Texas Historical Commission Seeks Old Photos For State Cemetery Restoration Project

AUSTIN—Dig into the attic and forgotten trunk. Resurrect the old handed-down picture albums and scrapbooks.

The Texas Historical Commission (THC) is interested in acquiring or copying historic photographs, documents, publications, or ephemeral items relating to the history of the Texas State Cemetery in Austin. Many of the cemetery's some 3,000 monuments, as well as the historic greenhouse and fountain, need repair and maintenance. Plans for restoration of the cemetery are now underway, and the THC is acting as a restoration advisor for the project.

According to Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, who referred to it as the Arlington National Cemetery of Texas, the State Cemetery should rank among Texas' most cherished landmarks, and the condition of its monuments and other elements should reflect its status. After a recent visit to the cemetery, Bullock called for the cemetery's restoration, and directed numerous state agencies to oversee the work over several years.

"Early photographs, documents, and other materials would help make our research for a historically accurate restoration of the cemetery possible," said

Gerron Hite, preservation architect with the THC. The materials also may be used for an exhibit in a visitor center that is being planned for the 18-acre graveyard that dates to the mid-19th century.

The Texas State Cemetery contains the graves and monuments of many of Texas' greatest military leaders, pioneers, government officials, educators, and literary figures who contributed to the growth and history of Texas. The graves and monuments of Stephen F. Austin, Gen. Albert Sidney Johnston, William Alexander Anderson "Bigfoot" Wallace, and folklorist J. Frank Dobie are among them.

Crooks said late Sunday that although

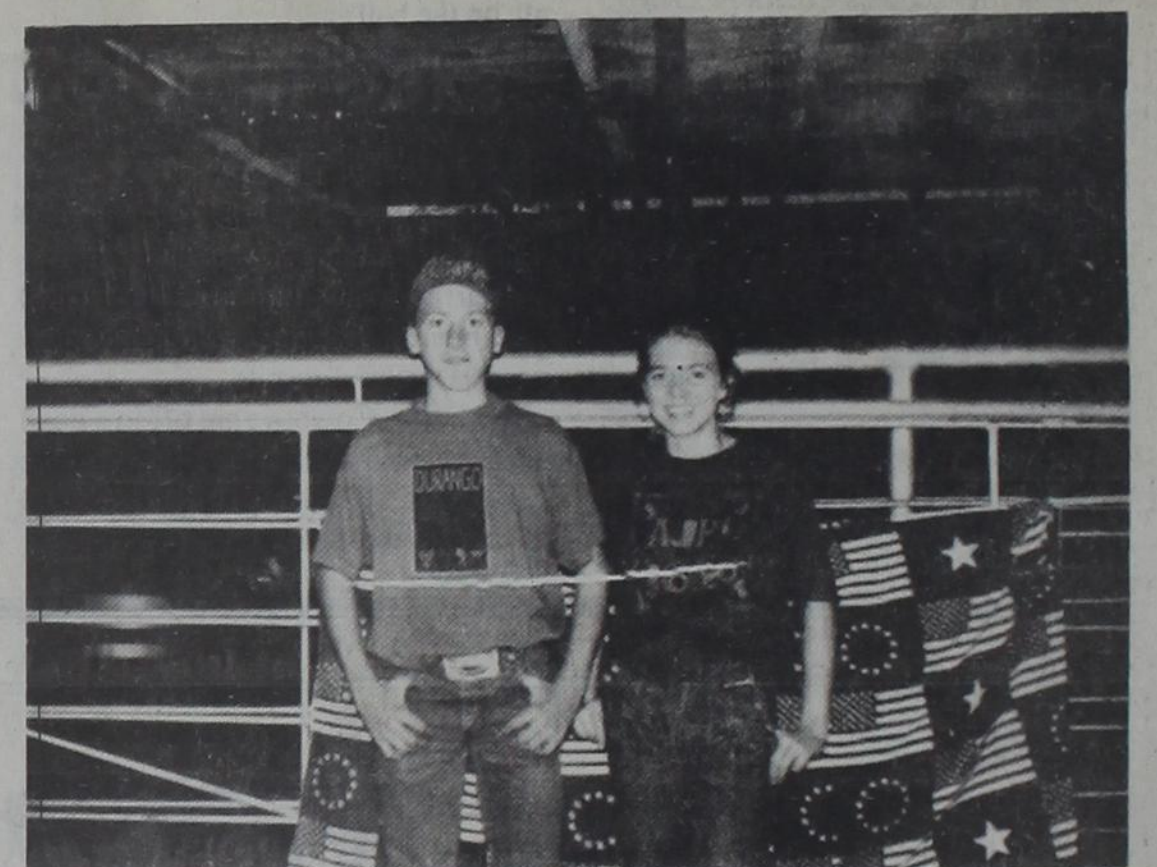
the investigation in the death is continuing, foul play at this time is not suspected.

