The Flag Corp's performance was outstanding. The six girls skillfully waved their golden flags as they exhibited their routine in perfect synchronization.

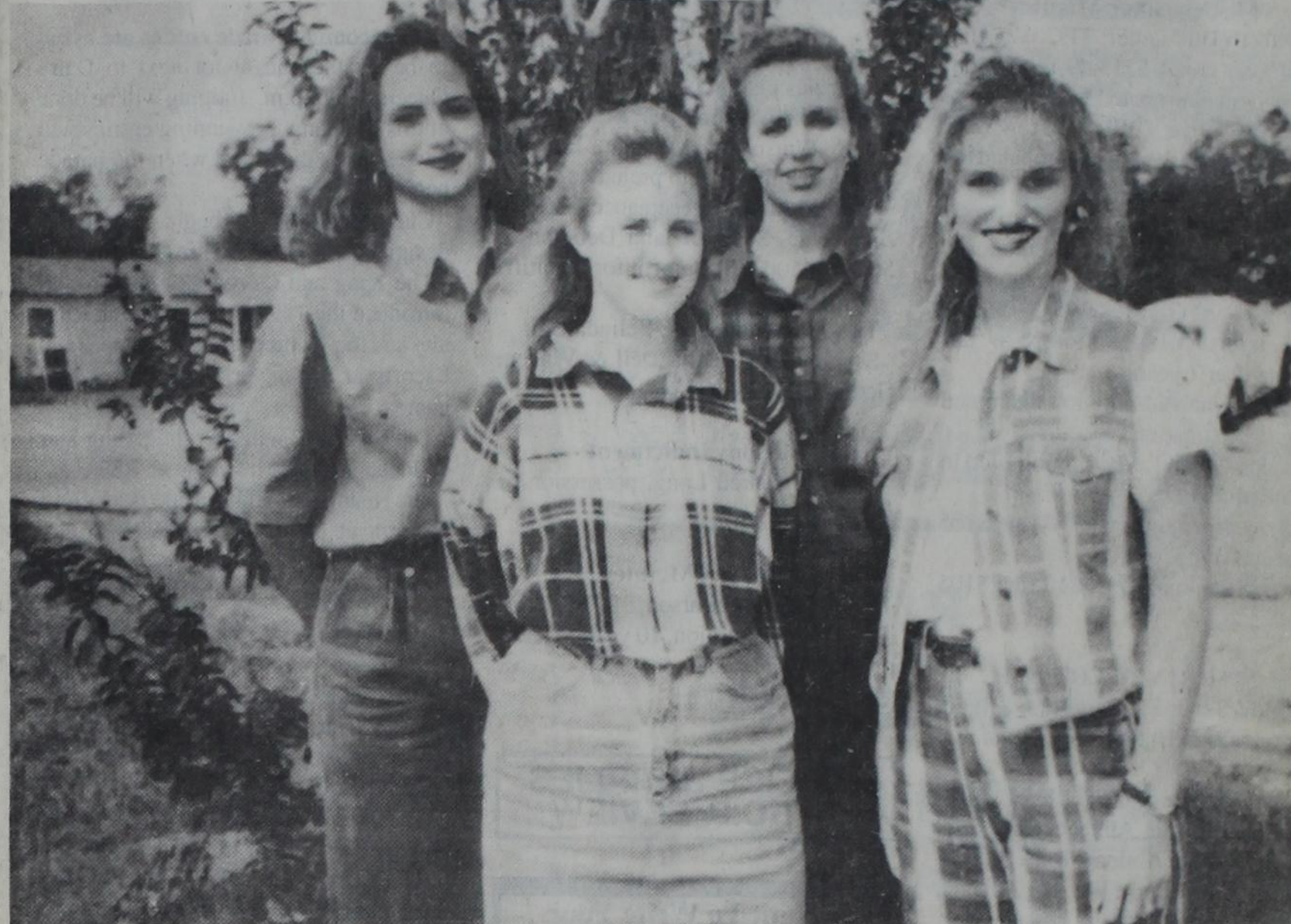

BUFFS DEFEAT GORMAN FOR TOP DISTRICT PLACING

BUFFS TAKE POSSESSION OF FIRST PLACE

It looked like a good sign last Friday night at Gorman when the Buffs started the game by attempting an on-side kick as the first play of the game...and it worked (recovered by Jody Fortune)...and it resulted in 7 points and by the last buzzer, Cross Plains was 1st in district with a narrow victory of 14-13 over the scrappy Panthers. The Buffs overall record is now 4-3-1 with the district record 3-0.

