Farmer, Grider Win Commissioner Posts In Run-Off Election

Bryan Farmer and Charlie Grider will be new county commissioner in Callahan County after winning the posts in the Tuesday, April 12 Democratic Party Run-Off Election
Farmer, a Eula resident, defeated Terry Ellis for the Precinct \#2 Commissioner post, 221 to 195 votes. Farmer took 53 percent of the e, while Ellis had 46 percent of the vote.
Grider beat Kenneth Sowell for the Precinct \#4 Commissioner seat 389 to 211 votes. Grider captured 64 percent of the votes to Sowell's 35 percent of the vote.
Grider and Farmer are guaranteed of winning the seats because there will be no Republican challenger in the November General Election. Other Callahan County run-off election results included:
Richard Fisher had 63 percent of the vote or 834 , to 36 percent or 470 otes for Jim Mattox for the Democratic nominee for U.S. Senate. Raul Gonzalez had 56 percent of the vote or 716 votes, to 562 or 43 ercent of the votes for Rene Haas for the post of Justice, Supreme Court, Place 1
Betty Marshall had 53 percent or 625 votes to 46 percent or 535 votes for Gene Kelly for the post Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2 There were 1,375 votes cast in Callahan County.

Remember the old debate? It has been waged in many classrooms; it has always ended without ever being resolved. Such a question and the uncertainty of any resolving answer, I am sure, anises trom and points out the foolish side of man. It also implies man's self-

translates into greater profits for the producer, says Walker. Sound manactices as proper grazing/haying frrilizing, weed control and other practices such as prescribed burning. One of the most important factors to consider when managing improved pastures is proper grazing and haying. As a rule, pasture production can be improved dramatically with the implementation of a rotational grazing system. This allows pastures to rest and regain vigor. Improved grasses are growth habit. Sod/turf forming grasses such as Common bermudagrass and Buffalograss should be allowed to reach a minimum height of $4^{\prime \prime}$ before initial grazing in the spring. A minimum height of 2 " should be left after grazing to maintain a healthy, vigorous stand. A minimum rest period of $28-32$ day
between grazing/haying is
recommended to produce the highest quality forage. The short grasses such as Coastal and Giant bermudagrass should be allowed wreach a minum heightof
$6 "$ before initial spring grazing Catle should be rotated to another pature when the grass has been grazed down to a height of $3^{\prime \prime}$. A 28-32 day rest period between grazing/haying is suggested in order to maintain a healthy stand of grass. Mid-grasses such as Kleingrass, Old World bluestems, Sideoats grama and lovegrass should be allowed to reach a minimum height of $8^{\prime \prime}$ in the spring before grazing begins. Cattle should be rotated when grass is grazed down to a height of $4^{\prime \prime}$. A longer rest maintain the highest production. Tall maintain he highest production. Tal grasses such as $S$ witchgrass and
Indiangrass should not be grazed in the spring until a minimum height of $12^{\prime \prime}$ is reached. A minimum height of $6^{\prime \prime}$ is recommended after grazing to maintain a vigorous stand. A $40-45$ day rest period between grazing/haying is also
