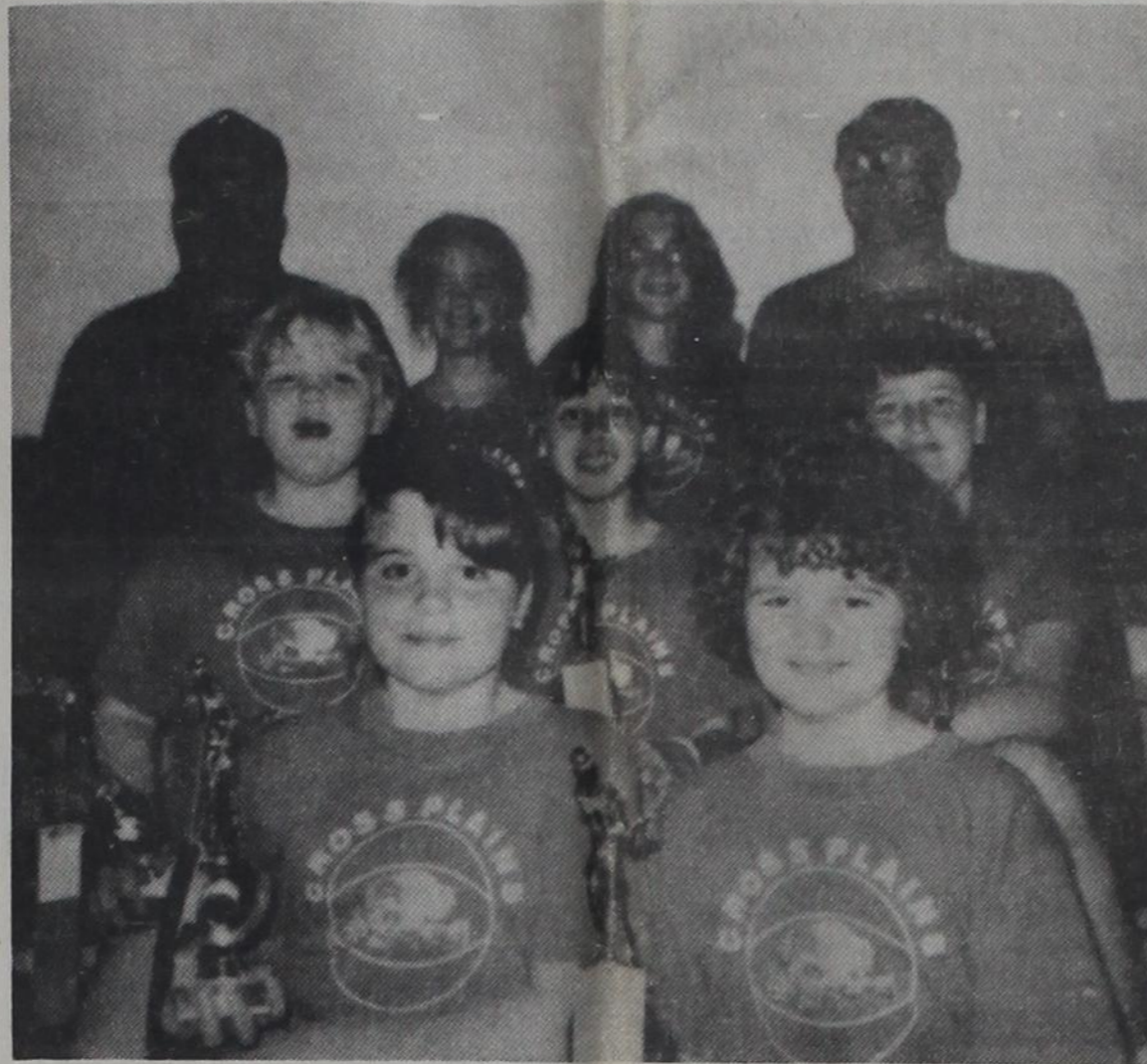

Tuesday, April 14 will go down as a bad day for Callahan County incumbents after county voters failed to re-elect the county sheriff, county tax assessor/collector and Clyde county commissioner.

Eddie Curtis defeated incumbent Bill Skinner, 1511 votes to 1381, in the Democratic Primary Runoff Election.