In stats, Cross Plains was out numbered in first downs 14-18, and in rushing yards 210-286. In passing, Cross Plains was accurate 37 percent of the time (13-8-no interceptions) to Gorman's 20 percent rate (1-5-1).

Leading rusher again this week was Jimmy Lee with 85 yards on 16 carries. Next was Cole Gilliam with 76 yards in 14 carries. Quarterback Brock Walker carried for 27 yards, including the 2 TD's, and had 67 yards passing.

All of the scoring occurred in the first quarter and 4th quarter. The 2nd and 3rd quarters saw some exciting defensive action.

On one play, freshman Jody Fortune was the last Buffalo between Cross Plains and the goal line. He used his speed and caught the Gorman runner preventing the TD and slowing the Gorman drive.

On another crucial play, sophomore,

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"It's a matter of life or death!" So reported the King County Humane Society of Seattle, Washington, looking for people to play with caged puppies. The idea was to prevent what they called an emotional break. "We've all seen the break," they say. "We'll take a loving, beautifully well adjusted puppy that has even passed its health exam — that has known love and children, and has romped on green grass — and then put it in a cage, and it breaks. Emotionally, it breaks! It will get in the back of the kennel and cringe, or perhaps run-back and forth in sort of a seesaw game."

The reason the humane society gives for this "emotional break" is that the animal feels rejected. That's sad, but as sad as it is for an animal to feel rejected, how many times sadder — how tragic! — for a human being to be or even feel rejected! How sad for one of God's creations in His own image to feel "all down inside," that nothing really matters and no one really cares.

What's needed in our lives is someone(s) who does care and is concerned about us — someone who values us and affirms us, who considers us of worth, not because of where we live or who we know, but because we are a human being. This Person who does so care is revealed in a document nearly two thousand years old, the New Testament. It says nothing can separate us from the love of God, which is in Him, Jesus Christ the Lord. What's needed by each of us is that kind of Someone who really cares — either Him and/or His representative(s).

Come learn with us to be better "carers." And by the way, we really do care about you, too!

