Tony and Paula, Cody's parents, are both former graduates of Cross Plains High School and have lived in the community for years.

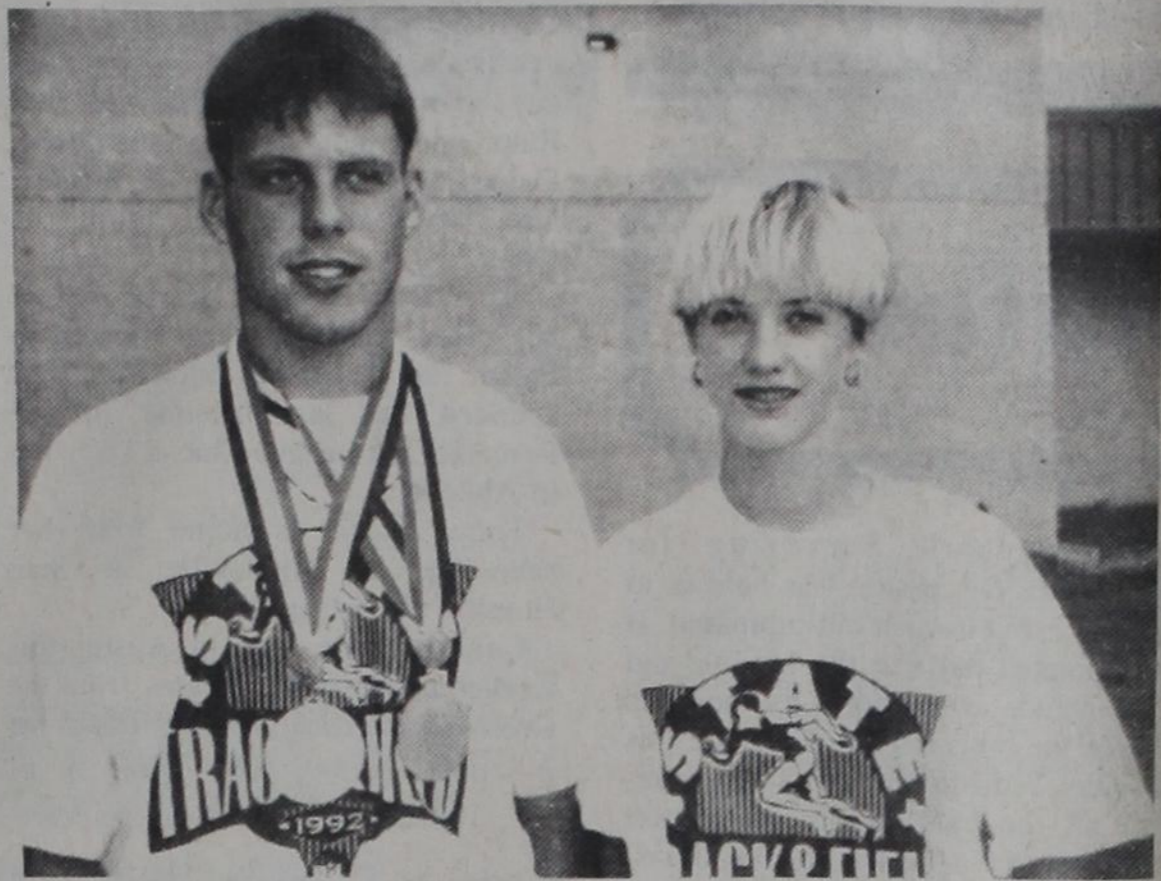
The compassion of local residents has been touching, and if anyone can be of further assistance, it would be greatly appreciated.

Brown Winner Of 2 Gold Medals And Flippin Places 7th At State Track Meet

Jody Brown competed in the 110 high hurdles and 300 intermediate hurdles and Tamar Flippin competed in the triple jump at the State Track Meet held in Austin last Friday and Saturday.

Brown, a Senior, took first place in both his events earning him two gold medals. His official time in the 110 hurdles was 15.1 and 38.4 in the 300 hurdles. This is the first time in the history of Cross Plains High School that any athlete has won two gold medals in State competition.

Junior Lee was the last athlete from the local high school to win a gold medal in the mile in 1966. His record setting time held up for many years.

Weather conditions were not accommodating for the meet, as Jody ran the first race in pouring rain. Many runners fell during the event due to the slippery surface. Brown's time was slowed by the rain, as he had a 14.2 just the week earlier at the State Qualifier Meet held in Abilene where he placed 3rd in both events competing against Class 4A and Class 5A tracksters.

During his second event the rain lightened to a mist and his time was reflective of his usual runs. Last year at State he finished 2nd in the 300 hurdles and 3rd in the 110 hurdles. Jody stated that he was determined to reach his goal of two gold medals.

