## Cross Plains Girls Win State Track Meet

The weather may not have been totally cooperative, but everything else came together for Coach Bill Boyd's Cross Plains Varsity Girls Track Team who earned the first State Track Meet team trophy in the school's history; first state championship in any sport.

There were over 300 schools in Class A participating in the 3-day meet held Thursday through Saturday, May 12-14

in Austin at Memorial Stadium.

With individual victories in several events and placing in several others, the nine member team totaled 52 points to give them the team trophy.

Individually, Senior Tamara Flippin won the state first place medal in the long jump, with 17'4 1/2". She also placed 4th in the triple jump going 35'3" (1st place finished with 35'7").

Also earning a first place state medal was Senior Amanda Sowell. She threw

the shot 38'6 1/2" to win.

To top things off, the 1600 meter relay team turned in a time of 4:04.2 which gave them a first place also. Members of that team are Tamara Flippin, Angy Phillips, Jodi Dallas, and Connie Steele.

The 400m relay team also placed in the top 6 giving Cross Plains additional points. This team of Tonya Stover, Jodi Dallas, Misty Strickland and Tamara Flippin turned in a time of 51.0 which was .8 seconds off the winning time of 50.2 by Lindsay.

The 800m relay team of Angy Phillips, Misty Strickland, Connie Steele and Tamara Flippin also took fifth place. Their time was a 1:48.8, with first place taken by Flatonia with a time of 1:47. All running events are school records.

Coach Boyd and the girls accepted the team trophy at a ceremony held on Saturday.

Jerry Boyd, Principal, will recognize award recipients and Lee M. Thompson, Superintendent, will present the graduating class.

Barbara Sowell, Ron Bagley, Randy Montgomery and Donnie Dillard will be the Cross Plains I.S.D. Board of Trustees presenting diplomas, as they each have a daughter graduating.

April Hogan has been named Valedictorian of the Class of 1994. She is the 18-year-old daughter of Troy Hogan and Nelda Black of Cross Plains and began attending Cross Plains School as a 7th grader.

"I decided in the 7th grade that I wanted to be Valedictorian of my class and I have been working on that since then," April responded when asked how she felt about

being Cross Plains' 1994 Valedictorian. She said when she was in the 7th grade she was asked to take the valedictorian and salutatorian awards to the office and she was so impressed with them that she decided then that was what she wanted to do. April finished with a grade point average of 99.5 which earned her the honor.

Over her 4 years in high school, April has participated in FHA 3 years (Dairy Products judging and President of Parliamentary Procedure Team), National Honor Society - 3 years (Vice President 1 year), on the Student Council 2 years, on the Annual Staff 2 years, Cheerleader for 2 years, Band member for 2 years, Personality 1 year, received the Hugh O'Brien Award - sophomore year, and received the Principal's Leadership Award her senior year.

April plans to attend Cisco Junior College next year to begin working towards a degree in Ag business, then attend either Tarleton or A & M her last two years.

Currently she has already received a Rockwell academic scholarship for tuition and fees and is also in contention for an FFA scholarship in which she could receive a minimum of \$2000 to \$15,000. She will know the results of that in June.

With a grade point average of 98.8, Tamara Kaye Flippin earned the honor of Salutatorian for the Class of 1994 at Cross Plains High School. Tamara is the 18-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E.J. Flippin of Cross Plains and has been attending Cross Plains schools since Kindergarten.

She was excited about earning salutatorian, because, as she said, "I knew the competition would be tough for valedictorian and salutatorian."

Tamara has been involved in a variety of activities during her 4 years of high school, including earning a state first place medal in the long jump in her senior year (see related track article). In her track participation, she has qualified for state in 3 of the last 4 years. In Cross Country, she was a regional qualifier in the two years she competed. Tamara also played basketball for 3 years, was in band 2 years, FFA 1 year (Greenhand Treasurer), National Honor Society 3 years (President Senior year), on the Annual staff 1 year, Class President Junior and Senior year, in the PAL program 2 years, and in Gifted/Talented for 3 years.

