**Announces** 

Retirement

Lee Thompson, long time Cross Plains school superintendent has announced that he will retire at the end of the current school year, June 30, 1996. Mr. Thompson came to Cross Plains in 1981 and will have completed fifteen years as superintendent in the district upon his retirement.

Mr. Thompson began his career as an educator in Blum, as a teacher and coach in 1958, after receiving his bachelor's degree from Sul Ross State in Alpine. From there he went to Meridian, and Cleveland, in similar positions. He completed his master's degree from the University of North Texas at Denton, and accepted a counseling position with the Irving I.S.D. After ten years in the Irving school district he moved to Whitney the end of this school year will have completed thirty-eight years as an educator in the Texas public schools.

He has observed many changes in society and education during his career as an educator. Perhaps the greatest change has been in the increase of the responsibility of the school to assume the role of teaching the whole child rather that the basic 3 R's of "reading, 'riting, and 'rithmetic." As economics forces both parents into the work place and with the increase in the number of single parents, the community can expect to see an even larger growth in the role of the school within the community. Administrators, other educators in the school system, and community members will constantly be evaluating and adapting services to meet the changing needs of our students

### **Blood Thinner Drug Prevent Strokes**

Greater use of the anticoagulant drug, "warfarin," sold as Coumadin, could save lives and prevent 40,000 strokes a year. The recent study recommends that Coumadin be used by patients with atrial fibrillation (fast, irregular heartbeats). Coumadin thins the blood and lessens the chance of clots forming. How much is a Bible worth? Well, Barbara Roberts paid \$5 for one that was/is worth \$25,000! Barbara happened to think it to be sacrilegious to throw a Bible away, so seeing one at a garage sale which she feared would be discarded if unsold, she bought it.

The Bible itself may not have been worth \$5, as values of Bibles go, per se. But tucked inside the Bible, between two of its pages, was an original copy of the Ulster County (N.Y.) Gazette, dated Sunday, January 4, 1800. The age of the paper would make it quite valuable but there's more. George Washington died on December 14, 1799. Guess whose obituary was in that copy of newspaper? Only two other copies of the original Gazette had ever been previously found; one is at the Smithsonian Institute, the other is at the Massachusetts Historical Society's museum.

Finding something very valuable in that Bible, as Barbara Roberts did, reminds me of such scriptures as Proverbs 23:23 which reads: "Buy the truth and sell it not." And Psalm 19:9-10 which states: "The judgements of the Lord are to be desired more than gold, yea than much fine gold." Psalm 119:72 -- "The law of Your mouth is better to me than thousands of shekels of gold and silver."

heat better than any other variety and is well adapted to this area.

Irrigation before planting will be necessary this spring because of the long, dry period and unusual heat for this time of the year.

Give growing plants a good drink of compost tea for a fast start, and healthy, disease and insect resistant vegetables.

To make compost tea, put good quality compost in a container, fill with water, let set in sun two or three days and then give each plant one cup of tea, or use two pound coffee can and pour down row.

Fertilize lawn and ornamental plants and begin mowing annual grass and weeds in lawn to prevent them from going to seed and becoming next year's problem.

For early flowers, start now inside in containers and sit out in flower garden after danger of frost. This year, try transplanting flowers intermixed with your vegetables for a more attractive garden. Plant roses and fruit trees early.

TIPS: Don't buy seed tapes, make your own. Cut strips of thick paper towels as long as you want. Then make a paste of flour and water and dab drops of paste on the paper towel strips at the seeds recommended spacing. Place a seed in each drop of paste and let the paste dry. Then roll up the dry strips and store the strips in a dry place until you are ready to plant. When you are ready to plant, simply unroll strips where you want to plant, cover with 1/4 inch to 1/2 inch soil and water them well. The paper towel will decompose, the seed will sprout, and the flour paste will become fertilizer.



All individuals with mental retardation have the capacity to learn, develop, and grow. Mental retardation is a condition that appears in a person before the age of 18 in which intelligence is below average and personal and social behaviors do not meet what is expected for the person's age and culture. People with mental retardation may mature at a slower rate and experience difficulty in learning, social adjustment and economic productivity.

Mental retardation and mental illness are not the same condition, although the two terms are often confused. Unlike mental illness, mental retardation is always associated with limited intellectual capacity. It occurs before age 18 and is a permanent condition. By contract, mental illness is not associated with a particular level of intelligence, may occur in a person at nay age and is often temporary and reversible. Both conditions may occur in one individual.

