She was independent and what I lovingly called "stubborn." I gave her credit for that particular trait in myself. Granny was a person who kept the conversation lighthearted and fun. You never knew what to expect, because she was so spontaneous.

Knox Waggoner mentioned at her beautiful service that she had a particular attraction to children and, indeed, she did. She had the ability to make little ones feel important and worthy of attention. He also shared the fun times the children had playing in the room upstairs at her Cottonwood home.

The big room was filled with clothing, hats, evening gowns, recital costumes, and some dolls, which children found fascinating. They would go dress up and then the style show began. All were creative in their outfits and entertaining. The children were particularly well satisfied playing in their imaginative world.

You can't speak about Granny without recalling her driving experiences. We always teased and said she drove as fast as her age, which would be moving on. She was able to drive until a few short months ago. I loved her tale about the time a buffalo ran into the side of her car on the way to Cottonwood. However, there was a buffalo roaming around the area at that time and she was very serious about her encounter.

What can I say? She was a "hoot," as my aunt, Joe Watson, would proclaim. She could brighten your day with some of her antics or stories from the past.

Never caring for material items, gifts to her had a way of disappearing. If anyone wanted them, it was fine with her. Actually, she didn't need material gifts because she was blessed with more important abilities, and had learned the secret of happiness.

Granny was fearless and had faith in the Lord. I have recently read the book, "Within Heaven's Gates," by Rebecca Springer after a friend's suggestion, and it has been very comforting with the passing of two loved ones.

We miss their presence, but their memory will be forever in our hearts.

Meeting Held On April 19 In Eula To Discuss Constitutional Amendments

About 100 county residents took advantage of a public meeting held Monday, April 19 in Eula to discuss the upcoming May 1 Constitutional Amendment Election.

Bill Grusendorf and Robert Clanton spoke to the group in favor of the three propositions placed on the May 1 ballot. Grusendorf is currently San Saba superintendent and serves as executive director for the Texas Association of Rural Schools and the legislative co-chairman of the Equity Center. Clanton is Balmerhea superintendent and is vice president of Texas Association of Rural Schools. He is also on the board of directors of the Equity Center and a member of the executive committee of the Texas Association of Community Schools.

Most of the 100 residents attending the public meeting appeared in favor of the three ballot propositions. Only one resident spoke out against the propositions stating the proposition would do nothing but take away the resident's rights.

Clanton spoke first and outlined the historic perspective of the public school finance problems facing Texas.

He stated legislative leaders have known since 1968 the solution to solve the current school finance problem. Clanton stated the first solution is to put more state money in public education. The second is by massive school consolidation, the third solution is by capping the expenditures of all school dis-

tricts and the fourth is a combination of any of the previous three.

Clanton said if Proposition #1 fails on the May 1 ballot, the only other way to comply with the constitutionality is by consolidation of school districts.

Grusendorf said all issues have two sides and "I'm on the side of equity." He stated the school finance issue is not about raising taxes. "There is going to be a tax increase, not because of Proposition #1, but because of the state deficit," Grusendorf said.

Grusendorf said the people against the propositions are involved in oil, chemicals and electric companies.

"If we do not support Proposition #1, we'll shoot ourselves in the foot," Grusendorf said. "This amendment will allow us to equalize without consolidation."

specific behavioral disorder characterized by chronic problems with attention, impulsiveness, and/or hyperactivity or restlessness which are inappropriate for a child's age. The following is a list of symptoms associated with ADD: 1) Fidgets or squirms excessively; 2) Has difficulty remaining seated; 3) Is easily distracted; 4) Has difficulty waiting his or her turn; 5) Blurts out answers to questions; 6) Has difficulty sustaining attention; 7) Shifts between incompleting activities; 8) Has difficulty playing quietly; 9) Talks excessively; 10) Interrupts or intrudes on others; 11) Does not seem to listen; 12) Often loses things; 13) Engages in physically dangerous activities without considering possible consequences.

Individually, these symptoms are considered normal behavior at various stages of development and do not indicate the presence of an attention disorder. An ADD child, however, consistently is unable to control his or her behavior and continues to demonstrate behavior inappropriate for his or her age and for particular environments. Some children may not demonstrate the constant motor activity characteristic of ADD, but still have significant attention related problems with school work, family life, and with other children. This condition is believed to be neurologically based and first appears in early childhood. Left untreated, ADD can significantly interfere with an individual's self-esteem, ability to learn, and social development. Although estimates vary regarding the number of individuals with the disorder, ADD widely is believed to affect approximately 2-5% of school age children.

Dr. Brinkman will be discussing several aspects of Attention Deficit Disorder, including how to recognize ADD, what to do if your child has ADD, and treatment of ADD. Dr. Brinkman will also answer any questions not covered at the end of the discussion.

The PTO strongly urges anyone who has a child with ADD or who is interested in finding out more about ADD to attend. Attention Deficit Disorder is not just a "school" disability, but affects all aspects of life. Parents, teachers, grandparents, uncles and aunts, day care providers or even just a friend of the family are welcomed to come and hear Dr. Brinkman. The information you receive here could make a difference in a child's school and everyday life.

April 6, 1993

This was a regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. Members present were Mayor Gene Dillard, Ted McKeehan, James Nichols, and Tom Clark.

