

Purpose of the movement is to stimulate growth and enrichment of this little city, with aim of creating new jobs and improving the quality of life here. Projects of this type are now being initiated all across Texas by civic-minded groups. Thrust to the economic development

It was stressed at Thursday's initial session that if such a tax is levied, it could not be spent or dedicated to any purpose until agreed upon by local citizenry. Texas law require that a public hearing be conducted before any project is considered for use of this tax money.

All funds originating from the half cent impost must be spent in Cross Plains, yet more than half will be paid by non residents, according to an estimate made by a representative of the State Comptroller's Office in a recent meeting with local business people.

Scores of Texas towns have already availed themselves to the advantages of this tax and others are reported lodging funds in escrow to lure development and aid enlargements and extensions to existing business concerns. The little city of Munday, a town North of Abilene and near the size of Cross Plains, reports that it has already attracted three new establishments and created 25 jobs within that township. Other towns and small cities reportedly now involved in this type of development include: Anson, Childress, Early, Hamlin, Hempstead, Kemah, New Boston, Olney, Rotan, Shamrock, Stamford, Overton and Cisco.

Texas law requires that a corporation, apart from the city council or governing body, be established to administer and use the sales tax funds. The corporation is required to file articles of incorporation with the secretary of state. The corporation's registered office must be within the city that imposes the tax.

While the following projects which are now being worked on by other small Texas towns are in no wise guidelines for Cross Plains, they are listed as follows: hatchery, junior college extension facilities, prison, sewing factory, printing plant, incubator, recycling factory, trades show quarters, utility extensions and enlargements, franchised business outlets, clothing manufacturer, substance abuse center, ratite (big bird) processing plant and others. At the meeting Thursday the opinion was voiced that local people might have beneficial suggestions to add to the foregoing list.

County Commissioners Pursue Disaster Relief Grant For Area

Callahan County Commissioners have retained the services of a grant writing company in an effort to receive a \$350,000 Disaster Relief Grant from the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs to assist tornado victims in the Cross Plains and Cottonwood areas.

Commissioners met Monday, November 14 during a regular commissioners' court meeting at the county courthouse in Baird to retain the services of TMS Group, Inc. of San Saba to serve as grant program administrator for the \$350,000 Disaster Relief Grant application to the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs.

Callahan County Judge Bill Johnson said a representative of the group met with the county commissioners to discuss the grant application. Judge Johnson said the company representative was optimistic their company could obtain the grant for the county. Judge Johson said the company recently obtained a grant for Lometa tornado vic-

Johnson said there would be no cost to the county in trying to obtain the grant and if the grant was approved, TMS Group, Inc. would be paid with grant funds for administering the grant application program.

-County commissioners met with Clyde Justice of the Peace Clerk Margie Blalock to discuss adjusting her salary to coincide with other clerks' salaries working in the tax assessor's office. Commissioners voted to adjust Blalock's salary to be the same as those clerks in the tax assessor's office. Blalock is a full-time clerk in the Clyde Justice of the Peace office and her duties are the same as those clerks in the tax assessor's office.



lonce heard a speaker trying to impress the importance of sincerity being in the lives of ones trying to help others, and he did so - yet in a joking way by saying, "Be sincere! Remember, be sincere! Above everything, be sincere — even if you have to fake it!"

That's an interesting word — "sincere." It means "without wax." Seems in the "old days" natural flaws in monuments and statues of marble and granite would be filled with wax and polished over. 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



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

Department of Agriculture today announced a preliminary 7.5 percent Acreage Reduction Program (ARP) requirement for the 1995 upland cotton

The Agricultural Act of 1949, as include: amended, requires the upland cotton ARP to be announced by Nov. 1. It also requires that the program lead to a supply/use situation in which projected ending stocks approximate, as closely as possible, 29.5 percent of the projected total of domestic mill use and exports for the 1995 marketing year.

Based on USDA's October supply and use estimates, USDA determined that a 7.5 percent ARP level will most likely achieve stocks meeting this ratio. A

DES MOINES, Nov. 3--President Clinton announced today that approximtely \$1 billion in emergency disaster aid will be made available to farmers whose crops were damaged due to adverse weather conditions in 1994. Abnormal weather patterns, causing excessive rainfall or drought, have led to substantial crop losses in isolated but widespread areas of the country.

"While these particular losses will not have an adverse impact on national production of the affected crops, the losses have been devastating to individual producers," Clinton said. "When emergency situations like these occur and farmers suffer losses through no fault of their own, we must be responsive to their needs and the hardships they face."

Farmers suffering losses due to these natural disasters may apply for emergency assistance at their local Farm Service Agency (FSA) office beginning on December 1. FSA is a newly-created agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture which combines functions formerly carried out by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation and the Farmers Home Administration.

The 1994 program is similar to those in recent years, in which farmers with crop insurance who suffered crop losses greater than 35 percent of normal production (or 40 percent losses for those without crop insurance) will be eligible for partial reimbursement.