Mental retardation is found in persons of all ages, races, cultures, and economic conditions. An estimated three percent of U.S. population more than 7.5 million people - have mental retardation. According to 1996 TXMHMR statistics, approximately 517,000 Texans have mental retardation.

The Abilene Regional MHMR Center provides services to persons in Taylor, Jones and Callahan Counties. Last year a total of 2,700 individuals were served, 308 of whom had mental retardation. ## Stenholm Votes For Farm Bill

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Congressman Charles Stenholm (D-Stamford) voted to pass the "Agricultural Market Transition Act (AMTA)," legislation to replace traditional crop subsidies with a system of fixed payments. The House of Representatives passed the bill by a vote of 270-155; the Senate approved similar legislation earlier this month.

"Despite my serious reservations about this bill, I recognize that the nation's two million farmers need a policy in place on which to make their 1996 planting decisions," said Stenholm. "By voting for a farm bill today, the process will continue moving along and, hopefully, some of the problems with this bill can be worked out in the conference with the Senate."

The House narrowly rejected amendments to eliminate Government support programs for peanuts and sugar. Stenholm successfully stopped the House effort to climinate the marketing loan program for cotton. Unfortunately, the House rejected the Gunderson dairy compromise, which would have provided stability to dairy producers.

"I could at least understand the point of eliminating subsidies if there was a level playing field for our producers in the international marketplace," observed Stenholm. "But it is foolish to think our producers can somehow


compete without our Governmen standing shoulder to shoulder with them when foreign governments so heavily subsidize our competitors."

Stenholm introduced amendments in the form of a Democratic substitute to provide \$3.5 billion for a Fund for Rural American.


"If the Federal Government is going to withdraw from its partnership with the American producer, investments need to be made in rural America to ease this transition," said Stenholm. "We proposed to increase USDA's authority to make improvements in rural infrastructure for water delivery and sewage disposal, research, education, extension, insurance and conservation."

The substitute also included provisions to provide oil seed loan rates and retain permanent farm law providing for permanent farm support authority. This block of amendments was rejected by the House. Also defeated was an amendment Stenholm introduced to replace the provisions of the bill with a modified version of the Senate farm bill in an effort to expedite the final enactment of policy on which farmers could plan for the current crop year.

"House action improves the bill and gives us a good basis from which to further improve this legislation in conference," added Stenholm.

The past three years have been extremely successful for Callahan County and the Sheriff's Department. As an example of this success, I would like to point out just some high lights of those things we have accomplished.

1. On November 9, 1995, the Callahan County Jail, one of the oldest operating jails in the State of Texas, was inspected and certified to be in compliance with all applicable rules and standards as set forth by the Texas Commission on Jail Standards. This certification remained constant for the past three years.

2. Under my administration, the Sheriff's Department established a Drug Interdiction Program aimed at locating and seizing illegal drugs and the monetary proceeds derived from the sale of those drugs. Since its inception, this program has been responsible for the seizure of more than \$65,000.00 which has been used to further the efforts of disrupting the illegal flow of narcotics and other contraband in and through Callahan County.

3. This Drug Interdiction Program has also been responsible for

providing fiscal savings direct to the taxpayers of Callahan County by using the proceeds from seized funds to purchase the following:

a. New patrol vehicles to replace an aging and sometimes inoperable fleet of cars. To date, we have purchased a 1994 Ford Crown Victoria and a 1995 Jeep Cherokee, the latter of which is also used for transportation of our Narcotics K-9, Leika. All associated equipment in these vehicles, emergency lights, radios and sirens was also purchased with the seized funds.

b. Office computer equipment that is now being utilized to better facilitate records management and report writing efforts within the Sheriff's Department. In addition, we are currently studying the feasibility of adding automated jail records and computer aided dispatch programs to enhance our abilities to better serve you.

4. Also attributed to the efforts of the Drug Interdiction Program is the collection of more than \$25,000.00 in fines through traffic citations issued during "Drug Interdiction" stops.

5. The DARE (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) program was started, in my first year in office and has, to date, been introduced into three of the county's schools. By September of 1996, the DARE program will be in all of the county's schools.

6. Most recently, the TRIAD program was established in our



## **OSU Places** Student **Teachers For** Spring Semester

Oklahoma State University's College of Education has placed 246 student teachers in 121 schools in 54 school districts this spring, according to Robert E. Knaub, OSU coordinator of field relations.

Student teacher supervisors and the Office of Field Relations work closely with principals and teachers to select the best cooperating teachers to mentor these future teachers, according to Knaub.






