## EDC, Inc. Met May 7

The Economic Development Corporation, Inc. held their annual meeting Tuesday, May 7, at the City Hall. Attending were Dannes Turner, Keith Lawrence, Billie Ruth Loving, Ray Womack, Era Lec Hanke, and a representative of the Cross Plains Review.

The first order of business was to elect officers. Ray Womack motioned to keep the same officers as 1995-96 and Era Lee Hanke seconded the motion. The officers are: President - Steve Mack

Vice-president - Keith Lawrence Secretary/Treasurer - Dannes

The financial report was given reflecting \$17,488.58 receipts from sales tax from July 1, 1995 to February 29, 1996.

A proposed budget for 1996-97 stated that sales tax receipts would be \$25,000 and interest from the income \$400. Project investments included the Sidewalk Project \$5,000 and Newsletter Project \$1,000 for a total of \$6,000. Operating expenses were estimated at \$2,450. The net fund increase would be \$16,950. The proposed budget was approved.

Businesses in Cross Plains have been replacing former flower barrels with new terra cotta colored pots in an effort to cooperate with the Downtown Beautification Project and the new look has been progressive. Setbacks have been experienced due to destructive acts. One business has replaced flowers for the third time, after they were crushed. Also the saucers of some of the new flower pots have been broken by roller blades, skate boards, and bicycles causing them to be unsightly.

### Tower & Equipment To Be **Purchased For County**

Callahan County Commissioners voted to purchase a tower and equipment for a countywide voice paging system to be used by thirteen emergency departments in the county.

County commissioners, in a regular meeting Monday, May 9, voted to spend \$10,789.03 to install a 250 watt tower in the Cottonwood area of Callahan County for the new beeper system. The system is being purchased from Abilene Communications. The Cottonwood area was the site chosen to erect the tower because of its central location in the county.

The voice paging system will be

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used to notify at anytime fire, police or ambulance service personnel of an emergency

It will not change the way emergencies are called-in to dispatchers at the Callahan County Sheriff's Office. Anyone wishing any emergency service will continue to dial 911 on the telephone. The voice paging system will be used by sheriff's department dispatchers to notify any of the departments using the beeper system's frequency

County Judge Bill Johnson said commissioners heard a report from a committee determining the feasibility of installing a countywide beeper system in Callahan County. Judge Johnson said commissioners agreed to the committee's recommendation to purchase the 250 water equipment and install the tower. However, each department using the beeper system must purchase the number of individual beepers to be used by that department. New beepers will cost between \$200 and \$300

Judge Johnson said the county has applied for a grant through the Texas Forestry Service to fund the equipment and tower purchase, however he has not heard if the grant application was approved.

The county departments which will use the voice paging system include: Callahan County Sheriff's Department, Clyde Police Department, Clyde Fire Department, Citizens Emergency Medical Service, Cottonwood Fire Department, Cross Plains Fire Department, Cross Plains Emergency Medical Service, Cross Plains Police Department, Baird Fire Department, Baird City Marshal's Office, Eula Fire Department, Oplin Fire Department and Putnam

Fire Department. Also during the commissioners meeting, commissioners voted to accept the only bid from West Texas Caterpillar in Abilene to purchase a maintainer for Precinct #3. The bid amount was \$36,800 including trade-in.

Commissioners also approved the minutes of the previous meeting and to pay all approved bills.

#### Cutbirth Naomi Heyser

Naomi Cutbirth Heyser, 97, died Wednesday, May 8, 1996, at Clyde Nursing Center. Graveside services were held at 10:00 a.m. Saturday at Ross Cemetery in Baird, with Rev. Jack Willoughby officiating, under the direction of Parker Funeral

Ms. Heyser was born October 22, 1899, in Callahan County. She was the daughter of J.B. Cutbirth, who was one of the original pioneers of the county. The Cutbirths moved to the county in June of 1877 from Pilot Point. Twelve children were born to J.B. Cutbirth, four of which died at birth...Adelia Scott (died 1965); Willie Cutbirth (died 1954); Fred Cutbirth (died 1966); Alice Phillips (died 1945); Lula Hart (died 1984); Bonnie Farmer (died 1994); and Naomi Cutbirth (died 1996). J.B. Cutbirth was a long time representative of the cattle industry of Texas and concentrated his attention to stock raising, buying and trading cattle. The Cutbirth brand is still active in Callahan County.

