

> The Flag Corp's performance was outstanding. The six girls skillfully waved their golden flags as they exhibited their routine in perfect synchronization.



BUFFS DEFEAT GORMAN FOR TOP DISTRICT PLACING

# BUFFS TAKE POSSESSION OF FIRST PLACE

It looked like a good sign last Friday night at Gorman when the Buffs started the game by attempting an on-side kick as the first play of the game...and it worked (recovered by Jody Fortune)...and it resulted in 7 points and by the last buzzer, Cross Plains was 1st in district with a narrow victory of 14-13 over the scrappy Panthers. The Buffs overall record is now 4-3-1 with the district record 3-0.

In stats, Cross Plains was out numbered in first downs 14-18, and in rushing yards 210-286. In passing, Cross Plains was accurate 37 percent of the time (13-8-no interceptions) to Gorman's 20 percent rate (1-5-1).

Leading rusher again this week was Jimmy Lee with 85 yards on 16 carries. Next was Cole Gilliam with 76 yards in 14 carries. Quarterback Brock Walker carried for 27 yards, including the 2 TD's, and had 67 yards passing.

All of the scoring occurred in the first quarter and 4th quarter. The 2nd and 3rd quarters saw some exciting defensive

On one play, freshman Jody Fortune was the last Buffalo between Cross Plains and the goal line. He used his speed and caught the Gorman runner preventing the TD and slowing the Gorman drive\_


