Abilene police officer Lee Reed will lead 2 workshops at the PAY conference - Positive Action for Youth - scheduled for Friday, February 26 and Saturday, February 27 at Cross Plains High School. Reed will be discussing gangs and cult behavior.

In the ritualistic crime segment, adults will be taught how to identify the elements that associate ritualistic behavior with criminal behavior and the signs in adolescents that could lead to violent behavior. He will also head the segment on gangs, which will help identify reasons for involvement of youth in gangs and the phenomenon of the gang movement in America. He will tell how intervention works with gangs. Reed has served on a task force for the California Department of Justice. He is also credited with writing several acts for the Texas Legislature dealing with missing and exploited children and ritualistic crime. In 1991, he was one of seven people selected by the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children to write a national training program.

Reed's presentations are only a part of the Positive Action for Youth (PAY) Conference that are scheduled for February 26 and 27 at the high school. The PAY Conference is a series of workshops designed to look at the destructive behavior among today's youth. The conference will focus on specific strategies through which the participants can involve the entire

Special Tax Credit For Low-Income Families

Millions of low-income families with children aren't claiming the special tax credits, worth up to 2,000, that they are entitled to. Many workers who miss out on this credit earn so little they had no tax withheld from their paychecks and were not required to file a return. Workers who lost their jobs or only worked part-time may be eligible for this credit.

You may be eligible for this credit if you worked during the year, had at least one child, and you earned income was less than \$20,000.

Working families with wages between \$6,000 and \$13,000 can qualify for a credit of at least \$1,000. There is also additional credit of up to \$357 for a child born in 1992 and another for help to buy health insurance.

The Earned Income Credit was provided to give low-income parents an extra incentive for working and staying off welfare rolls.

Earned Income Credit is the only credit that is refundable. That means it can go to a family whose income is so low that it owes no tax but can receive a refund check of up to \$2,0000.



Joe Land, a self made multimillionaire and public speaker who tours the country speaking to various groups spoke to the C.P. students and staff on Tuesday, February 16 during the 30 minute homeroom time.


The public is cordially invited to take the opportunity to hear one of the greatest singing groups of gospel music in the nation today.

Together since 1977, the Pacesetters have recorded nine tapes. They have had several singles that have had national air-play on many radio station throughout the United States.





The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has announced that more than \$960 million in dividends will be paid in 1993 to veterans holding active veterans' life insurance policies. These dividends are made possible because veterans are living longer than originally predicted, and the insurance trust funds are earning high yields from U.S. Government securities.

The payout will be credited automatically to 2.5 million policyholders on the 1993 anniversary date of their policies. Policyholders may choose to receive a dividend check or select one of nine alternate payments options. VA is cautioning veterans that only those policies that have been kept in force receive annual dividend distributions. The dividend amount will vary according to age, type of insurance and duration of the policy. No application from individual policy holders is necessary.

Government life insurance policies were issued to veterans of World Wars I and II and the Korean Conflict who served between 1917 and 1956. The largest group receiving dividend payments will be the 2.1 million veterans of World War II with National Service Life Insurance ("V") policies who will receive an average payment of \$386. Total payments to these policyholders are expected to reach \$818.1 million.

Dividends totaling \$8 million will be paid to the 30,377 World War I veterans holding U.S. Government Life Insurance ("K") policies for an average payment of \$263.

Some 263,914 veterans who have maintained Veterans Special Life Insurance ("RS" and "W") can expect to receive dividends averaging \$399 for a total of \$105.2 million.

Veterans who hold Veterans Reopened Insurance policies ("J," "JR" and "JS"), currently numbering 98,960, will share a \$32.5 million dividend. Average payments to "J" policyholders are \$297; for "JR", \$534; and "JS", \$545.



AUSTIN - A political observer describing himself as a visionary has suggested voters nationwide should consider electing Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock or Comptroller John Sharp president of the United States.

Last week, on the same day President Bill Clinton proposed massive taxes, Bullock told capitol reporters \$2.2 billion more could be put into education, health care, social services and law enforcement - without increasing taxes.

His proposal would use government efficiency measures and bookkeeping transactions pointed out by Sharp, Gov. Ann Richards and the Senate's staff.

Two Texans like Bullock and Sharp are needed in Washington, since - when all is said and done - foiks up there obviously lack the smarts to substantially cut federal spending, our observer noted.

Texas Congressmen Cautious Responding to the president's proposals, interim U.S. Sen. Bob Krueger seems to have gotten the message that voters don't want big spenders.

"I'm not going to vote for any tax increase until government puts its house in order," Krueger said following Clinton's speech.

