Buffaloes Win Area — Advance To Regional

The 1993-94 basketball season may be over but what a season it was! The Buffaloes finished with 28 wins and only 5 losses. The boys won district for the first time since 1985, advanced to regional tournament for the first time since 1986, and won two tournaments. This makes two out of the three years the Buffs have played basketball in March!

On Tuesday, March 1 in Coleman the Buffaloes defeated the May Tigers 67-63 in the area round of the state playoffs. Cross Plains jumped out to a 27-10 lead after one period. The Buffs had a slight let down in the second quarter and went into the half with a 44-31 lead. We were outplayed in the second half but hit our free throws down the stretch and won the game 67-63. Matt Reed had a tremendous game scoring a game high 22 points and grabbing 14 rebounds. Matt also had a game high 7 steals. Jason Fleming had 14 points, 4 steals and 4 assists, Brock Walker had 13 points, Kevin Switzer 10 points and 9 rebounds, Donnie Dillard 6 points and 9 rebounds and Rodney

Rudloff rounded out the scoring with 2 points. With this win, the Buffs advanced to the Regional Tournament in Abilene.

On Friday March 4 the Buffs met the Number 5 team in the state, the Lipan Indians and were beaten 89-52. We did not play well but I really think the better ball club won. What I'm trying to say is we could have played our best ball game and still gotten beat. Lipan went on to win the tournament and are only one of four class A teams left in the state still playing. We shot a dismal 32% from the field while Lipan scored the nets with 53% from the field.

Jason Fleming closed out a great career with 21 points. Sophomore Donnie Dillard showed signs of things to come with 14 points. Matt Reed had 7 points, Brock Walker had 5 points, Kevin Switzer 4 points and Kelly Barclay rounded out the scoring with 1 point.

This was a great season! I thank the boys for their hard work and good attitudes. I thank the community for the unbelievable support. I hope that we can

take the positive attributes of this season and carry them over into our daily life. I also hope that we learn from the negative experiences. Once again thanks guys for a great year. I wish you the best!!

School Zone Speed Limit 20 M.P.H. To Be Enforced

After an eight month observation I have come to the conclusion that the most dangerous area in Cross Plains is the School Crossing Zone on Main Street. I have not witnessed a serious accident in that area but have seen several close calls.

My first impression was that the major problem was that motorist entering Cross Plains from the north on Main Street would not realize that they were entering a school zone until they were already inside the school zone. The curve of Main Street, (Texas Highway 206) just to the north of the school zone does without a doubt create a distraction for southbound motorist unfamiliar with the area. In reality though, by far the largest number of speed limit violators in the school zone are local people.

I realize that in the past the speed limit has not been strictly enforced in the school zone. This fact does not lessen the danger to the school children of Cross Plains. It has been my observation that a lot of the parents bringing children to school will obey the speed limit while entering the school zone. After dropping

Runoff Slated For Both Commissioner Precincts

Judge Johnson Wins Re-Election Bid, JP Shelnett Given Nod

Incumbent Bill Johnson will remain county judge after he won in a re-election bid over C. Lee Smith, during the Democratic Party Primary Election held Tuesday, March 8.

Johnson won six of the seven voting precinct boxes to easily outdistance Smith, 1,475 votes for Johnson to 843 for Smith.

In other Democratic races of local interest, incumbent Clyde Justice of the Peace Eston Shelnett won re-election, defeating Twalla Simmons, 570 votes for Shelnett to 431 for Simmons.

Both county commissioner races will be decided in a runoff among the top two finishers, after no candidate took 51 percent of the total votes cast.

The Commissioner Precinct #2 runoff will involve Bryan Farmer and Terry Ellis. Farmer captured the most votes with 179, while Ellis took 139 votes.

Other Precinct #2 commissioner candidates receiving votes were: R.C. (Bud) Logan with 96 votes, T.W.

(Butch) Woodard with 92 votes and Russell Jones, Jr. with 45 votes.

Charlie Grider and Kenneth Sowell will vie for the Commissioner Precinct #4 seat in a runoff in April. Grider led the way with 179 total votes, while Sowell took 166 votes.

Other Precinct #4 commissioner candidates receiving votes, but out of the runoff race picture included: Freddy Tatom with 154 votes, H.D. Weaver with 97 votes and Lester M. Wyatt with 87 votes.

In the Baird Justice of the Peace race, Don Burns defeated Ida Mae Waddell. Burns took home 361 votes to Waddell's 285 votes.