In the fall, Tamara will be attending San Angelo State University. She recently signed a letter of commitment on a track scholarship with ASU. According to Tamara, she is leaning towards a degree in Kinesiology. She will start ASU with 3 hours of credit due to a correspondence course in history which she just completed and she also hopes to test out of several freshman level courses this summer. In thinking about her future, Tamara said, "Graduation and leaving high school is scary in a way, but also exciting. I'll miss all my friends, but I am looking forward to college and making new friends."

Brandon Finn have all maintained a 90 average or above for their four years in high school.

## McClure Sentenced To 20 Years By Eleventh Court Of Appeals

On May 5, 1994, the Eleventh Court of Appeals affirmed the attempted murder conviction of David Michael McClure, Jr. sentencing Mr. McClure to twenty years confinement in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

Mr. McClure was convicted by a Coleman County jury in 1992 of shooting his former wife, Kala McClure, in the back of the head and leaving her in a remote spot near Burkett in Coleman

County, Texas.

The Court of Appeals rejected all of the thirteen points of appeal asserted by the attorneys for Mr. McClure. Mr. McClure was represented on appeal by court-appointed attorney Melissa Romine of Abilene, Texas, and thereafter by retained attorney Bennie House, Jr. of Houston, Texas. The State was represented by District Attorney Ross L. Jones and acting Assistant District Attorney John Graves.

## Erodible Land Rules

To be eligible for payments and any other USDA program benefits, Scott Odom, County Executive Director of the Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, says 1994 farm program participants must comply with the highly erodible land conservation provisions.

"Producers will lose program benefits if they plant an agricultural crop on highly erodible land without using an approved conservation system, Odom said.

Beginning January 1, 1995, all conservation systems must be fully applied on highly erodible land for a producer to earn program benefits.

Odom said the highly erodible land restrictions apply to all farm program participants. "Once a crop is planted in non-compliance of the highly erodible land requirements, it is too late. The producer will be considered ineligible for 1994 benefits."

The ASCS official said producers who still need determinations on whether the land they planted to an annually-tilled crop, or designated as conservation uses or acreage conservation reserve, is highly erodible, should contact the county ASCS office or the Callahan County Soil Conservation Service as soon as possible.

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by ASCS is established by law without regard to race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin, marital status, physical or mental handicap, political affiliation, or sponsorship club.

## Conservation Needs

Producers who have serious soil erosion, water quality, or pollution problems on their land may want to check the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) practices available at the Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization Service (ASCS).

"Funds are available to solve these and other conservation problems through annual and long-term conservation agreements," ASCS official Scott Odom said.

With winter practices nearing completion, he said producers may want to begin spring practices or consider applying necessary conservation practices during the coming season.

Cost-shares funds are available for the following practices: Waterways and Critical Area Treatments, Terraces, Diversion Terraces, Water Impoundment Reservoirs, and Mechanical Brush Control.

The ACP offers financial and technical assistance to help producers solve critical soil, water, and pollution problems on their land.

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by ASCS is established by law without regard to race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin, marital status, physical or mental handicap, political affiliation, or sponsorship club.

## Wool-Mohair Comments Due

USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) invites wool and mohair growers and the public to submit comments on the methods for calculating price support for wool on unshorn lambs (pulled wool) and mohair for 1994.

"The written remarks must be received in Washington, D.C., on or before June 1, 1994 to be considered," county ASCS official Scott Odom said.

In accordance with the National Wool Act of 1954, pulled wool must be supported at a level in relationship to the

support price for shorn wool, that will maintain normal marketing practices for pulled wool.

Odom explained that pulled wool is the wool removed from the pelt of a slaughtered sheep. In the past, this provision has been implemented through payments based on the hundred weight of live, unshorn lambs marketed.

Odom said mohair must be supported at about the same percentage of parity as shorn wool, plus or minus 15 percentage points. The shorn wool support price is based on a formula prescribed in the National Wool Act. Based on current USDA data, the 1994 shorn wool support price will be \$2.09 per pound (grease basis).

The 2-year phaseout of the wool and mohair programs begins with the 1994 marketing year, according to Odom. "Producers payments will be calculated using the support prices covered by this proposed rule, but will then be reduced by 25 percent for 1994 in accordance with the Wool Act," Odom said. The wool Act is in effect through December 31, 1995.
