PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH AT CROSS PLAINS

Presbyterian Church History Told

The present United Presbyterian Church dates its beginning to August 9, 1896 at Cottonwood. The Reverend W.E. Green, who lived in Sabanno Community, was the leader of the Cumberland Presbyterian group. The original charter members included the following: J.W. Gage, M.J. Gage, S. R. Harris, M. E. Harris, S. B. Harris, H. Harpole, N. E. Harpole, W. V. Orr, Belle Orr, S. S. Ramsey, W. R. Brown, Mollie Brown, R. S. Tipton, Caroline Sullivan, and Elias Norton.

Three years later, on December 8, 1899, the Church moved to Cross Plains and the name was changed to Cross Plains Presbyterian Church by the Presbytery, the church's ruling body.

The church used an old school located west of the present cemetery; and on April 20, 1911, was incorporated by the State of Texas as "The First Presbyterian Church of America". The purpose of said corporation as formed is to support public worship, charitable and missionary work, able to hold and convey both real and personal property in such manner as may be necessary to further the interest of said corporation as a religious and eleemosynary body and to make and to pay off obligations. Corporation good for fifty years. Trustees: E.J. Barr, H. Harpole, W. V. Orr, J. C. Garrett, J.H. Williams, S.C. Barr. On August 3, 1961, the charter was renewed for another fifty years with renewal due 2011 A.D.

The board church was built in 1913, south of Kirkham's Texaco station, and was used until 1926 when the present brick church building was finished. Construction was very slow, because local farmers used teams and fresnoes to dig the church basements.

The elders who served on the board when the new church building was completed were: Jim Williams, S.C. Barr, Jim Barr, G.L. Eager, Tom Bryant, J.L. Settle and Chas. F. Hemphill.

Through the years numbers of ministers have served the church, including the following: W.E. Green, W.M. Bennett, C.C. Bullock, J.A. Gains, S.P. Collins,

(The Reverend Howell was lovingly referred to as "Dirty Foot" because he had no transportation and walked from Sabanno to Cross Plains to serve the church during the first World War.)

Colis Eager and Eunice Eager Starr remember some of the high moments in the church history. One occasion they vividly recall was a three week revival in January 1914, known as the Irwin revival. Horace Irwin, a minister from Sabanno, conducted the revival, assisted by his brother Albert, who was a trombonist, and Albert's wife, who played the piano. The church was filled with people of all denominations, standing in the aisles, sitting in the windows, and the choir jam-packed with eighty singers!

The high moment was at the end of an evening service, Reverend Irwin requested the song, "Tell Mother I'll Be There" and for those who had lost a mother to wave. When you looked around, the room was full of people waving handkerchiefs, and shedding many tears.

On another heart warming occasion, they recalled the wedding in 1940 of Sara Collins, daughter of Rev. S.P. Collins, who was married by her father in the church. Fifty years later, on her 50th Anniversary, she, with her family and many friends, returned to Cross Plains. This time, however, it was her son who conducted the service and her daughter played the piano.

Members of the church throughout the years have included the following families: Barr, Williams, McLain, Barrington, Walters, Leach, Rollins, Frazier, McAnally, Hinkle, Morris, Cole, Woods, Bayless, Holland, Saunders, Rhodes, Dolgeners, Billingsly, Foster, Koening, Huntington, Clay, Adams, Lotief, Hemphill, Sohns, McDermet, Coburn, Womack, Illingworth, McCall, Eager, Worthy, Sims, Fleming, Watson, Eubank, Vaught, Irwin, Bryant, McGowen, Settle, Williamson, Sherrill, Derrington, Hickman, Sipes, Newton, Wigginton, Davis, Baldwin, Lec, Dunn, Tillotson, Young, Grissom, Crabb, Boase, Montgomery, Huckaby, Weller, Gann, and Garrett.

In the late twenties and thirties, the Presbyterian Youth Group, Christian

Endeavor, was the largest in town under the leadership of Mrs. S. P. Collins and Mrs. Charles Hemphill.

Presently, the church is served by Reverend Henry A. Grubb, Minister, Sheri Bennett, Pianist, and the Session includes Jim Fleming, Cole Tillotson, Helen Tillotson, Barbara Young, Ance Barr, and Colis Eager.

"Three generations guilty of pushing heroin." So read the AP headlines which went on to tell of a grandmother, mother and daughter receiving jail sentences for pushing heroin in Massachusetts. The grandmother, sixty-eight, took orders for the heroin over the phone from customers of her daughter, forty-six, and the then younger one, eighteen, delivered the goods. Though in this case it seems the one in the middle of the three generations was the "ring-tail leader," it's nothing uncommon for the bad habits and even criminal characteristics to be handed down from generation to generation...

But the record of this series of three generations, guilty of pushing heroin, is quite different from a series of three generations spoken of some two thousand years ago by the inspired apostle Paul. In writing Timothy, Paul spoke of Timothy's unwavering faith, which was first lived in his grandmother, Lois, and his mother, Eunice. Don't you know the good example of the two previous generations had a lot to do with Timothy's now excellent example and pattern of living? Though he didn't catch all this by osmosis (Paul later stated that "from infancy, Timothy had known the scriptures..."), being around good influences is catching. (The same is true about being around bad influences!)

Parents, the difference in our children's destiny, in this life and life hereafter, will be greatly determined by what they are taught — by us — in word and in deed. What example and teaching will we give the next generations?

Bring your children with you and join us in establishing faith in God — like Lois, Eunice and Timothy. We really do care about you, too!