Campaigning isn't quite over for Curtis however. Republican Jerry Roden will face Curtis in the November General Election. All other Democratic runoff winners do not have an opponent in the General Election.

Incumbent tax assessor/collector

Wauneta Estes lost to Bun Barry, 1,541 votes for Estes to 1,548 for Barry.

In the Clyde Precinct #1 Commissioner seat, incumbent Roy LaFoy lost to Harold Hicks by 100 votes. Hicks had 404 to LaFoy's 304 votes.

In the Clyde Precinct #1 Constable seat, in which the incumbent did not seek re-election, David Blalock defeated Dahyl Bradshaw 847 votes to 349 for Bradshaw.

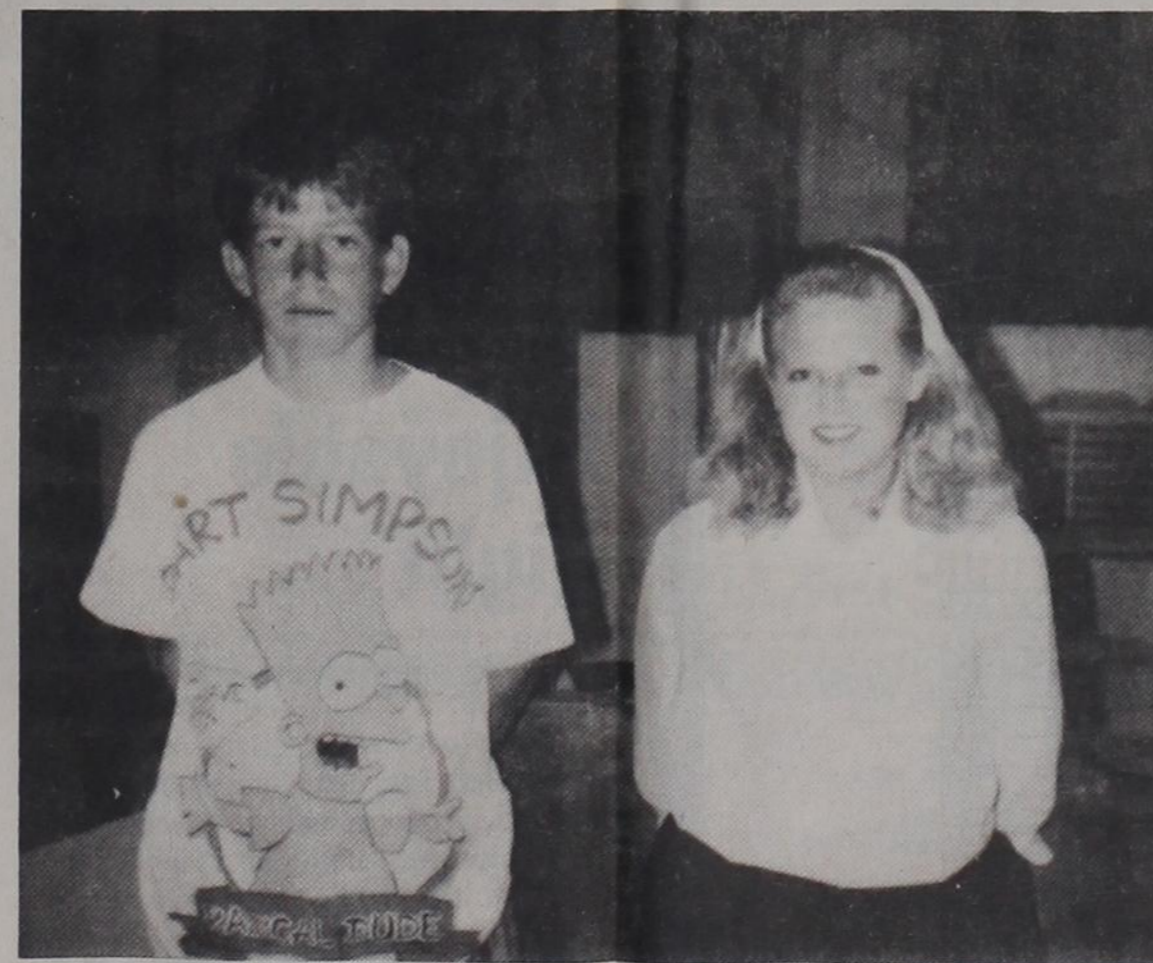

Cross Plains Tennis Team was in Brownwood Monday and Friday for District tennis. No one from Cross Plains advanced to Regional. Results were:

