



'Fertilizer Blender New Addition To Pioneer Farmers Cooperative'

The Pioneer Farmers Cooperative. located on East Highway 36 in the Pioneer Community, purchased a fertilizer blending program from the Tennessee Valley Authority and became Junctional on May 1, 1992.

The T.V.A. set up the high tech program and trained local employees for the newest service for their customers. Many area farmers have already used the program, which may accomodate any size blend up to eight tons in one batch. Over 200 batches have already been blended.

Farmers need only to request soil tests, which are sent to Servi-Tech at Dodge City., Kansas for analysis. Samples are taken from four inches beneath the surface, in approximately five different locations on a 40-acre field, and are blended together to arrive at a general sample.

Professionals examine the sample and send back the recommendation of fertilizer needed based on an average. The three main properties consist of what is commonly referred to as NPK. N represents the nitrogen amount. P the phosphorus, and K the potash.

A P.H. analysis to determine the atkaline or acid condition of the soil is also performed. It takes 10 days to receive the results and the suggested needs of the individual's soil. The detailed data examples used to exhibit the procedure were on the Eddie Me-

The analysis will determine how many units of nitrogen, phosphorus, and potash are needed. Some soils will not require some of three main elements and some may require certain trace elements.

The specialized procedure proves financially frugal, as you only purchase the elements the soil needs. "In the past, farmers performed a general fertilizing which sometimes wasted funds and time, when their particular land may not have even needed it," Dean Bailey, manager of Pioneer Farmers Cooperative pointed out.

"This is technology that can save money and produce better crops. Cost per acre is cut, which is helpful during these financial crunch days." Bailey remarked.

The results of the soil testing are entered into a computer, which calculates the exact amount of each property needed for the individual soil per 100 pounds of fertilizer, and indicates the amounts to be blended. A computer sheet printout is given to the operator of the skid loader (with front bucket) to be blended and loaded into a truck or fertilizer spreader

Kevin Bond expertly turned the skid loader on a dime as he quickly entered the various bins to obtain the needed properties. He emptied the exact amount, according to a scale on the blender, and the elements were thoroughly blended in the huge machine. The fertilizer then traveled a fertilizer spreader for Joe Oglesby, a local farmer/stockman, as I observed. He had requested the fertilizer to apply to a field he is preparing for a winter wheat crop for cattle grazing.

There are eight bins constructed on the northeast side of the Co-Op facility, including fertilizer storage compartments with cement floors and a runway for the convenience of the skid loader. The bins contain Urea, Potash, DAP (fundamental base of all fertilizers), Ammonium Sulphate, Filler (ground limestone), Phosphate (straight), and K Mag (Potash, Magnesium).

The cost of the fertilizer depends entirely on the blend, ranging from \$130 per ton to \$220 to \$230 per ton. Nitrogen is the most expensive ele-

The Co-Op will spread the fertilizer at a cost of \$2.50 per acre for application, or spreaders are available to customers to apply themselves without

Bailey explained that trace elements, zinc and boron, are sold in bags and usually used in very small amounts, 1/2 to 1 percent, but are



Dear Editor:

I was visiting in Cross Plains a few weeks ago and in doing some driving around looking at places my parents had lived long ago, I drove out north of town on a small country backroad. There had been a thunderstorm during the night before and even though this was late in the afternoon, there were still a few mud puddles on some of the small dirt roads.

We came upon the road which passed my grandmother's house of some 35 years ago and decided to drive through what appeared to be a mud puddle in the middle of the road. But as I drove the rental car through this puddle, the car suddenly dropped into what apparently was a ditch which had washed in the road! I realized immediately that we would need a tow truck to pull the car out and when I opened the door to go for help, the water was level with the floor of the car! I wadded out, ran to the nearest phone for help and found that there is no 911 service in Cross Plains, no tow service listed and apparently the police don't answer the phone after 5:00 in the evening! A very kind AT&T operator then tried the second number listed for an emergency, but when the "EMS" answered they would only reply that we needed to call the police! The AT&T operator tried to explain that there was an emergency (I had left my 86-year-old mother, a 7-week-old infant, and a 6-year-old child in the car with my grown daughter), but the "EMS" had no sympathy at all, just "call the police." 





Clyde Man Killed, 2 Others Hurt In Wreck

A Clyde man was killed and his wife and another woman hospitalized in a two-car collison Tuesday morning. August 11, on State Highway 36 about 15 miles southeast of Abilene.

The victim was identified as John Edwin Scott, 74, of Route 2, Clyde, who died about 10:50 a.m. at Humana Hospital-Abilene.

His wife, Sharlene Scott, 67, was listed in critical condition at Humana while the other motorist, Mary Melissa Parker, 25, of Cross Plains, was in serious condition at the hospital.

A Humana representative said Sharlene Scott was transferred to Zale Lipshy Hospital in Dallas last Wednesday evening, but the Dallas hospital would not release any information on her condition Wednesday night.

Scott received head and lung injuries as well as broken bones, the Humana representative said.

Trooper William Russell of the Department of Public Safety said the wreck occurred at Highway 36 and Farm Road 603 about 7:45 a.m. He said the Scott car was traveling north and entered the highway from a county road after coming to a halt.


