## Brownwood Regional Home Health Care Has Open House Jan. 21

The Cross Plains Chamber of Commerce officially welcomed Brownwood Regional Home Health Care to the community with a ribbon cutting ceremony on Friday, January 21. The newly remodeled facility held its open house from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. with refreshments for all.

is appropriate or whether medical factors require care that can only be provided in a hospital setting.

A recent addition to Brownwood Regional Home Care Services is a Class B agency to provide custodial care to individuals in medical necessity of this assistance. ## Early Voting To Begin On Wednesday, February 16

Early voting hours for March 8 Democratic Party Primary Election have been announced at the Clyde and Cross Plains voting locations.

Callahan County Commissioners, in a regular commissioners' court meeting held Monday, January 24, set the early voting hours at the two voting locations from 8:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m. each weekday.

Registered voters in Callahan County can vote by early ballot at the Justice of the Peace offices in Clyde and Cross Plains. Early voting for the March 8 Democratic Party Election will begin on Wednesday, February 16 and conclude on Friday, March 4.

One early voting date for Saturday, February 26 will be held at both locations from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

Early voting at the Callahan County Courthouse in Baird will take place at the county clerk's from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. each weekday, beginning February 16.

Any of the seven county voting precincts can vote early at any of the three early voting locations.

Other agenda items brought before county commissioners included:

—Commissioners voted to establish a Salary Grievance Committee for county employees to file salary grievances. The committee consists of Charles Steph of Clyde, Kathy Broadfoot of Clyde and Bill Gunn of Baird.

—Commissioners met with B.P.

Stephenson to discuss transferring authority from the Clyde, Cross Plains and Putnam Housing Authorities to Baird's Housing Authority. County commissioners asked Stephenson to have letters to present from the three housing authorities giving permission for the change. No action was taken by county commissioners.

—Commissioners voted to have the Federal Wage and Labor Law Institute perform a survey and help establish a County Employee Handbook for Callahan County. The cost for the survey and handbook will be \$1,800 plus expenses.

—County commissioners took no ac-

tion on a request from property owners to have County Road 487, located in Joe Ingram's Cross Plains Commissioner Precinct #4, closed to thru traffic. The county road, which comes out of Atwell to Baird, is seldom used and the property owners on the county road have signed a petition to have the road closed. Commissioners took no action until a notice was to run in the *Cross Plains Review* announcing the road closing and taking public comments on the matter.

The next meeting of the Callahan County Commissioners' Court will be held Monday morning, February 14 at 9:30 a.m.

