# **Eula Petition** Wants To Keep Barnes

A petition is circulating in the Eula community to keep Bryant Barnes as a sheriff's deputy there when the new county sheriff takes over in January.

The only petition, which is located at Eula Drive-In Grocery, asks Sheriffelect Eddie Curtis to consider keeping Barnes as the sheriff's deputy in the community when Curtis takes over as sheriff on January 1. The petition currently has 71 signatures on it.

About 10 Eula residents were instrumental in getting the petition started.

Sheriff-elect Eddie Curtis said Monday, November 30 he has no comment on the petition because he has not seen the petition and did not want to comment on anything he's not seen.

Current County Sheriff Bill Skinner said Monday, November 30 "It would be to Eddie's (Curtis) advantage to keep Barnes. He's an asset to the community and knows the country well." Skinner said Barnes has been a sheriff's deputy at Eula for about one year and has had "no problems" with Barnes.

In fact, Sheriff Skinner said Sheriffelect Curtis should consider keeping both Barnes and Clyde sheriff's deputy Rod Waggoner.

Sheriff Skinner said he didn't think current Chief Deputy Wayne Knowles would be considered for a job in the new sheriff's department.

Sheriff-elect Curus stated Barnes pre-

sented a resume of himself after the runoff election between Curtis and Skinner. Curtis said he's not made any decisions about appointing sheriff's deputies.

Curtis, who defeated Skinner for the Democratic nomination, said he previously stated publicly that he would be taking applications from prospective deputies and Barnes has not picked up an application.

Sheriff-elect Curtis went on to say he's already had some deputy applicants and was in the process of making thorough background checks on each applicant.

In the November General Election, Curtis defeated Republican candidate Jerry Roden and write-in candidates Bryant Barnes and Randy Pancake for

the job of county sheriff. Pancake, who was a sheriff's deputy at Cross Plains during the election, became the new Cross Plains city marshal as of

November 16. Sheriff Skinner said because of Pancake's resignation as deputy, he is

now working the county with three, instead of four deputies.

Skinner, whose last day is December 31, said he currently has three or four things in the making concerning finding another job. The sheriff said he would not be retiring, but instead would like to find a law enforcement position in the Big Country area.

## **USDA** Announces ARP Signup Dates FOR 1993 Farm Programs

November Washington, 19--Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan today announced that the 1993 acreage reduction program signup for feed grains, wheat, rice and upland and extra-long staple cotton will be March 1, 1993 through April 30, 1993.

On September 29, the secretary announced 1993 ARP percentages of 10 percent for corn and 5 percent for grain sorghum. The ARP for barley, oats, and wheat were set at zero per-

A preliminary announcement of an ARP of 7.5 percent was made November 2 for upland cotton. The 1993 percentages for rice and ELS cotton will be announced later.

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by ASCS is established by law without regard to race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin, marital status, physical or mental handicap, political affiliation, or sponsorship club.

#### ENVIRONMENTAL TIPS FOR THE MONTH

Your garden Now; Don't wait till spring. One of the secrets of great gardners is that they don't wait until spring to start making their gardens great. There is just too much work to fit into spring and summer. But in fall, where are no hard planting deadlines approaching, and the mild weather is even better for outdoor work. It lasts until the ground freezes which may not be until New Year.

Remake perennial beds, most have finshed flowering and are looking ragged. Dig up whole beds and reset the plants now. It's your chance to completely remove persistant weeds and split up plants that are overcrowded. Finish this job 3 or 4 weeks before the ground freezes and plants will regrow root systems vigorously. In spring, these beds will look terrific without you doing another thing except refreshing the mulch.

Roots of all plants, not just perennials, grow more in fall than at any other time. Trees and shrubs from local nurseries—either in containerrs or burlap balls—will be well established before winter. You can move trees and shrubs around your yard too, if you are careful to keep the soil intact around the rootball. Next spring they will start growing with no transplant shock

PLANT BULBS: Pan bulb planting as soon as the first leaves of autumn begin to color. If you didn't order your bulbs early, don't despair. You can still put them in the ground anytime before the ground freezes.