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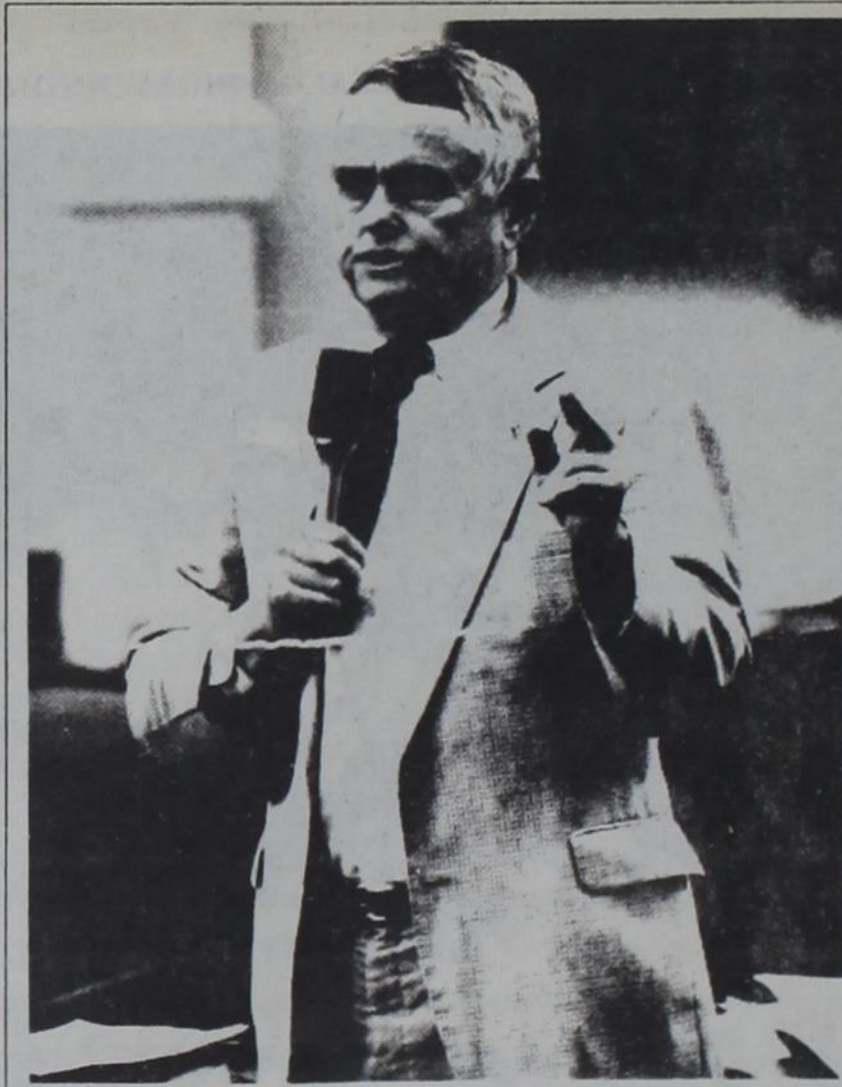

