Colonel Dyer estimates their loss Navyat 2000 acres of grass burned and six miles of fence-the post being burned to the ground.

The Grissom ranch lost about 19 miles of fence and some 2000 acres of grass.

The fire started near a rock quary on the Kendrick ranch and the south east wind drove it to the Dyer pasture and across to the Grissom pas-

A number of men from Baird joined the force to fight the fire. The Abilene fire department sent a chemi cal engine and several truck loads of soldiers and fire truck from Camp Barkeley joined by the Albany fire department helped in extinguishing

So far as we were able to learn no livestock was lost. Rabbits and quail driven from the high grass hov. day eveneing August 10th. All mem ered in unharmed places and borrow pits along the country roads.

Coloney Dyer says at least 25 miles of fence will have to be rebuilt in the burned area.






