The evening of entertainment is sure to enhance your Christmas spirit.


Gospel Singing And Supper At Cottonwood Saturday, December 5

Refreshments will be served and consumed in the foyer area of the gym


No street shoes will be allowed on the gym floor.

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

Accidental discovery may end obesity

WASHINGTON - Researchers may have discovered a way to end obesity - by accident!

In a study with a potential cholesterol lowering agent, scientists noted an unusual side effect. Instead of lower cholesterol levels, patients receiving a natural plant colloid lost weight while body weight in a control group remained constant.

The scientists say the mechanism behind the weight loss is not clear, but suggest it is partially due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calories. Scientists in another study published in the British Journal of Nutrition, found that patients consuming the same colloid lost weight in spite of being instructed not to alternormal eating patterns. Despite this evidence, other scientists may not agree on the weight loss benefits of colloids. Someday, pending further study, there could be universal agreement that colloids are helpful in confronting the problem of obesity.

National Dietary Research, whose research topics have been the subject of articles published in recent medical and nutritional journals, has successfully incorporated a series of colloids into a chewable food tablet called FS-1. When used as directed. FS-1 replaces high calorie fats with lower calorie nutrients, thus providing optimum nutrition with a minimum number of fat calories. According to an article published in the American Journal of Clinical Nutrition, consciously limiting the amount of food one consumes is not necessary to lose weight, provided you limit the fat

Clyde is the only Callahan County town to report retail sales increase this year over last year. Clyde is reporting 1992 city one percent sales tax payments 8.23 percent higher than last year. Baird's retail sales are down 1.28 percent from last year, Cross Plains reports sales 2.63 percent lower than last year. Putnam is reporting sales 8.51 percent behind last year.

John Sharp, State Comptroller, said that 1992 sales tax payments in Clyde are running 8.23 percent ahead of tax payments made to the city in 1991. He said that the sales tax rebates for the City of Clyde have amounted to \$83,262.71 so far in 1992, a 8.23 percent increase in sales taxes payments compared to the same time period last year. The 1991 payments to the city during the same payment period were \$76,932.01.

The city's monthly payment in 1992 is also ahead of last year's monthly payment. Clyde sales tax payment for November 1992 is \$11,645.60, up 4.91 percent from the November 1991 payment of \$11,100.05.

Other Callahan County towns reporting sales tax payments include:

—The City of Baird reported that sales tax payments in 1992 are 1.28 percent behind 1991 payments. The city had received \$33,857.92 so far in 1992, while the 1991 tax payments to the city were \$34,297.69.

The town's monthly payment for November 1992 is 4.41 percent higher than the November 1991 payment. The November 1992 payment was \$5,480.91, while the November 1991 payment to Baird was \$5,249.28.

—The City of Cross Plains is reporting 1992 one percent city sales tax payments running 2.63 percent lower than the 1991 payments of the tax. Cross Plains 1992 sales tax payments have amounted to \$48,705.18, while the 1991 sales tax rebates were \$50,023.11.

The city's monthly sales tax check for November 1992 totaled \$5,768.25. The 1992 monthly check is 6.49 percent behind the November 1991 rebate to Cross Plains of \$6,168.51.

Countywide, sales tax payments in 1992 for Callahan County are running 2.19 percent ahead of the 1991 payments in the county. Callahan County towns have received sales tax payments in 1992 amounting to \$174,713.83 while the 1991 payments to the county towns totalled \$170,967.34.

The rebates in Callahan County for the month of November 1992 were \$23,771.58, a 3.42 percent decrease from the November 1991 payments of \$24,614.29.

Some area towns reporting sales tax payments for the 1992 year to date and whether it's an increase or decrease over 1991 sales include: Albany, \$85,564.33 in 1992, 4.13 percent decrease from 1991; Anson, \$96,839.60 in 1992, 42.62 percent increase from 1991; Stamford, \$311,428.53, a 3.37 percent decrease from 1991; Cisco, \$140,156.52 in 1992, a 2.40 percent increase from 1991; Eastland, \$337,7716.33 in 1992, a 3.69 percent increase from 1991; Merkel, \$70,834.03 in 1992, a 3.37 percent decrease from 1991; Ballinger, \$441,571.27 in 1992, 8.54 percent increase from 1991; and Haskell, \$209,535.73 in 1992, a 48.38 percent increase from 1991.

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All Public Schools To Be Audited

Due to the overwhelming response from private citizens and elected officials, the State Auditor's Office's Management Audit of Public Schools (MAPS) will now be expanded to include ALL school districts in Texas.

The continuation of the public school audits was requested by Governor Ann Richards, Lt. Governor Bob Bullock, and Speaker Gib Lewis.

State Auditor Larry Alwin said, "The leadership of Texas wants the citizens to know they are searching for savings at every level, and our Office intends to continue to assist them." He said auditors will be looking for the school districts which have implemented costsaving ideas that can be passed on to other districts as well as pointing out school districts who are not doing the best job possible.

"The order in which school districts will be audited has not been determined as yet; however, each school district selected for an audit will be notified when the schedule has been completed," said Alwin. A proposal for MAPS II,

Merchants collect the state and local sales tax and send it to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its 6 1/4 percent share and returns the local one percent sales tax each month to local governments. Cities and counties may levy a combined tax of up to two percent above the state's sales tax, however all Callahan County towns only levy a one percent city sales tax, Sharp said.

The November checks include taxes collected on September sales and reported in October by businesses filing monthly sales tax returns with the state. Businesses file either monthly, quarterly or annually depending on the amount of sales tax they collect.

All local sales taxes must be approved by local voters and may be used for any legal city or county expenses. Most areas put the money in their General Fund and use it for normal operations like fire fighting, maintaining roads and law enforcement, Sharp said. outlining the continuation of the project, will be presented to the Legislative Audit Committee in the next few weeks.