Stenholm Seeking Applicants

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Congressman Charles W. Stenholm has announced that he is currently seeking applicants for nomination to the United States Service Academies. Applications for nomination to the U.S. Military Academy in West Point, New York, the U.S. Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colorado, the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland, and the United States Merchant Marine Academy in Kings point, New York, may be obtained by writing to Congressman Stenholm's San Angelo office.

Nominations are available to young men and women who will be at least 17 years of age, and not past their 22nd birthday, upon entry into the academy in July. Nominees are selected by a competitive process, judged on scholastic aptitude, moral character, leadership ability, and community involvement.

The academies offer a four-year degree in a variety of areas ranging from Civil Engineering and Physics, to American Studies and Behavioral Science. While attending the academies, cadets and midshipmen will earn an annual salary from which expenses for books, uniforms and incidentals are taken. Tuition, room, board, medical and dental expenses are paid for by the academies. Upon graduation from the academies, the cadets and midshipmen will serve as officers in the service for a minimum of six years.

Any persons who may be interested in applying for a nomination, or who would like to obtain additional information, should write to Congressman Charles W. Stenholm, 33 East Twohig #318, San Angelo Texas 76903. Applications must be submitted, and files completed, no later than December 1, 1994. Nominations will be made toward the end of December.

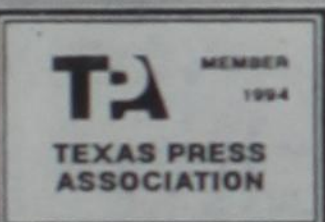

Pilot In Fatal Crash Termed 'Clueless'

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—A Texas pilot who died in a crash along with a local TV reporter was "clueless" and could not safely fly high-performance aircraft when he failed a Navy flyer program in 1987, his superiors said at the time.

The Sunday Oklahoman reported on the military service records of Maurice "Skip" Stevens in a copyright story. The newspaper obtained the records through a Freedom of Information Act request.

Stevens died July 5 near Dover when the plane he was flying crashed into a riverbed. Also killed was Kathy Jones, a reporter for KFOR-TV who was working on a story about Stevens' mock dog-fighting company.

Stevens was part owner of Air Strikes International of McKinney, Texas. The company offered customers a chance to fly simulated combat missions in high performance prop-driven planes.

In 1987, Stevens failed to pass two qualification rounds to fly A-6E attack jets from aircraft carriers. Such landings are one of the most difficult challenges of Navy aviation.

The newspaper said Stevens failed his first A-6 carrier qualification round in December 1986 and a second chance in May 1987, despite one-on-one training by experienced flyers and more than 200 prior practice runs.

An evaluation board never allowed to Stevens to fly in the Navy again, records show.

"I do not believe that LTJG (Lieutenant Junior Grade) Stevens has the aeronautical ability to safely fly high-performance aircraft," R.Y. Weber, commanding officer in May 1987 of the VA-42 squadron, said of Stevens' second attempt.

"Clueless," wrote Lt. M.G. Hayes, another evaluator of Stevens' May 1987 performance.

The head of the qualification phase, Lt. C.D. Weber, said Stevens' first qualification try was the worst he had seen in 2 years.

"LTJG Stevens failed in virtually every fundamental carrier qualification criteria. He demonstrated no learning curve or improvement, even on his second-day period after a thorough debriefing..." C.D. Weber wrote.

"He lacks both an understanding of fundamental corrective techniques and basic air sense—that feeling of how the aircraft is responding to changes in power, attitude, etc.," Weber wrote.

A navy review board later allowed

Stevens to keep his "wings," symbolic of completing basic aviator training, but he was banned from flying Navy aircraft.

Whereas, In addition to being a career woman, Kathy was a devoted wife and mother; she brought brightness into the lives of those who lived and worked with her; now, therefore, be it