RAKE LEAVES: Never. Mow them with you lawn mower. The mix of chopped leaves and grass clippings makes fine mulch or compost material. Shredded leaves will stay in place even when its windy. They are nature's finest fertilizer, and they'll keep the soil warm longer so roots of newly planted thing can grow even under a blanket of snow.

The difference between trash and mulch is that when material goes through the machine, its mulch; when it plugs the equipment, its trash.

## Texas AARP To Seek Health Care Reform In Legislature

Austin (Dec. 3) — The American Association of Retired Persons Texas State Legislative Committee announced today that health care and tax reform will be its top legistative priorities for the upcoming session of the Texas Legislature in January. Nearly two million AARP members live in Texas.

The committee is calling for legistion to ensure universal access to health care for all Texans. It receommends creation of a single-payor system that would feature system-wide budgeting and a single electronic claims clearinghouse.

Also recommended by the committe are "equitable revisions" of the Texas tax system as needed to meet the state's fiscal needs. Such revisions would include "mandatory decreases in regressive taxes."

Other objectives of the AARP committee include strenghtening the recent reform of the Texas insurance industry and opposing attempts by the utility industry to weaken or eliminate rate base regulation of public utility charges to

I don't mind taking criticism for something I've done, but I don't like it at all when I am wrongly blamed because lottery money doesn't go to the public schools.

My record on the lottery is clear and well documented

well documented.

Long before I became Lieutenant Governor, I said that the lottery was a sleazy way of raising government money. I said it was and unstable source of revenue and I would oppose making our schools dependent in any way on such a flaky source of income.

I repeated my statements often while I was running for Lieutenant Governor and I repeated them again when the Legislature passed the bill letting the people vote on the lottery.

Even before then, as State Comptroller, I pointed out that the State of California had made a very serious mistake in dedicating lottery money to schools—because after the newness wore off, the income fell and the schools had to be cut.

## Commission Approves Deer Herd Management Tags

AUSTIN-The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has approved a pilot program allowing some landowners to take antlerless white-tailed deer under a deer herd management tag system during the 1992-93 open deer season.

The experimental tag program, to end in February, is designed to provide landowners an additional means to avert habitat destruction by deer whose population size, through department review, has been determined to be in excess of the carrying capacity of the habitat, said Dr. Rudy Rosen, director of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's fisheries and wildlife division.

"We need to test the concept of this management tool," he said. "This proposal is designed to gain an understanding of the acceptability of the tag to landowners."

The tag system will be limited to 20 landowners this year and will be reevaluated before possible implementation next year. Issuance of anterless deer herd management tags will be determined through investigations by department wildlife biologists or certified wildlife biologists with plan review by TPWD biologists.

The program will cost landowners \$750 for an application fee and \$5 per tag. Rosen said the fees are set to recover estimated costs of administering the program. Harvested deer must be processed and delivered to a charitable organization.

A qualifying landowner must allow at least 40 anterless deer or 20 percent of the harvest target, whichever is greater, to be taken by regularly licensed hunters. "This limits the program to areas in need of extensive deer removal," he said. "It maintains the integrity of the herd management tag as a specialized management tool."

The property must be evaluated by a wildlife biologist and a harvest recommendation made. The harvest quota is designed to reduce the deer population to a level in balance with food supplies. One provision added at the request of the commission's regulations committee was intended to ensure that the tag not be used solely to reduce the deer herd below carrying capacity to produce trophy deer or solely to balance the sex ratio of the deer herd.

In exchange for possible lost public hunting opportunities, the landowner has the option of providing a quality deer hunt in 1993-94, purchasing a quality deer hunt on another property, providing a youth hunt for at least 10 youths or providing another proposal of equivalent cost that must be approved by the executive director.

"The object of this tag is to bring deer herds into balance with the habitat," Rosen said. "This program is to deal with habitat and the need to control deer populations within the habitat's capability to support them."

Landowners interested in applying for the program should contact TPWD for application forms. A wildlife management plan is required. In addition, the wildlife management plan needs to recommend an anterless deer harvest in excess of 40 animals in order to be eligible for deer herd management tags.

Those landowners not currently under a management plan can obtain assistance from the department. Applications for deer herd management tags cannot be accepted by TPWD before December 1