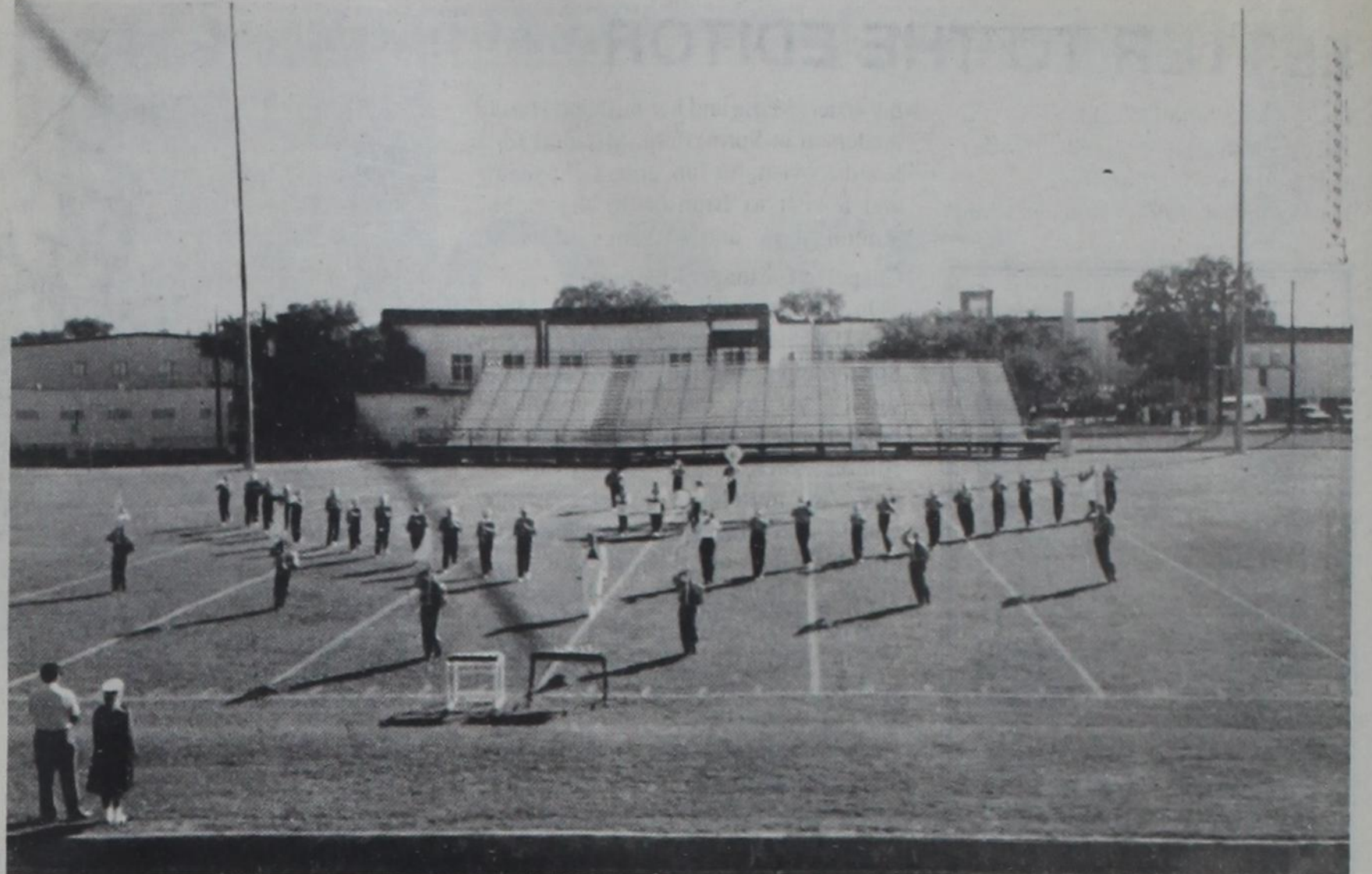

Lady Buffs Basketball