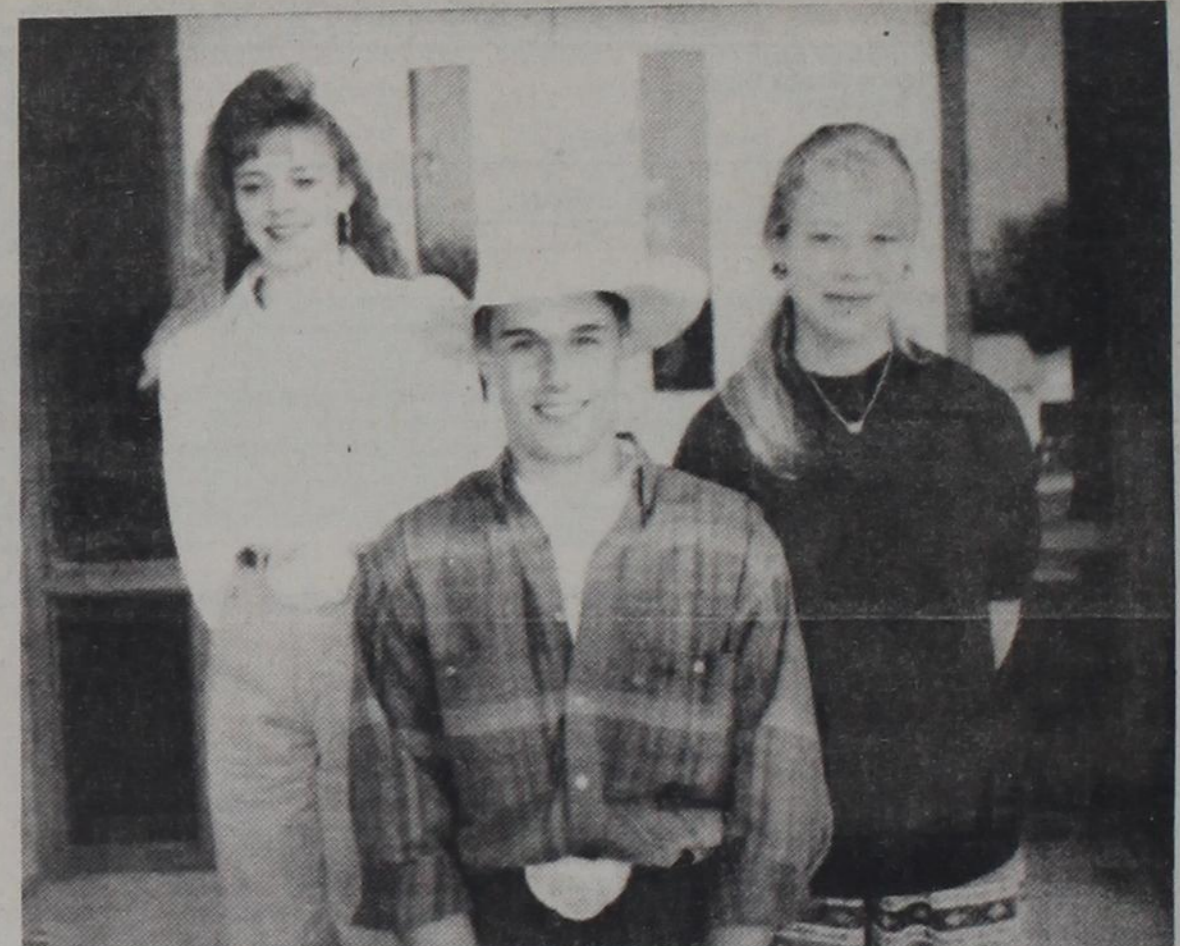
Girls Doubles — Varsity Robbie Hutton and Tamara Hutton beat Panther Creek (6-0) (6-1) and lost

