Local People Ired By Snub Given Seed Cleaning Plant

A statement which appeared in several Callahan County newspapers last week under the seeming auspices of a county official, urging growers of hairy vetch to take their seed to an out-of-county concern for cleaning, created a feeling of resentment in Cross Plains this week. A petition was hastily circulated Tuesday addressed to the Commissioners Court pointing out the discrepancy and urging proper amendments.

The petition signed by every local person to whom it was presented, called attention to the fact that a new \$12,000 vetch seed cleaning plant was recently installed in Cross Plains and due to the fact that it is thoroughly equipped and adequately staffed to serve producers of this section, it should certainly receive the support of salaried officials of the county.

Circulators of the petition announce that several times as many signers could have been secured if there had been sufficient time to devote to its presentation.

"We feel that the agricultural officials of our county should either boost and support commercial enterprises built to serve farmers of this county or remain utterly silent, certainly not use the influence of their position to impose hardship on a locally owned enterprise," appeared to be more or less the consensus of citizens interviewed.

In the meantime the Cross Plains plant, owned by A. D. Petty continues to do business, however, he reports the statement issued last week under the cloak of officialdom has seriously curtailed output and imposed financial hardship.

Clyde Farmer Holds Thieves At Gunpoint Until Sheriff Comes

Returning from town one day last week Carl Tyler, who lives on highway 80 just east of Clyde, saw two men leaving his house and heading in the direction of a wooded pasture. He grabbed a shotgun and began pursuit of the trespassers without their noticing his presence.

As the men entered a woods they sat down and began to try on a pair of boots and other clothing stolen from the house. It was at this time that Tyler slipped on the pair and leveled a shotgun upon them. He then marched them out into the clearing and sent help to notify Sheriff S. S. Nichols, who arrived in record time.

Under investigation by the sheriff it was learned that the men, Marion Bunch, 18, and Arthur Yates, 19, had robbed a Clyde filling station a few nights previously. They gave their address as Gainesville and a check-up with peace officers there revealed that one of the youths had formerly served a term in the state reformatory and that the other had been frequently questioned regarding infractions of the law.

The youths were taken to Baird and are being held in jail in lieu of \$500 bonds. They have been charged with burglary and their cases set for October term of forty second district court.

Cross Plains To Host Thousands At Picnic, Rodeo This Week End

Formally opening with an elaborate street parade Thursday morning at 10 o'clock the picnic was to continue through two days and the Rodeo three.

Attractions at the grounds the first afternoon include: old timers horse shoe pitching, a fat man's race, potato sprint and old fiddlers contest. Thursday night's program offered an amateur contest at the picnic grounds and the initial performance at the Rodeo arena.

Largest crowds were expected Friday night when an elaborate fireworks display is scheduled starting at 9:30 p.m. So potent will be the show that a special factory representative has been sent to Cross Plains to supervise firing. It is pointed out that persons who attend the rodeo Friday night will have ringside seats to the exhibition as the display will be plainly visible for miles around.

The most spectacular rodeo show ever produced here is expected this year. Cullen Robinson's string of bucking stock has been brought in and promises an opportunity for an outstanding performance by all competing cowboys.

Rodeo competition includes the following events: bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, ribbon roping, sponsors goat tying, Brahma bull riding, calf roping and junior bull riding.

Members of the Rodeo Association, a non-profit organization composed of stockmen and ranchers of this vicinity who are sponsoring the shows, have been working at the arena and pens the past week and announce facilities in shape to produce a fast, spectacular show.

Public address system to announce this year's Rodeo will be provided by the United States Army with equipment sent here from Abilene.

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

HEALTH STANDARDS ARE MAINTAINED BY REMOVAL OF DEAD STOCK, REFUSE

The Cross Plains territory can be kept clear of all dead stock, animal bones and refuse by using the services of the Central Hide and Rendering Company at Abilene. In that way higher standards of health may be obtained.

Dead animals and refuse are picked up, processed into grease for use in soap stock, and hides used in making shoes and other leather goods, and cracklings which are used in poultry and hog feeds. The Company also disinfects the area where animals fall. Sanitary trucks and equipment are used in removal of dead stock.