Krueger ran a \$24,250 ad in the Washington Post last week asking federal employees to expose "specific examples of waste and poor management."

His campaign spokesman, Monte Williams, said Krueger would wel-

come Clinton campaign help here, "but we wouldn't welcome his tax increases."

Other Texas congressmen remained cautious, most not committing to Clinton's tax proposals.

Krueger's main Democratic opposition thus far, former attorney general Jim Mattox, said Clinton

The Senate sponsor, Sen. Mike Moncrief, D-Fort Worth, said many Texans have been victimized by stalkers, but the state has no law to stop such harassment, which can involve following someone or making threatening phone calls.

"Once again, Texas is bringing up the rear to the rest of the country. Thirty-one other states have adopted anti-stalking legislation," Montcrief said.

Under his bill, stalking would be punishable by up to six months in jail and a \$3,500 fine. Repeat offenders could be sentenced to 10 years in prison.

Gov. Ann Richards and other state officials gathered in Laredo on Feb. 20 to join the Washington's Birthday Celebration Association in honoring Lt. Gov. Bullock as this year's Mr. South Texas.

Manuel Bravo, the association's president, said the selection committee unanimously chose Bullock because "he has long demonstrated his interest in the growth and development of South Texas."

Bullock is the 42nd recipient of the annual award. Mexican officials were also on hand for the awards ceremony.

The Senate confirmed the appointment of three new members of the University of Texas System Board of Regents: Lowell Lebermann, 53, president of a beer distributorship in Austin; Martha Smiley, 45, an Austin attorney; and Peter Coneway, 48, a Houston investor.

 State education officials voted to permit girls to play junior high and high school football next year, but some college officials said last week that women won't play in the Southwest Conference unless some court orders it.

The Senate passed and sent to the House a bill allowing the state to buy General Motors Caprice automobiles, which are assembled in Arlington. The bill changes the maximum wheelbase and horsepower specifications for vehicles that may be purchased or leased by state agencies.

Campaign Planning Begins

Meanwhile, Gov. Richards is making plans for a statewide campaign to win voter approval of a two-part constitutional amendment on school finance, which Republicans and some education groups vowed to campaign against.

Richards said she intends "to put together a serious, sophisticated plan to bring information to the people of Texas so that we will have an affirmative vote."

Karen Hughes, state GOP executive director, said the party "will counter the Democrats' 'Chicken Little' message that the sky is falling and the schools are going to close down."

Supports Ag Tax Reform

House Speaker Pete Laney, indisputably a bona fide farmer, said he supports efforts to halt abuses of the state's agriculture tax laws.

The measure, intended to protect family farmers, has loopholes used by developers and land speculators to pay less in property taxes than homeowners with equal valued property.

"I don't think the law was created to grant exemptions to people to warehouse land," Laney said. "I would definitely look with favor on something that would tighten up abuses.'

Laney said extensive reform could contribute millions of dollars in additional revenues to local school districts.

Stalking Bill Passed

Legislation to make stalking a crime won unanimous approval in the Senate last week, and more than 100 House members have signed on to carry the bill in the House.


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for the 1993 farm programs on March 1," Scotty H. Odom, County Executive Director of the Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said. As in the past several years, the sign-up will be conducted by appointments and producers may begin calling for appointment now. The U.S. Department of Agriculture is requiring acreage reductions of 10 percent for corn, 5 percent for grain sorghum, and rice, 7.5 percent for upland cotton, 20 percent for extra long staple cotton, and zero percent for wheat, oats, and barley.

Farmers who meet acreage reduction and other program requirements will be eligible for price support loans and deficiency payments. "Producers may request 50 percent of the estimated total deficiency payments in program crops when they sign up for the 1993 programs," Odom said. The payments will be issued in cash, and will be limited to the farms' intended program acreage. He said the 1993 programs have flexible planting features, the same as in 1992. Up to 25 percent of the crop acreage base or flex acres, may be planted to any program crop, any oilseed, industrial, or experimental crop designated by USDA, or any other crop except fruits and vegetables.

"A full list of crops which may be planted on flex acreage will be available in our office," ASCS official Odom said. For additional details on these and other 1993 farm program provisions, farmers may contact the Callahan County ASCS Office. The 1993 farm program sign-up ends April 30.

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by ASCS is established by law without regard to race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin, marital status, physical or mental handicap, political affiliation, or sponsorship club.

