Their students, on complteion of their training at Brooks and Randolph, will then be allocated to Army primary flying schools where they will be responsible for giving America's aviation cadets their first taste



SUGAR FOR MEAT CURING?

It looks now as if there won't be any extra sugar available this winter for home curing of meat. Even so farm or ranch families who have their own beef and pork can get by with careful management.

They have four choices, says Dorothy Wilkerson, County Home Demonstration agent.