All winning Callahan County candidates will automatically win election bids in the general election in November since there are no Republican candidates in the countywide races.

Complete election results of the Callahan County Democratic Party Primary Election will be published in next week's *Clyde Journal*.

The Randy Foster Farm in Eastland County has been operated by the family for 100 years or more and was inducted

into the Texas Department of Agriculture's Family Heritage Program.

Foster Farm Presented Family Land Heritage Award

Mr. and Mrs. Randy Foster of the Sabanno Community was honored in Austin on January 21, 1994 with the presentation of the Family Land Heritage Award. Rick Perry, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, gave this recognition.

Also attending the presentation were the Foster's sons, Kyle and Blake; Randy's mother, Louise Erwin Foster; uncles and aunts, Charles and Annette Ege of Smithville and Ralph and Faye Erwin of Hobbs, New Mexico.

The Family Land Heritage Awards are presented annually to Texas families who have owned and operated the same tract of land for agricultural purposes 100 years or more.

Documentation is required on the history of the land. Judge Scott Bailey, Chairman of the Eastland County Historical Commissions, approved the documentation.

The ceremony was the Twentieth Texas Family Land Heritage ceremony. It was sponsored by the Texas Department of Agriculture and held at the University of Texas Lyndon B. Johnson auditorium. A reception for all the families honored

followed the ceremony.

The Randy Foster Farm is located 14 miles south/southwest of Cisco and seven miles northeast of Cross Plains on State Highway 206.

The first family member to own this land was W.A. Erwin, who was born in McMinnville, Tennessee. He came to Texas because of hardships in Tennessee.

Erwin acquired title to the land October 14, 1893. The farm, consisting of 222.5

acres, was purchased from G.R. Patton and wife. The original grant holder of this land was Abraham Winfrey.

Erwin and his wife, Martha Elizabeth Erwin, had 12 children: Sam, Albert, Joe, Tom, Marion, John, George, Arthur, Horace, Arminda, Allie and Fannie. W.A. Erwin raised horses, cattle and hay on the place.

The present owners of the farm, Mr. and Mrs. Randy Foster, operate a dairy and produce hay and small grains.