Q. Do I have to file a return?





Dear Editor,

When our son Jess was born eight years ago, our lives changed forever. Of course, every parent learns that his life is never the same after the birth of a child. But with Jess, we faced a host of challenges many mothers and fathers do not. Jess has cerebral palsy. lives his life in a wheelchair, has vision difficulties and a seiure disorder. He has trouble communicating and doing anything for himself. In short, for the past eight years we have devoted most of our time, energy and resources to this fragile little boy.

Those who have never had the experience of raising a child with a serious disability cannot begin to understand the sense of isolation and disconnection that goes along with such a responsibility. Jess requires constant attention and assistance. Even now, a night's sleep is often interrupted to soothe a distraught youngster. Emotionally and financially, the situation has been draining.

For us, having periods of respite has proven crucial. We simply must have a few hours to ourselves once in awhile to rest and rejuvenate. On occasion, we need to be able to completely leave our home in Smithville for overnight trips. For years, we relied on faithful friends who were willing to step in for a few hours or a day at a time.

Our situation improved dramatically in 1988 when we discovered a wonderful program run by the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation. The program is called IN-Home and Family Support and it provides a small monthly spipend for families who have a member with a disability. The stipend can be used for any number of services, from respite to transportation to rehabilitation therapies of all types. Families of low and middle incomes are eligible to draw up to \$300 a month, or up to \$3,600 a year, depending upon individual needs. Funding is also available for a one-time allotment of up to \$3,600 for physical modifications to a residence or the purchase or lease of special equipment. The beauty of the program is that it offers choices. We were not subject to the dictates of a rigid set of guidelines. We were free to tailor a set of services to meet our needs. For us, of course, the money has gone to pay for respite care for Jess. Now we're able to go out a few evenings a month and occasionally take our other son, now 6, on a few excursions. We have also used some of the money for speech therapy classes for Jess. We used the one-time \$3,600 grant to make some much-needed structural changes in our home. We have a threestory house, which has meant carrying Jess in his wheelchair up flights of stairs. We have been able to install an elevator, add a wheelchair-accessible bathroom and add storage space for Jess' equipment. The one-time payment did not cover all the expenses of the modifications, but it helped enormously. In-Home and Family Support is a unique, user-friendly government program. Families are not subjected to miles of red tape, mountains of forms to fill out and constant interviews. It is an investment in and an affirmation of people with disabilities who want to live at home and the families who support them. For us, In-Home and Family Support has made a huge difference in the quality of our lives. Likewise, it has provided help and hope to more than 5,000 other individuals with disabilities and their families. Currently, Texas MHMR has almost 3,900 on waiting lists for this valuable program. The agency has asked the legislature to provide additional funding so thousands more Texans can benefit from In-Home and Family Support. We cannot think of any more efficient or productive way to spend the taxpayer's dollars. Jeri and Walter Winslett Smithville, Texas

In all of this, the process of prison funding has been reported as an exercise in problem-solving: the prisons are overcrowded, the situation must change, therefore monies are appropriated to correct the situation. Fine; well and good. It seems to me that is the way a representative democracy should work--identify a problem, assess possible solutions, and take action.

That process, however, most definitely does not occur when it comes to school funding. I continue to see and hear, instead, news reports of intense partisan bickering over appropriations for education. Whereas the prison problem is attacked, the issue of school funding is characterized by legislators engaged in bickering and head-butting, wrangling over their petty, personal differences, even sleeping during legislative school-funding sessions. As a result, school funding in the legislature is an unnecessarily prolonged, arduous, partisan process that works to the disadvantage of our children and their parents, and that most assuredly does not reflect any glory on the legislature. Moreover, while prisons are expanded and upgraded, while due consideration is given to providing for the needs and comforts of prisoners, the monies that are finally appropriated for our schools are niggardly by comparison. While prisons are supplied and staffed, schools have so little money that teachers themselves, who are themselves underpaid and undervalued, must pay for supplies for their students. While prisons are built that are often perceived as being nearly luxury resorts, schools

current crop of politicians in Austin. Going by their recent history, I must conclude the prognosis is gloomy.

Feeling that way, I think we citizens must exercise our rights to correct the situation. In short, I think it is time for a recall election: get rid of the politicians who cannot transcend their personal differences, and replace them with legislators who will have the sense and fortitude to do what is right and important.

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Dear Editor:

I am extremely upset over the obvious injustice between prison funding and school funding that has been shown in the recent news. I believe our legislators are playing with our childrens' education and lives, and I think we voters should do something to correct the situation.

This month, there have been news reports of \$250 million appropriation to alleviate overcrowded jails in Texas, plus another \$57.4 million appropriation designated for that purpose for Harris County (Abilene Reporter News, February 2 and February 10). In addition (Abilene Reporter News, February 9), Taylor County is preparing to expand its jail.

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
