of the district and may levy taxes, not to exceed three cents per hundred dollars valuation, issues bond by equipment and do whatever is necessary for the effective operation of the district. Fire fire commissioners are appointed so as to serve two year terms. Members are not with any fire department, county of local government. They must meet each

City Council Minutes

Submitted by the Cross Plains City Council.

January 7, 1992

This was a regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. Members present were Mayor Ross Gerking, Betty Lewis, Ted McKeehan, Gary Childers, Edwin Weiss, and Joe Holland.

Ted McKeehan moved to accept the minutes as read. Gary Childers seconded and motion carried four voting to accept and Joe Holland abstaining.

Joe Holland asked what had been done on the Christmas salary compensation and was informed that the Texas Municipal League had been contacted and City Hall was informed that if the compensation had been budgeted as such, then all requirements had been met and should the expenditures exceed the budget, then the budget would need to be amended to reflect these expenses.

The council also discussed the request from councilman Holland for triple reimbursement for overcharges for copies. It was noted that due to the absences from council meetings that councilman Holland owed the city and this fee would be withheld from his monthly check received for attending council meetings. Councilman Holland pointed out that other members of the council should be fined for this same matter and he was assured that they were being fined.

Rolan Jones met with the council to discuss the repair that needed to be done on Avenue A from 15th street to Highway 206. He pointed out that that street is heavily travelled and asked that since part of this street is con-

sidered a county road that the city and the county get together and do something to help this street from getting in such bad repair.

Dora Smith met with the council to discuss the Alton Barr Estate located at the Southeast corner of the city limits. The estate would like for the city to allow the designated streets and alleys' back to the property owners so that the property could be sold as acreage instead of in lots. The council informed Dora that they would have their attorney look into the matter and would inform her of the outcome as soon as they had any information.

It was pointed out to the council that when Mark Norris and Roger Wilson was hired that the council agreed to give these particular employees \$100.00 increase in salary when they received their certification in water and waste water services. It was pointed out that they reached their certification in November. Edwin Weiss moved to give Mark Norris and Roger Wilson \$100.00 each raise in salary. month or more if necessary," Haley said. He added that a fire district may be dissolved basically in the same manner in which it is formed. He said the fire district could make any tax exemptions on property, such as a homestead exemption or senior citizen exemption. Haley said that on a \$50,000 home, the addition tax would be \$15 per year. The Callahan County Firefighters Association, made up of the seven member fire departments in the county, are seeking residents to return the survey to determine if a fire district would be an acceptable solution to the funding problem. Haley said the City of Clyde contributes \$25,000 in fire protection towards the fire department's \$43,000 total budget. However, 70 percent of all calls are outside the city limits of Clyde. He said that if the fire department only

served inside the city limit's the department's budget could be reduced to \$30,000 to \$35,000 annually. The largest savings could be in fuel costs. Haley did suggest that the Clyde City Council would not go to such drastic measures as telling the fire department to serve residents only inside the city limits.

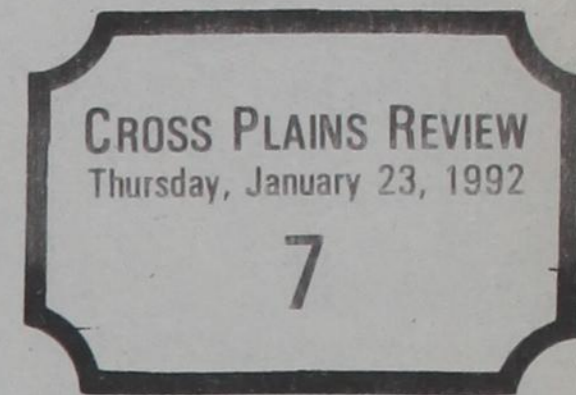