Naomi attended Texas Woman's College in Fort Worth and graduated from Hardin-Simmons University with a degree in elementary education. Ms. Heyser married O.B. Lidia on June 16, 1921. Otho, who died in 1929, a very young man, and Naomi had one daughter, Betty Hay (Lidia) Wilson, born December 6, 1927, and preceded her mother's death on September 10, 1980. While making her home with her widowed mother, Sara Alice Skinner Cutbirth, she taught school and later married rancher Fred Heyser of Putnam, where they resided until his death September 11, 1963.

She was a member of First Methodist Church of Baird and active in many social and study clubs in the towns of both Putnam and Baird.



## Mike Pinson To Speak At First **United Methodist** Church Sunday, **May 19**

Mike Pinson, Executive Director at Aldersgate Enrichment Center, will speak at the First United Methodist Church, 2000 Main, Cross Plains, at their regular Sunday service, May 19, beginning at 10:45 a.m.

Pinson is a Christian, family man, pilot, teacher, administrator, public servant, and retired military officer. He served over 20 years with the United States Army Infantry with tours in Korea and Vietnam. He served with the 82nd Airborne, 101st Airborne, Special Forces, 2nd Armored Division, and numerous other units. He has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, two Mcritorious Service Medals, four Bronze Star Medals, 21 Flying Medals, the Combat Infantryman Badge, the Master Parachute Badge, as well as numerous other awards. Mike retired as the Chief of Staff of the 2nd Armored Division.

He is very active in the United Methodist Church having served in the highest positions in his local church, and four years as Temple District Lay Leader.

In 1985 Mike and four other men traveled to the United Methodist Men's Conference held at Purdue University. While there he heard a choir from the Baddour Center in Senitobia, Mississippi. Baddour is a center for mentally challenged adults. Mike was so touched by this

choir that he felt a calling to this ministry. He came back to Texas and formed a committee to map the strategy for starting such a ministry in Texas. With the help of many people and ten years later, Aldersgate is now a reality.

Aldersgate Enrichment Center, located near Brownwood, now serves 32 associates with a staff of 16. It is located on 157 acres of land 3 miles south of Early on HIghway 183. Mike has been serving as Executive Director of Aldersgate for the last five years without monitory compensation. Since he assumed the job as director, Aldersgate has built a campus that all who sees are impressed. The net worth of Aldersgate has improved from \$220,000.00 to over \$1,200,00.00.

The most important achievement is the associates that are served by the center. It is called a people factory. It is a place where mentally and physically challenged adults can learn to function in society and gain selfconfidence. They learn that God loves them and they are special people who have been placed on this earth for a purpose. The jobs they perform are meaningful jobs that build self-esteem and that they can be proud of performing.

The meeting will be held Tuesday, May 21st, at 9:00 a.m. at the District Courtroom on the 3rd floor of the Courthouse in Baird.

"The new farm law offers a oneshot opportunity to sign up for the new 7-year program," Odom said. "Once the May 20 through July 12 sign-up period closes, only farmers with land coming out of the Conservation Reserve Program will be eligible to enroll."

## Vehicle Inspection Testing Required

AUSTIN-Beginning June 3, ap- and state regulations, the inspector plicants for Class A or B Texas Commercial Driver Licenses will be required to pass pre-trip vehicle in-

"This is really just some fine-tuning of our CDL program," said DPS Inspector John Hall. "New applicants will be required to pass a test to make sure they can determine whether a commercial vehicle is safe to operate on the highway. It should only take about 10 minutes."

