When the carcass results came back from an Oklahoma City packing plant Wednesday, Chandra Scout from Abilene took the trophy and $\$ 525$ prize for the Grand Champion Pork Carcass of the 1993 West Texas Fair.
In last week's live swine judging, which reaured almost 300 entries in Abilene
from throughout Texas, the hog was from throughout Texas, the hog was
second in its hearyweight class. Butafter the terminal trip to the packing house, the three-fourths Hampshire and one-fourth Yorkshire pig clearly cut out the grand carcass.
The 252 -pound live-weight hog produced 187-pound hot carcass with 5/10-of-an-inch backfat and a phenomenal
loin eye of 8.6 square inches. loin eye of 8.6 square inches.
Chandra's hog yielded 113.75 pounds
of lean meat - or 60.829 percent lan of lean meat - or 60.829 percent lean.

Wet insulation is less effective and the moisture can damage your home's structure. Onc place you don't vents; the attic necds ventilation to prevent unwanted moisturc. - Check the duct insulation to sec that all tears and separations are taped and
the insulation is securcly wrapped around the ducts. Ducts that aren't much as 20 percent of heated and cooled paying to heat and cool your attic as well as your home, and wasting energy and dollars.
- Check floor over unheated areas, such as crawl spaces, garages or baseof heat loss in an otherwise well-insulated house. ## Save Hot Water Cost Without Switching To Cold Showers

AUSTIN, TX - September 27 - A
water heater fueled by propane could save the average Texas family nearly $\$ 200$ a year compared to the cost of heating water electrically, while at the same time benefiting the environment and creating jobs in Texas. That's the message of the Railroad Commission's new newspaper and radio advertising campaign that kicks off
statewide this week. statewide this week. The campaign is
part of the Commission's legislative mandate to educate Texans about propane's benefits as and environmentally beneficial alternative fuel. Commission studies show the initial expense of installing a propane-fueled water heater is no higher than other types, but the return on investment is much faster. According to Chairman James E. (Jim) Nugent, fuel-cost savings rewt two years. "That's about a 50 percent annual return on investment," Nugent said, "which is considerably more than you get at the bank." Assuming typical delivered costs of 82 cents per gallon for propanc, savings over the ten-year lifc of the water heater could total more than $\$ 2,000$, Nugent added.
A major reason for propanc's cconomy is its efficiency compared to other methods of energy production. More that two-thirds of the energy generated by oil- or coal-burming electric utility and is therefore lost at the sourcc. Propanc, a clean-buming primary fucl, is nearly $21 / 2$ times as efficient, delivering 87 percent of its energy percent of its energy directly to the burner tip. Propane is widely distributed and
readily available throughout. "Morc readny a avairable throughout. Morc than a third of the nation's propanc
comes from Texas," noted Commiscomes Mary Scout Nabers. "Tcxas has a statc-wide propane production and distribution network in place, and the more people take advantage of propanc as a domestic and commercial heating fucl, the more jobs that network creates." Nabers added that a new market worth \$65 million a year to the Texas economy
ould arise if the 60 to 70 percent of al propane-heated Texas households that propane.
Propane technology has also become efficient in recent years. Today's propane water heater uses one third less fuel ran heaters manufactured as recently as five years ago, which contributes to the fuel's economy. Advanced burmer degis, energy-saving temperaure conof every gallon of fuel. Texas' environ of fuc sing propane to heat water, according o Commissioner Barry Williamson. ${ }^{\text {n }}$ Air pollution concerns all Texans, in both urban and rural arcas," Williamson said. "Gallon for gallon," Williamson added, "it takes nearly three times as much fuel, gencrating nearly threc times much ozone-depleting greenhouse to heat it directly with propane." Quick recovery is a primary befent propane water heaters. Anyone who has ver run out of hot water in the middle of shower, especially in cold weather, will approciate the prospect of having plenty of hot water on tap. In a comparison of the first-hour recovery rates of typical 40 -gallon water heaters, the ropane model provided nearly twice as ime as a comparable electric model. This program is called the Service Members Occupational Conversion and Training Act 1992 (SMOCTA)
Veteran Eligibility---Tobe eligible for
participation under SMOCTA, a
Veteran must have:
(a) been discharged under other than dishonorable condiuons on or after active military service for a period of more than 90 days with duty in Desert Storm noted on Form DD-214 OR (2) been discharged or released from clive duty because of a service connected disability.
For the purposes of SMOCTA, the Veteran must also meet one of the following requirements.
(a) separated from the active military service and whose primary or secondary
military occupational code in the Armed military occupational code in the Armed
Forces is (as determined under regulations prescribed by the Secretary and in effect before the date of such separation) not readily transferable to he civilian workforce; OR
(b) served in the active military service and is entitled to compensation (or who but for the receipt of military retirement pay would be entitled to compensation) under the laws administered by the Disability rating of 30 percent Disab
OR
(c) been unemployed at the time of applying for participation in the program and unemployed for at least 8 of the 15 weeks immediately preceding the date of such eligible person's application for participation in a SMOCTA program. An eligible person shall be considered $t$ be unemployed job and wants and is available for work. In determining whether a person is unemployed, V A shall not take into consideration part-time (a job that
