



McClure Sentenced To 20 Years By Eleventh **Court Of Appeals**

On May 5, 1994, the Eleventh Court of County, Texas. Appeals affirmed the attempted murder conviction of David Michael McClure, Jr. sentencing Mr. McClure to twenty years confinement in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

Mr. McClure was convicted by a Coleman County jury in 1992 of shooting his former wife, Kala McClure, in the back of the head and leaving her in a remote spot near Burkett in Coleman

The Court of Appeals rejected all of the thirteen points of appeal asserted by the attorneys for Mr. McClure, Mr. McClure was represented on appeal by court-appointed attorney Melissa Romine of Abilene, Texas, and thereafter by retained attorney Bennie House, Jr. of Houston, Texas. The State was represented by District Attorney Ross L. Jones and acting Assistant District Attorney John Graves.

Perhaps you like fresh cream from the cow's milk as much as I. There was a time when I wasn't too crazy about it — but I am now! I believe just as surely as the cream comes to the top of the milk, great eatin' comes from that cream. If you'll give me some fresh cream, I'll put it on cereal or peaches, strawberries or some cake, and double or triple the eatin' pleasure of any one or all of them! If you'll just give me the fresh whole milk, I'll even skim it in order to get the cream — but please don't ask me to milk the cow. That's too much!

Isn't that the way we are about a lot of things? Everyone wants the cream — but no one wants to milk the cow! — at least few are willing to. Cold, rainy, early in the morning; dirty cow lots and dirty cows; swish of the cow's tail - in the face! - a kick of the bucket and half the milk's gone. I enjoyed my chat with Lucille Callaway. She is like family to me. She's my Karen's grandmother. She didn't have any special news. Her schedule was about as usual.





Erodible Land Rules

To be eligible for payments and any other USDA program benefits, Scott Odom, County Executive Director of the Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, says 1994 farm program participants must comply with the highly erodible land conservation provisions.

"Producers will lose program benefits if they plant an agricultural crop on highly erodible land without using an approved conservation system, Odom said.

Beginning January 1, 1995, all conservation systems must be fully applied on highly erodible land for a producer to earn program benefits.

Odom said the highly erodible land restrictions apply to all farm program participants. "Once a crop is planted in non-compliance of the highly erodible land requirements, it is too late. The producer will be considered ineligible for 1994 benefits."

The ASCS official said producers who still need determinations on whether the land they planted to an annually-tilled crop, or designated as conservation uses or acreage conservation reserve, is highly erodible, should contact the county ASCS office or the Callahan County Soil Conservation Service as soon as possible.

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by ASCS is established by law without regard to race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin, martial status, physical or mental handicap, political affiliation, or sponsorship club.

Producers who have serious soil erosion, water quality, or pollution problems on their land may want to check the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) practices available at the Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization Service (ASCS).

"Funds are available to solve these and other conservation problems through annual and long-term conservation agreements," ASCS official Scott Odom said.

With winter practices nearing completion, he said producers may want to begin spring practices or consider applying necessary conservation practices during the coming season.

Cost-shares funds are available for the following practices: Waterways and Critical Area Treatments, Terraces, Diversion Terraces, Water Impoundment Reservoirs, and Mechanical Brush Control.

The ACP offers financial and technical assistance to help producers solve critical soil, water, and pollution problems on their land.

Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by ASCS is established by law without regard to race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin, martial status, physical or mental handicap, political affiliation, or sponsorship club.

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

Wool-Mohair Comments Due

USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) invites wool and mohair growers and the public to submit comments on the methods for calculating price support for wool on unshorn lambs (pulled wool) and mohair for 1994.

"The written remarks must be received in Washington, D.C., on or before June 1, 1994 to be considered," county ASCS official Scott Odom said.

In accordance with the National Wool Act of 1954, pulled wool must be supported at a level in relationship to the

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support price for shorn wool, that will maintain normal marketing practices for pulled wool.

Odom explained that pulled wool is the wool removed from the pelt of a slaughtered sheep. In the past, this provision has been implemented through payments based on the hundred weight of live, unshorn lambs marketed. Odom said mohair must be supported at about the same percentage of parity as shorn wool, plus or minus 15 percentage points. The shorn wool support price is based on a formula prescribed in the National Wool Act. Based on current USDA data, the 1994 shorn wool support price will be \$2.09 per pound (grease basis).

The 2-year phaseout of the wool and mohair programs begins with the 1994 marketing year, according to Odom. Producers payments will be calculated using the support prices covered by this proposed rule, but will then be reduced by 25 percent for 1994 in accordance with the Wool Act," Odom said. The wool Act is in effect through December 31, 1995.