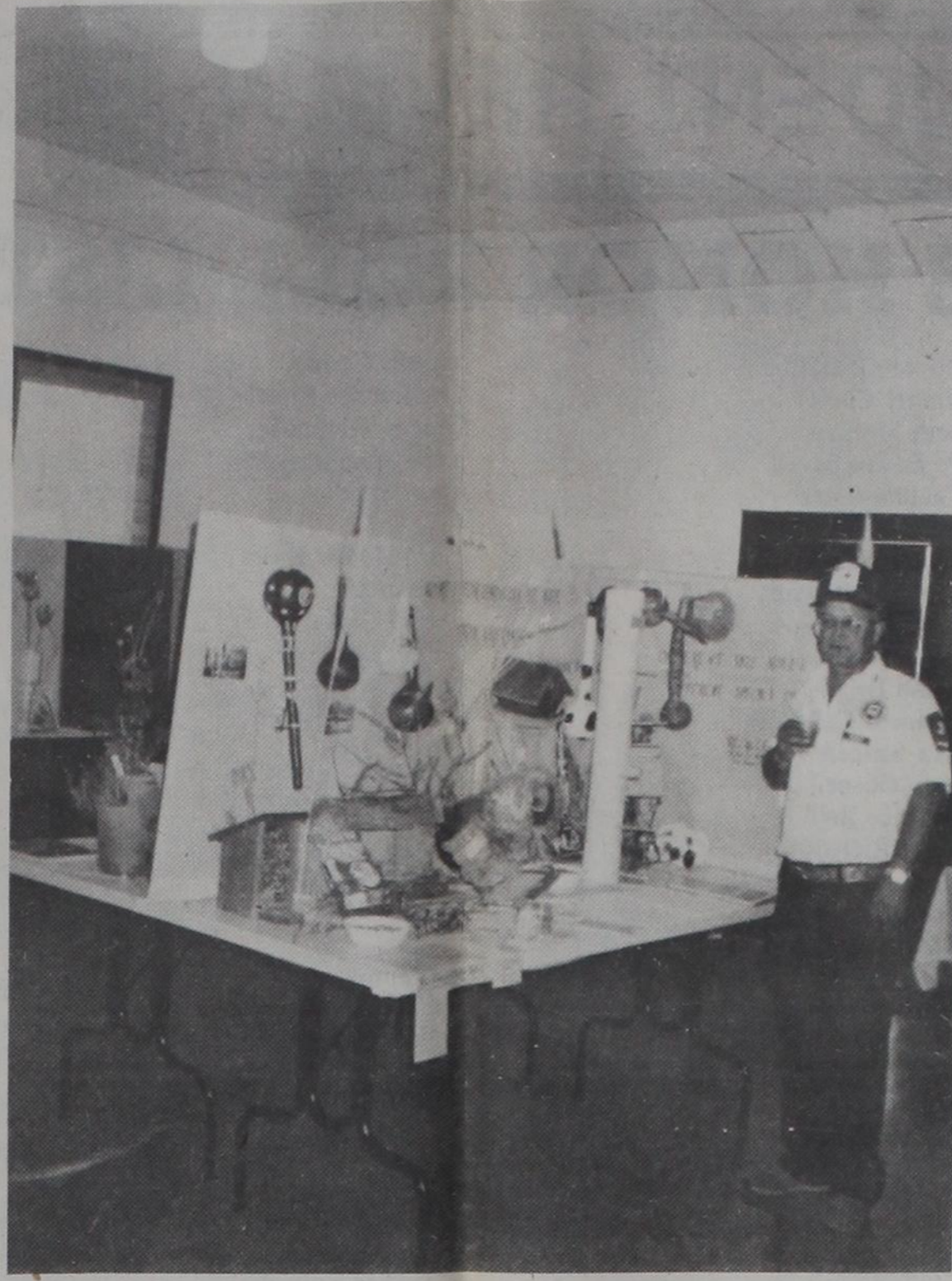

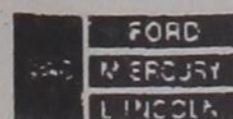

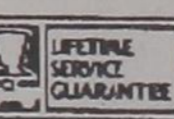

Old Enough To Die

Chances are, statistically speaking, you're going to live a little longer than your parents, just as they lived a little longer than theirs. For most of us in modern American society, life expectancy is increasing. Unless, of course, you happen to be young. If you're an adolescent, your life expectancy isn't quite as good as for the rest of us. At this point you might reasonably ask an incredulous, why? The answer, perhaps not so reasonably as it happens, is alcohol.

