

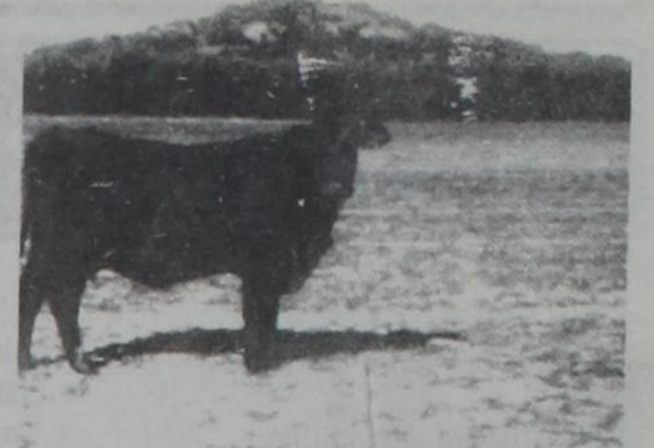

The General Election will be Tuesday, November 8 at the Cross Plains Community Center, between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Friday, November 4 will be the last day for early voting.

Voters in Callahan County will cast their votes by using the new optical scanned ballots.

Last summer, county commissioners authorized the allocating of \$21,095 for

a new ballot counting system which uses an optical scanner to count the ballots.

Tuesday, November 8, county voters will use the new ballot counting system for the first time in the General Election. Polls for the November 8 election will be open from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. at seven different voting locations throughout the county.

Callahan County Judge Bill Johnson said based upon the number of early voting ballots cast, county officials expect a good turnout for the General Election. Johnson said upwards of 4,000 ballots could be cast in the General Election.

Johnson said the new optical vote counting system has been installed at the

county courthouse in Baird for approximately three months. The new vote counting system has been tested a couple of times already, with another test scheduled for Tuesday, November 1. He said the tests are needed to confirm the accuracy of the equipment.

The optical scanner, the size of a large copy machine, can count votes as fast as 3,000 per hour. Judge Johnson said a representative of Hart Graphics in Austin, the company from which the scanning system was purchased, will be at the county courthouse November 8 to assist with the vote counting process.

Judge Johnson stated the vote scanning system is identical to one purchased by Eastland County recently. He explained the first time Eastland County used the optical scanner 7,326 votes were counted within two hours and 46 minutes. Judge Johnson said Callahan County's General Election ballots should be counted two hours after polls close Tuesday at 7:00 p.m.

Judge Johnson said the new optical vote counting system was purchased for its accuracy and convenience. He stated the equipment should be paid for in

Bufs Move One Game Closer

The Cross Plains Homecoming crowd had a great time on Saturday, October 29. Not only was it a chance to visit with old friends, but they saw the Buffaloes continue their winning streak by defeating Rising Star 35-0. The Buffs district record is now 4-0 with only one game left...to be played at Lometa on Friday, November 3.

The game started out with Cross Plains' Mike Tollett intercepting a Rising Star pass on the Cross Plains 25 on the second

play of the game. The Cross Plains drive resulted in their first of 5 TDs. The Buffs scored in all but the 4th quarter.

In the first quarter, Donnie Dillard caught a 19 yard pass from Brock Walker for the first TD. The second TD was scored on a short 1 yard run by Jimmy Lee.

Walker scored next on a 14 yard run in the 2nd quarter. Tollett also scored on a 9 yard run in the 2nd quarter.

The Buffs last score came in the 3rd quarter on a long 50 yard run by Cole Gilliam. Porcious Potter again success-

fully handled the kicking duties and each of his 5 extra point attempts was successful.

The leading rusher was Gilliam with 13 carries for 112 yards; Lee carried 13 times for 106 yards. Walker was 7 for 41; Jeremy Barnett 4 for 13; Tollett 1 for 9; Jody Fortune 1 for 10; Joseph Hopkins 1 for 2; Sean Jones 1 for 4; and Kevin Nickerson 1 for 0. Total rushing yardage for Cross Plains was 38 carries for 277 yards. Rising Star had 28 carries for 133 yards.

In the passing department, Cross Plains

was 6 for 15 with no interceptions for a total of 121 yards. Walker threw 6 for 10 121 yards and Jeremy Barnett was 0 for 5. Donnie Dillard had 4 receptions for 76 yards and Lee had 2 receptions for 45 yards. Rising Star went 1 for 11 with 2 interceptions.

Other game stats included: Penalties: Cross Plains 5 for 55 yards; Rising Star 3 for 25 yards.