Gary Childers moved to accept the minutes of the previous meetings as read. Tom Clark seconded and motion carried. Huey Rose met with council concerning Beech Street, north of 11th Street. He asked the council's permission to fence off 30' of this street since this street had never been opened and was not being maintained at this time. He advised the council that he would like to fence off the street and to maintain it in order to keep down pest, rodents, etc. from his property. The council advised Mr. Rose that they would need to look into the matter further and would be in touch with him as to their decision.

The council discussed the community center. They discussed the pricing for the fence to keep people from driving on the grass up to the tennis courts and out to the pavilion. It was pointed out that there were "NO PARKING SIGNS" located at the park, however most patrons did not adhere to the signs. Kindergarten Screening Tues., April 27

Parents are asked to pre-register their children who will enter Kindergarten next fall. All children who will be five years of age on or before September 1, 1993, may attend Kindergarten. Kindergarten is a basic part of the Cross Plains School system and the service is available to all students.

Kindergarten screening will be conducted Tuesday, April 27 at Cross Plains Elementary School. Please call the Elementary Principal's office at 725-6123 to make an appointment for your child. The screening will take about sixty minutes. Each student's hearing, vision, speech, motor skills, language ability, and developmental growth will be evaluated at this time. Parents will be given a report on their children's progress at the time of the screening.

Parents are reminded that to enter school in Texas the student must have a state approved birth certificate and a current immunization record. Immunization requirements include: three in a series of DTP and/or a booster after age 4, oral polio series, measles, mumps, and rubella. Please bring the birth certificate, immunization record, and social security number at the time of registering.

Early childhood screening will be conducted at the same time as regular Kindergarten screening. The early childhood program is to help those children age 3-6 who show to be developmentally delayed or handicapped in any way. If you have, or know of a child who might benefit from this service, please contact the elementary school office during Kindergarten registration.

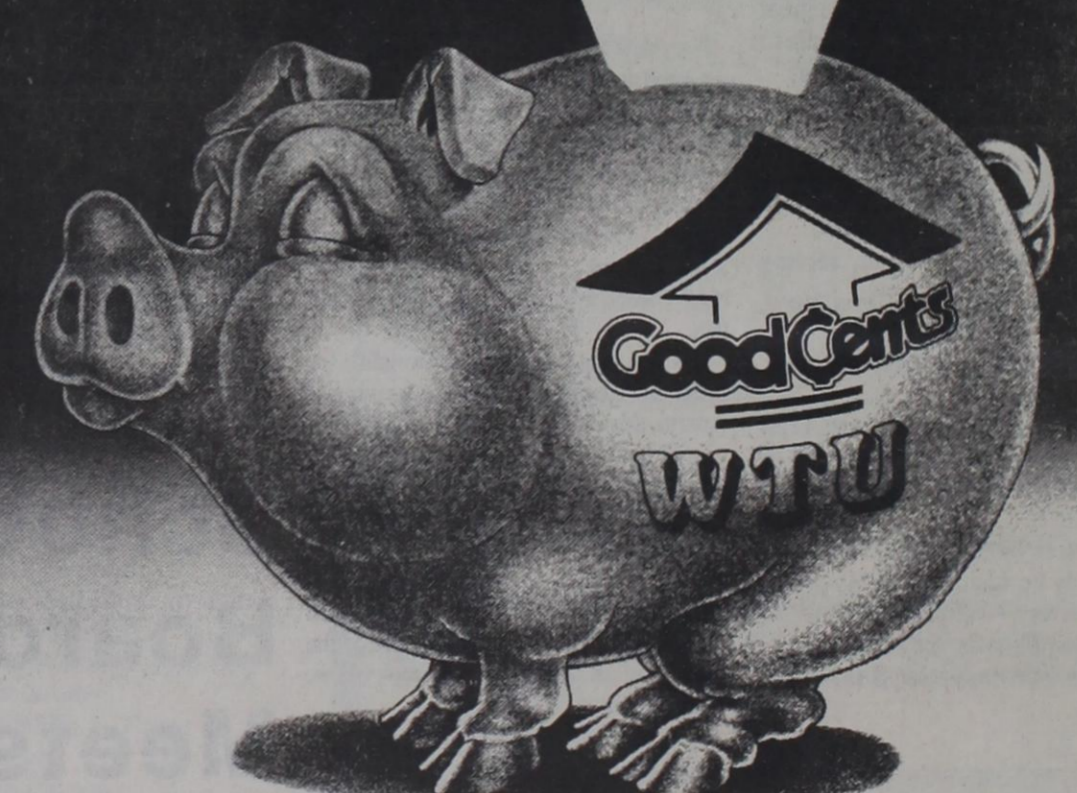

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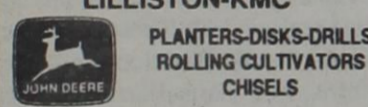

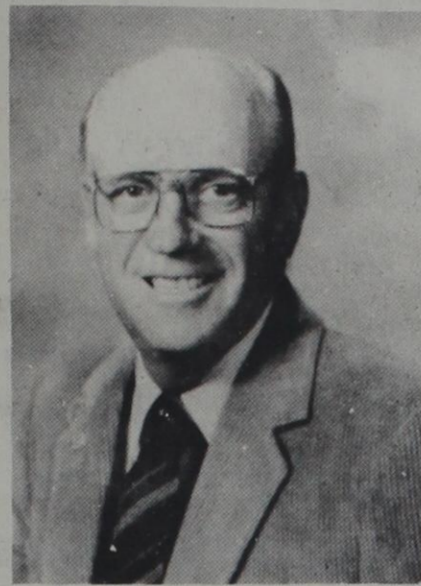