Approaching

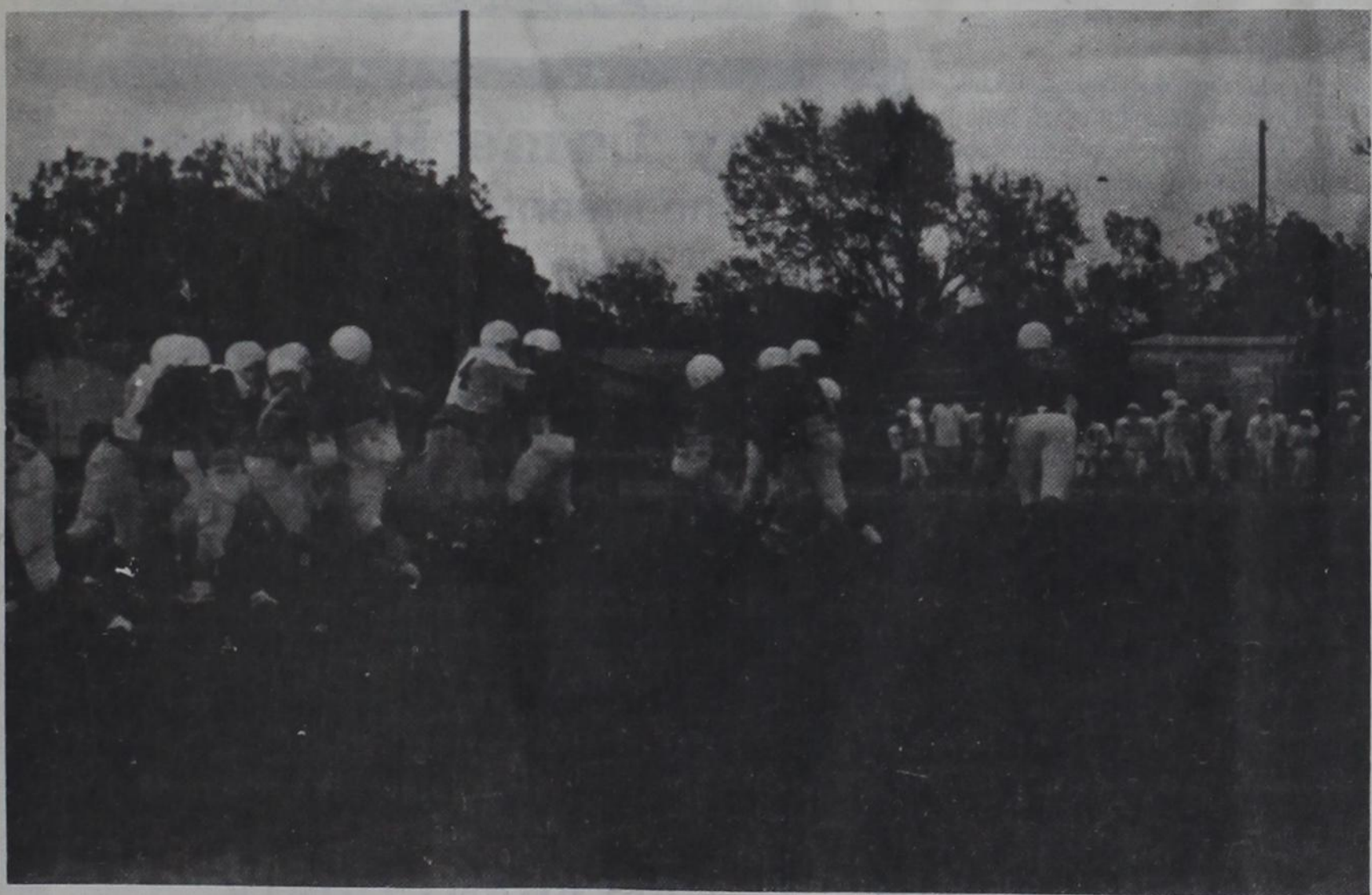