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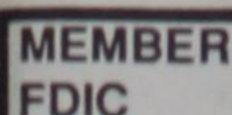

You have two choices in life — hide, or seek. It's an old game, hide and seek, and you're one or the other; there are no sidelines if you're playing the game. You are either hiding from the seeker, or seeking those who are hiding.

The Galilean said something about seeking. He said, "But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you," Matthew 6:33. In His "sermon from the mount" He discussed the futility of laying up treasures on earth, of trying to serve God and riches, and of worrying about food, clothing and shelter. 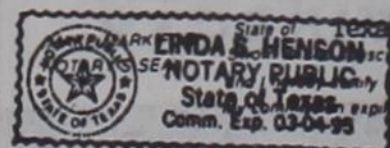
I have the solution — hide and seek. Seek God, and hide in His refuge! Come learn with us about "the hiding place," and "seeking first things first." We really do care about you, too!

The race for U.S. Senator includes Democrat Richard Fisher, Republican Kay Bailey Hutchison and Libertarian Pierre Blondeau.

The District 17 U.S. Representative candidates include Charles Stenholm, a Democrat and Republican Phil Boone.

levels. County ASC Committees are elected by eligible farmers.

WHO CAN VOTE: Farm owners, operators, tenant, and sharecroppers, of legal voting age, can vote if they are eligible to take part in any ASCS program. Check with your ASCS office for voting requirements.

NOMINATIONS: A petition signed by three eligible voters is needed to nominate a farmer-candidate. A statement must be included that the candidate has agreed to serve if elected.

ALMOST ANYONE ELIGIBLE TO TAKE PART IN A COUNTY ASCS PROGRAM MAY BE A CANDIDATE FOR THE COMMITTEE.

One of the committee's nominees must be from a minority group or a female (or both) if the county has five percent or more minority or female voters, and none are nominated by petition.

DON'T MISS OUT ON VOTING:

The 1994 election will end December 5. Ballots will be mailed at least 10 days before the election and must be returned or postmarked by December 5.

DISASTER PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

It is not known at this time if a disaster program will be approved for 1994 crops. If a program is approved, producers will be eligible for disaster payments if disaster program requirements are met and the following actions have been taken:

1) A crop acreage report has been timely filed for program and non-program crops (hay, vegetables, etc.) on form ASCS-578. Producers may file late if evidence of the crop being reported is still evident and a late filed certification fee is paid.

2) Form ASCS-574, Application for Disaster Credit, must be filed within 15 days of the date the disaster condition occurred or within 15 days after the crop is abandoned. Your farm will be visited to verify the condition of the crop. You need to have County Committee approval before destroying the crop by plowing, grazing, or baling.

3) For production which has been sold, all production records must indicate the producers name as well as the name and address of the buyer, the name of the crop sold, the price, the pounds sold and the identity of the farm where the crop was produced.

MAINTENANCE OF ACR, CU/ PAY ACRES

Farm program participants are reminded that haying or grazing of ACR and CU for pay acreage is prohibited through October 31, 1994. Participants are also required to keep the acreage free of weeds, insects and rodents, and protected from wind and water erosion.

1995 WHEAT PROGRAM PROVISIONS

USDA has announced a zero-percent acreage reduction program for the 1995 wheat crop. This level was chosen from the statutory range of 0 to 15 percent and is unchanged from 1994. The established target price is \$4 per bushel, which is also the same as 1994. A paid

land diversion will not be implemented. Other 1994 Wheat Program provisions will be announced later.

Recommended Deer Harvest

Landowners and hunters are reminded however, both bucks and antlerless deer must be tagged with the appropriate tag from a valid hunting license.

Deer populations vary from area to area and from ranch to ranch. The either sex regulation allows the landowner the flexibility to harvest deer on his property at the proper raters. It does not automatically mean that a heavy harvest of that the general deer hunting season in Callahan County will open Saturday, November 5, and run through January 1, 1995. The bag limit is 3 deer, limit 1 buck and 2 antlerless. No special permits are required for harvesting antlerless deer.

antlerless deer is needed. The recommended harvest rates of both antlerless deer and buck deer, as provided by the department, should be used only as a general guideline for harvesting deer. If more intense management of a place is desired, we suggest that the landowner should survey deer populations on his ranch on his own, this will allow him to get a more accurate representation of the deer found on his ranch. Please notice that in most cases the department recommends more antlerless deer to be harvested than bucks.

The recommended guideline for harvesting antlerless deer throughout most of Callahan County is 1 antlerless deer per 200 acres. The recommended buck harvest for the county is 1 mature buck per 400 acres.

1956 Football Team