But how can this be, you might insist, alcohol is illegal for those under 21, isn't it? Yes, sort of. But according to a Washington, D.C. study reported in 1991 by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, 97 out of 100 underage people bought beer without any difficulty and young people in the experiment were rarely asked for proof of age. Even 12- and 13-year-olds say they can buy alcoholic beverages in stores. Attempts to address this laxity are complicated by the fact that minors themselves can sell and serve alcoholic beverages without supervision in 44 states.

And so alcohol-related causes remain the number one killer of young people in the U.S., and law or no law, kids freely boast that they can buy alcohol just about whenever and wherever they want it. And they want it a lot, unfortunately, thanks to "peer pressure," whatever that is. Some prevention experts suggest that peer pressure is nothing more than a combination of alcohol marketing and availability; that is, you want the stuff, starting from the time you can sit up and work a TV remote, because you're bombarded with messages showing what a great time people have drinking. And it isn't difficult for most kids to get. Many parents still don't recognize the importance of giving clear, unequivocal no-use messages to kids or have trouble being positive role models about alcohol.

But surely kids aren't drinking all that much, or we'd all notice it, right? Wrong. Kids — junior/middle and senior high school students put away 1.1 billion cans of beer every year and 35% of all wine coolers sold in the U.S. In fact, they drink all that beer (2 percent of annual sales) because its cheap and easy to get, but they prefer to the wine coolers for the fruity, "non-alcoholic" taste and because they mistakenly think they don't contain so much alcohol. Among 12- to 17-year-olds, 28% of drinkers experience blackouts. A third of twelfth-graders binge drink at least once every 2 weeks and about 40% of college students binge drink regularly. By now, most of us know about the tragic combination of kids, cars, and drinking. But how many know that suicide is the number three killer of Americans 15- to 34-years-old, that 35% of these deaths are linked to alcohol, two-thirds of them legally intoxicated at the time of death.

April is Alcohol Awareness Month, the perfect time to start understanding the influence of alcohol on underage Americans; a time to draw the line against underage drinking.

Williams was tied with a Menard golfer after eighteen holes with an 88. Williams clutch six foot birdie putt assured of a spot in the regional tournament in Abilene.