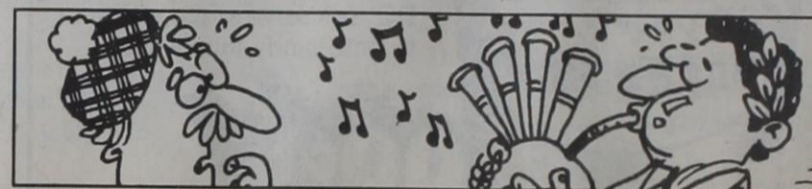

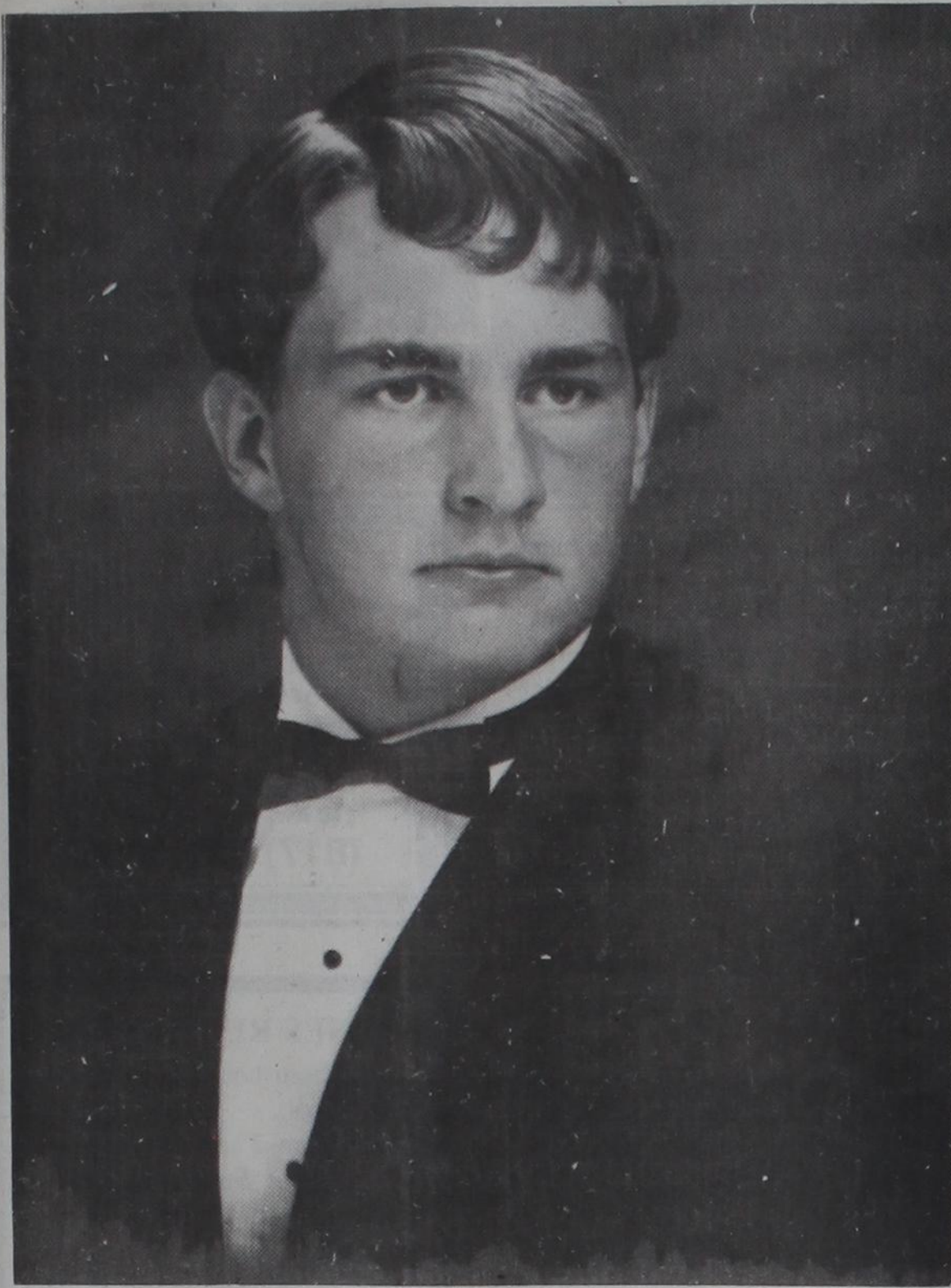

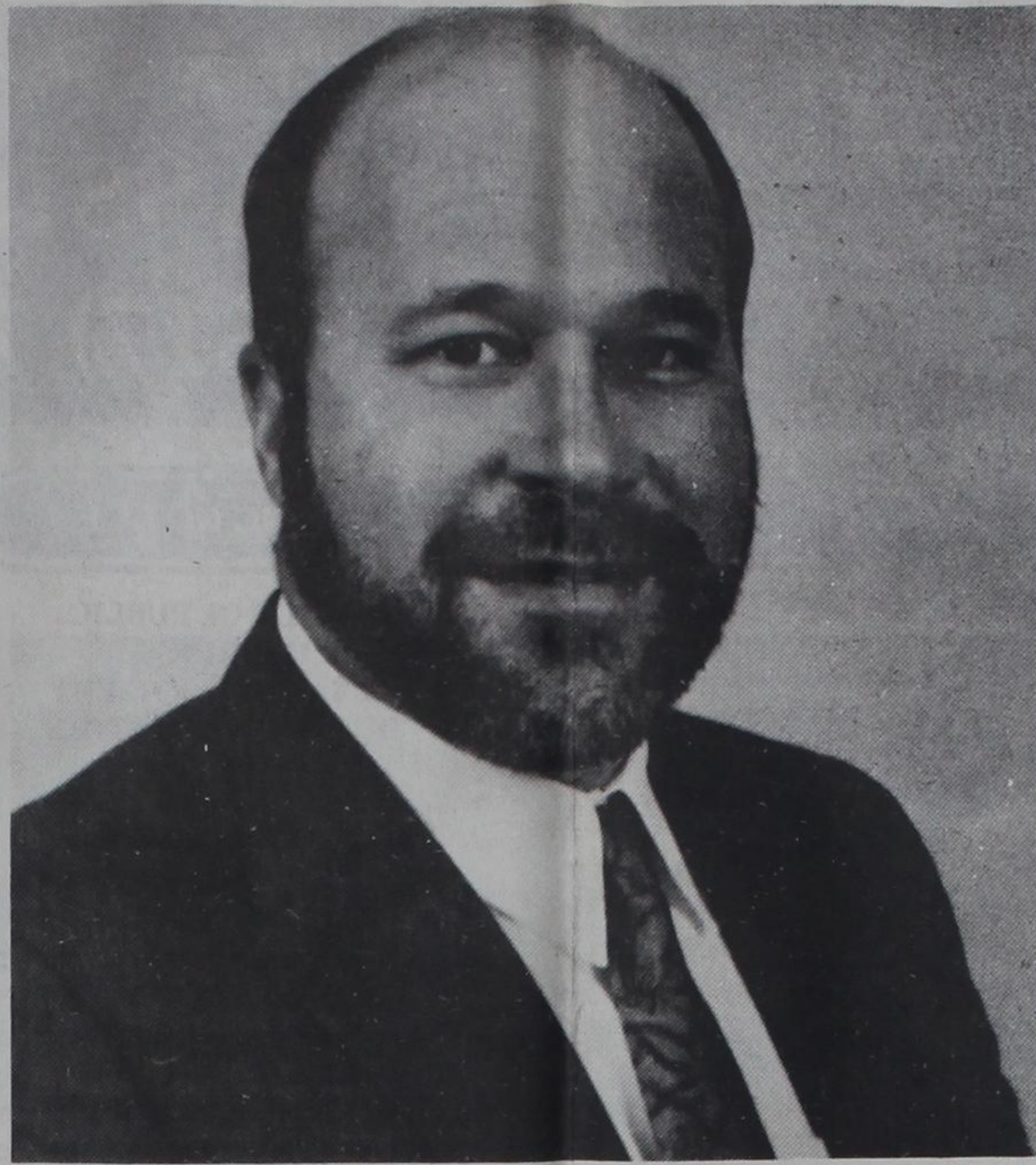

Bob Stallman Elected As President Of Texas Farm Bureau

Voting delegates of the Texas Farm Bureau elected Bob Stallman as the organization's eighth president on December 1, 1993. Stallman joined the TFB board as District 11 Director in December of 1987, and was elected vice-president in 1991.

A third generation rice farmer, Stallman began farming in 1975. He formed a family partnership with his father and brother. In 1989, he took over the family farming operation when the partnership was dissolved.

Stallman has been an active Farm Bureau leader since the '70s, and served the Colorado County Farm Bureau as director, secretary-treasurer, vice-president and president. He served on the TFB State Resolutions Committee, the Blue Ribbon Goals Committee, and the state Health Advisory Committee. In January of 1994, Stallman was elected to the American Farm Bureau Federation Board of Directors.

The Colorado County farmer graduated from Columbus High School and re-

ceived a Bachelor of Arts degree in Computer Sciences from the University of Texas.

He is a past member of the Columbus ISD board of trustees, serving six years, and was president and vice-president. Stallman was a member of the Colorado County ASCS Rice and Soybean Committee, and was selected as 1986 "Man of the Year in Agriculture" by the Columbus Rotary Club.

In 1989-90, Stallman represented TFB on the General Land Office's Coastal Management Plan Advisory Committee. He currently serves on the Colorado County Agriculture Advisory board.

