Runoff Slated For Both Commissioner Precincts

Judge Johnson Wins Re-Election Bid, JP **Shelnutt Given Nod**

Incumbent Bill Johnson will remain county judge after he won in a re-election bid over C. Lee Smith, during the Democratic Party Primary Election held Tuesday, March 8.

Johnson won six of the seven voting precinct boxes to easily outdistance Smith, 1,475 votes for Johnson to 843 for Smith.

In other Democratic races of local interest, incumbent Clyde Justice of the Peace Eston Shelnutt won re-election, defeating Twalla Simmons, 570 votes for Shelnutt to 431 for Simmons.

Both county commissioner races will be decided in a runoff among the top two finishers, after no candidate took 51 percent of the total votes cast.

The Commissioner Precinct #2 runoff will involve Bryan Farmer and Terry Ellis. Farmer captured the most votes with 179, while Ellis took 139 votes.

Other Precinct #2 commissioner candidates receiving votes were: R.C. (Bud) Logan with 96 votes, T.W. (Butch) Woodard with 92 votes and Russell Jones, Jr. with 45 votes.

Charlie Grider and Kenneth Sowell will vie for the Commissioner Precinct #4 seat in a runoff in April. Grider led the way with 179 total votes, while Sowell took 166 votes.

Other Precinct #4 commissioner candidates receiving votes, but out of the runoff race picture included: Freddy Tatom with 154 votes, H.D. Weaver with 97 votes and Lester M. Wyatt with 87 votes.

In the Baird Justice of the Peace race, Don Burns defeated Ida Mae Waddell. Burns took home 361 votes to Waddell's 285 votes.

All winning Callahan County candidates will automatically win election bids in the general election in November since there are no Republican candidates in the countywide races.

Complete election results of the Callahan County Democratic Party Primary Election will be published in next week's Clyde Journal.



After an eight month observation I have come to the conclusion that the most dangerous area in Cross Plains is the School Crossing Zone on Main Street. I have not witnessed a serious accident in that area but have seen several close calls.

My first impression was that the major problem was that motorist entering Cross Plains from the north on Main Street would not realize that they were entering a school zone until they were already inside the school zone. The curve of Main Stret, (Texas Highway 206) just to the north of the school zone does without a doubt create a distraction for southbound motorist unfamiliar with the area. In reality though, by far the largest number of speed limit violators in the school zone are local people.

I realize that in the past the speed limit has not been strictly enforced in the school zone. This fact does not lessen the danger to the school children of Cross Plains. It has been my observation that a lot of the parents bringing children to school will obey the speed limit while entering the school zone. After dropping

Foster Farm Presented Family Land Heritage Award

Mr. and Mrs. Randy Foster of the Sabanno Community was honored in Austin on January 21, 1994 with the presentation of the Family Land Heritage Award. Rick Perry, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, gave this recognition.

Also attending the presentation were the Foster's sons, Kyle and Blake; Randy's mother, Louise Erwin Foster; uncles and aunts, Charles and Annette Ege of Smithville and Ralph and Faye Erwin of Hobbs, New Mexico.

The Family Land Heritage Awards are presented annually to Texas families who have owned and operated the same tract of land for agricultural purposes 100 years or more.

Documentation is required on the history of the land. Judge Scott Bailey, Chairman of the Eastland County Historical Commissions, approved the documentation.

The ceremony was the Twentieth Texas Family Land Heritage ceremony. It was sponsored by the Texas Department of Agriculture and held at the University of Texas Lyndon B. Johnson auditorium. A reception for all the families honored

followed the ceremony.

The Randy Foster Farm is located 14 miles south/southwest of Cisco and seven miles northeast of Cross Plains on State Highway 206.

The first family member to own this land was W.A. Erwin, who was born in McMinville, Tennessee. He came to Texas because of hardships in Tennes-

Erwin acquired title to the land October 14, 1893. The farm, consisting of 222.5

acres, was purchased from G.R. Patton and wife. The original grant holder of this land was Abraham Winfrey.

Erwin and his wife, Martha Elizabeth Erwin, had 12 children: Sam, Albert, Joe, Tom, Marion, John, George, Arthur, Horace, Arminda, Allie and Fannie. W.A. Erwin raised horses, cattle and hay on the place.

The present owners of the farm, Mr. and Mrs. Randy Foster, operate a dairy and produce hay and small grains.

a child off at the school, however, may reach speeds as much as 35 M.P.H. before reaching the south end of the school zone which is located at Main Street and 13th Street.

Another serious problem is with some, not all of the student drivers who do not seem to realize that the laws which were made to protect them, also apply to them. The school zone limits are marked by a flashing light, and sign on the left side of the street and a white stripe across the street. The south end of the school zone is located at the intersection of Main Street and 13th Street, one block south of the High School. The north end is located at the intersection of Main Street and 16th Street, on the north side of the Elementary School. The speed limit of Main Street between 13th Street and 16th Street when the warning lights are flashing is 20 M.P.H.

This speed limit will be strictly enforced. I am asking everyone to cooperate in helping to make Cross Plains a safer place for our kids to live and go to school.

Coleman Musical March 11



The shells of turtles and tortoises include part of their backbone and ribs.
