Q-What is the difference between sciatica and lumbago? What are the results of adjustments for these

A-In sciatica there is inflammation of the sciatic nerve and sometimes swelling of the sheath which adds to the pressure and intensifies the pain. If the nerve substance is affected chiefly then there is less pain and sometimes signs of paralysis. The on-set of the disease is sudden with pains in the hip and thigh, which at first may be dull and aching but later way become very severe. Sometimes there is noticed a red streak down the thigh just over the sciatic nerve.

Lumbago is a form of rheumatism in which the pain is located in the nerve endings of muscles of the loins. is called pleurodynia. If in the hip it is called myalgia As in sciatica the appearance of the disease is sudden. Acute cases are accompanied with slight fever. Often the pain in lumbago is so severe the patient is unable to roll over in bed. The urine is found to be scanty and highly acid, the perspiration has an acid odor and the patient is often constipated.


