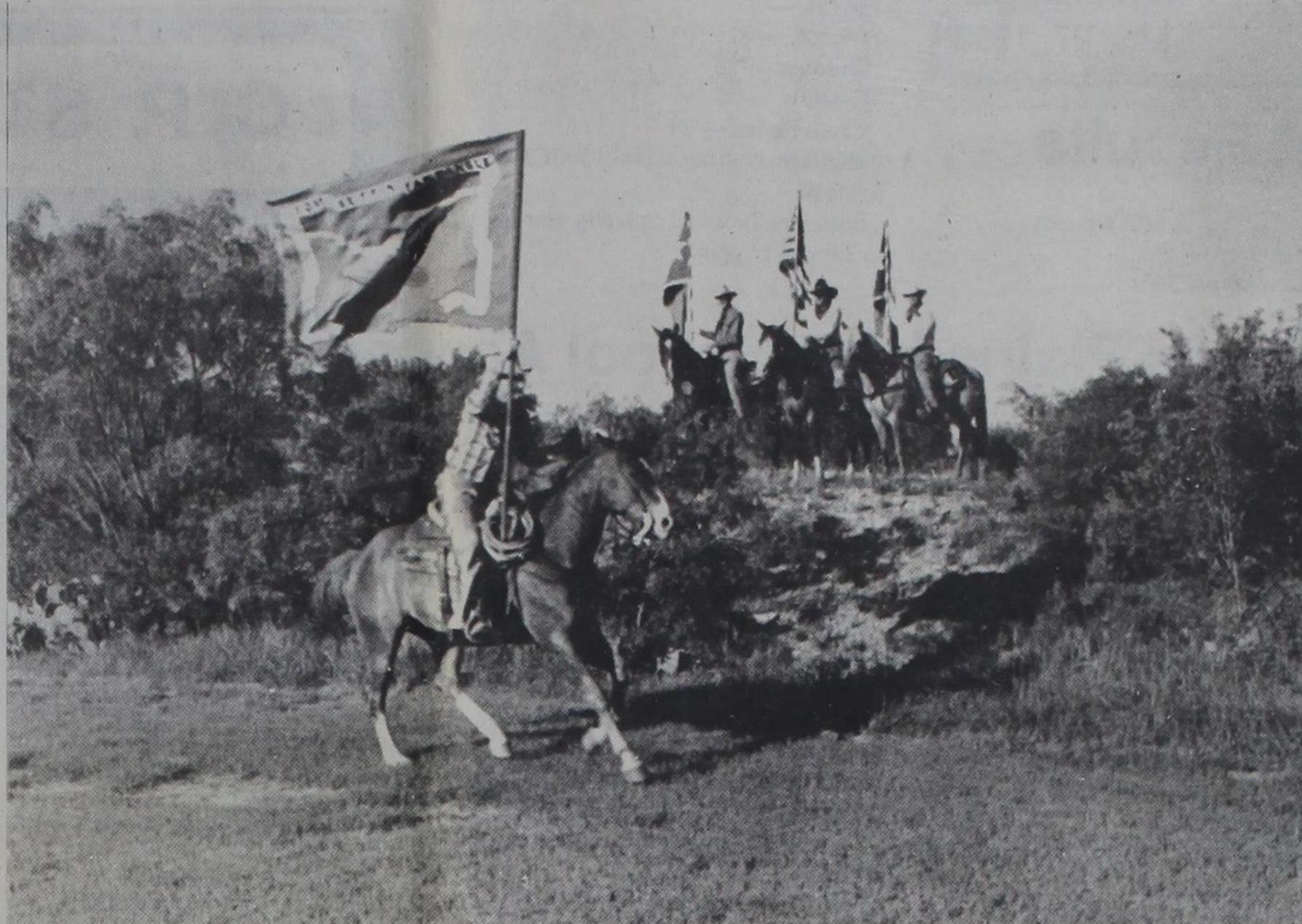

Pecan Spraying

Commercial pecan producers and homeowners are reminded that the date for casebearer control in Callahan County is approaching, says Greg Gemgross, County Extension Agent. Our current prediction for casebearer spray timing is May 30 - June 1.