News From COUNTY AGENT

DDT The following are recommendations for DDT to control insects. Those insects not mentioned in this paper cannot be controlled with DDT or other insecticides are more effective or safer than DDT. COTTON INSECTS: Fleahopper-5% DDT-sulphur mixture with at least 75% sulphur at 12 to 15 pounds per acre, usually a single application is sufficient. BOLLWORM: 10% DDT-sulphur mixture with at least 75% sulphur. Apply 10 to 15 pounds per acre at 5 day intervals. Stink bugs and plant bugs—same as for bollworm. THrips-5% DDT-sulphur dust applied at 10 lbs. per acre. FRUIT INSECTS: Pecan nut casebearer—3 lb. of 50% DDT per 100 gallons of water when tip end of small nuts turn brown or black.

Leathoppers—5% DDT dust or 2lb. of 50% DDT per 100 gallons of water. Grape leaf folder—Same as for leaf hopper. Codling Moth—2 to 3lb. of 50% DDT per 100 gallons of water at 10 to 14 day intervals. Oriental fruit moth on peaches—2 to 3 lb. of 50% DDT per 100 gallons of water at 10 to 14 day intervals. Peach twig borer—Same as for fruit moth. No DDT should be applied within three weeks of harvest. HOUSEHOLD PEST: Ants—5% DDT dust or spray. Houseflies—5% DDT in oil as a residual spray, or 3% DDT and 2% pyrethrum in aerosol bomb as a space spray. Mosquitoes—Same as for houseflies. Bedbugs—5% DDT oil spray applied only to the bed. Dog Ticks—5% oil spray, or 10% DDT powder. Cockroaches—10% DDT dust or 5% oil spray followed by 3% DDT aerosol. Clothes Moths—5% DDT stainless oil spray. Carpet Beetles—Same as for clothes moths. Silverfish—5% oil spray, or 10% DDT dust. Human Lice—3% DDT dust or spray clothing with 5% DDT stainless oil spray. FLOWERS, SHRUBBERY AND SHADE TREES: With the excep-