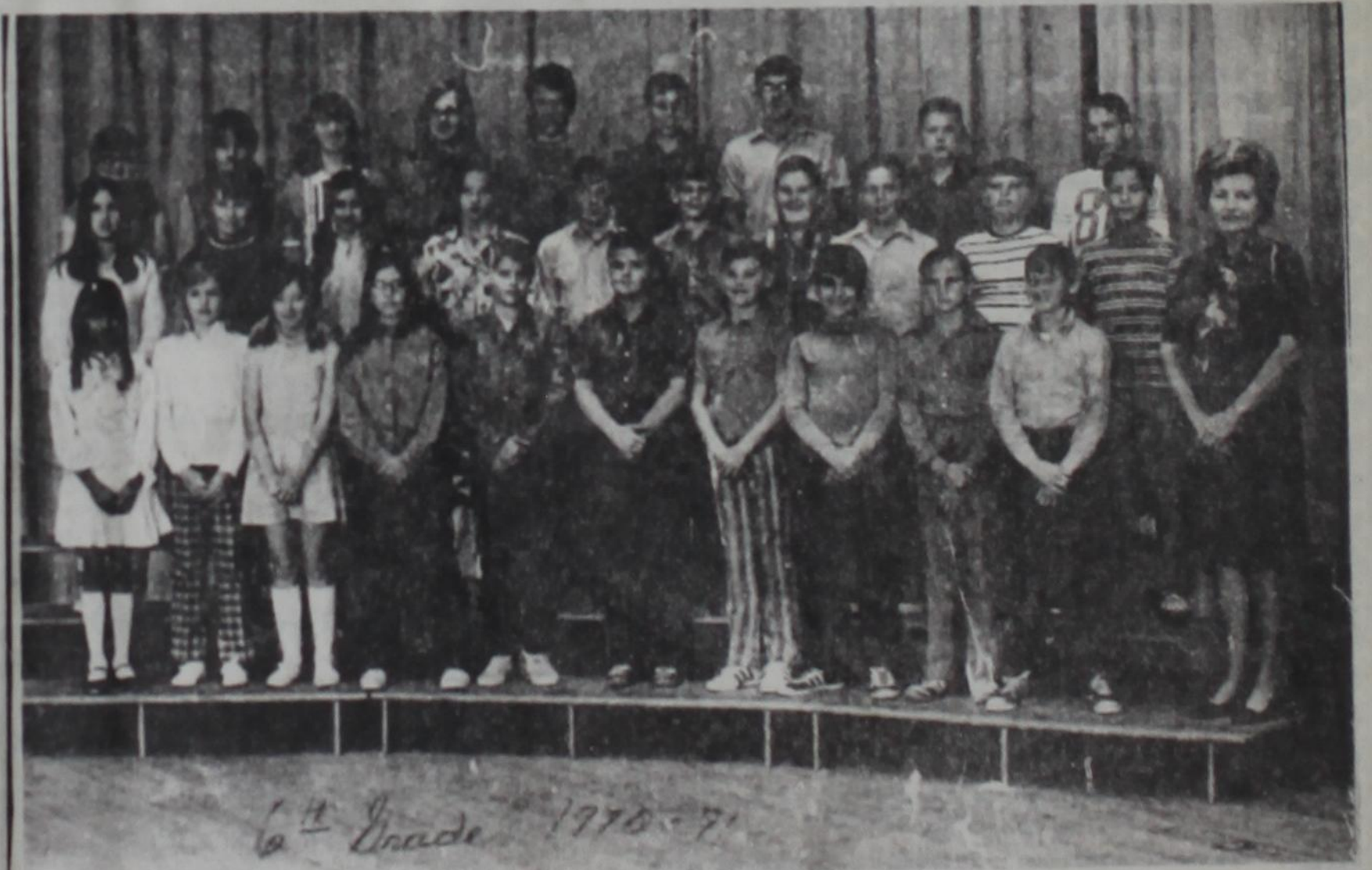

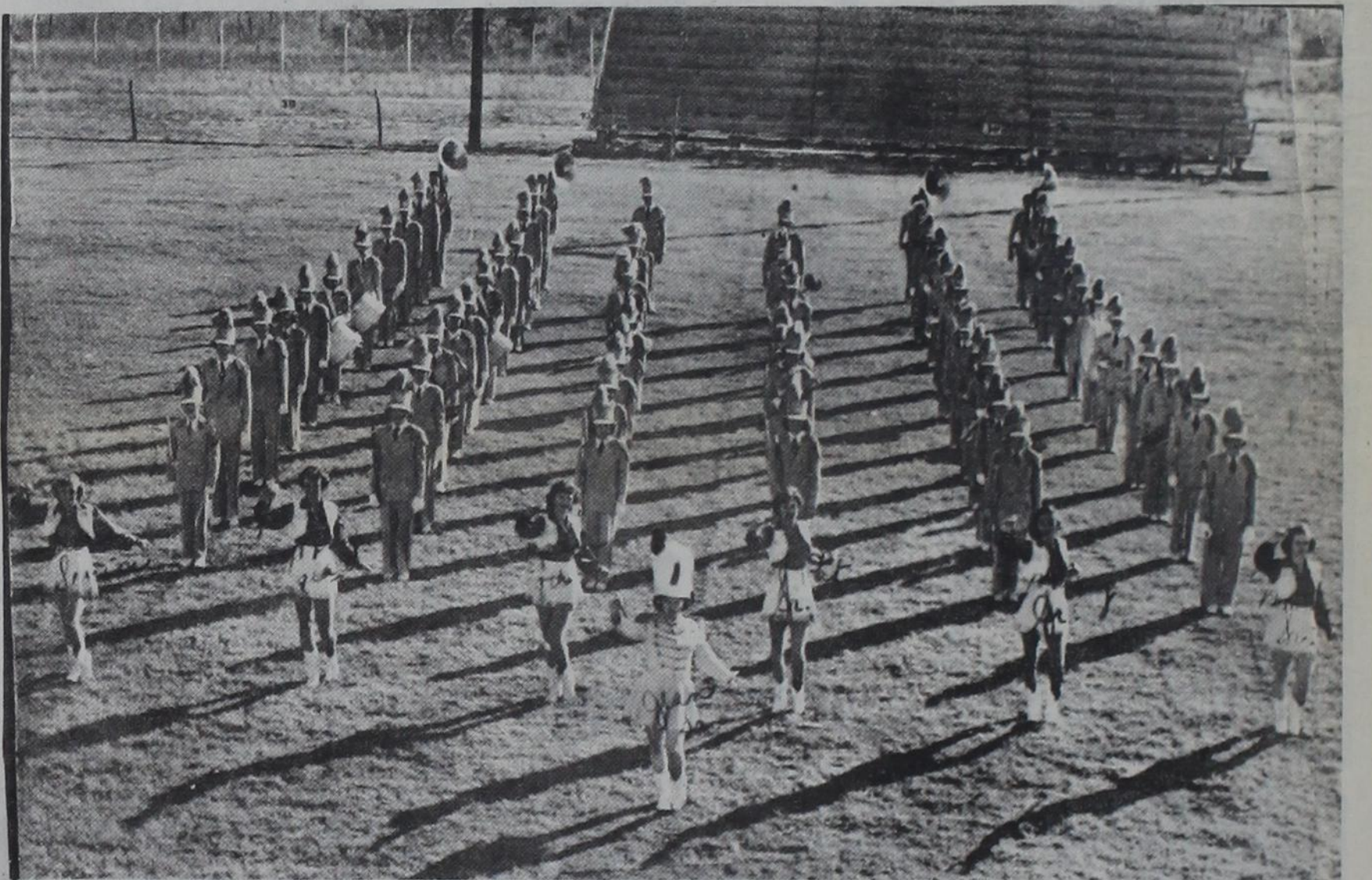