The long hours of work-outs, drills, weight lifting, running hills and dedication to training, even after school hours were well worth it for this young man. He has qualified for

the Regional Track Meet for the past four years. He set a record in the 300 hurdles in 1991 and broke his own record in the 1992 Regional Meet at McMurry.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Brown. He will be attending Texas Tech University with a football scholarship in the fall.

Tamar Flippin placed 7th in the State triple jump with 34 feet and 1 1/2 inches. It was her first State competition and she is only a Sophomore.

Her best jump this year was 36 feet 3/4 inches at the Panther Creek Relays. She won 1st in District in the long jump and ran on the 400 meter relay which claimed 5th in District. Tamar took 3rd place at District in the 800 meter relay and the 1600 meter relay. She also ran a 62.1 on anchor leg of the mile relay.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E.J. Flippin.

"Tamar is an exceptional young woman who has accomplished many goals this year due to hard work and love of the sport," remarked Coach Elaine Shedd.

Both Jody and Tamar were named Buffaloes Best in Track and Athletes of the Year in 1992.

A note of interest for youthful track enthusiasts, Brown started running track at age 8 in the summer programs at Texas Amateur Athletic Federation in Abilene and Brownwood. Another locally known youth from May, Vicki Lee, also participated in these summer programs and walked away with two gold medals in Class A 100 meter sprint and 200 meter sprint at the State Meet. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Don Lee.