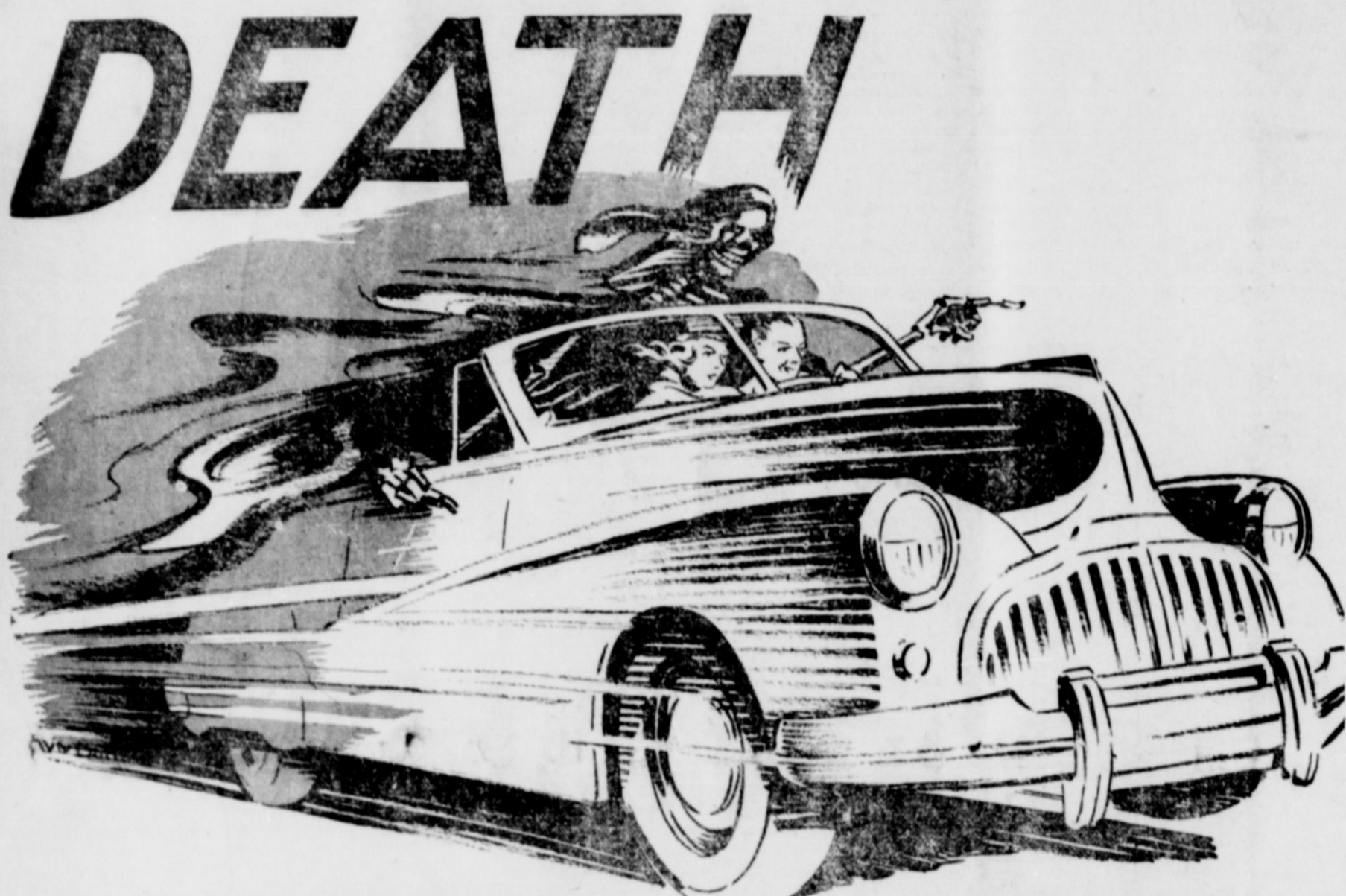
tion of scale, red spiders, aphids, mites and mealy bugs, 5% DDT dust, or 2 lb. of 50% DDT to 100 gallons of water repeated at 10 to 14 day intervals will control other insect pest. POULTRY LICE: Chicken lice—3% DDT or 5% spray over the birds when on roost. Feather mites—5% DDT with sulphur at 10 day intervals. Blue Bugs—10% DDT oil spray wherever blue bugs are hiding. STORED SEED GRAIN ETC. (1.) One ounce of 3% DDT dust mixed with 100lb of seed plus equal amounts of magnesium oxide protects seed from insects and some diseases. (2.) Spray bins or other storage places with 3% DDT oil spray before storing grain destroys all but egg stage of stored grain pests. (3.) Treating bags of kraft paper by dipping in a 10% DDT acetone solution prevents damage by stored product insects for many months. ANIMAL EXT. PARASITES: Beech Cattle—Either spray or dip can be used so long as every animal is thoroughly wet. Hornflies—4lb. of 50% DDT per 100 gallons of water will last approximately 2 weeks and

all of the next generations of flies will emerge at the same time. Second application 8lb. of 50% DDT wettable powder per 100 gallons of water will protect the animal longer than the hornfly generation. Usually a third application will not be needed until late summer or early fall. Use 4lb. of DDT per hundred gallons of water if animals were treated in spring or summer and 8 lb. per 100 gallons of water if they were not treated. Lice—The above treatment for horn flies will control the lice if animals are thoroughly wet, or two treatments at 15 day intervals with 4lb. of DDT per hundred gallons of water. Ticks—8lb. of 50% DDT per 100 gallons of water repeated at 2 or 3 week intervals will control ticks. Lice and Sheep Ticks—A single dipping in Stock 1235 which contains DDT in pine oil emulsion. The finished dip should contain 2% DDT. Hog Lice—Thoroughly wet the animal with 8lb. of 50% DDT per 100 gallons of water. BARKS AND OTHER OUTBUILDINGS: 5% DDT spray either made either from oil or wettable powder