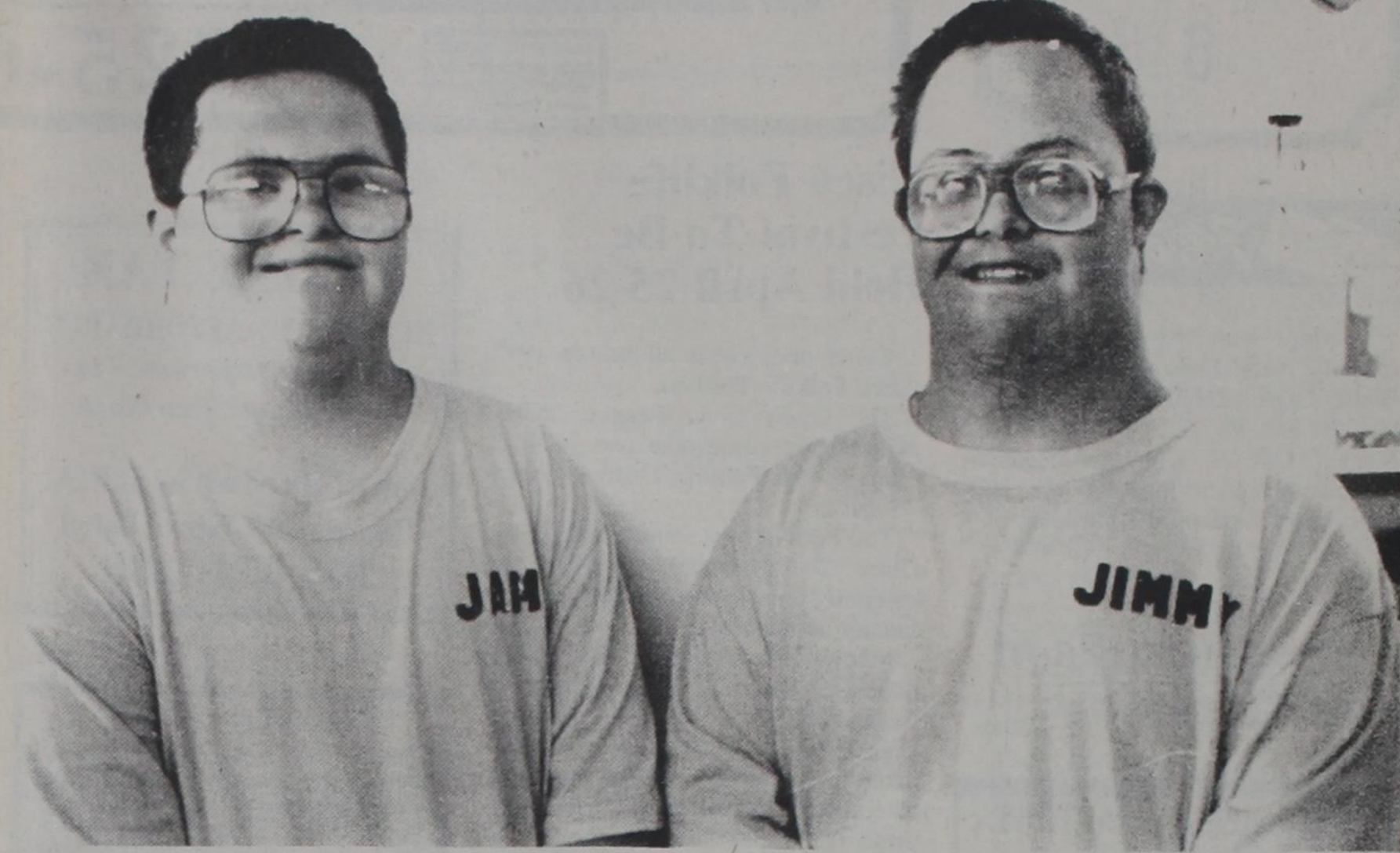

87th Infantry Division Of WWI And WWII Reunion In Toledo, Ohio

On September 15 to 20, the 87th (Golden Acorn) Infantry Division and its Combat Support Units — 549AAA, 735th Tank Battalion, 607th Tank Battalion, 602nd Tank Destroyer, and 610th Tank Destroyer will hold its 43rd Annual Reunion in Toledo, Ohio at the Radisson Hotel.

The 87th Infantry Division was activated and trained as a combat Infantry Division in both World Wars. In 1917 the Division joined Gen. Pershing's A.E.F. in France, and as it was being assigned to the Western Front, the Armistice was signed. In World War II, the Division was reactivated, trained, and entered combat in 1944 at Metz, France. During 154 days of almost continual combat, the Golden Acorn Combat Team fought in France, Belgium, Luxembourg, and Germany. It advanced more than 345 miles in the European Theater, taking 63,338 prisoners and liberating hundreds of towns. Veterans of the famous "Battle of the Bulge," crossing of the Moselle and Rhine rivers, and the "lightning streak" pursuit of the Nazis across the heart of Germany, fighting many bitter battles from the once impregnable German Siegfried Line to the Czech Border.

The combat ability of the 87th Infantry Division was held in high regard by Gen. George Patton, Commander of the Third Army, and received 3 Bronze Combat Battle Stars for its most valiant efforts in the battles of the Ardennes, Rhineland, and Central Europe.

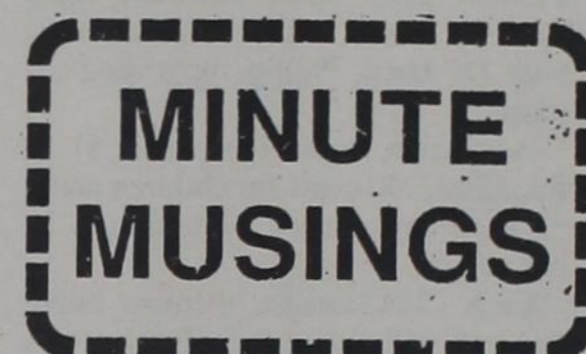

The WCTCOG regional plan will be a subset of the overall Texas State Solid Waste Management Plan. Any local plans subsequently developed will be required to conform to the regional plan. This regional plan will guide all solid waste management activities in the region. Any proposed facilities, actions or programs shall be consistent with this plan.

The Regional Task Force was chosen to represent governmental, private and civic sectors of each county in the 19-county area. The plan is scheduled for completion in August, 1992.