Producers should base spray dates on egg count. At least 200 nut clusters should be inspected for eggs in an orchard. The economic threshold for casebearers based on eggs is 1-2 percent of the clusters infested with eggs. Eggs hatch in 4-5 days. When eggs are found, the tree should be tagged and inspected daily until they hatch. When 1-2 percent of the nut clusters are entered by casebearer larvae, it is time to spray on that date. A second insecticide application may be required where eggs are found and nutlet damage continues 7 to 10 days after the first application. Extension Entomologists are predicting a light infestation this year and spraying schedule should be based on egg count.

Homeowners choices for chemical control are 50% WP Seven and 50% Malathion EC. Zinc sulfate, NZN or other zinc mixtures added to the spray solution will decrease rosette problems in pecan trees and allow them to produce higher quality nuts.

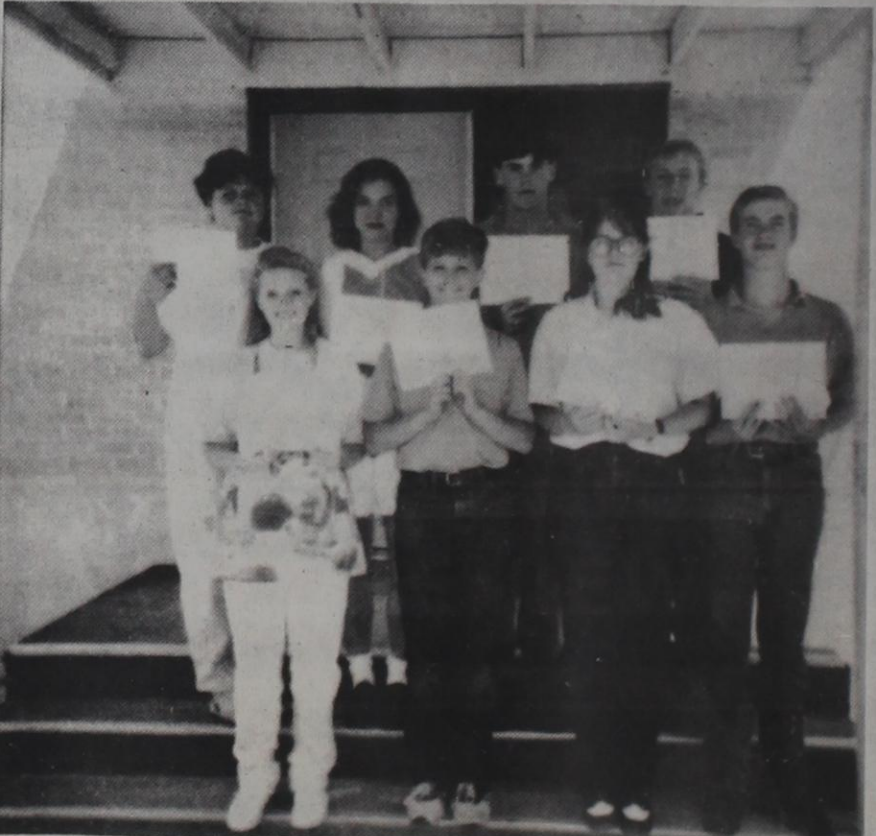

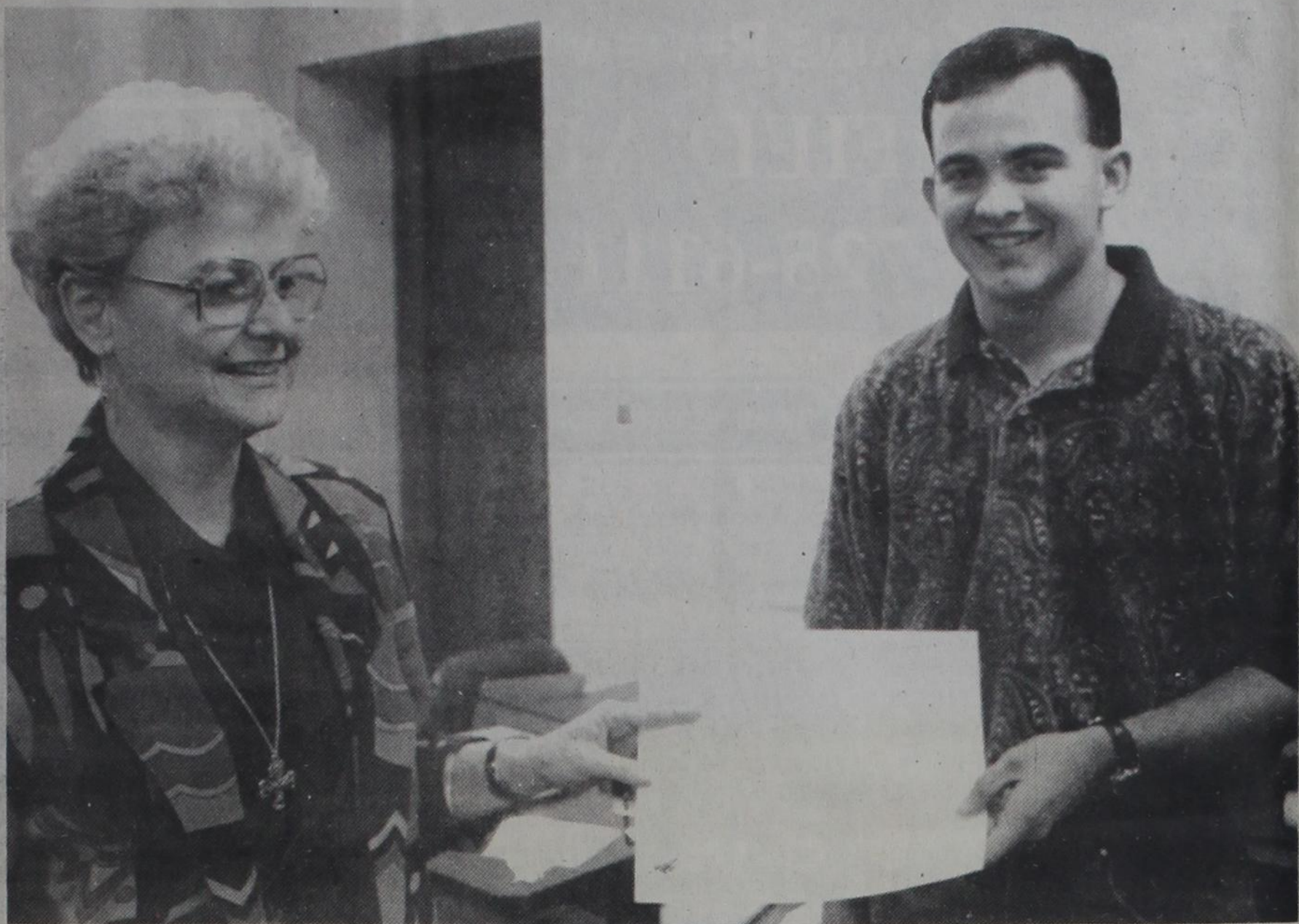

GARDEN TIPS FROM THE Cross Plains Garden Club

Environmental Tips For The Month: Cross Plains Garden Club

Lawns: We have really refined the way we care for our lawns. With water being a critical issue, we try to conserve the water we are using. Water very early morning, before the winds and lower humidities cause loss to evaporation. Water deeply and reasonable infrequently to encourage deeper root growth. Mow your lawn frequently, perhaps as often as every four or five days during the hottest part of the summer. Frequent close mowing will keep the grass growing horizontally. Your turf will be denser, better able to withstand the onslaught of kids, pets, and weeds. Weeds creep into your turf; we now have at our disposal all types of herbicides to eliminate the weeds without harming our lawns. There are pre-emergent weed killers that stop seeds of either grassy or broad-leaved (non-grassy) weeds ever from germinating. There are post-emergent products to eliminate broad-leaved weeds from any kind of lawn. We have MSMS and DSMA to eliminate existing grassy weeds from bermuda turf. We can even eliminate nutsedge from our lawns with a new product called Image. Of course, regular feeding with a quality fertilizer is the most important step to a weed-free lawn. You need to have your soil tested periodically to monitor changes in the residual nutrient levels.

Gardens: Treated woods in gardens, landscape timbers or railroad ties have been used by many for years and yet some magazines ran stories that these would be hazardous to vegetable gardens. The research by the Texas Extension Service has shown that the amount of creosote that leaches into the soil from railroad ties is well below recommended safety levels. And the same is true for the chemical used to treat landscape timbers.