CDL applicants previously only had been required to pass an airbrake inspection of their vehicle, Hall said.

The new pre-trip vehicle inspection test, which will include the airbrake inspection, is mandated by federal

CDL applicants should prepare for the test by obtaining and studying a copy of Section 10 of the Texas CDL Handbook at any DPS Driver License office.

Since Texas' federally mandated CDL law went into effect on September 1, 1990, some 560,000 Texans have been issued Commercial Driver Licenses. The pre-trip vehicle inspection test requirement is the first change in the licensing program since then, Hall said.

## Lake Brownwood State Park To Be Opened For Hunting For First Time

AUSTIN-Public hunts will be allowed at five additional state parks, including Lake Brownwood, under action by the Texas Parks and Wildlife commission.

on biological management needs and have tried to be sensitive to park users by setting hunt dates that will have a minimal impact on public access," said Herb Kothmann, public hunting program coordinator for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. "Most of our state park hunts will be conducted during December and January, when traditional park use is at its lowest point of the year." The five parks where public hunts will be offered for the first time are Brownwood, Choke Canyon Calliham Unit, Dinosaur Valley, Garner and Mother Neff. That will bring to 39 the number of state parks in which the hunts are allowed.

The agency also received approval to add the 2.335-acre Tawakoni Wildlife Management Area to the list of public hunting lands.

The public hunting proclamation approved by the commission includes an option for "special package" hunts to be conducted by the agency for promotional or fundraising purposes.

People will be able to pay \$10 for a

chance to hunt for bighorn sheep, desert mule deer, white-tailed deer and pronghorn antelope.

Hunters also are required to buy an annual public hunting permit for \$40 ter public lands to hunt wildlife. Information regarding special public hunts for will be available July 1.

Other proposals adopted Thursday by the commission, to take effect September 1, include:

- Giving landowners, who already have an approved management plan specifying a both-sex harvest quota, the flexibility to allot permits to hunters allowing the harvest of up to five white-tailed deer, but no more than three bucks, on their property.

- Opening a spring turkey season in Bowic, Cass, Chcrokee, Harrison, Jasper, Marion, Nacogdoches, Newton and Trinity counties. It would run from the Monday nearest April 20 for 14 consecutive days, with a bag limit of one gobbler.

- Changing the definition for community fishing lakes to extend special regulations to about 450 reservoirs. The special regulations lower daily bag limits for channel and blue catfish from 25 to five and pole-and-line angling only.

Rural Health Care & Energy Research Cut By House Budget Committee

During the House Budget Committee's consideration of a federal budget for fiscal year 1997, I offered amendments to restore cuts in funding for rural health programs and fossil fuel (oil, gas and coal)

The House Rural Health Care Coalition, which I founded and cochaired, has worked in a bipartisan spirit to address the health care needs of rural America, and I don't intend to sit idly by while the Majority tries to gut some of these programs.

The Majority's budget eliminates the Office of Rural Health Policy, which has served as a clearinghouse for rural health care issues and improved services to rural Americans. The Outreach Grants Program, which has established cost-effective ways to provide health care in rural areas, has also been targeted for elimination.

I introduced an amendment to restore funding for these programs from 1997 through the year 2002. My amendment would have paid for these programs by reducing the tax cut in the Majority's budget package.

Members of Congress who represent large urban areas don't worry about whether there will be a doctor to deliver babies, an emergency room to treat tractor accidents, or a nurse to deal with daily illnesses; those of us who represent rural areas

The Majority's budget will also terminate federal support of fossil fuels research and development in

three years.

With the U.S. importing over 50 percent of our oil, much of it from the unstable Middle East, we as a nation should be doing everything we can to develop our remaining energy sources, lessen our dependence on foreign sources, and keep jobs here at home.

I introduced an amendment to continue funding for fossil energy research and development form 1997 through 2002.

Unfortunately, my amendments were defeated along party line votes, and it will now be up to the House committees of jurisdiction to determine how to meet the Budget Committee's spending targets.