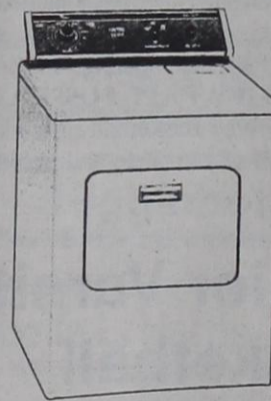

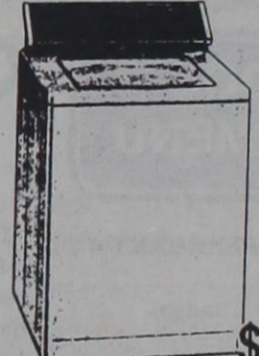

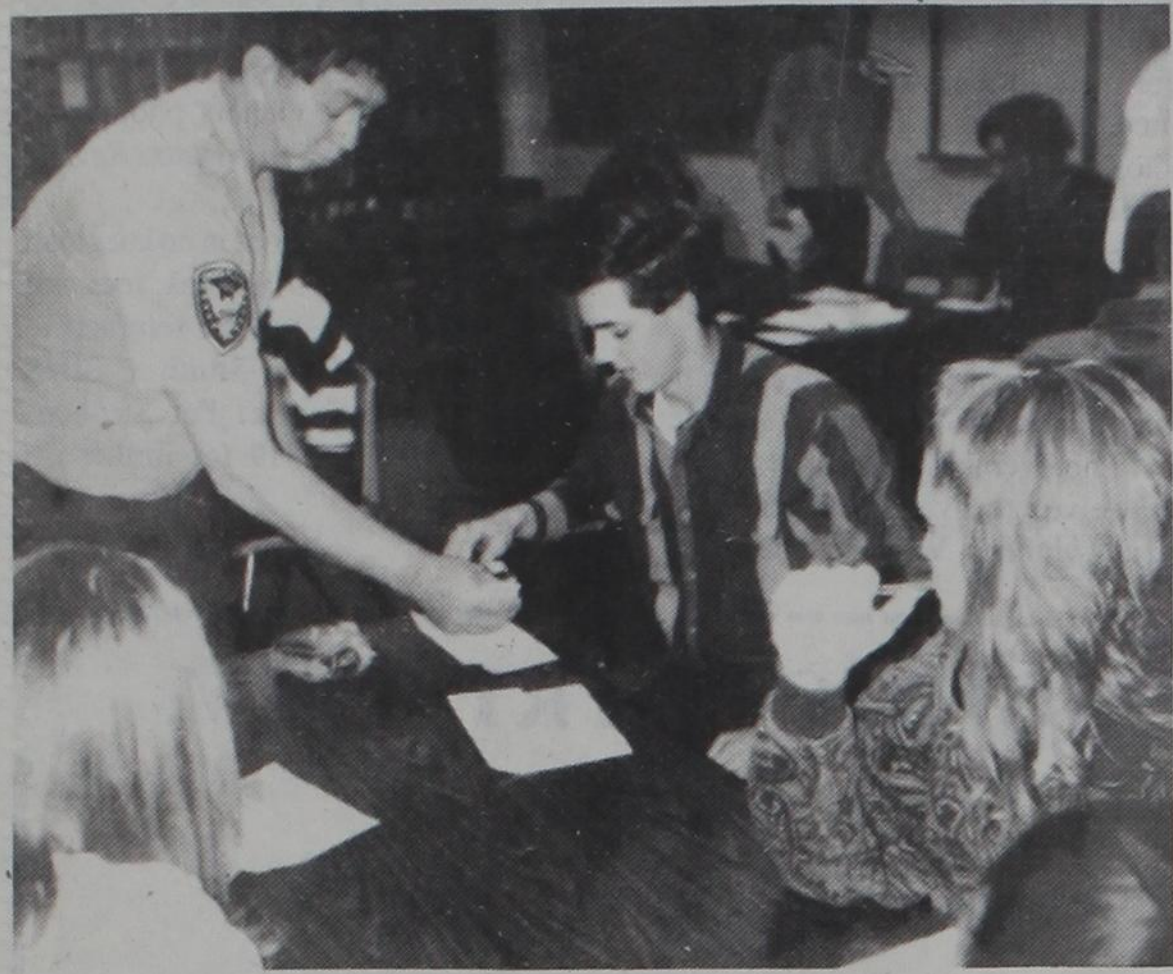

## Child Registry Program

The Cross Plains High School PAL (Peers Accepting Learning and Sharing) students will be sponsoring a program, beginning in the month of February that was developed as a positive deterrent to the continuing epidemic of child abduction. It is known as the "Child Registry Program."

The parents or guardians of children in grades Early Childhood through the 5th grade will have the opportunity to participate. For each student, a Child Registry Handbook will be available. By completing one of these booklets, parents will have an up-to-date and accurate record of each child in the event of an emergency such as an abduction.

These booklets, when completed, will contain such information as dental and immunization records, recent photographs, fingerprints, and other pertinent information that would help the authorities if it were necessary.

On Friday, January 21, the 22 PAL students were given instructions by Cross Plains Police Officer Don Griffith

on how to take accurate fingerprints. Each of the students then had the opportunity to practice taking prints.

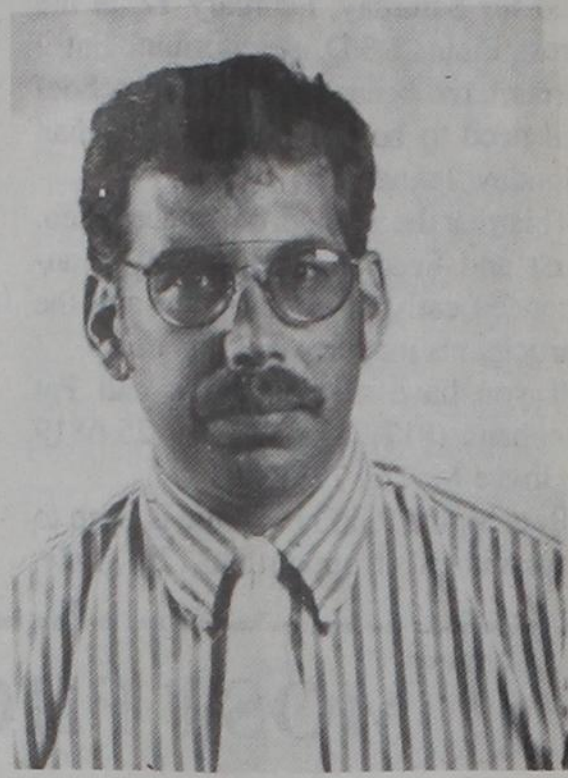
Earlier in the week, high school PAL sponsor, Dena Fielder, met with the elementary teachers to explain the program and showed samples of the Child Registry booklets. According to Fielder, the PAL students will begin filling out the booklets with the information that is already available through the school. At a later date, the booklets will be sent to each student's parent to be completed.

There will be no charge to the parents for these booklets. The cost of the program has been taken care of — partially by the C.P. Kiwanis organization and partially by the school district.

