## Turkey Shoot Saturday, Nov. 7

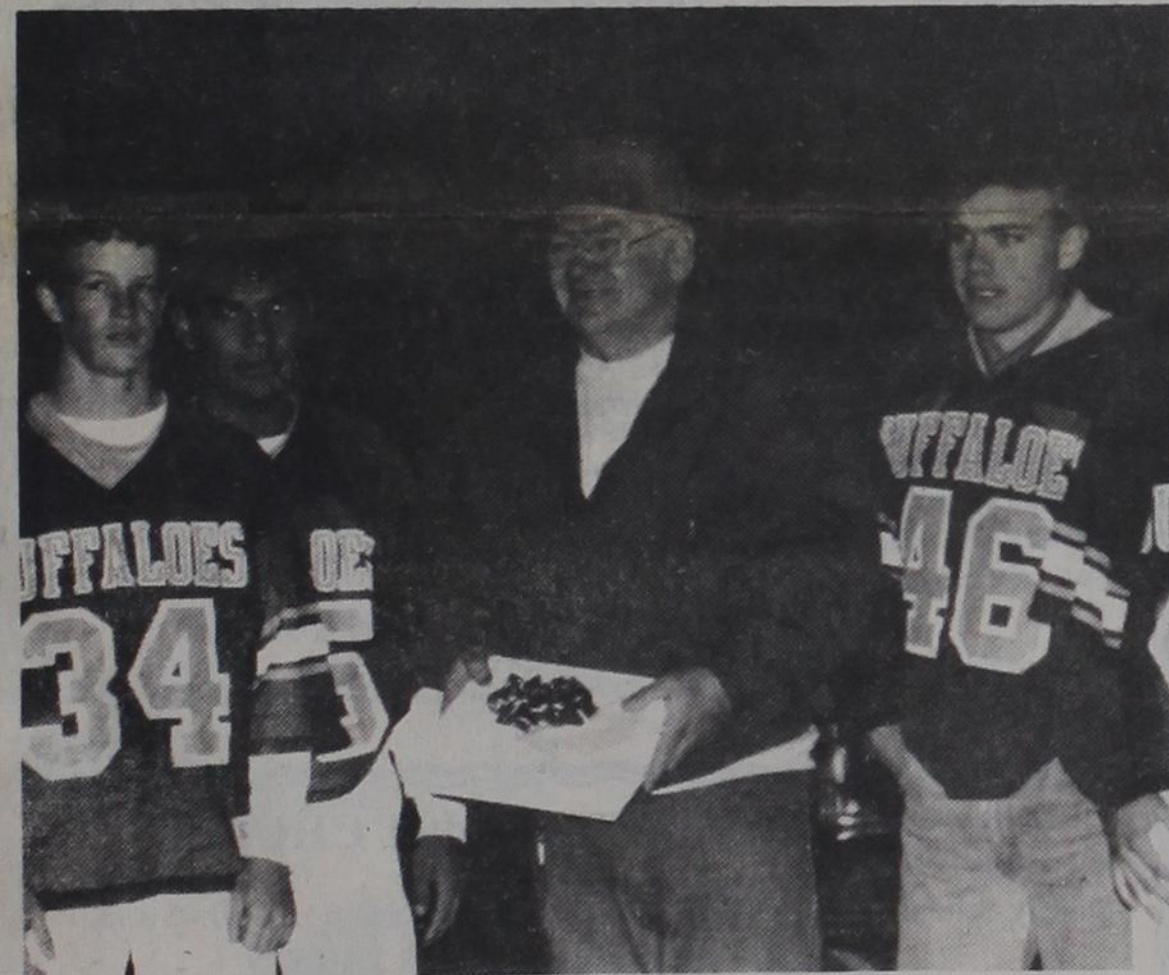

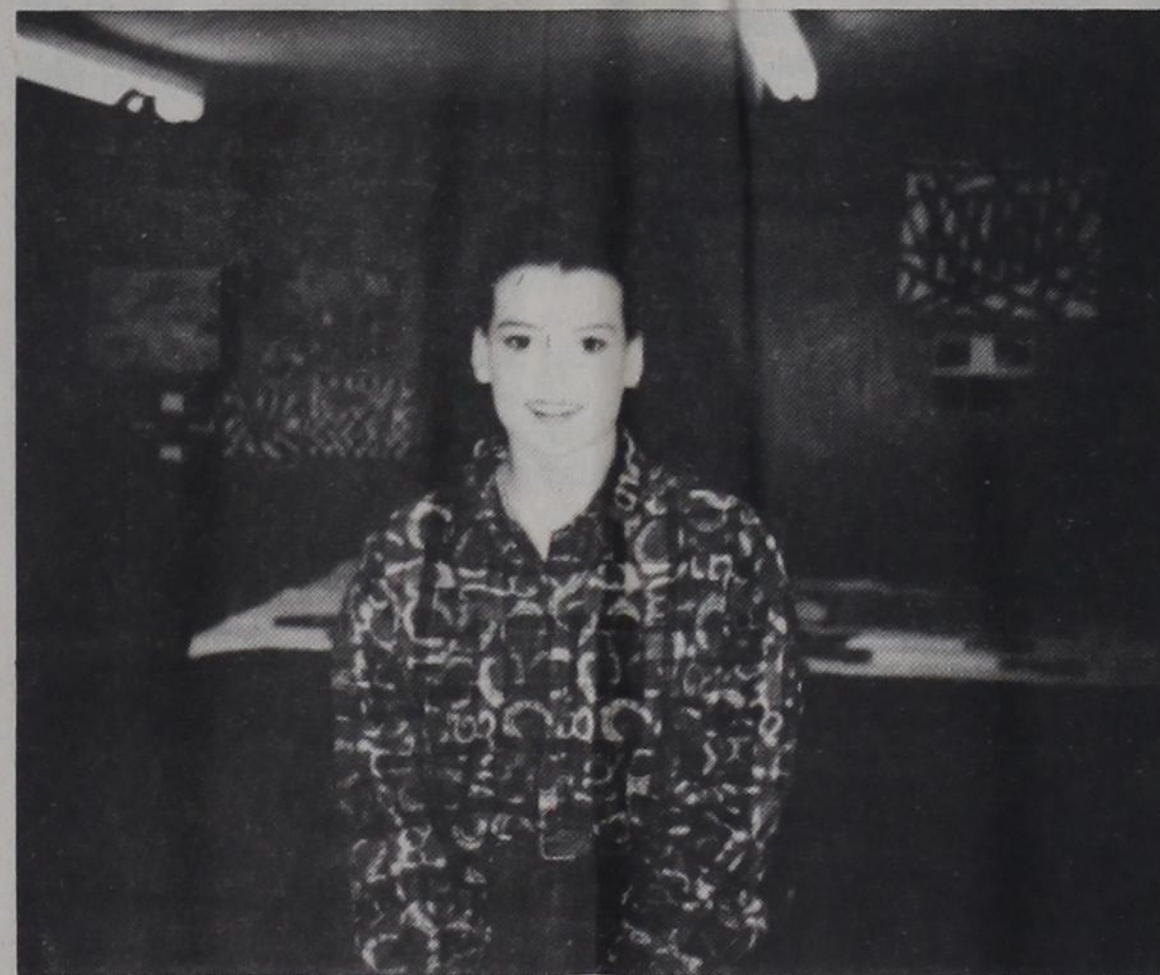
## Country Gospel Singing Nov. 12-14

## Connie Is Going Again

Cross Plains will be represented at the State Cross Country Meet again this year, and for the third year in a row Connie Steele will be making the trip.

Steele (a Junior) earned the trip to State by taking a 2nd place at the Regional Competition held in Arlington on Saturday, November 7. She ran one of her best times of the year at 12:54 for the 2 miles.

Connie had a great start in her race. By the first half mile, she had already claimed the second place position and spent the rest of the race expanding the distance between her and third place. By the end of the race she was over 100 yards ahead of third place. The 2nd place finish earned her a U.I.L. medal.

Also representing Cross Plains in the girls division was Jodi Dallas

(Sophomore). With 109 girls competing, Dallas turned in a respectable time of 14:35, her 2nd best time of the year. This earned her a 39th place finish.

In the high school boys division, Seniors Bill Steele and Carlile Albrecht competed for Cross Plains. There were 98 runners in the 3 mile race. Albrecht was 48th (after taking a spill in going over some water on the course) with a time of 19:48 which was his worst time since the first race at the beginning of the year.

Steele posted a time of 18:49 (his 2nd best time of the year) which was a 23rd place finish over the physically demanding course.

State competition will be in Georgetown on Saturday, November 14. Steele's race will begin at 10:00 a.m. at the golf course on the Georgetown University Campus.

3. Overall presentation — matting, framing consistent for best painting.
4. Comparison for final choices.

a Bachelor's Art Degree in 1956 and a Master's Art Degree from Texas Tech University in 1979. She prepared illustrations for Thorntons Department Store for thirty years and The Bootery for twenty-four years.