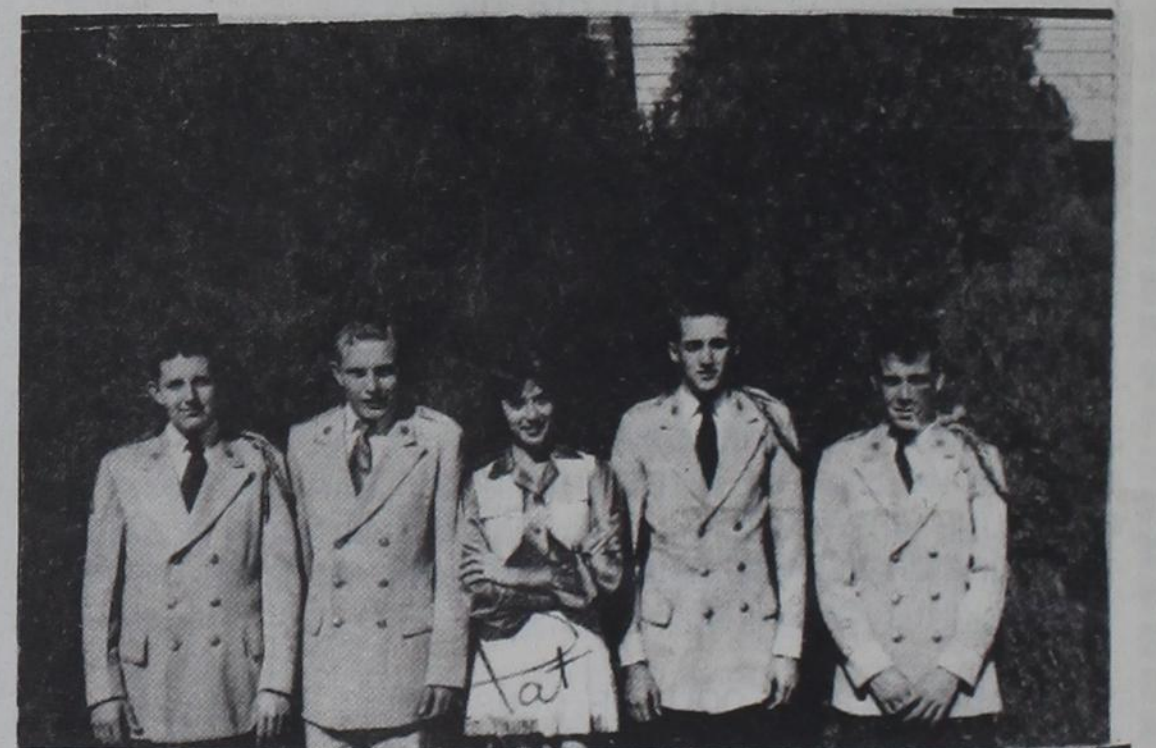