Information sheets and permission slips will be sent home by the PAL students in the near future, so be watching for them.

The PAL group meets for only 30 minutes a day during the high school activity period after lunch, so it will take a few weeks to compile and record all the information before the booklets are sent home.

## Junior High Girl's Basketball Report

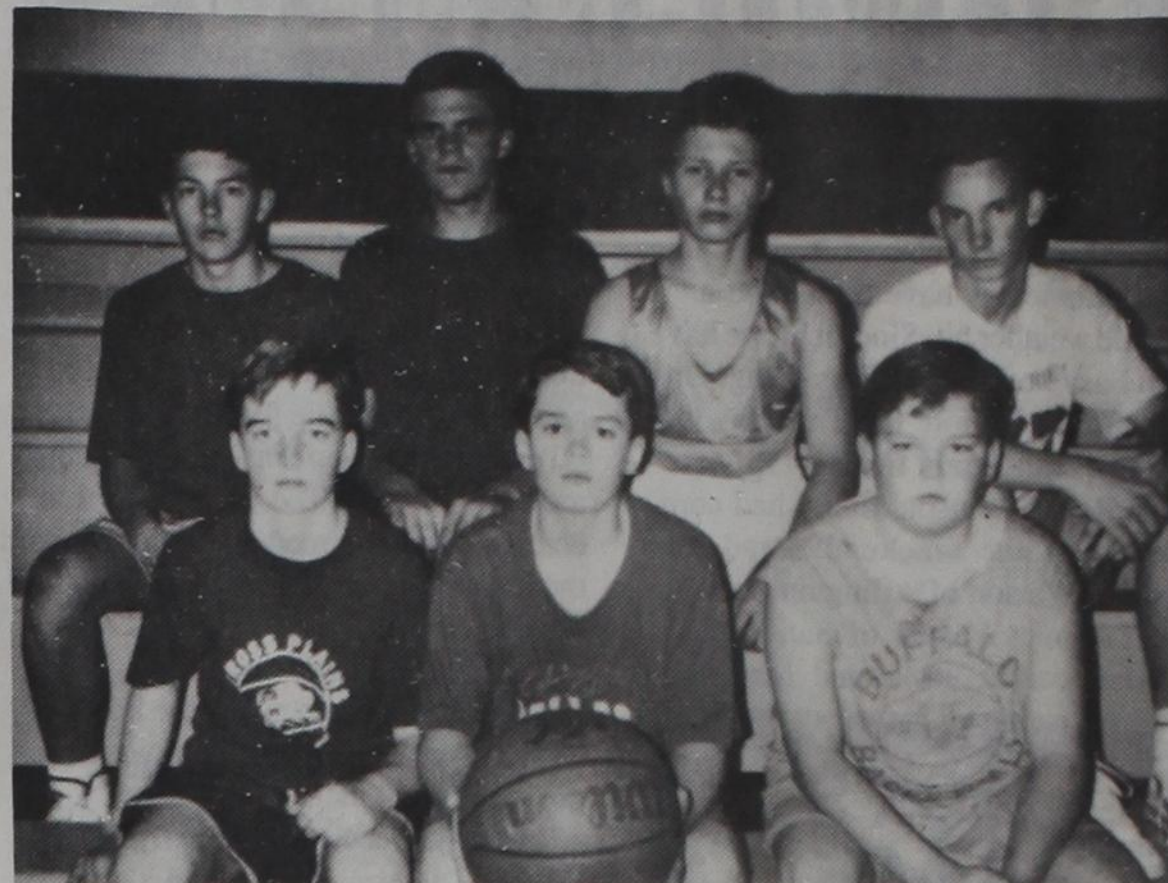

The library had to meet strict criteria, according to Joan McCowen, such as hours of access, staffing requirements, number of library materials, and local per capita support to become an accredited member. Public libraries must apply and qualify for membership annually. Cross Plains Public Library has been a member of the Big Country Library System for fourteen years.

By being in the State Library System, the Cross Plains Public Library has advantages it could not have otherwise, such as computers, projectors, extension loan books, interlibrary loan, workshops, and advisors.

Authorized by the Library Systems Act of 1969, The Texas Library System was developed to improve library service in the state through cooperative efforts. Comprised of ten regions, the statewide system provides an opportunity for local libraries to make the best possible use of

both their own resources and those available elsewhere in the system. These cooperative efforts are made possible through state and federal funds appropriated to the Library Development Program of the Texas State Library. This year the Texas State Library will distribute about \$7.7 million to the ten library systems.

"Membership in the Texas Library System means that we can meet many needs of the community," commented Billie Loving, librarian. "What books we don't have, we can get, plus the fact that we have access to materials and equipment we could never afford. For ex-

ample, this year we will have a new computer with modem and a FAX modem, a CD ROM player, plus three programs. The computer will simplify administrative tasks such as cataloging, letter writing, and book ordering. The citizens who worked so hard to begin the library and to see that it qualified for the State Library System were people with vision. Hopefully, we can keep their dreams alive."

