Veterans News

LOWER HOME LOANRATES-The Texas Veterans Land Board has announced new lower rates for home loans. Veterans who entered the armed services before December 31, 1976 and who have been discharged for less than 30 years are eligible for 5.65 percent on 15 year loans and 5.95 percent on 20, 25, and 30 year loans.

All other veterans will contine to pay 6.49 percent on a 15 year loan and 6.99 percent on a 20, 25, and 30 year loan. Restrictions imposed by the 1986 federal tax reform act are the reasons for the difference in the rates.

The land purchase loans remain at 7.79 percent for all Veterans. The home improvement loan rate has been reduced to 6.75 percent for Vietnam era Veterans, and remains at 7.80 percent for all other Veterans.

While the maximum amount of a loan a Veteran can receive through the VLB is \$45,000, home purchases are not limited to that price range. Veterans who want to buy a home costing more than that amount can combine their VLB loan with a FHA, VA or conventional loan to reduce their overall interest burden.

Home loans up to \$45,000, land purchase loans up to \$20,000 and home improvement loans up to \$25,000 make a total package of \$90,000 available to eligible Veterans.

BUSINESS LOANS-G I Bills no longer cover business loans. Veterans interested in obtaining SBA loans should apply through the Service Corps of Retired Executives (SCORE). The organization is located on the second floor of the Post Office Building, SBA/SCORE, Post Office Bldg., Room 2106, Abilene, Tx 79601. The telephone is 915-677-1857. TEXAS COLLEGE SAVINGS BONDS-Capital appreciation bonds are being issued by the Texas Veterans Land Board in April, 1994. These bonds will mature in 5 to 20 years and are priced at \$275 to \$750. All will mature at \$1,000. A bond purchased for \$275 will produce \$725 of tax-free income to the initial purchaser who holds the bond to maturity. These are a great way to provide college costs for your child or grandchild. Merrill Lynch & Co. (1-800-MERRILL, Ext. 6689) is the primary

EDUCATIONAL LOANS-Navy and Marine Corps Veterans and retirees who need assistance paying for college, graduate school or private high school are eligible for loans from a program called ALL AHEAD, a private creditbased education loan program accessible to Department of the Navy civilian, active duty, reserve, retired and former members of the Navy and Marine Corps. For information about eligibility, application forms, disbursements or borrower obligations and responsibilities, call 1-800-767-5626.

NEW NATIONAL CEMETERY-The Dallas - Ft. Worth National Cemetery will be located in Southwest Dallas Hill Country on the eastern shore of Mountain Creek Lake. It is bounded on the east by Spur 408 and fronts on Kiest Blvd. to the south and is adjacent to the Dallas Baptist University. Master Planning and Phase 1 Design Development are under way. Land acquisition funding has been provided for fiscal year 1994. 
According to Mr. Morgan, Mandi Sowell, daughter of Stuart and Barbara Sowell, has met these requirements all year as a Cross Plains band member.

Training

One of the state requirements for all Texas school board members is school board training. Each school board member must attend a minimum of six (6) hours of training per year.

In addition, a newly elected board member is required to complete a minimum of twenty (20) hours before the next board election. There are several ways credit may be earned. Attending workshops and seminars in the local area is the most common method. These workshops and seminars are usually held at night or on weekends in order not to interfere with the board member's other responsibilities.

Sites for the workshops and seminars are held at area schools, area universities, or the Region 14 Educational Service Center in Abilene. The majority of the workshops are presented by the Education Service Center staff and other professional organizations such as the Texas Association of School Boards, Texas Association of School Administrators, Texas Association of Community Schools and other organizations of a similar nature.

All the Cross Plains I.S.D. board members have met or exceeded the basic six (6) hour requirement for the 93/94 school year.




Attention Senior Citizens

Are you a senior citizen who needs information about or assistance with health insurance and public benefits? The Area Agency on Aging of the West Central Texas Council of Governments can provide free confidential help with Medicare, Medicaid, and other health insurance and public benefits. This program is called HICAP and it provides help in understanding and solving problems related to health insurance coverage, such as Medicare and Medicaid.

The Area Agency on Aging recruits, trains and supervises all volunteers and serves as the headquarters for the program. Volunteers receive training about Medicare, Medicaid, supplemental insurance, and long term care insurance. They also receive training concerning Social Security benefits, Supplemental Security Income, the Qualified Medicare Beneficiary (QMB) program, the Specified Low-Income Medicare Beneficiary (SLMB) program, food stamps and other income support programs.

The volunteers are trained to assist individuals 60 and over to better understand Medicare, Medicaid benefits, explore medicaid eligibility and apply for benefits. Volunteers are also trained to help individuals review and organize doctor and hospital bills, as well as provide information about advance directives such as the "Living Will" or "Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care".

If you need help with your benefits or feel that you might be eligible for assistance but do not know how to apply, the Area Agency on Aging can put you in contact with a Volunteer Benefits Counselor in your area. 
