# Farmer, Grider Win Buck-Out April 16 Commissioner Posts In Run-Off Election

Bryan Farmer and Charlie Grider will be new county commissioners in Callahan County after winning the posts in the Tuesday, April 12 Democratic Party Run-Off Election.

Farmer, a Eula resident, defeated Terry Ellis for the Precinct #2 Commissioner post, 221 to 195 votes. Farmer took 53 percent of the vote, while Ellis had 46 percent of the vote.

Grider beat Kenneth Sowell for the Precinct #4 Commissioner seat, 389 to 211 votes. Grider captured 64 percent of the votes to Sowell's 35 percent of the vote.

Grider and Farmer are guaranteed of winning the seats because there will be no Republican challenger in the November General Election. Other Callahan County run-off election results included:

Richard Fisher had 63 percent of the vote or 834, to 36 percent or 470 votes for Jim Mattox for the Democratic nominee for U.S. Senate. Raul Gonzalez had 56 percent of the vote or 716 votes, to 562 or 43 percent of the votes for Rene Haas for the post of Justice, Supreme Court, Place 1.

Betty Marshall had 53 percent or 625 votes to 46 percent or 535 votes for Gene Kelly for the post Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2. There were 1,375 votes cast in Callahan County.

Gary Childers moved to accept the minutes of the previous meeting with the following exception. The council informed Phyllis Pancake that she would need to file a complaint in order for the council to pursue the cleaning of the property in question. Tom Clark seconded and motion carried.

Ray Purvis moved to accept the agreement between the Callahan County Aging Services and the City of Cross Plains, allocating \$4,000 in financial support, appoint the Mayor as the Chief Executive Officer to sign any such local agreements and appoint Tommy Clark and Gary Childrs to the Executive Board to represent and/or speak on behalf of the city. Leon Nixon seconded and motion car-

Johnnie Bland met with the council concerning closing the alley between 13th and 14th streets and between Main and Avenue D. Gary Childers moved to allow the Blands to close the alley with the stipulation that the City Council have access to the property at any time. Leon Nixon seconded and motion carried.

Tom Clark moved to order the May 7 general election. Gary Childers seconded and motion carried.

James Nichols moved to appoint Vickey Worley as the election judge for the city election. Leon Nixon seconded and motion carried.

The mayor informed the council that the May 7 election would be held this year at the Senior Citizens Center at 116 N. Main due to a conflict in activities at the Community Center.

The council discussed the community center rates. Gary Childers moved to set the rate for 1-6 hours at \$45 and \$100 deposit. Six or more hours at \$75 and \$100 deposit, with the ability to rent the center from year to year as desired with \$100 deposit paid at the time of reser-

If lightning struck a tree and caused it to fall — in a forest where there was neither man nor beast to hear it - would it make a noise when it fell?"

Remember the old debate? It has been waged in many classrooms; it has always ended without ever being resolved. Such a question and the uncertainty of any resolving answer, I am sure, arises from and points out the foolish side of man. It also implies man's selfcenteredness in thinking he is the center of the universe and all existence.

We must recognize man's role in God's scheme of creation — that he is important (Genesis 1:26, 27), but that he is not the center of the universe. It helps to read such scriptures as Job 38, where God asked Job some penetrating questions: "Where were you when I laid the foundation of the earth? Tell Me, since you have understanding, who set its measurements, since you know?" Well there were about forty questions in all, and Job couldn't answer them - except maybe to shrug his shoulders and say, "I don't know!"

And so, David, in the Psalms, asks: "What is man that You are mindful of him... For You have made him a little lower than the angels and crowned him with glory and honor. You have made him to have dominion over the works of Your hands; You have put all things under his feet ... " (Psalm 8:4-6) But then he says, verse 9, "O Lord, our Lord, How excellent is Your name in all the earth!"

translates into greater profits for the producer," says Walker. Sound management of pastures includes such practices as proper grazing/haying, practices such as prescribed burning.

One of the most important factors to consider when managing improved pastures is proper grazing and haying. As a rule, pasture production can be improved dramatically with the be applied per acre to maintain implementation of a rotational grazing system. This allows pastures to rest and regain vigor. Improved grasses are managed differently according to their growth habit. Sod/turf forming grasses such as Common bermudagrass and Buffalograss should be allowed to reach a minimum height of 4" before initial grazing in the spring. A minimum height of 2" should be left after grazing to maintain a healthy, vigorous stand. A minimum rest period of 28-32 days between grazing/haying is used in this County to increase forage recommended to produce the highest quality forage. The short grasses such as Coastal and Giant bermudagrass should be allowed to reach a minimum height of 6" before initial spring grazing. Cattle should be rotated to another pasture when the grass has been grazed down to a height of 3". A 28-32 day rest period between grazing/haying is suggested in order to maintain a healthy stand of grass. Mid-grasses such as Kleingrass, assistance in applying sound Old World bluestems, Sideoats grama and lovegrass should be allowed to reach a minimum height of 8" in the spring before grazing begins. Cattle should be rotated when grass is grazed down to a height of 4". A longer rest period of 40-45 days is recommended to maintain the highest production. Tallgrasses such as Switchgrass and Indiangrass should not be grazed in the spring until a minimum height of 12" is reached. A minimum height of 6" is recommended after grazing to maintain

important factor to consider when attempting to maximize forage production. A soil test is strongly recommended to get the highest quality fertilizing, weed control and other and quality of forage for your money. These tests are easy to conduct and only cost around \$10. Soil testing kits can be picked up at the SCS office in Baird at no charge. If no soil test is used, a minimum fertilizer formulation of 40-40-0 should production.

Another critical factor to consider for maximum production is weed control. The best approach for week control is chemical application with a herbicide such as Grazon P+D. This method gives you the best control for your money. If no herbicide applications are done, then shredding weeds prior to bloom stage is recommended to reduce weedy competition.

Another practice that is commonly production and control weeks is prescribed burning in late winter. This practice is relatively inexpensive and has achieved excellent results.

With proper planning and a little effort, sound pasture management can dramatically improve forage production and quality and increase profits.

### ASCS -Farm Program

"Farmers have only 2 more weeks to sign up and become eligible for program benefits on their 1994 wheat, feed grains, cotton and rice crops," Scott Odom, CED of the Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said. The sign-up

period ends April 29th. He said producers will not have the opportunity to change their mind and sign-up after this deadline. Producers who have already enrolled and those who sign up before April 29th, have the option of withdrawing and returning any advance payments.

To be eligible for price support loans and target price protection on this year's crops, farmers are required to meet acreage reduction requirements of 11 percent for upland cotton. "There are no acreage idling requirements for wheat, corn, grain sorghum, oats, barley and rice," Odom said.

Target prices protect farmers' income if market prices fall below the federallyestablished levels. Through the ASCS price support loan program, farmers can obtain interim financing to operate and have time to wait for a better market.

Additionally, the 1994 farm programs offer advance payments in cash and flexible planting options.

"If producers do not sign up, they should clearly understand that they will not be eligible for benefits offered under the 1994 programs," ASCS official Odom said.

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by ASCS is established by law without regard to race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin, marital status, physical or mental handicap, political affiliation, or sponsorship club.