## City Council Minutes

Submitted by the Cross Plains City Council

**November 3, 1992**  
This was a regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. Members present were Ted McKeegan, Gary Childers, James Nichols, Tom Clark and Gene Dillard.

Gary Childers moved to accept the minutes as read. Ted McKeegan seconded and motion carried.

Len Lyons, BFI representative, met with the council to go over the yearly report and rate increase. Len informed the council that to date, the CPI has reflected a 3.0 percent increase over the past twelve months. This amounts to 28¢ per unit. In addition, landfill rates have increase 25¢ per compacted yard which translates to 10¢ per unit for a total of 38¢ per unit. However, BFI is proud to notify Cross Plains that they will not be asking for any increase on this years price. He also stated that BFI is proud to be of service

vice to the City of Cross Plains and pledges continued service in the coming year.

Warren Trammel met with the council on behalf of the Cross Plains Library. He discussed the financial condition of the Library and stated that unless the Library could come up with additional funds they would not be able to continue to operate. He asked the council to consider donating an additional approximately \$7,000.00 annually to the Library. He thanked the council for their time and the council informed him they would think about his request and get back with him.

Linda Strickland, Art Club representative, met with the council to ask that the Art Club be charged a reduced rate for the use of the Community Center due to the fact that they are a non-profit organization and they only use the center on Sunday to give out the awards and ribbons and are only in the center for a short period, but have to pay for the entire day. She thanked the council for their consideration and the council stated that they would get back to her with their decision.

Ted McKeegan moved to accept the 911 maps and logs as presented by Jedco-Design of Clyde. Gary Childers seconded and motion carried.

Tom Clark moved to allow Debbie Gosnell to purchase between 600-610 aluminum plates for the house numbers to be placed on the houses for the 911 numbering. Gary Childers seconded and motion carried.

Gary Childers moved to award the bid to Kenneth Sowell on the 40 joints of 4" x 30" irrigation pipe in the amount of \$360.00. Tom Clark seconded and motion carried with Ted McKeegan voting nay.

Ted McKeegan moved to award the bid to Rex Maxwell for the removal of two (2) galvanized, ground storage tanks in the amount of \$8,949.00. Tom Clark seconded and motion carried with James Nichols voting nay and Gary Childers abstaining from voting. It was noted that if Maxwell should decline the bid that it should be awarded to Tejas Construction out of Clyde.

James Nichols moved to wait until the next general election in May to fill the vacancy on the council. Tom Clark seconded and motion carried with Tom Clark, James Nichols and Gene Dillard voting for and Gary Childers and Ted McKeegan voting nay.

Tom Clark moved to advertise for bids on the construction of a new road located from Highway 206 down to the sewer farm. Gary Childers seconded and motion carried.

Ted McKeegan moved to pay the bills. Tom Clark seconded and motion carried.

Tom Clark moved to adjourn. James Nichols seconded and motion carried.

## Bufs End Season With A 4-2 District Record

The score may have been 42-26 in favor of the Baird Bears, but it was one of the most exciting games, and one of the best played games the C.P. Buffaloes have had all year long. For the 6 Senior players, this was their last game of their high school career and they made the most of it. Geno Fortune, Earl Meroney, and James Jones were in on some hard hitting tackles all night long. Billy Brown and Brandon Smith were both valuable on offense and defense, and Michael Cowan played a strong defensive role and made some outstanding pass interceptions.

It was the Buffs who had the first scoring drive which began only 2 plays into the game. Baird received the kickoff, but Cowan recovered the first Baird fumble, setting C.P. up at the Baird 49. Agter 3 carries by Fleming and one by Brown and a defensive pass interference call on Baird, quarterback Brock Walker handed off to Fleming who threw a perfect pass to Cowan for a 22 yard touchdown with 8:54 in the first quarter. The PAT failed, but the Buffs, for the moment were in the lead 6-0.

Then, unfortunately for the Buffs, Baird scored twice within the next 31 seconds! They took the kickoff from CP's TD and on their first play ran the ball in for the 50 yd. score, the PAT kick was good and with 8:35, the score was Baird 7 - CP 6. A few seconds later in the Buffs next possession, Brock Walker seeing the sack coming threw the ball, but a Baird defender intercepted and ran 30 yds. to the end zone putting the Bears ahead 13-6 with 8:21 left in the first quarter.

CP had 3 other possessions in the first qtr. but were unable to take advantage. Two of the possessions were due to recovery of Baird fumbles, one by Willie Nickerson and the other by

Jimmy Lee.

Baird also had 3 other possessions in the qtr. They did capitalize on the last one with :07 seconds left when they got their third TD on a 75 yd. drive. The PAT was good and the score was 21-6 going into the second qtr.