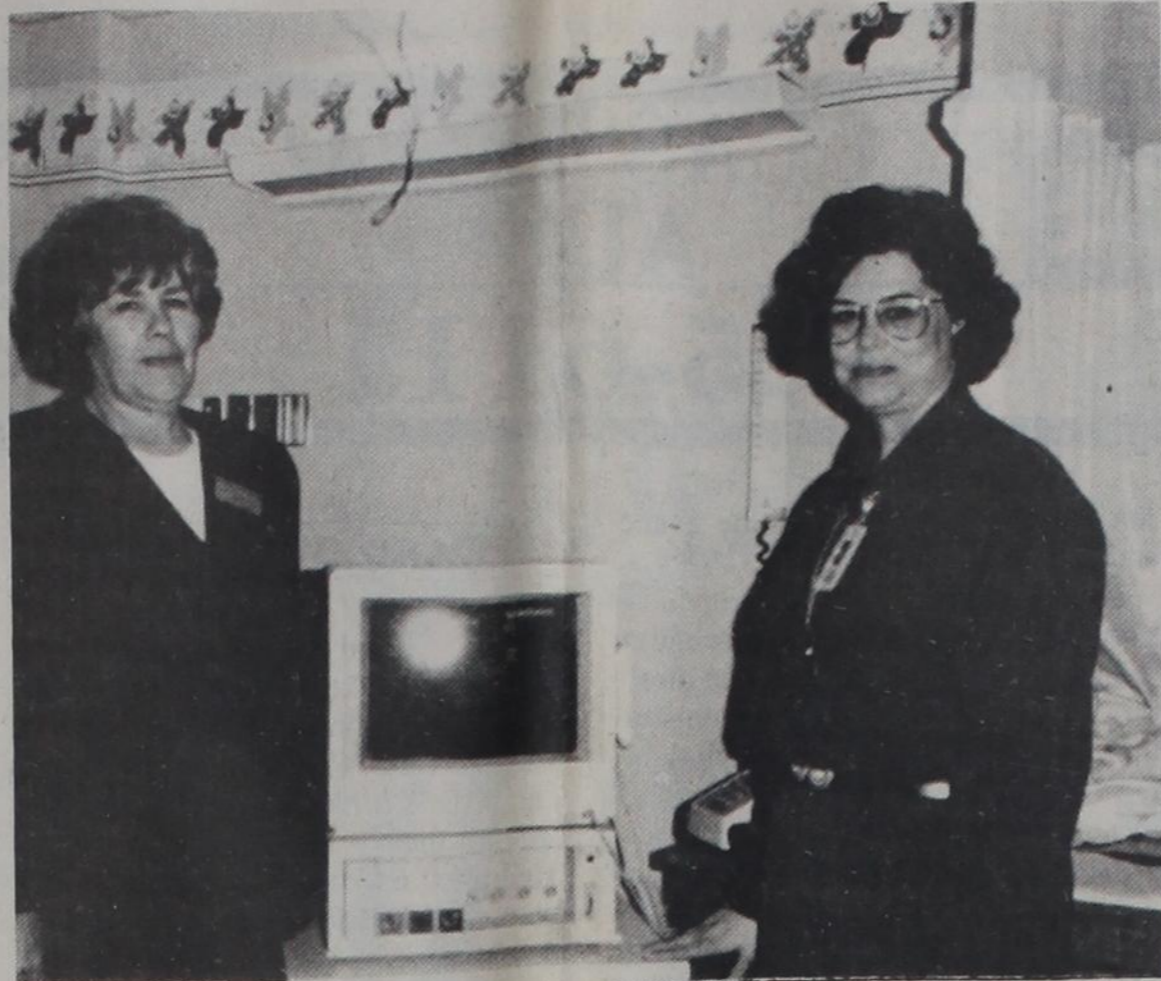

C.P. Dairy Queens Helps Purchase Equipment For Hendrick Medical Center

Over the past six years the local Dairy Queen has raised a total of \$20,206.46 to assist in medical care of children. Hendrick Medical Center Pediatric Wing has been the recipient of various types of equipment to compliment their facilities. The Abilene hospital receives 100 percent of the proceeds from the annual Rock-A-Thon which benefits children throughout the Big Country.

Recent purchases include the sophisticated thermometer and monitoring devices. The monitors are used in the children's Intensive Care Unit.

More than 2,200 babies are born each year at Hendrick. Most are served in the term nursery, but some begin their lives with complications and must go to maximum or intermediate care nurseries, which offer advanced monitoring and life-saving equipment.

The Trauma Center is open 24 hours, seven days a week for emergency treatment. The Poison Control Center is located in the Trauma Center for information and care.

Last year, 930 children were admitted to Hendrick for surgical procedures, and in 1991 they served youths from more than 23 West Texas counties. The Meek's Children's Hospital is licensed for 31 beds and offers quality, state-of-the-art health care.

Children's Miracle Network began in 1983 as an effort to produce high quality, national telethon to raise money for hospitalized children. In its first year, the telethon was broadcast by 30 stations. CMN and the 22 hospitals that participated raised \$4.7 million.

The Children's Miracle Network Telethon has grown to the largest telethon fund raiser of its kind, in the world. In 1991 they raised more than \$100 million and distributed it to 160 hospitals for children. It originates live from Disneyland and is broadcast by 185 television stations. Since its first program, nearly half a billion dollars have been raised.

The largest event for CMN is the

telethon which takes place on May 30 and 31, featuring more than 100 television, recording, movie, and sports personalities.

Richeson Dairy Queen will hold its Rock-A-Thon simultaneously, beginning at 2 p.m. Saturday, May 30. A carnival, food, clowns, a magician, and lots of musicians will be among the entertainment planned.

Rockers will rock from 2 p.m. until 2 a.m. The Dairy Queen will serve a barbeque dinner to all those who rock, in appreciation of their efforts. Anyone who would like to rock may contact the Dairy Queen or Susan McNeel. More details on the fun-filled event will appear in next week's issue of the newspaper.

ATPE RELEASES SURVEY RESULTS

AUSTIN — Many of the education reforms passed by the Texas Legislature in 1984 have not worked, according to a recent survey of public school educators.

The random survey of 1,638 members of the Association of Texas Professional Educators shows that 81 percent of those surveyed say state mandated teacher evaluations consume too much administrative time; and more than half say the suspension period under the no-pass, no-play rule should be reduced from six to three weeks.

"No-pass, no-play was designed to make students work harder and maintain passing grades, but instead, students are opting for less-demanding courses," said Beverly Sinkey, ATPE state president.

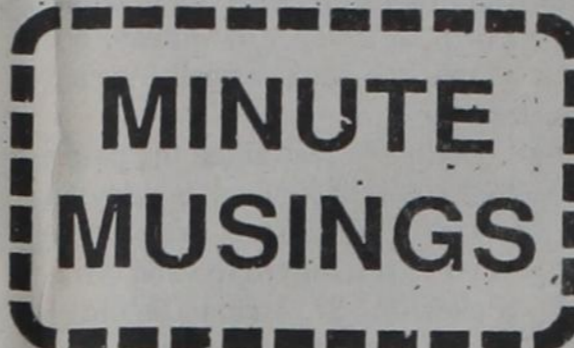
The mandated 22:1 teacher/pupil ratio for kindergarten through grade four received the most favorable response of all the 1984 reforms. Twice as many teachers said the ratio in their classroom had improved, compared to those who said conditions had worsened.

Three-fourths of those surveyed say school violence is on the increase in their district. "This is the most alarming response in the survey," said Sinkey. "Incidents of violence against students and teachers are becoming much too common. Learning cannot

take place in an atmosphere of fear." Sixty-four percent favor year-round schooling if they are compensated accordingly; and only 28 percent favor consolidation as a solution to the school finance issue.

The survey was conducted for the association by M. Lee Williams of Southwest Texas State University.

With a 1991-92 record membership of 54,600, ATPE is the largest non-union educators' association in the United States. ATPE's membership consists primarily of classroom teachers but also includes administrators, paraprofessionals, retired educators, and public members.