in water. If second application is needed, 2 1/2% DDT will do. DON'TS FOR DDT: 1. Don't mix DDT with lime, it is incompatible with insecticides not highly alkaline. 2. Don't use DDT on vine crops, melons, cucumbers, etc. 3. Don't use DDT liquid preparations which contain solvents for DDT on cattle. 4. Don't use DDT on leafy vegetables. 5. Don't overdose fruit and vegetables with DDT. 6. Don't mix liquid preparation of DDT in dipping vat containing arsenic. Mrs. E. A. McDowell and daughter were Abilene visitors last week end. Mrs. W. 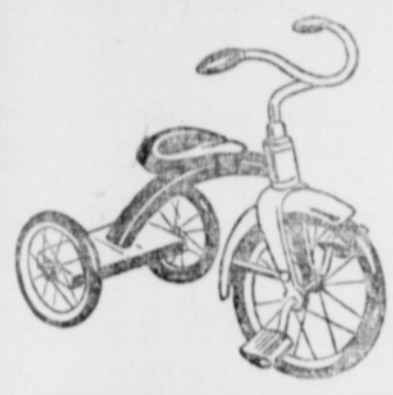

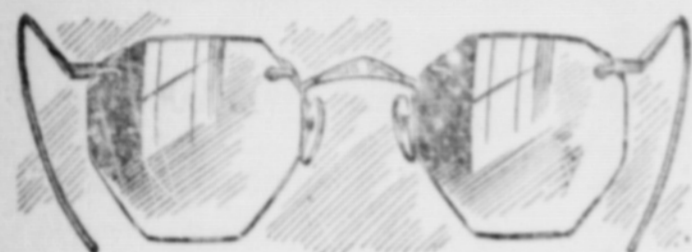

"I want to tell you a Texas story. I was in Java during the recent war. It was in the early days and the outfit had been pretty badly shot up. It contained a good many Texans. 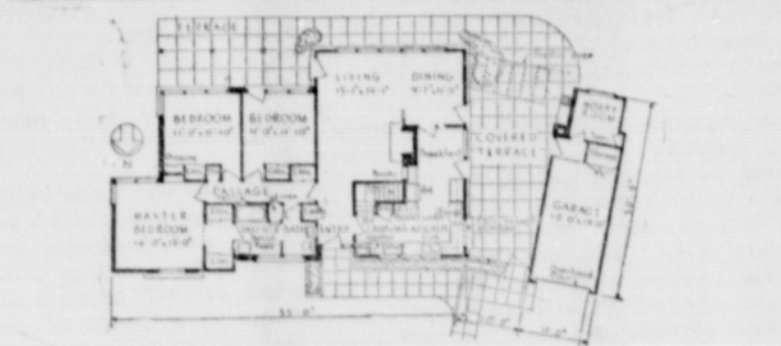

Ex-Soviet Official Charges Spy Rings Infest U. S. Cities

Soviet spy rings are operating in Washington, New York, Chicago, San Francisco and other important cities in the United States, according to Igor Gouzenko, former Soviet Embassy clerk, whose disclosures of Red espionage to obtain the secret of the atom bomb rocked the world.

"I could tell from the messages I handled when I worked in Moscow (as a Soviet cipher clerk) that there are at least two or three Soviet spy rings in cities like New York, Chicago and San Francisco, and, of course, many more in Washington," Gouzenko states in an article in the March issue of Cosmopolitan magazine.

Gouzenko's disclosures were of such vital importance that when Prime Minister Mackenzie King of Canada received his information he went first to Washington where he told the story to President Truman and then to London where he presented Gouzenko's facts to Prime Minister Attlee.

"During these five months before the time I gave my information to the Canadians and the time that wholesale arrests of the spies were made, Russia and Canada carried on a strange guessing game while Great Britain and the United States watched nervously," Gouzenko states in the article.

"As a matter of fact the word 'atomium' was leaked among the members of our own atomic project, also provided the Russian spy ring with samples of uranium which were considered so valuable that they were not even entrusted to the inviolable diplomatic pouch but were sent to Moscow with a member of the embassy staff."

Despite the great need for felling the suspicions of the Russians until arrangements could be made to arrest major figures in the Soviet espionage ring, Canadian officials could not afford to let Dr. May escape to Russia. He was shadowed to London on a trans-Atlantic air liner, arrested there and sentenced to ten years penal servitude.