Offensively, the second qtr. was the worst for the Buffs. In CP's 4 possessions of the quarter, the Bears were able to stop the Buffalo drives. The Buffs lost one on a fumble, one a Baird 2-point safety, one when they were forced to punt, and then the clock ran down for the half.

The Buffalo defense played a tough second qtr., keeping the Bears at bay until 1:00 minute left when Baird topped of a drive with an 11 yard run for the TD. The PAT was good, making the score 30-6 at half time.

The third qtr. was scoreless for both sides. Both the Buffs and the Bears had 3 possessions in the qtr. but were unable to move the ball for a score. CP's Meroney did recover a Baird fumble at one point, but had to give the ball back on downs a few plays later.

The 4th qtr. saw 5 TDs scored, three by the Buffs and 2 by Baird. Baird scored first, finished a 31 yd. drive. The Buffs then took advantage of their possession and drove the ball 60 yds. with runs by Brock Walker, Brown, Fleming, Cowan and Kevin Switzer setting up the successful 15 yd. pass from Fleming to Smith for the TD. The PAT failed, and the score was now Baird 36 - CP 12 with 6:25 left in the game.

Baird used their next turn to move 50 yds. and score for the last time, but it was now 42-12.

CP scored again after a 70 yd. drive using 5 plays including passes to Smith and Donnie Dillard, a run by Fleming and the successful 4 yd. TD pass to Cowan from Fleming. The PAT failed, but the score was now Baird 42 CP 18.

The Buffs final score was set up when Fleming recovered a Baird fumble after CP tried the on-side kick.

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## Grazing Period Opened November 1, 1992

The official grazing period opened November 1, 1992, for acreage conservation reserve (ACR), or land designated as conserving use (CU) for payment under the 1992 acreage reduction programs.

Scott Odom, County Executive Director of the Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said farm program participants are now authorized to graze their ACR and CU acreage.

Farm program participants are not permitted to graze ACR or CU for payment land during the 5-month nongrazing period set by the State ASC committee. The nongrazing period in Callahan County runs from June 1, 1992 to November 1, 1992.

Now that the prohibited grazing

period has passed, Odom cautions farmers against overgrazing the acreage so as to maintain sufficient cover to prevent wind and water erosion.

"Producers must comply with grazing and conservation regulations as stipulated in the program contract to maintain farm program benefits." ASCS official Odom said those who fail to do so will be out of compliance and could lose payments and other program benefits.

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by ASCS is established by law without regard to race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin, marital status, physical or mental handicap, political affiliation, or sponsorship club.

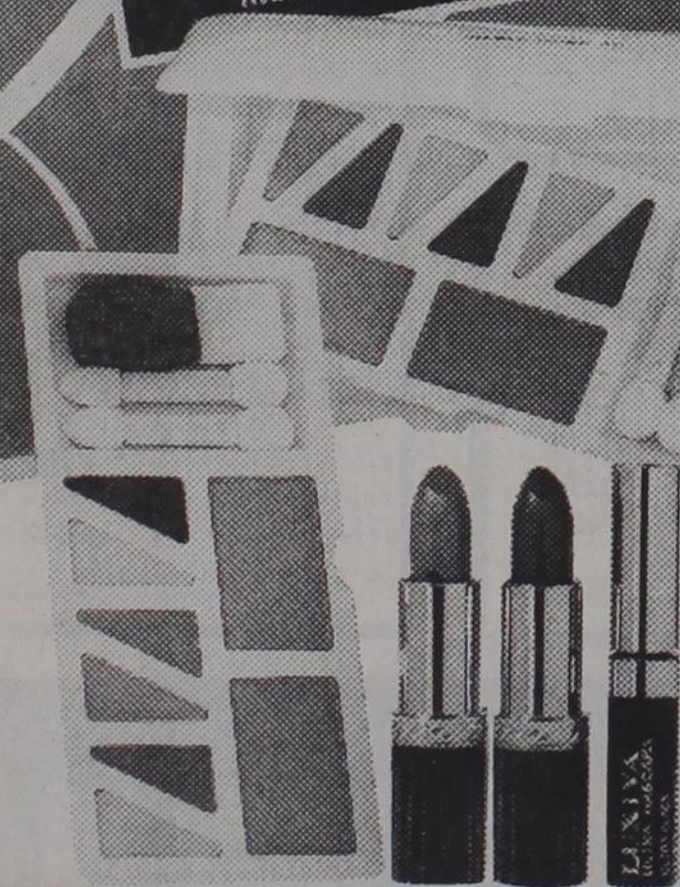