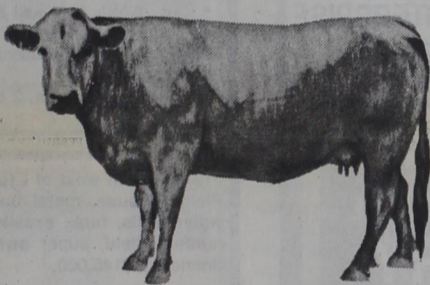

**Free Income Tax Service**

Through the Tax-Aide program, volunteers provide free personal income tax assistance to the Senior Citizens, low-income families and the general public with basic tax returns, individuals with complicated tax returns will be advised to seek professional tax assistance.

Volunteers are specially trained, in cooperation with the U.S. Internal Revenue Service (IRS), to understand those provisions of the tax code that affect Senior Citizens as well as the low and middle income families. Tax-Aide volunteers provide personal, one-on-one assistance to help you complete your federal tax returns, including special rebate programs.

Tax-Aide volunteers are available from February 1st to April 15th each year. There will be two volunteers working the Cross Plains area using the Multi-Purpose Center on East 8th Street as their headquarters. Tax returns will be prepared by APPOINTMENT ONLY, so you will need to call the volunteers personally for appointments. Volunteers are Pauniece Oglesby 725-6772 and Susie Rogers 725-7552. Mrs. Oglesby prefers to volunteer on Tuesdays, but will make appointment on other days if necessary. Mrs. Rogers wishes to volunteer on Tuesdays also.

When you meet with a Tax-Aide volunteer, you should bring the following: (1) a copy of last year's (1993) income tax return, (2) any W-2 forms you have received showing your income from working, (3) all 1099 forms you have received which show the interest and/or dividends, (4) all 1099-R forms which show all pension monies paid to you, (5) form SSA-1099 which shows the Social Security paid to you, (6) records of any other income you have received, and (7) receipts or cancelled checks for any of your medical/dental expenses and any contributions you have made to charities.

This is a community service available to those stated above and the Tax-Aide volunteers are eager to be of assistance, so please call for an appointment and let us help you.

## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

An "Open Letter" to our Community, especially to and in the interest of the Larry Cheshier Family.

In light of recent tragic deaths of young people in our area, most recently that of Scott Cheshier, I pass on some information from the January issue of *Ministry*, a publication I receive, from an article entitled "Living with Dying."

Victor M. Parachin, writer of the article, quotes the following from another writer, Nicholas Wolterstorff, in "A Lament for a Son" that he wrote four years after he lost his 25-year-old son in an accident: "It's so wrong, so profoundly wrong, for a child to die before its parents. It's hard enough to bury our parents. But that we expect. Our parents belong to our past, our children belong to our future. We do not visualize our future without them. How can I bury my son, my future, one of the next in line? He was meant to bury me!"

Mr. Parachin offers six suggestions for such parents and those of us who minister to them (which reaches beyond those of us commonly referred to as "minister"!):

- 1) Encourage the parents to find friendly listeners (the bereaved need people who are genuinely interested in them, and who will listen to their pain and share their hurts);
- 2) Show the grief and faith co-exist (while faith cushions the blow of bereavement, grief often deepens the experience of faith);
- 3) Encourage the bereaved to join a support group (the pain of child loss is so deep that it cannot be understood and analyzed, only shared and supported);
- 4) Lead the bereaved to tap faith resources (prayer, Bible reading, Christian fellowship, worship);
- 5) Professional counseling if/when needed;
- 6) Prepare the bereaved for special days (encourage them to do something special on these days in memory of their child or other loved one — give a book or bouquet of flowers or a visit to someone else lonely or in need).

A remark by one parent, a "minister" himself, might help those of us who need to, want to, ought to minister to the Cheshiers and others who are bereaved: "For a week the phone never stopped ringing after our son died, then it never rang. I thought I'd go crazy, and felt like screaming in the silence."

Most of what is shared in this "Open Letter" is from the magazine and writer afore mentioned. If you would desire a complete copy of Mr. Parachin's article, call me or write me and I will be glad to supply you with one.

Larry, Theresa and Kevin, may "the Lord Bless you and keep you; the Lord make His face shine upon you, and be gracious to you; the Lord lift up His countenance upon you, and give you peace." (Numbers 6:24-26)

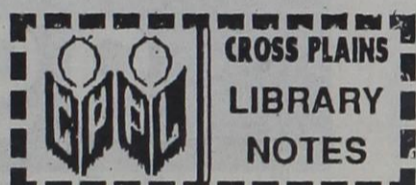