Flowers: Pansies, the flower for all seasons, has been designated in 1993 as flower of the year. Popular in southern and southwestern gardens in winter and northern gardens in summer, pansies are truly a flower for all seasons. Pansies enjoy one of the widest color range of any annual.

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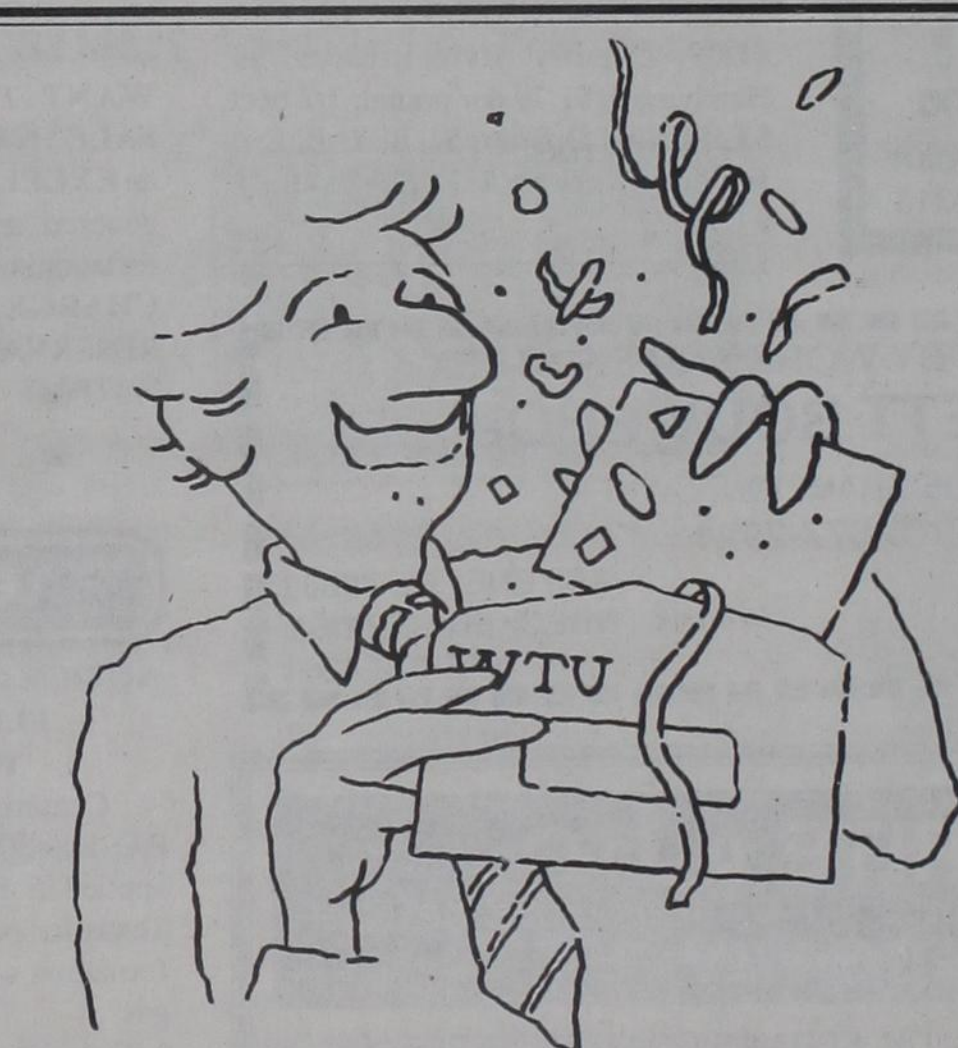

Twyla, have one son, Luke, 2.

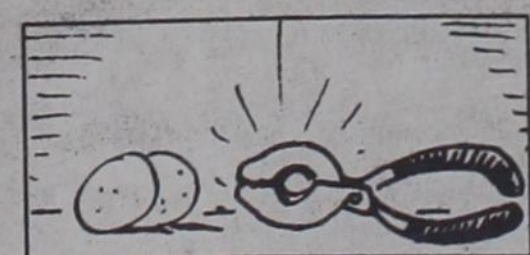