Bob and Connie Stallman have two daughters, Angela and Kimberly. The Stallmans are members of the First United Methodist Church in Columbus, where Stallman serves on the administrative board.

Garry Mauro, Chairman of the Texas Veterans Land Board, has announced a free seminar on loan programs available to Texas Veterans. The meeting will be held at 7 p.m. Thursday, March 10 and registration begins at 6:30 p.m. Veterans are urged to attend the gathering at the Abilene Civic Center, Conference Room 1, North Wing. The Civic Center is located at 1100 North 7th Street in Abilene. Texas Veterans are now eligible to participate in three low-interest loan programs. Qualified Veterans may borrow up to \$20,000 toward the purchase of land, \$45,000 toward a home, and up to \$25,000 to make home improvements. This is a total benefits package of \$90,000. Approximately 140,000 Texas Veterans have already taken advantage of these benefits, and the Texas Veterans Land Board wants to make sure that all qualified Veterans have an opportunity to participate. Mr. Mauro has also announced that a down payment assistance program has recently become available. This program is for qualified low-income Veterans who may be eligible for up to \$1,500 at 0% interest. Mr. Mauro will be at the seminar to welcome attendees and his staff will be available to answer questions and to discuss each program. Mr. Mauro advises that these programs may not be used for refinancing due to Federal regulations. This seminar is part of the Texas Veterans Land Board's motto--"Not doing a favor for Texas Veterans, but repaying one".
